

## Alberts and Erdmann etch names into Cashmere history

Bulldog track and field fans may recognize Ellie Alberts and Grace Erdmann as two of the top athletes competing in the long jump and the triple jump.

Both athletes recently added their names to CHS track and field history after record-setting performances at the April 23 North Central Washington meet at Cashmere's field.

During the event, Alberts won the long jump with a record-setting leap of 16-7. Her mark beat the old record of 16.676 set by Jessica Bauer in 2014. Her mark puts her at sixth in the

Washington state 1A Classification standings.

On the same day, Erdmann won the triple jump with a record-setting 35-7, breaking the previous mark of 35-6.75, which former Bulldog Laura Jordan set in 2001.

She is ranked at No. 3 in the state with Alberts two places behind her.

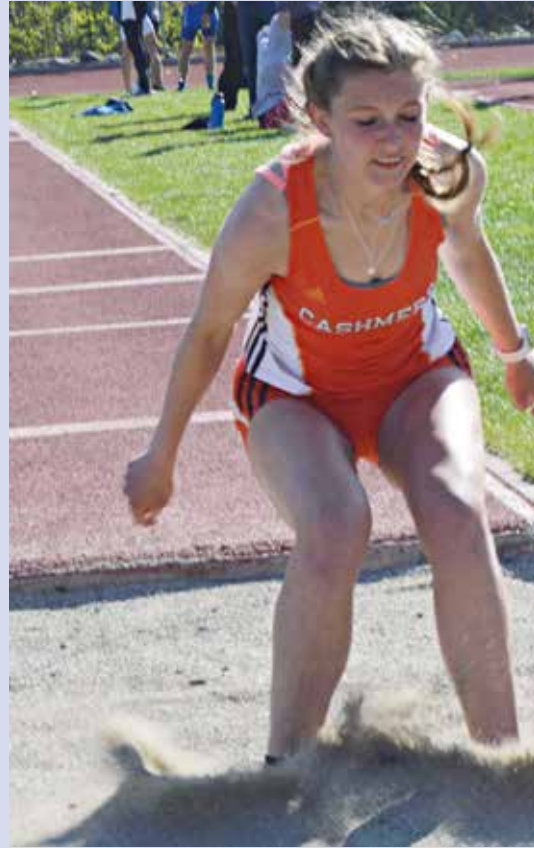
Erdmann had been chasing the triple jump record since she started track her sophomore year. During her initial weeks on the team, Erdmann tried several events before she realized she was good at the triple jump. As a sophomore, she achieved a mark of 35 feet and knew the CHS triple jump goal was within

reach.

"This year (I said) 'I'm No. 2 right now, but that's not No. 1,'" Erdmann said. "I want to be No. 1 in the school. Going into every meet that was my goal, to break the record."

Erdmann almost did not break the record on April 23. The day before the NCW meet, she came down with a case of food poisoning. She managed to recuperate and have the best triple jump performance in her high school athletic career.

"Just to have my name up there and knowing that I'm a part of school history is great because this school is one of the best athletic-wise," Erdmann said. "It's just awesome."

For Alberts, breaking the CHS long jump was a big accomplishment for her and attributed her success to her hard work in practice. Yet, the Cashmere senior also has her sights set on going beyond the record and competing in her fourth the state track and field championships for the fourth year in a row.

"(The record) is a goal you should always have, but it's not the main goal," Alberts stated. "The main goal is getting to state and doing well, and hopefully winning state... being grateful for the opportunity to be given that record, but still continue to work hard."

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## Just in time for summer - city plans pool repairs

Few things cure an antsy, long summer afternoon like a dip in the pool. On the brink of summer, while most of us prepare by stocking up on sunscreen and finding a pair of flip flops that match our favorite bathing suit - the city of Cashmere is making its rounds to ensure the community pool is ready for the upcoming 2019 season.

At the April 22 City Council meeting, Steve Croci, Director of Operations, gave an update on how the Cashmere city pool is looking for the summer. On the morning of April 22, the city conducted a dye test which revealed some issues with the guttering system.

"There's the pool and then there's the gutter that has the drains in it," explained Croci. "It's just the gutter."

The guttering system was repaired extensively a few years prior, according to Croci. But using a spray on liner, it was revealed the system is cracking.

"I think it's just the elevation change from the winter, freeze and thaw," said Croci.

He believes that currently it's losing about 40 gallons a minute. The water is seeping into the ground, some of the decks are slightly sunken in and also believed to be partially draining into Crunch Pak's parking lot.

