Giving back to remember a friend, Christmas spirit

Many kids scrawl "Lemonade Stand" on a makeshift box or carefully deposit the loose change mom dropped on the floorboard in their piggy bank - usually this is to save up for a new bike helmet or designated for fund reserved for when the ice cream truck barrels around the corner. However, ten-year-old Riley Acheson of Cashmere, put on her apron and began baking to sell cookies and cakes, not for any personal gain, but in honor of her Leavenworth friend Emma Davenport and simultaneously as a means to provide to Operation Christmas Child.

Operation Christmas Child is an annual campaign put on by the Christian charity Samaritan's Purse, which is run by evangelist Franklin Graham. Churches and schools pack up crayons, toys, toothbrushes and other assorted kid friendly products in colorful



shoeboxes - and then Operation Christmas Child plays as the middle-man Santa and delivers millions of shoeboxes to children worldwide.

"Emma and Riley were friends and this was part of her way to give back and honor Emma and Emma's birthday," said Whitney Acheson, Riley's mom. "She wanted to do a bake sale, bake cookies and cakes and a lot of other things, in an effort to raise money to fill shoeboxes for Operation Christmas Child."

The pair, Acheson and Davenport, had planned to join forces for this particular project due to both of their families previously participating, according to Acheson. After Davenport passed away in last July, Acheson didn't falter from the their original plan to give back - instead she expanded the idea to make it bigger in Emma's honor.

"We started the auction (for the baked goods) on Emma's birthday, September 22. It took about a month, with school, to make the goods and deliver them. November was when the shoeboxes were due," said Acheson.

The pint sized good samaritan remained focused on her goal from the end of September until

November, working hard to bake, deliver and get the supplies for the shoeboxes themselves. With the help of the Light In The Valley Church (Peshastin) members, Acheson and community members filled 145 boxes to be later shipped out by Operation Christmas Child.

"A lot of people came out to the filling party," said Acheson. "It was quite the task, but a lot of people, even people who didn't know Emma personally, came out to the support the cause and the idea. It was neat that the community came together."

Keith Goehner comments on his win, future in legislature

The final result was impressive: Chelan County Commissioner Keith Goehner (R) defeated independent Ann Diamond by more than 13 percentage points, or more than 6,000 votes out of nearly 50,000 cast on November 6, for the seat vacated by Cary Condotta for 12th State Representative.

"I'm grateful to the voters and look forward to representing the whole district, which is much larger geographically than just Chelan County," Goehner said.

He said it will be a "steep learning

curve" but "looks forward to the challenge to learn as much as I can."


Before he takes his seat in Olympia he stated in an exclusive interview with NCW Media, parent company of the Cashmere Valley Record, Lake Chelan Mirror and Leavenworth Echo, that he still needs to make a few "minor changes" on the county level before he tackles "bigger issues" such as the recent carbon tax referendum defeated by the voters.

Goehner acknowledges the carbon tax initiative is not going quietly into the night, stating the state "will still have to deal with it."

In a previous interview with this

reporter, Goehner had this to say about a variety of issues after 16 years serving the county stating he has an advantage over many in the legislature because of his county commission experience, "There are not many in the legislature who have county experience and understand how their actions impact the functions of local government. Unfunded mandates are not supposed to exist, but each session brings more expectations of new services without funding to carry out the new laws," he said.



Handwashing is one of the most valuable skills you can acquire. Using an effective hand washing technique and doing it frequently is absolutely the



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MOST effective way to reduce colds and viral illnesses of all kinds in yourself and your family. This week was National Hand Washing Week, and yesterday I received an email from my clinic's Safety Committee, reminding me of the critical importance of washing/sanitizing your hands in reducing the spread of illness in yourself and your patients. According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), healthcare personnel practice hand hygiene only about half as frequently as we should. Yikes! There's plenty of room for improvement! There's also plenty of room for improvement if you watch how people wash (or barely wipe) their hands in the restrooms of airports, movie theatres and restaurants. When it comes to performing this vitally important skill, it seems that most of us could definitely use an upgrade.

How should you wash your hands? First, you have a choice between hand soap or hand gel or sanitizer. Which one is best? That depends. Unless your hands have dirt, visible soil or grease on them, you can effectively wash or sanitize your hands using either soap and water or an alcohol-based gel or foam, as long as the alcohol gel or foam contains at least 65-70% alcohol. If your hands are dirty or greasy, washing them with soap and water is more effective than using gel or foam.In health care settings, using alcohol-based hand rubs for hand hygiene is strongly encouraged because they are more convenient to use and, when used properly, they can kill bacteria more effectively more quickly than washing with soap and water. Alcohol based hand gels are also less irritating to the skin than soap and water, which is important in health care settings because health care providers need to wash their hands frequently during each shift as they care for their

and viruses from their surface by friction and rinsing them away, not by killing them with a chemical. Personally, I avoid antibacterial soap because I've developed a serious contact allergy triclosan, a common ingredient in liquid antibacterial soaps like Dial® and Softsoap®. Whenever I travel I bring one of those small hotel bottles of shampoo with me to use instead of the industrial antibacterial liquid soaps in airports and restaurants, so my hands don't break out in red. itchy welts.

