The Cashmere High School boys basketball team ran through a gauntlet of competition last week with two Caribou Trail League games and a nonleague contest.

The Bulldogs began the week with an 80-54 CTL victory at Cascade on Jan. 15.

Cashmere jumped to 33-14 lead in the first quarter, including three three-pointers from Sam Phillips. The Kodiaks began to nip at the heels of the Bulldogs, outscoring them 16-9 in the second quarter to bring the scoring gap to 42-30 at helftime.

"In the last four games we were under after the first quarter so we were focused on getting a good start," Head Coach Levi Heyen said. "To score 33 points in the first quarter is a great way to get our offense to a good start."

Cashmere added 19 points in both the third and fourth quarters. Mason Landdeck led the Bulldogs with 27 points while Nate Phillips recorded 20 and Sam Phillips added

"When those guys are scoring well, we're a pretty dangerous team," Heyen said. "Even on some nights we've had Mason score high and Sam at 15, we've been able to find a way to win."

Heyen also complimented Cascade Head Coach Paul Fraker and what he has done with the Cascade program, as well as the work ethic of the Kodiaks team.

Local non-profit hoping to put permanent roots down

Many Cashmere residents have boxed up various food to donate to the Cashmere Food Bank - that forgotten can of corn in the corner of the pantry, grabbing double boxes of macaroni to drop off at the food bank on the way home or snagging the last few cranberry sauces on the shelf for those who can't afford as much for their Thanksgiving feast. The Cashmere community has been very forthcoming with paying it forward for those families who need the help, but now the Food Bank is looking for something more than just kitchen staples.

"People in the Cashmere Valley know we have had support maintaining food in the food bank and now we're just looking for a better way to serve those in need," said Pam Leighton, Cashmere Food Bank executive director.

Over the many years that have stretched between now and the food bank's inception, the food bank has primarily been somewhat temporarily placed until shifting to a new location.

"Because we've moved around a couple times over the years, I think people have gotten confused as to where we're at," said Leighton.

The food bank's current location is a warehouse esque, small section of a building on Railroad Avenue owned by an outside entity. However since this current distribution and food storage area has recently been put up for sale, it has left the food bank looking at the future quizzically for its location. But the for sale sign isn't the only element prodding the food bank to begin its quest for a permanent residency.

"We've expanded a bit to distribute out of that location, the building is up for sale so we don't know if we'll have to move once its sold," said Leighton. "It is small. It can get crowded in there on food distribution days and we have clients that have to wait outside -

regardless of how the weather is."

With around 40-50 families shuffling in to get their items, it can get to be cramped with the traffic in the small space. This has prompted the urge to search for a larger space to better accommodate the needs of clients. However, a larger space also requires a larger sum to fund the

new location.

Since the location is run by volunteers and is a non-profit, there is an obvious deficit between the budget and a pricey rent. Leighton stated that in December, households in Cashmere received a letter explaining the quest for a new landing spot.

"This was a way to let the community know what was happening and to seek possible donations. Since we're a 501c(3), anyone who donates can claim this on tax returns and that's our big push," said Leighton.

Though, the food bank isn't just banking on depending on donations and are simultaneously searching for other avenues of funding. On Thursday, January 17, Leighton said that there was a strategy meeting with facilitators to brainstorm and discuss ways to raise funds. Leighton also mentioned looking outside of donations by attempting to get grant money.

The persecution of Tim Eyeman continues

If you are going to challenge the political system be sure you have a lot of money and the help of a major law firm. Otherwise, you are in for a fight you cannot win.

It appears Attorney General Bob Ferguson continues his legal persecution of political activist Tim Eyman. Last week he requested the court declare

to represent Eyman. It seems the AG has invoked the nuclear option by convincing the court to declare no individual practitioner can keep up with the army of lawyers employed by the state. So only hours before he was to appear in court Eyman found

himself without legal council.

Eyman's attorney unqualified

It has been said that anyone who chooses to represent themself in court has a fool for a client. The problem is Eyman did not choose to represent himself he was forced to by the very people who have filed the actions against him.

Of course he lost the hearing on procedural grounds that he didn't follow proper court procedures. Of course he didn't. Eyman is not an attorney.

The goal of all of this appears to be nothing more than an attempt to silence Eyman. A blatant attempt to strip Eyman of his civil rights under our Constitution.

