

Cashmere Cub Scouts Pack 1 hauls in record for food bank

Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts alike are committed to serving their communities, constantly striving to lend an extra hand for the prosperity of our area.

The "Scouting for Food Campaign" is one way Scouts give back to the community. On November 3, Cub Scouts of Cashmere's Pack 1, canvassed the town.

Dressed in their Class A Scout uniforms, the young scouts went door to door soliciting members of the community to support the campaign. Residents were given a flyer which instructed them to leave their donations in a bag by their doorstep the following Saturday when the Scouts retrieved them.

Family, friends and neighbors alike participated. Members and volunteers checked expiration dates, recorded weights of each item and boxed everything for transportation.

Total pounds of food acquired in

2015; 550 lbs, 2016; 729 lbs, 2017; 608 lbs. All impressive numbers, but in 2018 the community of Cashmere donated a whopping 1065.79 pounds of food! Far surpassing their goal. Scouts and volunteers were amazed at the gratitude shown community wide.

The Scout Law states: "A Scout is trustworthy, loyal, helpful, friendly, courteous, kind, obedient, cheerful, thrifty, brave, clean and reverent."

"As the Cubmaster for Pack 1, it is my goal to ensure the scouts recognize what elements of the Scout Law are fulfilled while engaging in varied ventures. This campaign proved to be "helpful" to our community who might be less fortunate than them. All the while exercising friendliness and courtesy while knocking on doors and speaking with residents. Although some boys were anxious leading up to asking strangers for donations, it helped them build confidence and integrity," said Candi Bray.

Food Bank, graciously accepted the donations, which helped fill Thanksgiving care boxes. They were distributed to the community on Saturday, Nov. 17th.

"On behalf of the scouts of Pack 1, Thank you to everyone who contributed and helped. These Cubs are learning how to make a difference, and it's the community's support and decency that makes it possible," Bray said.

"Jesus offered salvation for free," Haney said, so at one point in the affair players could choose, sight unseen, from a bag of rocks, all black, but if they chose the only white rock in the bag they were automatically let back into the game.

"The internet has changed the way today's youth has fun. Years ago watching someone play Hackysack was considered entertaining and now it's Youtube," said Claussen.

The entire experience was filled with "subterfuge and deception" according to Haney. Even food, at times, was not a given, but had to be earned or discovered.

"It was super fun," said Eli Haney, Steve's son, a 17-year-old Cashmere sophomore.

"There were a lot of moving parts," said Chase Lak, who helped film the trial by fire. At one point the contestants had to swim across the river and retrieve a bag in which they could put whatever food items they found into it once they swam back.

Haney guesstimates the entire endeavor cost about \$2,000 in church and volunteer funding, but was not planning on making this an annual affair. The winners get cash and prizes

CASHMERE -- Picture a group of high school students suddenly without their precious cell phones, computers, televisions, cars or any modern trappings. It is an almost impossible vision, but it really happened on the banks and in the water of the Wenatchee River last August as a group of 18 teens from Cashmere, Chelan, Leavenworth and Wenatchee entered a three-day realistically engineered "Survivor Camp" sponsored by the Christ Center Church here.

To make sure things were as close to the real television show "Survivor" as possible, Pastor Steve Haney enlisted the help of one of his congregants, 30-year-old Michelle Schubert Claussen, who actually appeared on the nationally aired hit show in early 2016 (Survivor 33) in the "Millennials versus Gen. X" episode, which took place in Fiji.

To mimic the real deal, Haney, a trained EMT, also had the help of nine other adults to guide the experiment along, complete with a film crew and another certified EMT, Jonathan Claussen, husband of Michelle.

The film crew broke down the three days of challenges into 10 episodes and has been airing them at The Underground youth outreach center here every Sunday evening at 6 p.m. since the camp finished.

Haney reports the films are well received, which has also increased attendance at the youth outreach by a significant amount. "We've gone from an average of 20-25 kids to 25-60 attendees."

"The kids love it. There's a lot of laughing and clapping, oohs and aahs," Haney said. The ratio of boys to girls was six boys to four girls

The culmination of all those challenges led to the final three contestants gathering for a live final decision on Sunday, Dec. 2.

