OKANOGAN - Go Fund Me and North Cascade Bank accounts have been created for an Okanogan firefighter who was seriously injured while battling a wildfire at Spring Coulee last Sunday, Sept. 1.

Christian Johnson, Assis-

tant Chief with Okanogan Fire District #3 suffered burns over 60 percent of his body and damage to his airway. Johnson is currently in Harborview Medical Center in Seattle where he has been placed in a medically induced coma to stabilize his condition for skin

Brewster Chamber hears from two guest speakers, looking for new treasurer

BREWSTER - Guest speakers from the Care Net Pregnancy Centers and North Central Washington Economic Development District addressed the regular monthly meeting of the Brewster Chamber of Commerce on Wednesday, Sept. 4, on topics of business and social needs facing local communities.

Karla Phillips representing area Care Net Pregnancy Centers previewed the organizations second annual benefit and auction that will be held this year at Sun Mountain Lodge on Saturday, Oct. 26.

Care Net has centers in Omak, Orville, Coulee Dam and Brewster that provide ee and confidential services to Okanogan County women considering abortion of facing an unplanned pregnancy.

"It's not enough to say we're pro-life," said Phillips "but not give the support needed once a woman makes the decision to keep her baby."

(\$250) receive logo/sponsorship and video presentation recognition and two event tickets.



Traveling throughout North Central Washington with my staff has become an annual tradition in the fall, the time of year that legislators traditionally begin planning for the upcoming legislative session.

In past years, I have visited Leavenworth, Cashmere, Wenatchee, East Wenatchee, Chelan, Quincy, Coulee City, Soap Lake, Bridgeport, Pateros, Twisp, Winthrop, and

Waterville - all communities in our vast Legislative District 12. This year's tour included many of those same stops along with new additions of Mansfield and Mazama. The hikes provide me with an opportunity to connect with people in a unique and different way - and they have become political "walk and talk" opportunities, which are a fun change of pace from common conference room or office discussions.

As I review my notes from this month's listening sessions and look ahead to the legislative session in January, I will travel to Olympia not only better prepared to represent us but also filled with gratitude for the opportunity

to do so. If you were not able to participate in my recent listening tour, please know that you can connect with me vear round.

tral Washington Economic and diversifies the regional Development District has been awarded an Economic Development Administration (EDA) grant by the U.S. Department of Commerce to implement a comprehensive economic development strategy (CEDS) for Chelan, Douglas, and Okanogan counties.

The grant contributes \$225,000 to the \$450,000 CEDS project, which establishes a roadmap for private and public sector collaboration to create economic development that strengthens economy, supports private investments, and creates jobs in the region.

"This grant is critical to help provide the vision that Chelan, Douglas, and Okanogan counties need to continue to create sustainable jobs and spur diverse economic development," said Cantwell, the Ranking Member of the Senate Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation and a member of the Senate Small Business Committee.

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
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The WVC CAMP program serves about 55 students per year. More than 550 students have participated at WVC since 2009. More than 85 percent of CAMP students enroll for a second year at

Sunday, Sept. 8

The two renovated fairgrounds facilities, the racetrack and rodeo arena were well received by competitors and spectators alike according to venue directors.

"The contestants loved the arena," said rodeo director Sam Buchert. "The timedevent cowboys liked the roping set up and the barrel racers loved the ground."

Buchert said it was cool getting high-fives from many of the barrel racers who traveled long distances to compete not knowing what to expect of the arena conditions.

"The rodeo itself was good," said Buchert. "There are always a few little things to dial-in with a new facility like the sound system and that's to be expected, but we will definitely work on making it better next year."

Buchert said he overheard one National Finals Rodeo qualifying roper tell the Pro-West president, who was on hand to see the new arena: "This is the nicest facility there is and they (Pro-West) should have the Pro-West finals here."

Future plans call for bleachers along the east side of the arena. In their absence fans backed pickups along the fence Saturday afternoon to have prime viewing spots for the Saturday evening rodeo.

"It was awesome to see the arena lined with people and vehicles for the show Saturday," Buchert said.

Pro-West Results

Horse race coordinator Carol Sivak noticed a larger than usual turnout of spectators and racers, "especially the Junior Relay which we had 10 teams," said Sivak. "it was great to see the youth getting involved more."

Sivak said competitors came from Colville, Inchelium and Keller to fill the races.

The winner of the Senior Relay race on Sunday, Sept. 8, Omak Express, is qualified and paid into the World Championships at Walla Walla on Sept. 28-30.