Ferguson is using the Campaign Finance Laws to persecute Eyman. Claiming

Eyman did not file proper reports with the Public Disclosure Commission. suit is for \$2.1 million dollars and a lifetime ban from participating in any political activity.

BILL FORHAN It has forced Eyman to **PUBLISHER** file for bankruptcy.

The problem is the penalty far outweighs other suits by the AG's office for similar violations of Campaign Finance law. A review of the Attorney General's website regarding enforcement action against campaign finance law violations shows the action against Eyman is remarkable. Only one other claim exceeds the amount sought against Eyman. That was against the Grocery Manufacturers Association for \$19.1 million. The next closest claim was against the Washington Education Association for \$975,000. The other 32 cases listed averaged \$74,609 including AGO costs for prosecuting the cases.

In December of 2017 The Spokesman Review ran a story about how Campaign Finance complaints were becoming the newest political weapon in Washington politics. Bob Ferguson's assault on Tim Eyman is moving that weapon from the big money politics of labor unions and political parties to individual citizens who are simply seeking to petition their government for

redress of their grievances. That is unconstitutional. As the chief legal officer for the state, Attorney General Robert (Bob) Ferguson should know

There is another political activist who has promised to bring suit against Ferguson for violation of the very Campaign Finance laws he is charging Tim Eyman with violating. Glen Morgan of WeTheGoverned. com has filed 14 claims of violation of Campaign Finance Laws by Ferguson according to a story on his website.

There is no reason that individual citizens should need to hire a major law firm to represent them when they are simply exercising their Constitutionally protected

It is time for political activists and organizations that claim to support holding government accountable to come together to support Tim Eyman. Organizations like Glen Morgan's WeTheGoverned and The Freedom Foundation need to call on Ferguson, Governor Inslee and both political parties to end this travesty.

The suit needs to be dropped. The state needs to agree to pay for Evman's current legal costs and Attorney General Bob Ferguson needs to resign. It is the only fair solution to this egregious abuse of an ordinary

In light of the Supreme Court Decision in Citizens United there is some question about the legality of the entire Campaign Finance Law and the Public Disclosure Commission.

State Parks: 12 free days in 2019

PARKS COMMISSION NEWS RELEASE

The Washington State Parks and Recreation Commission will again offer 12 free days next year, in which day-use visitors won't need a Discover Pass to visit state parks by

State Parks free days are in keeping with 2011 legislation that created the Discover Pass, which costs \$30 annually or \$10 for a one-day visit. The pass is required for vehicle access to state recreation lands managed by Washington State Parks, the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) and the Department of Natural Resources (DNR). The Discover Pass legislation directed State Parks to designate up to 12 free days when the pass would not be required to visit state parks. The free days apply only at state parks; the Discover Pass is still required on WDFW and DNR lands.

"We think the State Parks free days are a great way for people to try a new park or visit an old favorite," said State Parks Director Don Hoch. State Parks, in coordination

with WDFW, will once again offer a free day on Sunday, June 9, as part of WDFW's Free Fishing Weekend. This day, combined with the June 8 free day for National Get Outdoors Day, will give visitors an entire weekend to explore state parks for free.

Cashmere looking ahead for future crosswalks

'Look both ways', 'Stay on the sidewalk', 'Wear your

helmet': These are common reminders shouted at the backs of children on their way out the door to head to school. Sometimes these cautionary tips fall on deaf ears and students that chose to walk to school sometimes forget traffic dangers.

The city of Cashmere has an upcoming project to harness in some dangers for those students who walk or ride their bicycle to school - recently approved for the Safe Routes funding, the city is planning on installing four flashing beacons on Pioneer Avenue, near Vale Elementary.

"It's a state grant for safe walking and bicycle routes. This is to make sure that drivers are paying attention and to make it safer for kids," said city of Cashmere mayor Jim Fletcher. "We're trying to avoid any and all accidents. In this world, drivers are more and more distracted."

WSDOT's Safe Routes program offers funding to improve conditions and as a result encourage children to walk or bike to school. According to WSDOT's website, the program started back in 2005 and has awarded funds to

291 schools across Washington state. The city of Cashmere has now been offered the same opportunity to improve safety traffic conditions as well.

