Burn restrictions eased in parts of East Washington

QUAD CITIES --- Effective Sept. 18, the Washington State Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has eased burning restrictions in portions of Eastern Washington thanks to recent rain and lower temperatures.

"Rule and permit burns are allowed in most areas, however, there are still burn restrictions in a few areas," a DNR media release said. "Please check with the local fire district or visit https://fortress.wa.gov/dnr/protection/firedanger/before lighting any fire."

DNR sources advise the following simple steps before burn-

1. Check before burning by calling 1-800-323-BURN (2876) or

https://fortress.wa.gov/dnr/protection/firedanger/ for current burning conditions.

- 2. Put a firebreak around your fire.
- 3. Never leave fire unattended. 4. Put the fire completely out every night.
- 5. If wind speeds increase, put out your fire.

Bridgeport to interview candidates for new reservoir design

Sheriff updates council

BRIDGEPORT - City council members will hold interviews with three of the four contractors who submitted bids to design the new city water reservoir. The new structure is scheduled to be built adjacent to the existing reservoir on property the city acquired through an exchange with the Washington State Department of Fish and Wildlife.

City engineers Gray & Osborne met with city officials prior to the bid request to make sure all relevant details were included in the reservoir plan. As to its eventual carrying capacity, Public Works Superintendent Stuart Dezellem said further analysis will determine that issue but that 250,000 gallons is a minimum amount.

Council member Phil Lee agreed to take the place of former council member Eric Schmidt on the Public Works Committee that addresses city street, water and sewer issues. The committee will interview one potential designer at 2 p.m., Sept. 30, and the

remaining two at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m., Oct. 1, before making its selection.

In other business, public works superintendent Stuart Dezellem reported that all items on a contractor's checklist have been completed on the Foster Avenue Overlay Project and recommended that the council approve the project as completed. Council members so voted.

Council members scheduled the date for the preliminary budget workshop for 6 p.m. Oct. 9, scheduled a Planning Commission Joint Workshop for 6 p.m., Oct. 16, and approved a preliminary budget public hearing for the next regular council meeting at 7 p.m., Oct. 16

Mayor Janet Conklin advised that Columbia Valley Medical Clinic (CVMC) followed up its presentation at the August council meeting to inquire if the council wants the CVMC mobile unit to make a return trip to Bridgeport. In the earlier visit the mobile unit patients included Bridgeport school students.

Mayor Conklin told council members that the Family Health Center at 1015 Columbia Avenue provides a nurse on staff at the Bridgeport school. FHC also has plans to

acquire a mobile van to travel to migrant housing sites and other locations to provide on-site care. Council members decided to take no action on the CVMC proposal.

Conklin said she recently had an advisory from the chamber of commerce that Brewster Food Bank is requesting a donation. City clerk/treasurer Judy Brown advised the council that the city will need to secure memorandum of understanding (MOU) similar to the one it has with the Brewster Senior Center before it approves a donation schedule.

"I think this would be a good

thing to include in our budget," said council member Matthew Schuh of next month's 2020 budget discussions.

Lee suggested that the city contact the food bank with respect to its willingness to approve an MOU and if so. revisit the issue during budget discussions.

Melinda Posner, Parks Planner for the Washington State Parks and Recreation Commission contacted Mayor Conklin with a request to appear at the next regular council meeting on Oct. 16, to discuss ways to get the community more involved in the Bridgeport State Park located two miles north of Bridgeport on the north shore of Rufus Woods Lake. Posner said the state is also willing to entertain any offers to purchase land from property owners in the outlying areas.

"The biggest thing the state parks could do is to stop the requirement to have a pass to even drive out there even to visit with someone who's staying out there," said Dezellem. "You have to have a \$10 one-day

Career Connection Expo coming Oct. 29 to Agriplex

OKANOGAN - The second annual Okanogan County Career Connections Expo is coming to the Okanogan County Fairground Agriplex from 9 a.m. to 12 noon, Tuesday, Oct. 29.

