

### Giving back to remember a friend, Christmas spirit

Many kids scrawl “Lemonade Stand” on a makeshift box or carefully deposit the loose change mom dropped on the floorboard in their piggy bank - usually this is to save up for a new bike helmet or designated for fund reserved for when the ice cream truck barrels around the corner. However, ten-year-old Riley Acheson of Cashmere, put on her apron and began baking to sell cookies and cakes, not for any personal gain, but in honor of her Leavenworth friend Emma Davenport and simultaneously as a means to provide to Operation Christmas Child.

shoeboxes - and then Operation Christmas Child plays as the middle-man Santa and delivers millions of shoeboxes to children worldwide.

“Emma and Riley were friends and this was part of her way to give back and honor Emma and Emma’s birthday,” said Whitney Acheson, Riley’s mom. “She wanted to do a bake sale, bake cookies and cakes and a lot of other things, in an effort to raise money to fill shoeboxes for Operation Christmas Child.”

The pair, Acheson and Davenport, had planned to join forces for this particular project due to both of their families previously participating, according to Acheson. After Davenport passed away in last July, Acheson didn’t falter from their original plan to give back - instead she expanded the idea to make it bigger in Emma’s honor.

“We started the auction (for the baked goods) on Emma’s birthday, September 22. It took about a month, with school, to make the goods and deliver them. November was when the shoeboxes were due,” said Acheson.

The pint sized good samaritan remained focused on her goal from the end of September until November, working hard to bake, deliver and get the supplies for the shoeboxes themselves. With the help of the Light In The Valley Church (Peshastin) members, Acheson and community members filled 145 boxes to be later shipped out by Operation Christmas Child.

“A lot of people came out to the filling party,” said Acheson. “It was quite the task, but a lot of people, even people who didn’t know Emma personally, came out to support the cause and the idea. It was neat that the community came together.”

### Keith Goehner comments on his win, future in legislature

The final result was impressive: Chelan County Commissioner Keith Goehner (R) defeated independent Ann Diamond by more than 13 percentage points, or more than 6,000 votes out of nearly 50,000 cast on November 6, for the seat vacated by Cary Condotta for 12th State Representative.

“I’m grateful to the voters and look forward to representing the whole district, which is much larger geographically than just Chelan County,” Goehner said.

He said it will be a “steep learning

curve” but “looks forward to the challenge to learn as much as I can.”

Before he takes his seat in Olympia he stated in an exclusive interview with NCW Media, parent company of the Cashmere Valley Record, Lake Chelan Mirror and Leavenworth Echo, that he still needs to make a few “minor changes” on the county level before he tackles “bigger issues” such as the recent carbon tax referendum defeated by the voters.

Goehner acknowledges the carbon tax initiative is not going quietly into the night, stating the state “will still have to deal with it.”

In a previous interview with this

reporter, Goehner had this to say about a variety of issues after 16 years serving the county stating he has an advantage over many in the legislature because of his county commission experience, “There are not many in the legislature who have county experience and understand how their actions impact the functions of local government. Unfunded mandates are not supposed to exist, but each session brings more expectations of new services without funding to carry out the new laws,” he said.

Sheriff Brian Burnett was recently appointed by Governor Jay Inslee to the Board of Commissioners of the Washington State Criminal Justice Training Commission (CJTC). The CJTC Board of Commissioners develops and implements training standards and programs designed to upgrade criminal justice personnel and establishes standards relating to physical, mental, and moral fitness for recruiting criminal Justice personnel.

The Board includes two incumbent sheriffs; two incumbent police chiefs; two officers at or below the level of first line supervisor; one from a county and one from a municipal law enforcement agency with at least 10 years' experience; one county and one state correctional system employee; one incumbent county prosecutor or municipal attorney; one local government elected official, and one member

of the general public. The Board of Commissioners also include four ex-officio members, Washington State Patrol Chief, FBI, Washington State Attorney General, and an Employee of the State Correctional System.

This appointment, bestowed by the Governor, is an honor for Sheriff Burnett, and he hopes it will equally benefit the Washington State Criminal Justice Commission and the Citizens of Chelan County for the next six (6) years, which is the full term of the appointment. The CJTC Board of Commissioners meets quarterly throughout the year and is governed by Title 139 of the Washington Administrative Code.

Sheriff Burnett recognizes the importance of balancing local issues with those that require our local officials to work outside their home area with peers from around the state for the betterment of public safety within their communities.

# The Real Santa Claus

Christmas season is upon us and along with it, decorations, television advertisements and store displays depicting the man from the North Pole—Santa Claus

always been my favorite and I share it every chance I get this time of year.

In the 4th century, things seemed to be going well for Christianity; churches were filled, there was freedom to preach the gospel and this vast Roman Empire was steadily becoming united under the banner of Christ.

Until one man, a priest no less, named Arius of Alexandria dared to challenge the very doctrine that Christianity is built upon—the very nature of Christ himself (Matt. 16:13-18).

Arius' views centered on attacking the deity of Jesus, saying that Jesus is not of the same essence as God the Father but Christ was the first and greatest being created by God.