Survivor contestants Elani Scott, Zoe McDevitt and Evan Pheasant were the last three out of the initial 18. To make the cut in only three days, the three tribes in the Cashmere game had to vote someone "off the island" every few hours in tribal councils. Eventually it came down to only six players formed into one tribe and the infighting inherent therein.

The students were given incentives to play and to win during the ordeal at many different stages.

Sleeping bags, not tents, were the accommodations next to the Wenatchee River with the three tribes given territories to stay within. Often the action went on 24/7 as did the filming.

A great variety of physical, mental and by extension, spiritual, obstacles caused the brave teens to exude everything from blood, sweat and tears to vomiting.

A "gross food" eating contest may have been responsible for some of that with interesting, yet diabolical mixtures such as chipotle tofu and capers pickled with anchovies.

During the three-day challenge there were "slide puzzles" and a blind-folded rope maze and a building project where contestants could only use their feet. Another game involved a maze placed on a table where contestants had to manipulate a golf ball through the maze by picking up the table and guiding it.

Still another challenge was a game called "idol sparring" in which players would have to attack other players,

while still having to balance their "idols."

tribes The were named after the Biblical characters Issachar, Rizpah Abishai. and Issachar, founder of his namesake tribe in the Book of Exodus, Rizpah, concubine of King Saul and Abishai, nephew of King David.

Even if voted off the island, there was a way for players to get back into the game, just as in the TV show. The outcast was given a chance at returning via specific tasks done well on Redemption Island. as rewards, including an award for "fan favorite." Some the winning monies are placed into a special fund for the student they can use later.

Because of the great success had at this year's event, despite the smoky summer, plans are in the

works for "Survivor Big Sky" to take place possibly in the early summer of 2019 in Montana near Glacier National Park.

How did most of the teen players respond to the trials and tribulations?

"We knew going in not to forfeit personal relationships. This was just a game," Eli said.

"It was all for the glory of God," concluded the elder Haney.

The court ruled against the state and opened the door to the Ferguson having to be deposed himself for prosecutorial bias against Eyman. Score one for Eyman and the American system of justice.

Unfortunately, the case isn't over. AG Ferguson has now begun to put pressure on Eyman by deposing his wife, who is not involved in Eyman's political activism.

The result is that Eyman announced as of last Thursday that six years of persecution by the state's Attorney General has resulted in the end of his 25 year marriage and the need to file bankruptcy.

In the words of Tim Eyman, "the process has become the punishment."

Unfortunately, Eyman's case is no longer an isolated incident in American politics. Consider what we have witnessed over the last two years following the election of

President Trump. The FBI and "Special Prosecutor" Robert Mueller have wasted a small fortune and destroyed the lives of



numerous individuals in an effort to find evidence that Trump stole the election with the help of Vladimir Putin.

While some of those convicted by Mueller's investigation have questionable backgrounds at least one of them threw in the towel and fell on his sword to protect his family. General Flynn pleaded guilty to lying.

This is not the American way. It is a travesty of justice that the government is now using legal extortion and intimidation to beat citizens into submission. It is a tactic that many trial lawyers have utilized for decades to extract damage awards from American Industry driving up the cost of health care. But now our own government is turning it against citizens.

Attorney General Robert Ferguson is running for governor. He has filed over as dozen lawsuits including lawsuits to protect the "rights' of illegal immigrants but he apparently is unconcerned about the rights of American citizens. He is not only unfit to be the attorney general he is unfit to be governor.

What he has done to Tim Eyman and his family is disgraceful.

What he has done to the American system of justice should be of concern to all Washingtonians regardless of their political persuasion.

On the first day of 2019, our trade war with China is set to get much bigger. The 10% tariffs we already impose on \$200 million in Chinese imports will climb to 25%. If that happens, it will raise the stakes significantly.