Okanogan County WorkSource is partnering with the North Central Educational Services District (NCESD), the Colville Confederated Tribes, the Apple STEM Network, and Economic Alliance to host the event that introduces local high school students to career, training, and education opportunities offered by business and educational institutions.

Last year's debut Expo drew more than 750 students who were exposed to more than 80 vendors. Organizers anticipate that more than 1,000 students from across 10 school districts will turn out for this year's Expo.

"This event is a great opportunity to connect with your future workforce and introduce our students to the wealth of career opportunities and training/education programs within your businesses and educational institutions," wrote Career Connection Specialist Kristi O'Neill of WorkSource Okanogan County to potential vendors. Vendors in attendance will include community, technical, and four-year colleges, military, Job Corps, employers, skills centers, and apprenticeships.

Club secretary Mike Mauk said the new installation is in a building that the club acquired last year from the Border Patrol.

"The frequency is 145.470

with a pl tone of 173.8," Mauk said using references that amateur radio operators would know. "This is open to all licensed members."

Mauk said the repeater incurs monthly PUD operating costs and the club welcomes donations to help meet the expenses. The club address is: P.O.B. 464, Okanogan, WA 98840, with websites at w7orc. com and on facebook.com.

"We thank K7AUC Bob (Sandy) Sanderson for all the equipment and all of his time and tech support for installing the antenna, and climbing the tower," said Mauk. "We also thank Ken Rau our Repeater Coordinator for working with us to get frequencies.'

Club vice president Sanderson has assumed duties as club president replacing former president Dick Miller while the group prepares for an election of new officers next January.

a moment of levity. Morris handed out three months of incident reports - June, July, and August - that became intermingled in the course of distribution and then stood by as council members sorted and exchanged sheets until all present had a copy of each.

"It's a test," chuckled Mor-

"We're not doing that well," a council member observed.

Morris said the new Douglas County Law and Justice Center, a 17,900 -square-foot building on 19th Street in East Wenatchee is about a month-and-a-half away from occupancy in mid-Novem-

"We're down three people right now," Morris said of deputies on staff.

Two of those, Ruby Ramirez of Quincy and Adrian Lopez of East Wenatchee, are attending the Basic Law Enforcement Academy in Burien, a 720-hour training program required for all state law enforcement personnel. A department newhire, Jeremy Adams, will join the Sheriffs' Office on Oct. 1 and begins academy training at the end of November. Following graduation, Lopez will be assigned to the north end of the county and fills the last open slot for the north end.

Morris said he will also ask the Douglas County Commissioners for funding to add another staff member for the North Central Washington Narcotics Task Force.

Morris said a site has been chosen for the new Tacti-

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cal Training Facility (TTF) shooting range.

"It's at Brandt's Quarry between Farmer and Douglas, smack dab in the middle of the county," said Morris. "It's a large area and I hope to have it ready to use next

Council member Sergio Orozco advised Morris that he has received citizen complaints of drivers passing school busses while they are stopped with lights flashing. Morris said the schools have forms for the bus drivers to use to document passing infractions. Once they are forwarded to the Sheriff's office Morris said his deputies will pay a call on the offenders to educate them on applicable traffic law.

Conklin said she was approached by a citizen who is also a retired police officer who wants to use one of the city's vacant buildings to start a boxing club for youngsters in Bridgeport and inquired if that was an activity Morris would support. Morris said he would support any legal activity for area vouth.

Conklin said she was also contacted by a lady requesting a letter from the city supporting her drive to designate September as Children's Cancer Awareness Month. Governor Inslee supports the effort and wants towns around the state to write their own proclamations endorsing the measure. Conklin said if council members had no objection, she would draft a proclamation on behalf of Bridgeport.

The next regular meeting of the Bridgeport city Council is at 7 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 16.


If we are all okay with a nationally broadcast commercial telling us that this living arrangement is all about Mom, does that mean Dad is chopped liver?



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


Two days earlier Bridgeport suffered a 23-0 shutout at the hands of defending Central Washington 2B league champion Liberty

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