There is currently a flashing light on South Division Street, but according to Fletcher the new flashing beacons will be scattered on Pioneer Avenue. There will be one in front Vale Elementary, one that somewhat aligns with Mission Creek Road, one nearby the park and one at the intersection of Pioneer and Tigner.

This is primarily due to the proximity to Vale Elementary, which is where the youngest members of the Cashmere School District family attend.

"The flashing light will have a button for kids to press before they cross," explained Fletcher. "These locations were chosen because of the

high usage of young children." The total estimated cost comes to \$190,000 with the grant covering \$180,000 and the city chipping in \$10,000. However, funding won't be available until July when the

state budget becomes active. According to Fletcher, details such as final design planning and construction bids will began gaining traction in the fall of 2019 and then by spring 2020, the construction of the crosswalks should began.

Van Lith breaks CHS three-pointer record

Cashmere High School's Hailey Van Lith added another milestone to her impressive high school basketball career.

During the Lady Bulldog's 62-44 nonleague win against Medical Lake on Jan. 5, the junior point guard broke the CHS record for most threepointers in a single game with

"I was super excited (to break the record), but also super grateful that I play for a coach and a program that allows me to do things like that, and teammates who know when to give me the ball in the right spot," Van Lith said.

Head Coach Brent Darnell noted Van Lith shot an 81 percentage in three-pointers during the evening.

"I've watched a lot of high school basketball and a lot of college basketball over the years, and I've never seen a girl make nine-three pointers

in a game," Darnell said. "The impressive thing with those nine three-pointers is she was playing against a Box and 1 Defense, so every three (point shot) she took was contested. She hit a couple of what we call 'catch-and-shoot threes,' but most of her threes came from making a move, taking a step back and hitting a tough shot."

Darnell said Van Lith, who was a starter as a freshman and a sophomore, leads the program in every statistical category. He explained Van Lith is the most aggressive girl he has coached, and "plays physical and strong in such high gear." Scoring is not the only strong aspect of Van Lith's game as Darnell commended her passing and defense. He also acknowledged Van Lith's high basketball IQ, experience in big-game situations and being vocal on the court.

"She's good at communicating offense and defense, and being a

cheerleader on the floor at the same time she's playing," he said. "It's been like having another coach on the floor. It's a huge advantage to us."

Van Lith already has several accolades in her high school career. It was almost a year ago when she scored 1,000 career points, a feat many athletes accomplish do not accomplish in their high school career. She earned numerous league and state honors, including the 2018 Washington Interscholastic Activities Association Class 1A MVP, the WIAA All-State Class 1A first team and All-Caribou Trail League MVP in 2017 and

Outside of school, she has won gold medals as a member of the 2018 Youth Olympic team and 2018 FIBA U17 World Cup. She also competed on the Northwest Blazers.

2018 and Adidas All-American.

Van Lith said competing in AAU basketball and the summer league has helped her get in the best shape and

mindset of high competition of winter basketball.

Even with all of her accomplishments, Van Lith, the daughter of Jessica and Corey Van Lith, is grateful for everyone in the Bulldogs basketball program, from her teammates and coaches to the stat keeper.

"Living in a small town, there is a family atmosphere everywhere," Van Lith said. "My parents remind me not to forget where you come from. I'm always trying to remember that I didn't do this by myself. All these people and all of my friends pushed me to this level. I owe my success to a lot of people."

In addition to her teammates, Lith lists several professional athletes who have influenced her playing style and competitiveness, like WNBA superstar Diana Turasi and NBA player Kyrie Irving.

Van Lith has aspirations to play at the college level, going back to when she was little. She already has several goals she wants to accomplish in her college career, such as being a four-time National Player of the Year, winning four national championships and being selected as a first-round draft pick for the WNBA.

"When I was little, I would pray and beg that UCONN would give me a scholarship," Van Lith said. "It's just crazy to think that I can choose if I want to go there or not. It just shows that if you're willing to put in the work that you can do anything, even if you're from Cashmere, Washington. Nothing can stop you. Basketball is a process and you can never stop. I'm going to have to stay hungry to accomplish my goals."

The Lady Bulldogs recently captured the CTL league championship after their 62-6 win over Cascade on Jan. 15. Van Lith said Cashmere is set on winning the district and will not overlook the other teams in the last round of league play.

