The South Koreans are rich enough to fend for themselves. Kia's and other South Korean products are selling well. It is long past time to cut the apron



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Out of 10 counties, CHS student places first in art contest

Cashmere High School student Eli Haney has always had an artistic side; from constantly coloring as a kid to taking countless photographs as a teenager, the 16-year-old said he loves finding beauty in nature. When he heard about a Washington Apple Education Foundation (WAEF) art contest, which asked students to submit an artistic depiction of our region's prized fruit, Haney jumped at the opportunity and began working on a submission.

WAEF, founded in Wenatchee in 1994, is an organization that seeks to advance the tree fruit industry's charitable work by providing access to educational opportunities for students throughout the state. Each year they award scholarships to students whose parents are involved in the tree fruit industry along with handing out a cash prize to the winner of their annual Year of the Apple Art Contest, sponsored by Corteva Agriscience. The contest is open to ninth through twelfth grade students from Adams, Chelan, Douglas, Okanogan, Grant, Benton, Franklin, Kittitas, Yakima and Walla Walla counties.

After a month of creating his entry, totaling nearly 45 hours of work, Haney submitted a life-like drawing of local apples to WAEF titled "Too Many the Same." The foundation received entries from 162 students from across all 10 counties this year but awarded the grand prize of \$1,000 dollars to Haney at

the CHS Awards Ceremony on Monday, June 4. WAEF Executive Director Jennifer Witherbee said with his special attention to detail, Haney embodied the essence of apples grown in our valley.

"We were looking for art that looks like the fruit grown in Washington State. He did a really great job with color and realism of the fruit, it was artwork that looked like it was intended to be commercially produced," Witherbee said.

Haney first heard about the contest from CHS art teacher Alan Pace, who also teaches at Cashmere Middle School. The soon-to-be junior has been in and out of Pace's classroom since his seventh-grade year and said the teacher has taught him much about art and how to fine-tune his work. Pace said Haney was the only student from Cashmere to submit a project to WAEF this year; he credits the student's success to his dedication in focusing on the tiniest of details.

"He's always been a hard-working and talented student, I've had him in class several times since he was in middle school and he always does his best," Pace said.

Haney began the project by taking a photograph of apples displayed for sale at Martin's Market Place. After editing the photo to make the colors pop, he then divided the picture with a grid and began drawing each section piece by piece. Using colored pencils as his medium, Haney worked diligently to define the color and shading of each apple to make his drawing as close to reality as possible. After submitting his work

with no response, Haney was surprised by WAEF when they delivered to him a gigantic check during the award ceremony.

"It was an unreal experience, I was so happy because I knew how much time I put into it and to have it all pay off was amazing," Haney said.

Tesla charging station coming soon to Leavenworth

For Dan's Food Market owner Eric Worthen, developing a Tesla charging station on his vacant property next to the store was the farthest from his mind. The dirt parking lot was used for overflow parking at the market, but also used for festival and weekend parking.

One day, someone knocked his office door at Dan's Market. It was Sean Dayton, the instillation program manager for Tesla.

"He told me what he had in mind. We talked for about 15 minutes," Worthen said. "He laid it all out. It took me back. I need time to think about it. I thought about it for a couple days and told him I was not interested. I wasn't interested, because I didn't know enough about Tesla and whether it would be a good fit for the parking lot."

In the meantime, Worthen did some research. Dayton kept coming back and wouldn't take "no" for an answer. Dayton had looked all over town,

It's on Highway 2 on the way to Chelan," Worthen said. "Ninety percent of Tesla's that are going to charge out here are from the greater Seattle area. There are lot of them over there. After talking to more than just Sean, we talked it over as a family and thought maybe this will work."

At long last, Worthen started to negotiate with them. Initially, Tesla was only going to pay for the instillation. Worthen would be responsible for the power usage and there would be no lease money coming from Tesla.

In the United States, Telsa stations are in high demand because it brings added value to the property, Worthen learned. Still, Worthen is so busy at the store, he didn't see where it would be any added value.

"Then, after several months of negotiations and me getting what I want for that property... they are going to pave it, stripe it. Those are basically doing \$60,000 to \$70,000 in improvements to my property and they are paying for all that," Worthen said. "There is a 10-

ple, everybody that works for them. They were good to work with. I think it will be good for the city. I know some people will think, that's all we need is more people here, more cars," Worthen said. "Not everybody is going to think it's a great deal. If look at the people who own Tesla's, they are all in a high tax bracket. They are going to come here and spend money and time. I just think it is cool."

