

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Community meeting set about West Cashmere Bridge project

Design is nearly complete on the new structure that will replace the nearly 90-year-old West Cashmere Bridge. The community is invited to see the proposed replacement bridge at a meeting on Sept. 18 at the Cashmere Riverside Center, 201 Riverside Drive. The community meeting will be 6:30 to 7:30 p.m.

During the meeting, Chelan County Public Works will update the community on the progress of the project, which is expected to begin construction in spring 2020 and take about 24 months. The county's engineering consultant, TranTech Engineering of Bellevue, will give a short presentation and then open the meeting up for questions from the public.




County has ever undertaken," said Eric Pierson, Chelan County Public Works Director/County Engineer. "The overwhelming support from our community partners has played a significant role in garnering interest for the project at both the state and federal levels, and in keeping the project on track."

The West Cashmere Bridge, commonly called the Goodwin Road bridge, was built in 1929 on Cashmere's west side. A fracture critical bridge, the bridge is posted for weight and height restrictions, restricting most freight haulers, school buses, transit and some emergency vehicles from using it. County engineers have estimated the bridge may need to be closed by 2022 because of its progressive deterioration.

eterioration. The replacement bridge, which will span the Wenatchee River near the current bridge's location and then cross over US 2 to Hay Canyon Road, is estimated to cost about \$23.5 million. Chelan County has raised the money for the project, which is being paid for with a variety of state and federal grants as well as some county funds and a private contribution from Crunch Pak, Cashmere's largest employer.

At this time, Chelan County is working on finding a new home for the historic portion of the bridge: two 117-foot, Warren deck truss spans. The deck truss spans are available until January 2019 for donation to any governmental, non-profit or responsible private entity for public or private use. Cashmere Mill District property groundbreaking: future development, employment opportunities

for two general purpose industrial buildings of 16,500 square feet each, will be groundbreaking for the city of Cashmere and for Chelan County as a whole. It was only fitting that the construction of the two buildings be kicked off with a groundbreaking ceremony, Wednesday, Sept. 5.

weak. Most people just want their jobs more than they want to do legislative work so they punt most of the work to the next branch."





In Nike's new ad, Kaepernick looks expressively bold as the caption reads "Believe in something. Even if it means sacrificing everything"

But what exactly did he lose? A mediocre football career?

What Kaepernick lost, he has gained it back ten-fold in public notoriety and the media sensation that surrounds him is paying him dividends.

My point: He didn't lose anything.

Sitting on my desk is a book called Foxe's Christian Martyrs. I pick it up from time to time to be reminded of what real sacrifice looks like.

Recently, I was prompted to read the story of John Rogers—a man who believed in something and it really did cost him everything.

The year was 1553, Mary, daughter of Henry VIII ascended to the throne of England. Mary, unlike her father, was a fervent Roman Catholic and made it a goal to bring Roman Catholicism back to superiority in England.

In previous years, the Protestant doctrines that denounced the Roman papacy and dogmas had taken root within England and have now swelled to be the dominant expression of faith.

Mary hated it all and would quench this Protestantism at all

costs.

John Rogers, theologian and pastor, was inflamed with the spirit of Reformation. In his pulpit, he would preach and teach from the Scriptures alone and courageously condemned "pestilent popery, idolatry and superstition" that was indicative of Roman Catholicism.

Needless to say, Queen Mary was not very fond of Pastor Rogers' sermons.

In a sweeping move by the Monarchy, Queen Mary instituted the Heresy Acts which severely punished any dissenter who dared to challenge Rome.

John Rogers along with many others remained undeterred to contend openly and publicly for the gospel of Jesus Christ until he was placed under house arrest and then later thrown in Newgate prison waiting for the day of his execution.

On the day he was to be burned at the stake, he was offered one last chance to recant of his theological

convictions and bow the knee to Roman Catholicism.

COMMUNITY VOICES

John Rogers replied, "That which I have preached I will seal with my own blood."

Immediately after, John Rogers was bound and paraded through the street as a condemned heretic.

As Rogers passed by the crowd, many of whom Rogers had given his life to minister to, it was said that he quoted verse after verse of the promise of eternal life and the glories that await those who die in the name of Lord.

His wife and children were also in attendance, urging their father and husband to remain steadfast to the end.

On February 4, 1555, John Rogers was burned at the stake.

He would be the first of over 280 people publicly executed for their convictions under the reign of "bloody" Queen Mary.

Those who witnessed John Rogers' execution, most notably the French ambassador Antoine De Noailles reported that Rogers approached his death as a man approaches his wedding day—with joy.

John Rogers believed in the gospel and he sacrificed his very own life for that belief. That is heroism and

sacrifice. Taking a knee on a well-

maintained lawn while receiving a multimilliondollar salary and shoe deal is not.

Cashmere's historic lumber mill district redevelopment ready thanks to cleanup

The old sawmill in Cashmere once pulsed with activity 50 years ago.

Now new life is breathed into the community thanks to cleanup and redevelopment. Today, the Port of Chelan County is celebrating added commerce and jobs.

The city of Cashmere's Mill District has a long and varied history that began in the 1940s. Processes at the lumber mill and other activities left a legacy of contamination that impacted soil and groundwater. In all. 26,000 tons of wood waste and contaminated soil was removed, overseen by our toxic cleanup program staff

and funded by Ecology grants. The Port of Chelan County is marking the construction of two 17,000-square-foot buildings that will support the expansion of local business as well as new employers.

