



Cashmere's Kert, Darnell win awards at NCW Sports Banquet

WENATCHEE - Between the Bronze shoe, six teams traveling to state (girls soccer, girls basketball, wrestling, baseball, track and tennis) and five of which placing in their respective sport, it has been quite a good year for Cashmere athletics.

The cherry on top for was presented this past Tuesday at the NCW Sports Awards Banquet at the Town Toyota Center in Wenatchee on June 6, as Tyler Kert and Brent Darnell took home the honors of Male Athlete of the Year and Coach of a Female Team of the Year.

Kert, a junior three sports athlete in football, basketball and tennis looked surprised at first when his name was announced, but he has certainly earned it with his play this season.

Kert was the quarterback of the Bulldogs team that went 5-4 in the season, but beat the Mountain Goats in Chelan to retain the Bronze Shoe for another year. Kert followed up with a superb basketball season, where he was named team captain at the end of the year and then took second place in the 1A Singles State Tennis Tournament in Yakima.

"I was partly surprised but really honored to receive that award," Kert said.

He expressed his thanks towards

his family, friends, coaches and teammates for all of their support.

"It was a very cool honor and it meant a lot to my family for me to get that because the last person to get that award was my uncle, Dusty Lane, in 1995," Kert said. "He died a couple of months after I was born so it really meant a lot to my family that I won that."

Since leaving Eastmont for Cashmere in 2012, coach Darnell has sculpted the Bulldogs into a consistent championship contender. In the four years that he has coached the Bulldogs, Darnell has lost only 14 games - half of which came in one season

(2015-16) - and his teams have achieved an unblemished 20-0 record in CTL league play twice.

Over that span, Darnell has lead Cashmere two times to a third place finish in the 1A State Tournament and a second place finish this past year. Darnell will look to get over the hump and bring home a championship with freshman phenom Haley Van Lith.

After accepting their individual awards, both Kert and Darnell posed for a photo op with keynote speaker, former Chelan Goat and current Brooklyn Nets basketball forward Joe Harris.

Harris, a three time CTL Player of the Year and former Washington Mr. Basketball Gatorade Player of the Year gave a motivational speech prior to the award ceremony. "I had

grand visions in mind, and that is the advice that I would like to give to every athlete here," Harris motioned to the audience. "Every athlete has goals, identify what your vision is and get committed to the process to accomplish that vision. You can't just write them down though and kick back on the couch watching Netflix. It doesn't work like that. You have to have discipline and focus to work toward your goals every day. It is easy to be motivated for a few days and another thing to want

it hard enough to work every day. The world is not devoted to making you happy and you are going to face some sort of adversity. No one goes unscathed, we all get knocked down, but the important thing is how you respond. You can succumb or bounce back, (but) just control what you can control. It doesn't matter where you grow up, all that matters is what you believe and up here in your mind," Harris said. "Don't let anyone tell you that you can't do something and always believe in yourself."

Asgard Pass claims another victim

Cashmere man part of search and rescue team

ASGAARD PASS -- On June 3, a 19-year old Mercer Island man was presumed killed while glissading* at Asgaard Pass. By June 5, searchers had still been unable to locate the body of Benjamin Gore. Gore was glissading down Asgaard Pass when he fell through a hole in the snow into the creek below.

This same hole, which is created by the melting snow, has claimed three lives now. One year ago, almost to the day, a 24-year old Seattle man was lost glissading with coworkers. In 2011, a 21-year old Eatonville woman was killed there.

Jeff Paton of Cashmere was part of the Chelan County Mountain Rescue team that searched for Gore and the man last year.

"There's a stream that comes down Asgaard Pass which is covered by snow until it starts to melt out. It's exactly in the middle of the pass. The pass is 2,200 feet from the lake to the summit. About about halfway down is a small waterfall," Paton said. "That creates a hole underneath the snow. When it first starts to open, it is only

a few inches wide, then it gets wider and wider."

Paton said Gore was glissading, which is a normal procedure, but you must pick and choose your conditions and your runout. You don't just glissade anything, he said, like on ice, or a place with an unsafe runout or rocks at the bottom.

In this particular case, Gore got out of control.

"If you do get out of control, then you're going to take what you get. This particular spot, whether it didn't add it up or what, but it leads you to a little waterfall about 15 feet, which pitches underneath the snow," Paton said. "Right now, there is a three or four foot hole. He went right into that hole. The water goes over the rock underneath the snow, which is water polished and very smooth. You end up going down there quite a long ways."

The only way to get the body out at this point is to wait for the snow to melt out more, he said. Paton said they do not want to put a guy down there in a dry suit, roped or not, and have the whole top collapse on him.

Paton is confident the body will end up in the same exact place as the man from last year.

"There are a couple little shelves where the water goes through there, down to a small shelf not really big enough to hang up a body, then down further to a big pool. The odds are that he will be in exactly the same place as the Chinese (tourist from Seattle) man," Paton said.