Tesla will be leasing the property, but due to the contract, Worthen could not reveal what they are paying. He said that financially, it just made sense. When it's all done, there will actually be even more parking available.

"They are going to pave it and stripe it. We're actually going to generate more parking from it. I'm not going to be able park cars on weekends and festivals. That will go away," he said. "I don't anticipate there is going to be room. We're getting busy here. It's very important I save parking for my customers. We'll see on Christmas Lighting and Oktoberfest, I'll probably be able to shove some cars out there."

Worthen said he is a little concerned about the travelers with boats and the RVs that typically park there. The spaces in front of the chargers is reserved, but Worthen said there is some flexibility to use those spots when it's not busy in town.

The entire project to install the Tesla charging stations is around \$500,000 to \$600,000, Worthen said.

"There are 16 chargers out there. I've had a lot of comments already. There's one in Ellensburg and one in Monroe. This will work well for people coming to Chelan, Wenatchee, Leavenworth," he said. "It's centrally located on U.S. Highway 2. Charges in 30-40 minutes. Hopefully the people will be receptive to it. It was a dirt parking lot, chuck hole city. It will be clean, landscaped, fenced. It will be a good addition to my grocery store."

It's expected the Tesla charging station, parking lot and landscaping, would be finished in the next month or so.

It is Well

“Saved Alone”
That was the telegraph Horatio G. Spafford received from his wife informing him that she was the only survivor and his four daughters were tragically lost at sea. It had only been two years earlier that the family had lost everything in the Chicago Fire of 1871, leaving the family destitute and in financial ruin.
Horatio Spafford had lost it all and yet during this time, he penned one of the greatest and well-known hymns of our day, “It Is Well with My Soul”.

How could Horatio Spafford sing in a moment like this? His children are dead, everything to his name was burned up by fire. How can you in your circumstances say,
“When peace, like a river, attendeth my way,
When sorrows like sea billows roll;

Whatever my lot, thou hast taught me to say,
It is well, it is well with my soul.”?

It is not easy to say those words in the middle of suffering. Let’s be real, in the natural it doesn’t make sense to say “it is well” when your child dies of cancer or your mother is wasting away right before your eyes with dementia.

How can it be well with your soul when your life is filled with so much personal tragedy?

For Horatio Spafford, it was well because he had Christ.

Jesus, the one who forgives and saves sinners and who is the treasure of heaven, is the source

of true and perfect contentment in all circumstances.
What makes Jesus so significant and so necessary in times of affliction is because he alone can dispense peace to those who are suffering.
In his final address to his disciples in the gospel of John, Jesus speaks about tribulations that will come about for following him. It is true, contrary to what many people believe, being a Christian is not easy nor is it a pathway to prosperity and worldly comfort. No, it is often filled with trials, suffering, and sorrow. Christ knows this and doesn’t mince words when he says, “In this world, you will have tribulation” (Jn. 16:33a).

Yet Christ delivers a profound promise to those whose lives are rattled to the core and are desperately troubled. He says, “Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give to you” (Jn. 14:27a).

This promise of peace is meant to be manifested in and through suffering and it begins with having a right standing with God. Without having a repaired relationship with God, our lives are in eternal trouble. Any hope of peace is instantly evaporated because, in our sin, we are at war with a holy God.

But Christ through his sacrificial death destroys the hostility between the repentant sinner and God and secures peace between the two by the blood of the cross (Col. 1:19-22).

And unlike the world, which considers peace treaties contingent or temporary, the peace that Christ promises is

eternal. In other words, God and the Christian are forever in harmony.

When an individual realizes, as Horatio Spafford did, how infinite this peace is between God and them, it overflows into situations that are extremely difficult. Why? Because they are assured that God is for them and not against them (Rom. 8:31) even in the middle of tragedy. That is the only reason why a man who has lost it all can write and sing with authenticity about the wellness of his soul and if you are in Christ, it is the same for you.

When an individual has God in their life, they have everything and although there will be famine, sickness, and storms of life, God will remain forever a refuge and a source of strength (Hab. 3:17-19).

Personally, I have no idea how someone can walk through this waste howling wilderness without Christ. How do they cope or deal with the sorrow and grief of this fallen and broken world? The truth is they don’t. Any semblance of peace or contentment in hardship is only a surface covering the depth of hurt that an individual experiences. Even the most well-developed coping mechanism given to us by secular psychiatry can’t penetrate the depth of pain that one feels in this life and bring about true lasting healing.

Christ can and does.
Wellness of the soul amid difficulty and everlasting peace can be found in Jesus.
Turn to Him and He will give you peace like a river.
