

## Precautions amp up as COVID-19 alarm spreads

QUAD CITIES – Last Wednesday, March 11, the World Health Organization (WHO) declared the COVID-19 virus outbreak a world pandemic. On Friday, March 13, President Donald Trump declared COVID-19 a national emergency and Washington governor Jay Inslee announced closure of all K-12 schools statewide.

Around the Quad Cities area city and agency officials are taking steps to prepare for whatever actions the current crisis calls for.

- Brewster Mayor Art Smyth called for a special city council meeting on Monday, March 16, to position the city to qualify for emergency federal funds, if needed.

- Pateros Mayor Carlene Anders said the city would address the latest developments in committee and at the regular monthly council meeting that was scheduled for Monday, March 16.

- Okanogan County Public Health

OCPH announced that as of 11 a.m. Friday, March 13, there were no reported COVID-19 cases in Okanogan County and the four COVID-19 tests administered to four residents produced negative results. OCPH also advised that Gov. Inslee has taken the following actions:

- Expanded the prohibition of social, spiritual, and recreational gatherings of more than 250 people to include the en-

tire state of Washington.

- Closed all schools in Washington State (K-12, 2-year, 4-year, community and technical schools) no later than Tuesday March 17, 2020 through at least April 24, 2020
- Churches

Public celebrations of Masses suspended in Diocese of Yakima

Bishop Joseph Tyson has granted a dispensation from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass for all parishioners of the Diocese of Yakima, and all travelers within the boundaries of the Diocese on Sundays, for an indefinite time. They are asking pastors to open churches at set times each day for parishioners' private prayer; scheduled celebrations of Eucharistic Adoration, which could include well-organized and small Eucharistic Processions; and opportunities for private confession

- Expanded the directive of nursing/assisted living homes to adult family homes

- Meetings cancelled
- OMAK - The March 27 meeting of the Okanogan County School Retirees' Association has been canceled as a COVID-19 precaution.

- Okanogan PUD: Okanogan County PUD staff scheduled a meeting for Monday morning, March 16, to discuss closing all offices to the public effective Tuesday, March 17.

## Sanders squishes Biden in initial Okanogan primary results

OKANOGAN COUNTY – Chief Deputy Auditor and Election Administrator Jamie Groomes of the Okanogan County Auditor's Office reports that the second count of unofficial presidential primary election results in Okanogan indicate that Democratic Party voters in the county are choosing Vermont Senator Bernie Sanders over former Vice President Joe Biden by about five percentage points as of Friday, March 13. Sanders has 38.27 percent to Biden's 33.73 percent. About 900 ballots remain to be counted Groomes said.

Sanders' lead does not hold up statewide as Washington's Democratic voters are favoring Biden 37.74 percent over Sanders at 35.69 percent with 93.95 percent of the precincts reporting.

Massachusetts Sena-

tor Elizabeth Warren is in third place statewide with 9.57 percent. In Okanogan County Warren is in a close contest with former New York Mayor Michael Bloomberg. Both are winning 9-plus percent of the votes. The county Democratic vote count is 4,004 votes as of this writing.

County Republicans turned out 5,173 strong for President Donald Trump.

The next Okanogan County count will be on Wednesday, March 18.

In Douglas County, Biden leads Sanders 40.08 percent to 31.69 percent among Democrats. Bloomberg is a strong third with 10.75 and Warren is fourth with 6.31 percent. Douglas County has about 1,000 ballots left to count. The results will be certified on March 20.

Douglas County Republicans voted 5,592 or 99.48 percent for Trump and 29 votes for write-in candidates.

## Brewster moves forward with Senior Center agreement

BREWSTER – The Brewster City Council continued its discussion relative to acquisition of the Brewster, Bridgeport, Pateros Senior Center during its regular monthly meeting on Wednesday, March 11.

City attorney Chuck Zimmerman said the council's Senior Center Committee advises the city to proceed with the acquisition and requested that council members authorize the mayor to complete negotiations and accept transfer of the real property.

Zimmerman said that part of the proposed agreement includes city assumption of insurance costs of the Senior Center building and any major structural and HVAC repairs. The city would own the building and lease it back to the Senior Center which would be responsible for janitorial services. The Senior Center would keep

any dues, fees and revenues it raises while the city would pay the Senior Center's power bills for the first year to allow the small group that comprises the Senior Center to survive and enlarge its membership.

Mayor Art Smyth said his understanding is that the Center would pay its own power bill for the first year and the city would then evaluate the degree of help the Seniors might need covering operating expenses going forward.

Committee member Avis Erickson said that the council has to first come up with a plan that Senior Center President Neal McKee, who was present at the meeting, could take back to the Senior Center membership for its approval before the city could proceed to the next step.