During the races on Saturday, Sept. 10, Doug and Deance Ralston hosted the County Roping and Barrel Race for community members who are 18 years and older, Sivak said.

Between the Sunday races Marnee Cleveland hosted games for kids to play on their horses to entertain the spectators.

"There was a costume contest, Texas Trot, Boot Race, Bubble Gum Run, Gunny Sack Hop, Egg on the Spoon, Hurry Scurry (a speed/timed, low jumping game), and Horse and Rider Soccer," Sivak

On the track two heats each of kids races and Walk, Trot and Run events were crowd pleasers.

Sivak said the new dirt overlay on the track held the water well from the Saturday night/Sunday morning deluge that fell.

"We are working hard to know how to work the new surface," Sivak said of track maintenance.

Donald E. Howell, Sr.

Donald E. Howell, Sr., age 91, passed into the presence of his Lord and Savior on August 29, 2019. He passed with his son Paul, at his side, holding his hand.

Don was born September 13, 1927, to Orlando E. and Frances (Jennings) Howell. He grew up on his familys' farms in Marysville, Washington. Each farm was pioneered by both parents' side of the family. One of the farms is now Jennings Park in Marysville. In 1950, Don entered the Army, serving in Korea and Japan during the Korean War. Sgt. Howell was honorably discharged in 1952 and continued to serve in the Army Reserves then the National Guard.

He met Leona A. Leonard while doing graduate work at Seattle Pacific University. Don and Leona were married on August 14, 1953, in the First United Methodist Church in Marysville. Don directed and sang in church choirs in the Spokane area. One such



traveling choir was the Whitworth Acapella Choir. He had a beautiful baritone singing voice. During this time, he graduated from Whitworth University with a Bachelor Degree. He taught music, drama and mathematics in Deer Park and Raymond School Districts. Don was able to play any instrument proficiently, whether it was strings, brass, reeds, or percussion.

Don and Leona moved to Aberdeen, Washington in 1955, where he taught mathematics at Hopkins Jr. High, Weatherwax Sr. High School



and Grays Harbor College. He earned a Masters degree from Portland State College in 1966. Don retired from teaching in 1985. He remembered each of his students by name and the year they were in his classes. During his teaching career, he served in the Army Reserves and Washington National Guard. After going up through the ranks, he retired from the National Guard with the rank of Lt. Colonel in 1987.

Don served as a councilman for the 5th Ward on the Aberdeen City Council in the 1970's and was a member of the Aberdeen Planning Commission. He was very active member of the United Commercial Travelers and served as Grand Counselor in 1986. He served as a Commander of and was a life member of the American Legion. Don was a member of the Aberdeen Elks, the Washington Education Association and National Education Association.

After retiring from teaching in 1985, Don went on a Walk to Emmaus where he was immersed in a closer walk with our Lord. Donald and Leona entered the ministry serving churches in the Methodist conference for the next 12 years. In 1985, Don and Leona's unpaid ministry led them to Eastern Washington where they served as Pastors of the Pateros and Bridgeport Methodist Churches for three months. Don and Leona were

authorized by the Bishop of the Methodist General Conference to conduct regular church services, officiate at weddings, funerals, and baptisms. Don and Leona traveled great distances to visit people in the hospital and those that were home-bound. Parishioners often commented that Don preached like Billy Graham and sang like George Beverly Shea. Because the people of the churches would not let them go, three months turned into eight years continuing their ministry. They retired from lay ministry in 1997. They travelled to numerous states, villages in South America, Canada, and made many road trips. When they retired from ministry, their car had over 400,000 miles on it from ministry and from touring the United States.

On May 21, 2016, Don suffered a stroke that prevented him from being mobile. For the next three years, he remained at home surrounded by his loving family.

Don is survived by Leona, his loving wife of 66 years, five children: Orlando G. Howell

(Julia), Dona Carriker (Gene), Donald Jr. (Lisa), Paul, Carlene Kuhn (Gene). He is also survived by 11 Grandchildren and 5 Great Grandchildren, a sister Ruth Jobes, a brotherin-law Thom Leonard, numerous Nephews and Nieces. His parents, his sister Lucille and son-in-law Gene Kuhn preceded him in death.

The family thanks Don's wife Leona, all the amazing caregivers, staff at Harbors Home Health & Hospice, daughter-in-law Lisa Howell, daughter Dona Carriker, Grandson Evan Kuhn, and primary caregiver Orlando Howell for the quality care they provided during the past three years giving Don a good quality of life and to be at home surrounded by his loving family.




