

Fatality suffered, record acres burned

Wildfires devastate parts of Okanogan, Douglas counties

QUAD CITIES – A deadly combination of tinder-dry conditions, low humidity, and 40-mile-per-hour winds provided ideal conditions for a wildfire that started east of Omak to burn more than 300,000 acres in 48 hours over the Labor Day weekend.

The Cold Springs Fire that would later become the Pearl Hill Fire started west of Omak Lake some-

time around 9 p.m., Sunday, Sept. 6, and quickly spread south and west jumping the Columbia River near Bridgeport at about 3 a.m. according to a source in the town.

First fire casualty

As the fire aided by a strong south wind raced across the Colville Reservation toward Bridgeport in the Monday morning darkness, a family of three

camping at a remote house in Paxton Canyon without power, water, or communications was caught by the fast-moving flames. Despite a valiant attempt to flee the blaze in a pickup, Jacob Hyland, 31, Jamie Hyland, 26, and one-year-old Uriel were overtaken by the flames and suffered third-degree burns while escaping the inferno on foot.

Search teams were dispatched on Tuesday, Sept. 8, to try and locate the missing family who were eventually

found Wednesday morning, Sept. 9, along the north bank of the Columbia River by a Colville Tribes Fish and Wildlife boat. The year-old infant had succumbed to his injuries. Both parents were

transported to Three Rivers Hospital and then airlifted to Harborview Medical Center in Seattle where they remain in critical condition at this writing.

A GoFundMe account established for the Hyland's

has grown to more than \$225,000 as of this writing.

Brewster High School refuge

The Red Cross set up shop at Brewster High School Tuesday, Sept. 8, to

provide refuge for scores of migrant laborers burned out of their housing facilities at Bridgeport. Shelter manager Cheryl Provorst from the Everett Red Cross chapter said about 90 individuals spent the previous Monday night camped on the school soccer field before facilities were made available the following day.

Provorst said the school can accommodate as many as 300 people still, if the need arises.

Southern Baptist Church-

es of North Central Washington that contracts with the Red Cross to provide cooking and food services for disaster was also on site at Brewster High School.

Bridgeport losses

Bryson Zahn could see the fire approaching the family home at 900 Maple Street from the northeast while he was engaging another front of the fire at the family's 100-acre apple

Phone and Internet Discounts Available to CenturyLink Customers

The Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission designated CenturyLink as an Eligible Telecommunications Carrier within its service area for universal service purposes. CenturyLink's basic local service rates for residential voice lines are \$21.85-\$25.50 per month and business services are \$30.00-\$37.00 per month. Specific rates will be provided upon request.

CenturyLink participates in a government benefit program (Lifeline) to make residential telephone or broadband service more affordable to eligible low-income individuals and families. Eligible customers are those that meet eligibility standards as defined by the FCC and state commissions. Residents who live on federally recognized Tribal Lands may qualify for additional Tribal benefits if they participate in certain additional federal eligibility programs. The Lifeline discount is available for only one telephone or broadband service per household, which can be on either wireline or wireless service. Broadband speeds must be 20 Mbps download and 3 Mbps upload or faster to qualify.

A household is defined for the purposes of the Lifeline program as any individual or group of individuals who live together at the same address and share income and expenses. Lifeline service is not transferable, and only eligible consumers may enroll in the program. Consumers who willfully make false statements in order to obtain Lifeline telephone or broadband service can be punished by fine or imprisonment and can be barred from the program.

orchard across the river at Monroe Orchard Road.

"I called my father (Bryan Zahn) to warn him about the fire and he asked me to come and help move stuff out of the house," Zahn said.

By the time Zahn made the drive from the orchard, across the bridge and east to the family home, the residence which the Zahn's had occupied for more than 50 years, was already fully involved.

"I got there in time to see the window blow out," said Zahn. "I thought my Dad was still in there, but he was across the road (SR 173) in his pickup."

Zahn said the fire was so intense that it threatened to burn his vehicle parked on the highway bordering the east side of the property.

Bridgeport mayor Janet Conklin said that 16 homes were lost in and around her city. As the Pearl Hill Fire flanked Bridgeport from the northeast and advanced around its southern perimeter it consumed everything in its path including the mayor's property on the east side of the city limits.

"We lost everything but the house," Conklin said during a Thursday evening phone call.

Conklin said she has been on the phone trying to solicit emergency aid.

"We have many Hispanic families who have lost

homes," said Conklin, "and many of those without insurance."

The mayor is gathering information to relay to the Douglas County Commissioners and is working to get Bridgeport declared an emergency disaster area. Conklin is also asking any citizens who have travel trailers they can donate to house the homeless to contact the city.

Mansfield spared

While Mansfield was spared by flames that burned heavily east of the town, some outlying structures were not as fortunate. At Jamison Lake, eight miles southeast of Mansfield, one resort escaped destruction while another

did not.

Jamison Lake Resort near the north end of the fishery sustained a near-miss as flames burned hot and heavy near the buildings and travel trailers along the east shore.

"My karma must have really been working," said Jerry Day who has owned the resort for the past six years.