Zimmerman said that based on his experience with similar acquisitions, he recommended that the city help the Seniors now to allow the Senior Center

Erickson said operating the Senior Center, like operating the city pool, is going to cost the city money in any case. All parties agreed that the end, all parties want is a thriving and growing Senior Center.

McKee said the center is working on adding activities including a pinochle card game and perhaps breakfast on Saturdays. He explained that the Center has an agreement with Okanogan County Transportation and Nutrition (OCTN) to provide weekly meals for the Seniors. Zimmerman recommended that the OCTN agreement be incorporated into the city lease.

"We think we are at the juncture where it's appropriate to make a motion to authorize the mayor to complete negotiations with the Senior Center to accept transfer of the Senior Center building to the city," Zimmerman said.

Council members unanimously approved the motion.

## Brewster council reviews airport master plan update

BREWSTER – J-U-B Engineer Steve Marshall was the featured speaker at the regular monthly meeting of the Brewster City Council on Wednesday, March 11, during which he updated the latest developments as the city moves towards approval of the final version.

"We design airports of all sizes around the airplanes that use them," said Marshall.

The Master Plan schedule involves seven steps that include:

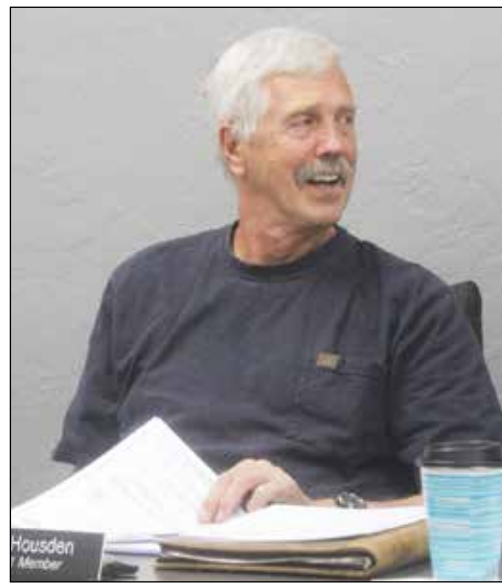
- Inventory
- Aviation Activity Forecasts
- Facility Requirements
- Alternative Considerations
- Selection of Improvements
- 20-Year Capital Improvement Plan
- Airport Layout Plan (ALP) Drawings & Report

The city is currently at the point between Alternative Considerations and Selection of Improvements.

Airport Committee member John Housden reminded council members that "this is a plan of things that we're required to present and are not necessarily what we are going to do."

Housden said that in his meeting with Marshall one of the items that he thought was of special importance to the community was the use of the airport for medical purposes.

Anderson Field's current

activity revolves around 32 based aircraft including 12 helicopters and 6,300 aircraft operations.

"Lifelight is an important user along with flight training, potential wildland fire aircraft and business activity," the plan said.

Marshall explained the four alternatives for the city to consider:

Alternative No. 1: Make everything right as the airport now stands to include an access agreement with adjacent business operations south of the airport

Alternative No. 2: A 500-foot runway extension, a marginal improvement to handle slightly larger, faster aircraft that carry more fuel and passengers.

Alternative No. 3: The airport extension with all-weather capacity to accommodate plans that need the help of

instruments to land through clouds or inclement weather.

Alternative No. 4: The airport extension with improved all-weather capacity which amounts to Alternatives 1 and 2 combined.

J-U-B also presented four alternatives for visual and GPS (Global Positioning System) setbacks. Among Marshall's recommendations was that the city protect the option for a runway extension in case it is needed later. Marshall also recommended pursuing a straight-in GPS approach and all-weather observations systems (AWQS).

Last week J-U-B advertised for bids for a runway rehabilitation project with bid opening scheduled for April 2 and a projected completion date in September.

Housden recommended that the city consider add-

ing a small annex building or trailer where pilots to meet. The airport currently provides a courtesy car.

In motions related to the airport review the city approved a supplemental engineering agreement to extend the master plan update contract that expired at the end of 2019. The city also authorized the mayor to execute the airport paving application to both the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) and Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), a \$238,000 award, and once the grant is received, to authorize the major to negotiate an agreement with J-U-B for engineering services. As part of the grant application the city passed a resolution to commit the city's commitment of \$15,000-plus for its share of the funding.

# Volunteer for Special Investigations Units

### For Okanogan and Douglas counties

OKANOGAN – The Okanogan County and Douglas County Sheriff's Offices are looking for community volunteers to serve as Non-Law Enforcement Community Representatives to assist their departments with review, selection and assessment issues.

"The Non-Law Enforcement Community Representative does not serve as an investigator, but rather assists with the review of

independent investigative team member qualifications, selection of team members, and assessing potential conflicts of interest," said Okanogan County Sheriff Tony Hawley in a media release. "This volunteer position is designed to enhance community trust and increase transparency at all stages of a Special Investigations Unit (SIU) independent investigation."

