

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

OKANOGAN - The second annual Career Connections Expo held at the Okanogan fairground Agriplex on Tuesday, Oct. 29

"This was our second year holding this event in partnership with the Okanogan County Economic Alliance and the Apple STEM Network and were overwhelmed with the response that we received from our vendors, schools and community members," said career connection specialist Kristi O'Neill of WorkSource Okanogan County.

O'Neill said more than 250 local and statewide professionals, 70 local and statewide businesses, 27 education and training representatives and four military branches were represented at the Expo.

"The Okanogan PUD had staff from energy services, engineering, operations, information services and communications there," said O'Neill. "Their line crew had a timed competition for high school students to switch out a fuse."

The USFS brought Smokey Bear along to help connect with students who are interested in careers with the Forest Service and Lifeline Ambulance provided students with an opportunity to practice their CPR skills inside one of their ambu-




Undefeated Lady Bears roll through volleyball rivals