This false teaching sent the empire into a frenzy, not only upsetting churches but whole communities and something had to be done.

The plan: call over 300 bishops and have them convene in the city of Nicaea to discuss the nature of Jesus—is Jesus God or not?

And in 325 A.D. it happens. As the story goes, Arius stands in the center of a great meeting hall, surrounded by bishops from all over the known world and begins to vigorously contend that Jesus is not co-equal nor is he co-eternal with God the Father.

Agitated by Arius' overt and arrogant blasphemy and zealous to defend the Lord Jesus Christ, Nicholas rises to

his feet and approaches Arius, striking him in the face.

Who would have thought that the beloved bishop from Myrna would start a fist fight at the first ecumenical council?

Long story short: The fight breaks up, Nicholas is defrocked for the outburst (he would later be reinstated as bishop) and the Council of Nicaea reaffirms Biblical Orthodoxy, condemning Arius and his views as grossly heretical.

Now I don't condone punching heretics or committing violence against people that disagree with the Bible. Yet while I disagree with Nicholas losing his cool, I can still appreciate and respect what motivated him.

In a day when the truth is attacked more than ever and Christ is blasphemed in the most sickening of ways, I wonder if we Christians feel anything anymore?

We ought to be angry at what angers God. Sin should never be tolerated and when we confront it in our own lives especially, there ought to rise up within us a holy anger which motivates us to action.

What the real Santa Claus modeled in his life and ministry was a zeal for the truth and taking a stand when necessary.

Although we shouldn't mirror his response to Arius, we should, however, be willing to be bold for what is right.

A man of courage and hero of Biblical orthodoxy or Jolly Old Elf, which one will you choose to tell your kids?

I will pick the real Saint Nicholas over any fairy tale.

Goehner's vision extends to the future, "There are several areas that need to be focused on because of their long-term effects. Forest health issues are getting a lot of attention, but the work that needs to be done is slow in materializing. To avoid catastrophic fires like we have seen, we must be aggressive in reducing fuels and thinning trees for a healthier and more productive forest. Even though the Hirst issue was resolved, water availability will continue to be an issue of great concern for the 12th District. As we continue to grow and attract new businesses, we must assure that water supply will be predictable. We need to continue to pursue storage as an option for water availability," he said.

Because agriculture and tourism are the main "industries" in the 12th District, Goehner said the key to helping them stay healthy, "is to not burden a business with taxes and regulations that impede its development and expansion. Agriculture has been and continues to be the cornerstone of the 12th District's economy so it is critical to ensure labor supply is sufficient to harvest crops in a timely manner. Recent decisions at the state level relating to agriculture have created more burdens and obligations for farmers. There is still great potential for expanding tourism, but the hospitality industry needs to be encouraged to plan for more housing opportunities for guests. We need to address traffic flow issues to accommodate the increase in tourism-related traffic."

Anyone living in Chelan County is aware of the housing shortage about which Goehner said, "Affordable housing continues to be a topic of concern, but the state continues to modify standards that add costs to the price of construction. ... there should be allowances for greater utilization of the land. The 'one size fits all' of GMA (Growth Management Act) has proven that there are ways that we can accomplish the intent of the act while taking advantage of creative planning opportunities. I would support tax incentives and bonus densities, in certain situations, to encourage lower cost housing."

Regarding the marijuana industry, Goehner said, "The marijuana industry has created zoning which was not anticipated, but it has generated significant revenue for the state. Within the district, there has not been much revenue returned

to cities and counties even though local jurisdictions are left to deal with the negative impacts. As the commercial aspects of the industry evolve, I am hopeful that the conflicts we see today will be resolved."

Regarding the recent Hirst Decision amendment, Goehner, "The mitigation was helpful, but there will still be court challenges to determine who has senior rights and municipal supply."

Goehner feels he has allies in Olympia that will protect the 12th District family and rural way of life, stating, "There are numerous individuals who are our allies to protect rural lifestyles. ... it is always interesting to see how similar the 12th District is to other rural districts irrespective of the

East-West divide. Rural areas share values and mindsets that the more urban districts have a hard time relating to."

He also feels there should be a rapprochement with those on the other side of the isle, "... I will make every effort to seek out those that I may initially disagree with. Respectful building of relationships and clear communication are critical to being effective. Olympia has become increasingly polarized and on key issues, resolution must have meaningful dialogue. There will be times when there will be a need to agree to disagree, but it needs to be done in a manner that does not alienate the other person. I hope to develop relationships on both

sides of the aisle," Goehner said.

He said last week, "I look forward to working with (the other 12th District Representative) Mike Steele," he said, "I think we should work well together."

His current county responsibilities include membership on the Washington Counties Risk Pool - Executive Committee; Skillsource; the Regional Water Resource Committee; the Upper Valley Parks Service Area; the NCW Realtors Governmental Affairs Committee; Rivercom; the Chelan County Fair Board; WSAC; the Wenatchee Watershed Planning; the Solid Waste Council; the Chelan County Disability Board; and the Health Board.