This project shows what success can come when you have the right ingredients -grant funding, dedicated staff, and collaboration!

Cashmere now has a real vitality with added commerce and jobs, setting them up for long-term success.

A vision realized

The Cashmere Mill District is prominently located along Sunset Highway, highly visible to traffic and the local

community in Chelan County. From the 1940s to the late 1970s, the Cashmere Mill Property was primarily lumber milling, while the 1980s and 1990s saw various commercial and light industrial activity.

Port of Chelan The County had a vision and in 2008, purchased the 32.5-acre property. Their goal was to remove the existing contamination and wood waste, and turn it into a thriving industrial property that would support the revitalization of the city of Cashmere.

Ecology was able to grant \$1.5 million to the Port of Chelan County in 2012, and an additional \$3.5 million in 2013 in order to:

· Figure out the type of contamination present on the property, and how far it had spread

• Prepare a plan to remove and clean up contaminated soils and groundwater

Remove contaminated soils and wood waste

• Set up a monitoring program for the groundwater · Replace a City of Cashmere

water main that was in need of repairs

• Prepare the property for redevelopment

The greatly improved environmental infrastructure conditions allowed for the eventual development into Cashmere Mill District, complete with water, sewer,

electric and internet utilities. Major highway connections only a half-mile away give easy access to Seattle or Spokane.

A bright future

Port Commissioner JC Baldwin, said the future looks "very bright" for the old mill site. In fact, Louws Truss Company just opened a new manufacturing facility in Cashmere in June.

Two flex buildings are planned for the future, and are generating interest from a variety of businesses. The Port of Chelan County also has the option to build an additional two more flex buildings, if necessary.

Baldwin Commissioner expressed her excitement that the city, port, and Ecology were able to work together to rehabilitate this blighted property in her district. "This is what Port Districts do!" she said.

Valerie Bound, central region section manager for the Toxics Cleanup Program, shared her own enthusiasm for the project. "We love to see this kind of positive impact for a community," she said. "We were happy to work with the staff from the Port, and help make their vision a reality."

and Cashmere Mayor Jim Fletcher also spoke at the ceremony. The development of the buildings is an effort to support local businesses in expansion plans while simultaneously recruiting new businesses. The buildings will serve as a pillar of economic activity, job growth and private investment, according to the Port.

"We've had conversations with multiple local companies to expand here. There's limited capacity for business here, really tight real estate," said Port Executive Director Patrick Jones. "This is a lot of space to bring onto the market all at once."

There was enthusiasm surrounding the dirt that was symbolic for future builidings. Many entrepreneurs, as possible future tenants, are eveing the land with eagerness especially in correlation to the current lack of supply for commercial property in this region. The buildings will be versatile and can fit many different forms of businesses and tenants. The space could be used for house production, office, laboratory, and a warehouse among other

"Although the mill is not here, jobs will be," said Goehner. "And that's really what we need here in our valley. And once again, I appreciate partnering with the Port in making this a reality."

Port originally The purchased the property ten years ago in 2008, however

obstacles and restrictions based on environmental issues greatly slowed progress for the last decade. After the collective unit effort with Washington State Community Economic Revitalization Board, Washington State Department of Ecology and the city of Cashmere to work on the property to better improve the conditions and clean up the area for the two buildings.

"You can literally eat off this

dirt, trust me," said Baldwin. With many years, effort collaboration groundbreaking ceremony was the public introduction to the new buildings, however this project has been long awaited. "This has been a long time

Visit a Washington state park for free Sept. 22

No Discover Pass needed in honor of **National Public Lands** Day

Saturday, Sept. 22, marks the 25th anniversary of National Public Lands Day. Washington State Parks invites the public to visit a state park for free on this day. No Discover Pass will be required for day visits.

National Public Lands Day (NPLD) is coordinated by the National Environmental Education Foundation.

State Parks free days are in keeping with 2011 legislation that created the Discover Pass, which costs \$30 annually or \$10 for a one-day visit. The pass is required for vehicle access to state recreation lands managed by Washington State Parks, the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) and the Department of Natural Resources (DNR). The Discover Pass legislation directed State Parks to designate up to 12 free days when the pass would not be required to visit state parks. The free days apply only at state parks; the Discover Pass is still required on WDFW and DNR lands.

Two more State Parks free days are available in 2018: Sunday, Nov. 11


have good access to great recreation!

I am currently on the Board of Wenatchee Valley TREAD, the newly-formed nonprofit to promote outdoor recreation and tourism in Chelan and Douglas counties. Our work is done with the financial support and partnership of the Chamber of Commerce and Port of Chelan County, and many recreation businesses and nonprofits in the area. Our goal is to promote recreation to improve the quality of life and health in the region, and to develop recreation-based jobs as part of a strong and diverse economic mix that supports this region.

As a County Commissioner, I will continue to work with the chambers of commerce, port districts, and our cities to strengthen that approach. My goal is to bring all stakeholders together (motorized, nonmotorized, water, snow and land) to provide the best outdoor recreation experiences in our communities, improving the quality of life for everyone who lives in or visits the region.