Day's good karma did not reach Jack's Resort farther south along the lake's east shore. According to its online website www.jacksresortonjamesonlake.com/

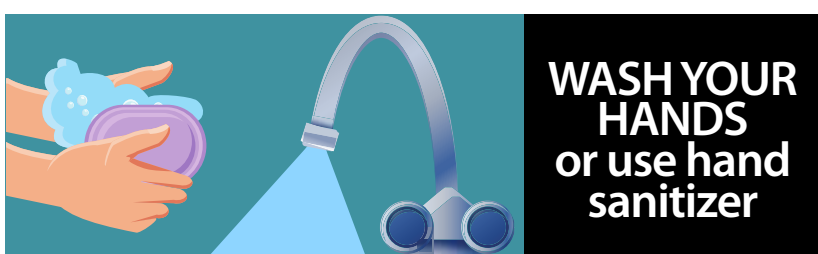
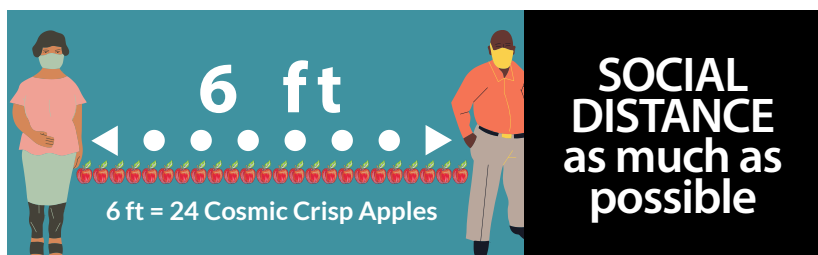

Wenatchee Social Security Administration mistreats Disabled Veterans

Attention for those who are veterans in Grant, Okanogan, Chelan or Douglas counties, a government agency right here in little Wenatchee needs to be chastised for the hypocritical way it treats our Disabled Veterans. It is the Wenatchee Social Security Administration. Even those employed by the SSA face constant discrimination, harassment, violation of HIPAA laws and illegal disciplinary "ambushes" perpetrated by - ironically - minority supervisors.

Management created a hostile work environment and is rarely challenged because all the other employees feel their own careers may be threatened if they try to defend the Disabled Vet. So, most go along and grin and bear it.

The Wenatchee SSA has mismanaged the way they treat Disabled Veterans, as I have been told (with documentation), on at least three occasions with sev-

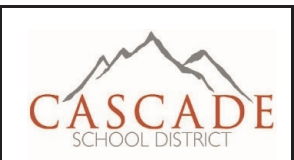

Fish Camp Memories

Every September for 16 years I've driven down the hill from Goldendale, taken the turn left on a road that passes by Maryhill State Park, and pulled into a campsite fronting the Columbia River at the impeccably clean and well cared for Peach Beach RV Park. What brings me here? Fish Camp. It's an annual event attended by outdoors media members, professional anglers and individuals in the fishing and outdoors retail and manufacturing industry.

The event is the brainchild of Ed Iman, a long-time fishing guide and promoter who calls The Dalles, Oregon home and who helped pioneer walleye fishing here in the Pacific Northwest. The daily flow of Fish Camp is simple. After checking in with Ed you put your sleeping bag in one of the tents set up for you or park your truck, camper or RV or boat in one of the camp sites within the south half of the park taken over by this event. In the middle of all of this a long line of tables under canopies are set up. This is where participants eat and socialize while a crew of helpers prepares three tasty meals a day for you.

Every day anglers go out on an adventure of their choosing. Most are after fall chinook, found in the Columbia River off the mouth of the Deschutes, Klickitat or White Salmon Rivers. Others, particularly those who have never been to the Pacific Northwest before, head out onto the Columbia to wrestle with a sturgeon.

The largest one caught at Fish Camp measured over 11-feet long and was caught by a longtime manager with Cabela's a few years back.

Both the Klickitat River on the Washington side and the Deschutes River a short drive away from camp in Oregon offer a combination of Chinook and summer steelhead. Some years boats are available to take anglers up and down these rivers. Even when there are not though, there are plenty of opportunities to catch fish from the bank if you are willing to hike to your fishing hole.

There are bass and walleye too. Originally, the main focus of Fish Camp was walleye fishing on the Columbia but they can be tough to catch during the month of September due to an abundance of bait fish in the water that doesn't have them too interested in the worms you are trolling past them. Having said that, there's always a boat or two targeting these tasty fish and sometimes, the bite does come on below the John Day Dam and some of those fillets become available for dinner.

As for me, I'll miss my annual hike up the Deschutes River where I toss spinners and spoons for salmon and steelhead as well as my efforts to catch the same fish

out of the Klickitat. The smallmouth bass fishing on the Columbia? I'll miss that too and I've had some fun trips not only fishing from bass boats but also from a kayak. Hover fishing for salmon is another fun trip I'll miss this year and the opportunity to wrestle with a big sturgeon is also a fight I'll miss. On top of this I'll miss my drive to the John Day River and Cottonwood Canyon State Park where you can hike for miles in a gorgeous, remote setting, fishing runs for smallmouth bass and seeing wildlife from mule deer to bighorn sheep.

Yes, I will miss the fishing at Fish Camp this year, but truth be told, I think I'll miss the friends I've made over the last 16 years even more. Here's hoping I'll be driving back to Fish Camp in 2021. In the meantime, I hope I've given you a few ideas about places to go fishing in the Columbia River Gorge this month!

PS - Speaking of cancellations, the Northwest Berkley Big Bass Tournament, scheduled for Oct. 3 at MarDon Resort and Potholes Reservoir, has also been cancelled. Weather permitting though, it should be a good weekend for a cast and blast with quail hunting along with bass and walleye fishing available around here.
