

Pateros approves development, consultant agreements

PATEROS - The city council approved two resolutions during its regular monthly meeting held by Zoom conference on May 18, one for the development of downtown lots and the second for a Transportation Improvement Board (TIB) grant.

The Planning Committee met with Chris Anderson of Rock Garden Holdings, LLC, owner of vacant downtown lots that Anderson agreed to develop. Earlier Anderson approached the council to request a two-year extension in his development agreement with the city. The Committee recommended approval of the requested two-year extension with conditions:

- A \$1,000 fee paid quarterly to begin upon council approval of the extension.
• Upon approval of building plans, fees paid, and construction schedule, \$1,000 fee will be waived unless construction does

not meet agreed schedule.
• Total fee amounts to be returned to Rock Garden Holdings, LLC, if the project is completed within two years.

The city also approved an engineering consulting agreement with Varela & Associates of Spokane for a TIB grant that will extend completion of the Warren Avenue sidewalk to the tennis courts.

In other business city administrator Jord Wilson said public works is closely monitoring budget items to conserve money during the COVID-19 pandemic. Accordingly, some planned projects are being postponed and no summer help will be hired while the city watches further developments coming out of the current crisis.

The city is pulling away from its proposed water system improvement project and Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) application for the Pederson

Memorial Day flags fly as usual at local cemeteries

Finding a way around COVID

QUAD CITIES - Pandemic or no pandemic, flags and folks turned out on Memorial Day weekend to pay respects to lost loved ones, place flowers and mementos at headstones and honor veterans who served our country. Those volunteers who annually make sure that American flags are conspicuous along memorial drives and veterans' grave sites once again rose to the occasion and worked around COVID-19 mandates to get the job done.

Bridgeport

On Friday, May 22, Bridgeport community members comprised of city staff, city council, Bridgeport high school teachers and students and American Legion volunteered at the Bridgeport cemetery "while doing our best to social distance," said Bridgeport resident and Vietnam veteran Ken Krugel.

"The city crew put the large flags up," said mayor Janet Conklin. "Ken Krugel supervised the FFA and Leadership kids from the school who washed and placed the smaller flags on individual veterans' grave sites."

Together the group put up 130 large flags along the Aisle of Flags and placed crosses and small flags on 167 graves after students carefully scrubbed the markers.

Bright and early on Memorial Day morning, seven volunteers from Columbia Post 97 of the Brewster American Legion arrived at Locust Grove Cemetery to erect more than 100 large flags along the drive that runs through and around the site. QUAD CITIES - From a motorcade to an outdoor waterside venue schools in the Quad Cities area have brought some creative approaches to the table in an effort to give the Classes of 2020 both a memorable and enjoyable commencement experience.

Brewster hiker rescued from Billy Goat Mountain

ALTA LAKE - An unidentified Brewster hiker was rescued from Billy Goat Mountain near Alta Lake last Thursday, May 28, after an ankle injury prevented him from walking the five-to-six miles back to Alta Lake under his own power.

Okanogan County Sheriff Tony Hawley reports that the 17-year-old hiker was with two friends when the injury occurred.

"Okanogan County Sergeant (Justin) Weigel responded to the location to assist in coordinating the rescue efforts," said Hawley. "Okanogan County Search and Rescue (SAR) Coordinator (Rick) Balam and Sgt. Weigel were able to have SAR volunteers assemble for the rescue planning efforts."

Hawley said Balam and Weigel contacted Naval Air Station Whidbey Island for a U.S. Navy SAR helicopter to respond and assist in the rescue of the hikers.

"The hikers were located by the U.S. Navy search crew at about 9:08 p.m.," said Hawley. "The three hikers were flown to the Brewster airport and met at that location by Brewster Ambulance to transport the injured juvenile to Three Rivers Hospital to be treated for his injured ankle."

The two other hikers were transported from the airport by Sgt. Weigel.