"Maybe we do a temporary fix this year and do something bigger next year," said Croci.

The plan is to repair the leaks prior to June 13, the first day the general public can trickle in for cannonballs and swan dives. A date hasn't been set officially nor is a collaboration with Crunch Pak a definite, though Croci did say the city may approach the company. The city is already planning how to get the leak at least temporarily fixed for the summer.

## Local distillery finds second home in Cashmere Mill District

Future breeding ground of prominent businesses, the Cashmere Mill District Business Park, broke ground in September 2018. Cashmere residents that drive by the site have probably noticed the efficient progress made.

Beyond progression construction wise, the Port of Chelan County has already made big moves internally for the Mill District - a second tenant has been signed in April for a future residency in the development. Blue Spirits Distillery will be moving into the future business hub this summer when the buildings are completed.

"We're very happy with Blue Spirits being part of this property," said Craig Larsen, Port of Chelan County business development director. "Look forward

to getting them in those spaces this summer."

Blue Spirits will be leasing 6,831 square feet. The Cashmere functions will be production, storage and a consumer component. According to Larsen, the distillery will have a twist for consumers that want to bottle Blue Spirit's products.

"You can buy a barrel of whiskey and it will age there. You can come visit your whiskey and when you think it's ready they will bottle it for you," said Larsen. "Which is kind of a cool way to show people the distilling process and aging."

Blue Spirits isn't a foreign company to Cashmere locals or a stranger to the region - the distillery operates a tasting room in neighboring Leavenworth along with a location nestled in Lake

Not only will individuals be getting a buffet of community favorites but also giving back to Cashmere High School's Family Career and

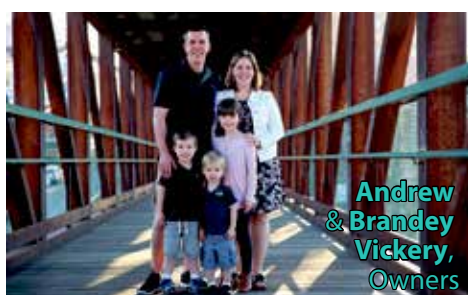
Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) students.

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# NATIONAL NURSES AND HOSPITAL WEEK

## May 6 - 12 is National Nurses Week

National Nurses Week begins each year on May 6th and ends on May 12th, Florence Nightingale's birthday. These permanent dates enhance planning and position National Nurses Week as an established recognition event. As of 1998, May 8 was designated as National Student Nurses Day, to be celebrated annually. And as of 2003, National School Nurse Day is celebrated on the Wednesday within National Nurses Week (May 6-12) each year.

The nursing profession has been supported and promoted by the American Nurses Association (ANA) since 1896. Each of ANA's state and territorial nurses associations promotes the nursing profession at the state and regional levels. Each conducts celebrations on these dates to recognize the contributions that nurses and nursing make to the community.

The ANA supports and encourages National Nurses Week recognition programs through the state and district nurses associations, other specialty nursing organizations, educational facilities, and independent health care companies and institutions.

### A Brief History of National Nurses Week

1953 Dorothy Sutherland of

the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare sent a proposal to President Eisenhower to proclaim a "Nurse Day" in October of the following year. The proclamation was never made.

1954 National Nurse Week was observed from October 11 - 16. The year of the observance marked the 100th anniversary of Florence Nightingale's mission to Crimea. Representative Frances P. Bolton sponsored the bill for a nurse week. Apparently, a bill for a National Nurse Week was introduced in the 1955 Congress, but no action was taken. Congress discontinued its practice of joint resolutions for national weeks of various kinds.

1972 Again a resolution was presented by the House of Representatives for the President to proclaim "National Registered Nurse Day." It did not occur. 1974 In January of that year, the International Council of Nurses (ICN) proclaimed that May 12 would be "International Nurse Day." (May 12 is the birthday of Florence Nightingale.) Since 1965, the ICN has celebrated "International Nurse Day."

1974 In February of that year, a week was designated by the White House as National Nurse Week, and President Nixon issued a proclamation.

1978 New Jersey Governor Brendan Byrne declared May 6 as "Nurses Day." Edward Scanlan, of Red Bank, N.J.,

took up the cause to perpetuate the recognition of nurses in his state. Mr. Scanlan had this date listed in Chase's Calendar of Annual Events. He promoted the celebration on his own.

1981 ANA, along with various nursing organizations, rallied to support a resolution initiated by nurses in New Mexico, through their Congressman, Manuel Lujan, to have May 6, 1982, established as "National Recognition Day for Nurses."