While breaking the CHS three-point single game record was another accomplishment, Van Lith's favorite memory so far in her Bulldog basketball career was one she shared with her teammates during the Monday, Jan. 7 practice.

"We do box out percentages

and we have a goal of getting 70 percent as a team," Van Lith said. "We hadn't reached that (goal) this year and we would have had to run a lot in practice if we didn't get 70 percent against Medical Lake. We got 71 percent against Medical Lake. How much we celebrated after they told us the percentage and how we accomplished our goal was something special. It showed how close we are as a

The Cashmere High School girls basketball team checked one goal off their 2018-19 season list - a Caribou Trail League championship.

The Lady Bulldogs claimed their sixth conference title after their 62-6 win against Cascade on Jan. 15. The victory over the Lady Kodiaks brought Cashmere's league record to 8-0. The Lady Bulldogs had defeated every other CTL team twice to outright earn the conference title.

With a lock on the league championship at stake, Head Coach Brent Darnell said Cashmere was focused on coming out of the gate and winning the game against Cascade at all costs.

The Lady Bulldogs jumped out to a 21-3 lead in the first quarter with Hailey Van Lith scoring 12 points. In the second quarter, Cashmere boosted their lead with 18 points to take a 39-3 lead in the first half.

Cashmere added 12 points in the third quarter and 11 in the fourth frame to secure the win.

Darnell noted the Lady Bulldogs played against a solid Cascade defense and commended the Lady Kodiaks' focus, work ethic and attitude throughout the game.

Van Lith led the Lady Bulldogs in scoring with 25 while Ellie Alberts added 15 and Grace Hammond had 11. Grace Erdman recorded 13

Bulldogs forced 36 turnovers to Cascade's six.

"We played 11 kids tonight and had seven score, I thought we did a good job at shooting," Darnell said. "It was a fun game."

Cashmere continued the week with a 75-34 thumping of Chelan in front of a packed gym on Jan. 18.

The Lady Bulldogs opened with a 33-5 lead in the first quarter, including 18 points from Van Lith.

"We had as good of a first quarter (in this game) as we have had all season," Darnell said. "The girls were amped up to play, it was a packed house and a great environment.'

Cashmere continued their momentum with 16 points in the second quarter to lead 49-23 at the first half. The Lady Bulldogs boosted their lead with 19 points in the third quarter, and seven more in the final frame.

Darnell said the Lady Bulldogs played great defense in the first, third and fourth quarters. He noted the team tried to score too fast in the second quarter, which allowed Chelan to add 18 points. He also commended Cashmere's resilience and ability to come back after a slow quarter.

"They take that first punch and they get back up, they're extremely competitive," Darnell added.







One of my neighbors swears that rubbing DMSO really helps his arthritic joints, while my sister-in-law keeps insisting that MSM is the same thing as DMSO but without the smell. Which one is right?

DMSO is the abbreviation for dimethyl sulfoxide, a powerful solvent that is produced when processing wood pulp into paper and paper products. DMSO is widely used as an industrial-strength degreaser and as a solvent for many products, including antibiotics, herbicides and fungicides. In medicine, DMSO is commonly used as a cryopreservative for tissue samples, protecting the cells as they are frozen, and also used by veterinarians on horses to reduce swelling from trauma. Not just a solvent, DMSO has a unique and interesting quality: it penetrates through skin and travels into your muscles and bloodstream. Not only does DMSO easily move through your skin, it will carry other chemicals or medicines into your body along with it. DMSO was marketed for relief of muscle soreness and arthritis because it was used in horses and dogs to help decrease pain and swelling of muscles after

an acute injury. Because of its ability to pass through the skin, veterinarians are cautioned to use rubber gloves when applying DMSO. In humans, DMSO is used to treat a painful condition called interstitial cystitis by putting a solution containing it directly into the bladder. DMSO also helps decrease tissue damage from certain cancer drugs that cause severe tissue damage if they leak out of your vein into the surrounding tissues, causing intense pain as they eat away your nerves, blood vessels and muscles. DMSO travels rapidly through the skin to dilate blood vessels, helping to flush away the caustic chemotherapy drug and reduce the risk of permanent tissue damage.