Not coincidentally, By Brad Trump and Chinese Blackburn leader Xi Xinping are

planning to meet in early December. So, there's certainly the potential for a deal in the coming weeks. I think both sides would like to see that happen. China's economy has been slowing recently, and while it's not all because of the trade war, it certainly isn't helping. Similarly, here in America, the stock market is nervous and there are signs that the economy has peaked. So, a deal would be helpful to both sides. But what could a deal look like that would satisfy both sides? The simplest route for a deal would be something like this:

Over the next 5 years, China will commit to buying \$200 billion more in goods from America, which will cut the trade deficit in

However, if Trump comes to the American people with a plan as small as "China will buy more stuff from us," will that be good enough? Trump talks a lot about

the trade deficit (which is more America's fault than China's), but nearly everyone agrees that the real problems with China are technology theft, and how they subsidize certain industries. If Trump is really committed to changing those actions from China, I worry that it will take much more hard work and pain from both sides.

If our stock market keeps falling, and the economy keeps slowing, does Trump have the fortitude to endure that pain? He doesn't seem like a delayed gratification sort of guy. However, his options are limited After declaring that China is "raping our country," his base might revolt if he agrees to a deal that doesn't solve the biggest problems.

Clearly, the best scenario for the stock market over the short term is for a small, North Korea-style deal that doesn't accomplish much, but allows both sides to declare victory and move on. On the other hand, our problems with China are real, and now that Trump has brought those issues to a head, this might be our only chance to fix them. But that won't come easily.

It's a tough situation, and I'm genuinely unsure of which way I want this to go. But the stakes are high, and they are about to get higher. The stock market will be watching closely.

Boys Basketball Cashmere

After the boys walked away from their first game with a win against a hard team to beat, 79-74 Euphrata, it's clear that this will be a promising season for the Cashmere Bulldogs boys basketball team. And after finishing last season with a 14-9 record, missing state playoffs by one game, the team seems to be coming back eager to push further this season.

"This year we are very young, but have some talented players," said head coach Levi Heyen. "The league is very talented and senior heavy, so we know that each game will be a battle. We are planning on competing in every game and if things go well, we'll be on the hunt to win the league championship."

The five out of name varsity players are sophomores, but four of them are familiar on the court as varsity players since they were starters as freshmen. One of the returning starters is Sam Phillips who was second team all league last year as a freshman. He'll be one to watch for scoring, handling the ball and rebound. His twin brother Nate Phillips missed a good portion of last season due to a broken hand but made up for lost time on the court, waveraging nine points per game. Heyen is counting on him to play strong defensively and also outside shooting.

Carter Alberts is a promising returning sophomore starter, with a height of 6'5 and experience starting ten games as a freshman, Heyen expects him to be both a solid rebounder and shooter for the team. Mason Landdeck, a sophomore point guard, is known for his ability to get to the basket quickly and Heyen credits his ability to be a dynamic player on the court.

"Mason and Sam Phillips will do a great job of breaking down defenses and creating shot opportunities for us this year," said Heyen.

So despite being a relatively sophomore heavy varsity,

according to Heyen, all nine of the varsity guys have spent significant time practicing during the off season. So what they lack in age difference, the boys have made up for in experience and practice.

"We are going to play a much faster paced game and pick up our defensive intensity. Last year we had a big strong team with a couple of great shooters. We are smaller this year, but much quicker as team and have more balance," said Heyen. "We think that every one of our guys can score for us and we have a number of great outside shooters."

The team is strong in its ability to score and speed. So this season will be heavily concentrated on strengthening defense.

"We want to really focus on being just as good on the defensive side. With our lack of size, we'll need to be aggressive and out work our opponents if we want to win the rebound battle," said Heyen.

Players like Landdeck, who Heyen says is a feisty defender who draws tough match ups defensively, and Brooks Elliot, a fast player who is rebounder that's talented at guarding anyone at the floor, will be huge assets to the team's defense this season.

"We have the athletes to cause a lot of problems for others teams if we can pressure the ball and force teams into turnovers which will lead to easy baskets for us," said Heyen.

The team's impressive roster, speed and growth defensively are all elements indicating that the boys will produce winning results by the end of the season.

"They are a great group of basketball players and young men and they have the ability to make plays without having to have too much structure or set plays," said Heyen. "I think this is going to be a very fun group of boys to watch play basketball. They have the ability to score in bunches and once our defense gets established, we could be a very dangerous team come playoff time."
