American Legion hosts | Colville Tribes extend reservation closure

Business Council voted to extend the tial services, and other pre-approved closure of reservation access to all non-essential visitors until midnight, June 26, due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

In a media release dated May 28, the closure includes all fishing for non-tribal members and extends "to all boat launches, lakes, rivers and reservoirs within the exterior boundary of the reservation which includes Lake Roosevelt and Lake Rufus Woods."

The council initially closed access to the reservation on March 25, following the first reported cases of the COVID-19 virus in Ferry and Okanogan counties.

> "The state highways on the Reservation also remain open to through traffic," an earlier CCT release said. "These include Highway 155, 97, and 21. Highway signs will urge travelers through the Reservation to stay safe and stay home."

> CCT said the closure is consistent with other actions taken by the Colville Tribes to protect residents from the pandemic and is consistent with the Stay at Home order issued by Governor Jay Inslee."

> The closure appears to be accomplishing its purpose in containing the spread of the coronavirus on the

cases on the reservation remain at 11, a figure that has not changed for a full month since April 29. Meanwhile, elsewhere in Okanogan County confirmed COVID cases have increased in three of the four other monitored locations.

South County has seen its number of cases increase from four one month ago to 17 as of OCEM's latest count. Central Valley increased from five to 10 cases during the same period, and North Valley went from one to three. The Methow Valley remains at five cases.

PUD explores gradual reopening of services

OKANOGAN – While PUD district staff will continue to adopt a four-day work week through June, the board of commissioners at its May 26 meeting agreed to explore the reopening of services to the public including the possibility of opening offices one day per week in mid-June.

Plastic or glass barriers are being installed at each branch office for those customers who need in-person services.

"Staff members have adjusted schedules, added sanitation measures, implemented social distancing and in some cases began telecommuting since mid-March to prevent the spread of COVID-19," said a first-come, first-served basis. the district is now considering what its next steps will be. We will likely have more of a plan for reopening our facilities after the June 8 board meeting."

There are currently 259 customer accounts totaling just under \$50,000 in delinquency status that PUD customer service representatives are helping service users resolve. Help is available through the Department of Commerce Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP).

Qualifying households that have suffered income loss, a business shutdown or health issues from the coronavirus outbreak can receive up to \$500 in energy assistance. A household must be at or below 125 percent of the federal poverty level. As an example, a family of four with an annual income below \$32,188 would qualify. Funds are available on