DMSO has been used in topical products to help reduce the burning and tingling pain caused by shingles, called post-herpetic neuralgia. This effect may be from its ability to interfere with a certain type

of nerve transmission called C-type fibers that send pain messages to your brain. One of more unusual characteristics of DMSO is that concentrations of 80-100% will penetrate your skin quickly and easily, traveling through your muscles and into your bloodstream. This effect can enhance the action of some medicines, like insulin. DMSO is also one of the main ingredients in the prescription medicine Pennsaid®, the other ingredient being an antiinflammatory medicine very similar to ibuprofen, applied to the skin of painful knee joints twice a day. Although most creams and lotions don't cause side effects, DMSO is an exception, because it travels through your skin into your bloodstream and throughout the rest of your body. Common side effects from using DMSO include drowsiness, headache, dizziness, dry skin, a garlic-like taste in your mouth, and a garliconion body odor. The garlic

taste and body odor are from the sulfur part of the DMSO molecule, which is believed to encourage cartilage formation. When using DMSO, some of it is changed inside your body into a closely related compound called methylsulfonylmethane, or simply MSM. MSM is widely marketed as an analgesic and anti-inflammatory supplement for osteoarthritis, although there is little solid scientific evidence that it works. Although DMSO or MSM may only offer only modest pain relief, it still may be enough to help you. MSM is usually a better choice than DMSO because it has fewer side effects and no garlicky taste or body odor. The usual dose of MSM is 500 mg to 1000 mg taken 2 to 3 times a day for relief of pain and stiffness and it's often combined with glucosamine or chondroitin.

Cashmere Council adopts Water Use Efficiency Program goals

CHS students star in Legally Blonde - The Musical

The Cashmere City Council began the 2019 with adopting new goals for the city's Water Use Efficiency Program.

During the Jan. 14 meeting, Director of Operations Steve Croci presented new goals for the program. He said staff proposed these objectives to help improve the efficiency of the city's water system. He noted the city accomplished previous objectives set in 2011, such as a 2 percent reduction in per capita water consumption, which is currently at 12 percent.

One of the recommended goals for 2019 is to reduce Equivalent Residential Use consumption by 1 percent in 2024, and 2 percent by 2039. The second goal is for the city to maintain its distribution system leakage (DSL) below 10 percent.

Croci said the city's DSL was previously 35 percent, which prompted the creation of an action plan to reduce leakage

by 33 percent. Staff fixed a leak at the mill site, which reduced the city's leakage by 76 percent. Cashmere's current DSL is below 10 percent.

Ryan Peterson, Engineering, said larger water systems have between 5-10 percent DSL. Cashmere is not required to create an action plan this time because the city's leakage does not exceed 10 percent.

"It's impossible to be zero (percent), but if you can stay in the range of 5-10 percent, that's fantastic," Peterson added.

Croci said the city would work toward achieving these new goals through customer education and periodic leak detection surveys.

In other action items, the council voted on a response plan if E.coli is detected in a routine distribution sample from the city's water system.

Council voted to wait until repeat samples confirm the presence of E.coli in the water

distribution system within 24 hours before advising water customers. Although Cashmere has never had a water sample test positive for E. coli, the city needed to develop a response plan in case the strain is found in a routine distribution sample.

Peterson explained when a water sample tests positive for coliform, staff will acquire a repeat sample to determine if there is coliform in the system. When a lab performs a coliform test on a repeat sample, they will also conduct an E. coli test. If the sample tests positive for E. coli, the city must issue a notification within 24 hours.

He added samples having the presence of E.coli are false positive 50 percent of the time.

The council received an update regarding state funding for a project.

Mayor Jim Fletcher said he was notified the city was approved for a Safe Routes to School grant from the Washington State Department

of Transportation (WSDOT) for a project on Pioneer Avenue. The project will consist of installing flashing beacons at four crosswalks on Pioneer Avenue near Vale Elementary School. The beacons will be similar to the one installed on South Division Street.

Fletcher said the project's estimated cost is \$190,000. The grant will cover \$180,000 while the city will pay a \$10,000 match. He added the funds will not be available until after the state passes the budget.

In other business:

- The council adopted an amendment to Ordinance No. 1274, which adds Section 5.04.100 "Revocation of a Business License" to the city's municipal code.

- Council also approved a resolution establishing budget and reserve policies.

- Fletcher announced there will be a community workshop on Jan. 28 at 6 p.m. at the Cashmere Riverside Center.