"We are very thankful to have our dedicated group of SAR volunteers who are willing to respond to help out with rescue efforts no matter when or where they may be needed," Hawley said.

# PUD explores gradual reopening of services

### LIHEAP help available

OKANOGAN – While PUD district staff will continue to adopt a four-day work week through June, the board of commissioners at its May 26 meeting agreed to explore the reopening of services to the public including the possibility of opening offices one day per week in mid-June.

Plastic or glass barriers are being installed at each branch office for those customers who need in-person services.

“Staff members have adjusted schedules, added sanitation measures, implemented social distancing and in some cases began telecommuting since mid-March to prevent the spread of COVID-19,” said Sheila Corson, community relations coordinator. “As the state and counties begin to reopen,

the district is now considering what its next steps will be. We will likely have more of a plan for reopening our facilities after the June 8 board meeting.”

There are currently 259 customer accounts totaling just under \$50,000 in delinquency status that PUD customer service representatives are helping service users resolve. Help is available through the Department of Commerce Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP).

Qualifying households that have suffered income loss, a business shutdown or health issues from the coronavirus outbreak can receive up to \$500 in energy assistance. A household must be at or below 125 percent of the federal poverty level. As an example, a family of four with an annual income below \$32,188 would qualify. # Colville Tribes extend reservation closure

NESEPELEM – The Colville Tribes Business Council voted to extend the closure of reservation access to all non-essential visitors until midnight, June 26, due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

In a media release dated May 28, the closure includes all fishing for non-tribal members and extends “to all boat launches, lakes, rivers and reservoirs within the exterior boundary of the reservation which includes Lake Roosevelt and Lake Rufus Woods.”

The council initially closed access to the reservation on March 25, following the first reported cases of the COVID-19 virus in Ferry and Okanogan counties.

Reservation access remains open for tribal members, non-member reservation residents, tribe employees,

food, postal, delivery and other essential services, and other pre-approved personnel outside the agency.

“The state highways on the Reservation also remain open to through traffic,” an earlier CCT release said. “These include Highway 155, 97, and 21. Highway signs will urge travelers through the Reservation to stay safe and stay home.”

CCT said the closure is consistent with other actions taken by the Colville Tribes to protect residents from the pandemic and is consistent with the Stay at Home order issued by Governor Jay Inslee.”

The closure appears to be accomplishing its purpose in containing the spread of the coronavirus on the reservation. Latest figures released by Okanogan County Emergency

Management show confirmed COVID cases on the reservation remain at 11, a figure that has not changed for a full month since April 29. Meanwhile, elsewhere in Okanogan County confirmed COVID cases have increased in three of the four other monitored locations.

South County has seen its number of cases increase from four one month ago to 17 as of OCEM's latest count. Central Valley increased from five to 10 cases during the same period, and North Valley went from one to three. The Methow Valley remains at five cases.

of your legacy was a gift that kept on giving to your entire community for generations to come?

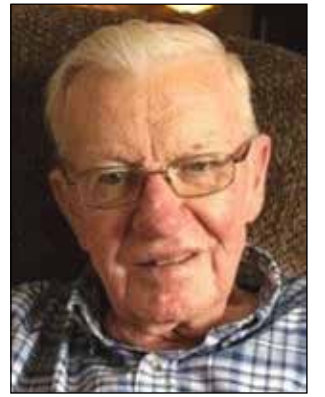

Some summers were spent in travel study classes accompanied by his family. Many miles were covered between the Mexican border and the Arctic town of Inuvik and across two-thirds of his beloved US of A. Many hours were spent at his "Rattlesnake Hatchery" on North Star Road in the process of restoring the Ulrich Fries historic cabin, which got consumed by the 2014 Carlton Complex fire. Brian was a life member of VFW Post 6853 and the National Rifle Association.

Brian was preceded in death by his parents, Pat and Marge Morey Lindelien; stepdad Lyle; grandparents George and Lottie Morey Irwin and Robert and Winnie Cross Bauman, and surrogate granddad Bill Boyer.