What's most important is HOW you wash your hands.

1. Rub the soap or alcohol gel over ALL the surfaces of your hands, especially fingertips, fingernails and between your fingers

2. Keep rubbing LONG ENOUGH, which is for at least 15 seconds.

To ensure you are doing it right, one very successful strategy is to hum a catchy song that takes you 15-20 seconds to finish it while you rub in the soap or gel in a pattern covering the tops, palms, between your fingers, and each one of your fingertips and fingernails. Singing 1 verse of the songs Freres Jacques, The Itsy Bitsy Spider, and 2 verses of Happy Birthday, the Alphabet Song, or Row, Row, Row Your Boat are popular choices that last about 15-20 seconds. My own personal favorite? The Itsy Bitsy Spider. There's lots of information about teaching children effective hand washing technique online.

Here are 6 Key **Strategies for Effective** Hand washing:

1. Do it frequently. Wash or sanitize your hands BEFORE eating, BEFORE and AFTER caring for loved ones who are ill, and AFTER the bathroom, handling animals or pets, or sneezing or wiping vour eves or nose.

2. Check the label. For

3. Rub your hands thoroughly. Make sure you are rubbing soap or gel over EVERY surface of your hands, especially all of your fingertips and fingernails.

4. Don't skimp on hand gel. Many people swipe hand gel around and that's it. hands. Singing a song is an effective way to keep yourself from stopping too soon.

6. Antibacterial soap is not necessary. Using a hand soap that contains an antibacterial chemical does not make up for not using good hand washing technique.

The Real Santa Claus

Christmas season is upon us and along with it, decorations, television advertisements and store displays depicting the man from the North Pole—Santa Claus

Dressed in the red jumpsuit, fluffy white beard, round belly and usually carrying a large sack, I cannot help but shake my head at the images.

Santa Claus, or should SMITH I say Saint Nicholas has been reduced to a cartoon or even worse, a marketing strategy.

What a shame.

Call me a grinch, but the real Saint Nicholas is a thousand times more compelling than any jolly old elf who says "ho, ho, ho".

The real Saint Nicholas was a hero, a champion of justice and above all, a Christian.

The stories of Nicholas of Myrna and his ministry are ubiquitous. For example, there was that time when he rescued three young women from a life of prostitution by secretly paying their dowry. Or where he exposed a corrupt judge and saved falsely accused men from being executed. There was also that one occasion where he resurrected children and kept them safe from a wicked butcher who was wanting to sell them as food.

There are many more stories of Nicholas that we could mention. Some bordering on the strangely miraculous others more rooted in the everyday experience of a minister of the gospel.

Yet there is one that has

always been my favorite and I share it every chance I get this time of year.

In the 4th century, things seemed to be going well for Christianity; churches were filled, there was freedom to preach the gospel and **A WALK** this vast Roman Empire was steadily becoming PASTOR united under the banner of Christ.

Until one man, a priest no less, named

Arius of Alexandria dared to challenge the very doctrine that Christianity is built upon-the very nature of Christ himself (Matt. 16:13-18).

Arius' views centered on attacking the deity of Jesus, saying that Jesus is not of the same essence as God the Father but Christ was the first and greatest being created by God

This false teaching sent the empire into a frenzy, not only upsetting churches but whole communities and something had to be done.

The plan: call over 300 bishops and have them convene in the city of Nicaea to discuss the nature of Jesus-is Jesus God or not?

And in 325 A.D. it happens.

As the story goes, Arius stands in the center of a great meeting hall, surrounded by bishops from all over the known world and begins to vigorously contend that Jesus is not coequal nor is he co-eternal with God the Father.

Agitated by Arius' overt and arrogant blasphemy and zealous to defend the Lord Jesus Christ, Nicholas rises to his feet and approaches Arius, striking him in the face.

Who would have thought that the beloved bishop from Myrna would start a fist fight at the first ecumenical council?

Long story short: The fight breaks up, Nicholas is defrocked for the outburst (he would later be reinstated as bishop) and the Council of Nicaea reaffirms Biblical Orthodoxy, condemning Arius and his views as grossly heretical.

Now I don't condone punching heretics or committing violence against people that disagree with the Bible. Yet while I disagree with Nicholas losing his cool, I can still appreciate and respect what motivated him.

In a day when the truth is attacked more than ever and Christ is blasphemed in the most sickening of ways, I wonder if we Christians feel anything anymore?

We ought to be angry at what angers God. Sin should never be tolerated and when we confront it in our own lives especially, there ought to rise up within us a holy anger which motivates us to action.

What the real Santa Claus modeled in his life and ministry was a zeal for the truth and taking a stand when necessary.

Although we shouldn't mirror his response to Arius, we should, however, be willing to be bold for what is right.

A man of courage and hero of Biblical orthodoxy or Jolly Old Elf, which one will you choose to tell your kids?

I will pick the real Saint Nicholas over any fairy tale.