1982 In February, the ANA Board of Directors formally acknowledged May 6, 1982 as "National Nurses Day." The action affirmed a joint resolution of the United States Congress designating May 6 as "National Recognition Day for Nurses."

1982 President Ronald Reagan signed a proclamation on March 25, proclaiming

"National Recognition Day for Nurses" to be May 6, 1982.

1990 The ANA Board of Directors expanded the recognition of nurses to a week-long celebration, declaring May 6 - 12, 1991, as National Nurses Week.

1993 The ANA Board of Directors designated May 6 - 12 as permanent dates to observe National Nurses Week in 1994 and in all subsequent years.

1996 The ANA initiated "National RN Recognition Day" on May 6, 1996, to honor the nation's indispensable registered nurses for their tireless commitment 365 days a year. The ANA encourages its state and territorial nurses associations and other organizations to acknowledge May 6, 1996 as "National RN Recognition Day."

1997 The ANA Board of Directors, at the request of the National Student Nurses Association, designated May 8 as National Student Nurses Day.

## May 8<sup>th</sup> is National School Nurse Day

National School Nurse Day, an annual observation sponsored by the National Association of School Nurses, is designed to honor all school nurses. This year's celebration falls on May 8.

For some students, the school health services program or school-based health center serves as their primary connection to health services. School districts look to school nursing, a specialized practice of nursing, to provide oversight of student health conditions and promotes student health.

School nurses, grounded in ethical and evidence-based practice, function not only as care providers for students with highly diverse and demanding medical conditions, but as leaders who bridge health care and education, provide care coordination, advocate for quality student-centered care, and serve as critical links between the school, home,

community, primary healthcare providers, and community and mental health services. Their contributions to student health support attendance, engagement, graduation, and ultimately, development of successful community members.

School nursing responsibility for students with chronic health conditions, care coordination and monitoring is demanding, particularly when time and resources are limited. A school nurse may be responsible for students in multiple school buildings - some are responsible for multiple school districts - serving the needs of some school buildings one day per week or less. Workdays can be hectic as the healthcare needs of students are managed along with health services program requirements.

Take a moment on May 8 and thank them for all they do.

For months, the financial world was convinced that the trade war with China would be ending soon. The consensus was that a small, insignificant deal would be agreed to, and both sides would declare victory. After that, the entire global economy could gloriously move beyond all the trade uncertainty.

That's looking less likely now. Rather than a small deal, Trump seems to be going big. He's angling for a trade deal that fixes some of the biggest problems we have with China (including technological theft and government subsidizing their corporations). I will give Trump credit for trying, but a big, comprehensive deal won't be easy to accomplish.

Ominously, there's an obvious comparison to the North Korea situation. Trump picked a fight and successfully forced them to negotiate. While that was an accomplishment, it was only the beginning. Coming to a significant, verifiable deal is a lot more difficult - even for the world's greatest negotiator. There's a lot riding on this. When Trump walked away from North Korea talks with nothing, the stock market shrugged it off. However, if Trump walks away with nothing from China, it will be a much bigger problem for the markets.

However, it does seem like both sides want a deal. The American economy is slowing, some of Trump's strongest supporters in the Midwest are hurting, and there is an election next year. Trump would like to declare victory and move on.

Similarly, China would like to move on. Their economy slowed down significantly last year. It's hard to know how much of that slowdown was due to the trade war, and how much a result of China's own policies. They have been deliberately slowing their economy in an effort to get a handle on their massive amounts of debt. So, how much of their economic slowdown was because of the trade war, and how much was a result of China simply tightening their own belt?

At this point, China doesn't want to fight two battles, so they've given up on the belt tightening. They are stimulating their economy again, and their economy looks better as a result. However, they do not want to keep doing simulating. So, they would like to get a deal done and get back to focusing on their own problems.

Because both sides really want a deal, I still think the most likely scenario is that we will see a few small agreements, and all the difficult stuff will be continuously kicked down the road. While that's a lot better than any escalation of the trade war, it means that the tariffs, and all the uncertainty of the trade war, could be with us for a long time. That would not be a good outcome.

# Third-place Cashmere ends regular season with two-win streak

For the first time in their 2019 campaign, the young and inexperienced Cashmere High baseball team scored back-to-back wins.

The Bulldogs wrapped up the regular portion of their schedule with Caribou Trail League wins over Okanogan on April 30 and Cascade two days later.

While Cashmere (3-6 CTL, 5-14) wrangled up wins throughout the season, enough to finish third in conference play, the victories would follow with two or more losses. The recent win streak snapped Cashmere's four-game skid.
