



Darnell is impressed by the girls' aggressiveness, their willingness to compete in practices and how they work to help better each other.


"Practice is so important for us and our girls know that," Darnell said. "They really get after it in practice, and that makes the coach happy. We're getting better."



Then on Saturday evening the camp's participating kids will perform at the high school boy's varsity game, which begins at 5:45 p.m. at home.



Effective Laxatives

Thanksgiving dinner last month, we each shared something we were thankful for. Recalling my 89-year old father struggled to walk up hills and stairs during our trip together in Italy a few weeks ago, I reflected on how we take for granted the small things: not only our mobility, but good bowel and bladder function. I know that I did.

As pharmacy students in our early twenties, my classmates and I snickered in the back row as our professor, Dr. Keith Campbell, explained various types of laxatives. It all seemed so funny, back then. Funny, that is, until it happens to YOU, which it did, 10 years later during a bout of whooping cough while taking a cough syrup containing the narcotic codeine. The misery I suffered when my bowels stopped working had to be Karma at work, getting the last laugh.

How does constipation happen? When you eat, your food becomes a liquid mass of nutrients. You have muscles lining the walls of your intestines that squeeze in a coordinated rhythm called peristalsis to move that mass of food along, allowing your body to absorb nutrients and

water from it along the way. Eventually that movement results in eliminating the remainder as feces. The longer it takes to move through your intestine, the more water can be reabsorbed into your body and the firmer your feces or stool becomes. If the muscle contractions of your intestine aren't strong or fast enough, your stool will become hard. causing constipation. Ouch!

Certain medicines and foods called laxatives can help relieve constipation. The word laxative means "to loosen", and laxatives relieve the discomfort of backed up bowels by relaxing or loosening them.

Some laxatives work by increasing the amount of water in the stool to keep it soft and less painful to eliminate, while others increase the amount of bulk in the stool, which helps move it along and holds water in the stool as it moves through to keep it soft. The fastest way to relieve constipation is with a stimulant laxative, which increases the strength and frequency of the peristalsis squeezing action to get things moving again.

There are several stimulant laxatives to choose from: Senna, castor oil and an extract from the bark of a tree called cascara segrada are from natural sources, and bisacodyl is a synthetic compound.

Senna is an effective laxative from either the dried leaves or the pod of the Senna Plant. Available as tablets or extract as Senakot®, or as tea brewed from Senna leaves, it creates strong intestinal contractions and causes a bowel movement within six hours.

Castor oil is extracted from the bean of the castor plant and is converted in the small intestine into a compound that creates such intense waves of peristalsis that it can be days before another bowel movement. occurs. The intestinal cramping that from castor oil can even trigger uterine contractions. Castor oil should only be used occasionally; otherwise it can interfere with absorption of nutrients and can irritate or damage the lining of the intestine.

Cascara extract is from the bark of the cascara or buckthorn tree, which grows wild along the Pacific Coast in Washington and British Columbia. It also tastes absolutely terrible, and milk of magnesia (another type of laxative) is often added to it to mask its bitter taste.

The most commonly used stimulant laxative today is bisacodyl, a synthetic



compound introduced in 1953 as Dulcolax®. It is less likely to interfere with nutrient absorption because it acts in the colon instead of the small intestine. Bisacodyl is available as tablets and rectal suppositories.

Here are 4 tips to keep things moving:

1. Know how fast your laxative will work. Bisacodyl rectal suppositories can achieve results within 15 minutes to an hour; Senna and castor oil usually act within about 6 hours, while bisacodyl tablets work overnight, in about 6-12 hours.

2. Stimulant laxatives can be combined with stool softeners to help relieve the discomfort of **hard stools.** Some examples include Senokot-S® and Peri-Colace®, and prunes (dried plums).


3. Consider trying prunes, **AKA dried plums.** Studies show that prunes are effective in relieving constipation but unlike over-the-counter laxatives deliver many critical nutrients, including antioxidants, fiber, potassium, vitamins A and K. Prunes/

dried plums have also been shown to improve bone density as well or better than many medications prescribed for thin bones.

4. Avoid remedies that can cause or exacerbate constipation. Talk to your pharmacist to see if any of your medicines/supplements could be contributing to constipation.