The SIU is comprised of law enforcement investigators and command staff from the Okanogan County Sheriff's Office, Douglas County Sheriff's Office, Chelan County Sheriff's Office, Wenatchee Police Department, East Wenatchee

Police Department, and the Washington State Patrol. SIU's purpose is to investigate officer-involved uses of force that result in great bodily harm or death. The agency involved in the incident under investigation is removed from the process.

A complete list of duties of a Non-Law Enforcement Community Representative can be found in chapter 139-12 of the Washington Administrative Code (WAC) online at <https://apps.leg.wa.gov/wac/default.aspx?cite=139-12>. Volunteers must be legal residents in the county in which they apply.

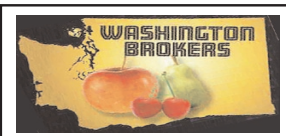

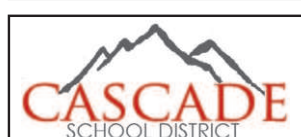

**The rise of handwashing a vitally important life skill**

Last year we moved into our current log home, a house that has TWO bathrooms. Whoo-hoo! There's a loft with a master bathroom upstairs and a main bathroom downstairs. This is the first house I've lived in that has more than one bathroom. I grew up in an old Victorian house, where my 3 sisters, 2 brothers and parents shared ONE bathroom. You'd often hear someone pounding on the bathroom door, followed by someone inside calling out, "I'll be out in a minute!" Do you know how long a minute is? That depends on which side of the bathroom door you're on...

Our main bathroom has a Christmas tree shaped container filled with deep green liquid hand soap that smells just like Christmas. We liked it so much last year that we've kept using it even after the holiday season ended. The bottle is almost empty now, and I'm looking for something to refill it with.

Why do I care about hand soap that smells like a Christmas tree? Because it makes washing your hands a more pleasant experience, and handwashing is important.

Handwashing is one of the most useful and important personal skills you can have, one that directly protects the health of yourself and your loved ones from colds, the flu, and other illnesses like coronavirus.

How should you wash your hands?

First, you have a choice between hand soap or hand gel or sanitizer. Which one is best? That depends. Unless your hands have dirt, visible soil or grease on them, you can effectively wash or sanitize your hands using either soap and water or an alcohol-based gel or foam, as long as the alcohol gel or foam contains at least 65-70% alcohol. If your hands are dirty or greasy, washing them with soap and water



is more effective than using gel or foam.

In health care settings like clinics, hospitals and nursing homes, using alcohol-based hand rubs for hand hygiene is strongly encouraged because they are more convenient to use and when used properly, they can kill bacteria more effectively and quickly than washing with soap and water. Alcohol based hand gels are also less irritating to the skin than soap and water, which is important because health care workers need to wash their hands frequently during each shift as they care for their patients.

Do you need an antibacterial soap? No! The key to effectively cleaning your hands is removing bacteria and viruses from their surface by using friction and then rinsing them away, not by attacking them with a chemical.

What's most important is HOW you wash your hands. You should rub the soap or alcohol gel over every surface of your hands, including your fingertips, fingernails, and between your fingers, for at least 15 seconds.

To keep you rubbing long enough, hum a song that takes you 15-20 seconds to finish while rubbing your hands in a systematic pattern over the tops of your hands, palms, between your fingers, fingertips and fingernails. One verse of a song like Freres Jacques, The Itsy-Bitsy Spider, or two verses of shorter songs like Happy Birthday, the Alphabet Song, or Row, Row, Row Your Boat all last about 15-20 seconds. My own personal favorite? The Itsy-Bitsy Spider.

Passing on this vital personal skill is easier now than ever, with plenty

of free information available online to help teach effective hand-washing technique to your children and grandchildren.

Here are 6 Key Strategies for Effective Hand-washing:

- 1. Do it frequently.** Wash or sanitize your hands BEFORE eating, BEFORE and AFTER caring for loved ones who are ill, AFTER using the bathroom, handling animals or pets, and sneezing or wiping your eyes or nose.
- 2. Check the label.** For effectiveness, make sure the alcohol-based hand gel you buy and use contains at least 65-70% alcohol.
- 3. Rub your hands thoroughly.** Make sure you are rubbing soap or gel over EVERY surface of your hands, especially all of your fingertips and fingernails.
- 4. Don't skimp on hand gel.** Many people swipe hand gel around and that's it. Apply enough gel so that it takes about 15 seconds to dry completely.
- 5. Sing a song.** Sing or hum a catchy song that lasts for at least 15 seconds while you wash your hands. It helps kids learn effective handwashing and keeps you (and them) from stopping too soon.
- 6. Antibacterial soap is not required.** Effective handwashing or sanitizing depends on using good technique, not on wiping with soap that contains an antibacterial chemical.