Calling around to various state parks and to the Department of Fish and Wildlife, Wheelless began asking if there were any conservation projects that needed assistance.

"They're a harder thing to find," Wheelless said about conservation projects in regards to other types of

service projects.

Finally getting into contact with the Leavenworth Fish Hatchery, Wheelless was pleased to hear that Marjorie Lodwick, the Agency Coordinator for the Department of Fish and Wildlife, and her staff were seeking help with different conservation projects they had planned at that location.

Projects available included cleanup and planting trees, with planting trees being the project the boys decided on.

"The goal of the project was to fill in open space next to the river and provide more habitat for the wildlife along the Icicle River," Lodwick said.

The Cascadia Conservation District in Wenatchee donated 50 Ponderosa Pines, 15 Vine Maples and 15 Wood's Roses for the Cub Scouts to plant.

According to Lodwick, Wheelless first got the saplings and planted them in her own yard temporarily so that the plants could adjust in the ground after having been stored in a refrigerator unit for quite a while.

Why am I so cynical? Actual work leads to actual reality, or truth about life, and as the Bible saying goes, the truth shall set you free.*

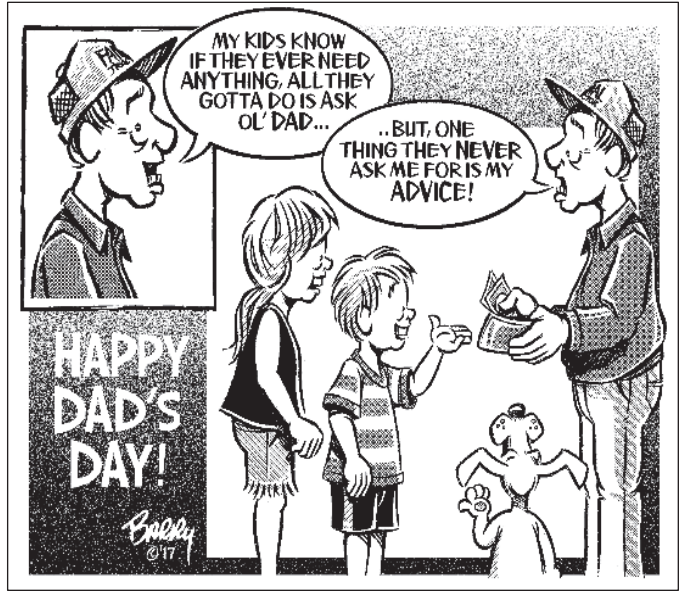
I know of too many

Give alternatives a try. Your sparkly-eyed Einstein will only benefit from the experience. Of course, parents who think their children are merely part

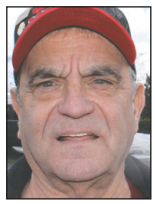

People made their own fun in the early days

In the early part of the 1900's the people of central Washington looked for ways to enjoy their time off from all the work and chores that came with building the area. Camping, fishing and hiking were popular with some carrying water tanks of Cutthroat trout into the high lakes.

AM radio, along with movies were getting a lot of play, but the demand for music and dancing was not being filled. Some enterprising folks saw the need for dance halls and bands and therefore put in some dance halls. One was built at Crescent Beach on Lake Wenatchee and extended out over the water. A dance pavilion was built on Lake Chelan near Campbell's.

Another was built by the Wenatchee River and called "Edgewater Grove". It was just upriver from the town of Monitor and located in a grove of mostly cottonwood trees with some pine trees. Mom told me that because of Prohibition these dance halls always attracted

"bootleggers." The Edgewater Grove had a big following from Wenatchee and Cashmere. Sometimes the people would travel to Lake Wenatchee and the dance at Crescent Beach. The following is a story that I heard my mom tell a few times.

My dad was single and raising some very good melons on the sandy side of the canyon that one of grandma's orchards

was in. He and my uncle Frazier or "Tade" liked playing tricks on different folks and so set out to trick my future mother and her sister Bonita along with a friend named Hazel.

It started with Uncle Tade telling the girls that he would be glad to take them to the dance at Edgewater Grove. Friday night came and Uncle Tade picked the girls up and told them it would be nice to grab a couple of watermelons from Eddy's melon patch. He mentioned that Eddie was gone for the weekend and would never miss them.

With the girls dressed up complete with stockings and low heels, Uncle Tade drove the girls up to the orchard. The sun was setting and it was starting to get dark. Orchard irrigation in those days was

done with the water running in dirt ditches on the selected rows. Uncle Tade talked the girls into walking up through the orchard to help carry the melons back to the car.

The girls held hands to get over the wet rows and they all made it to the melon patch. Uncle Tade started slapping melons and all of a sudden a voice from behind a large pine tree yelled "what are you doing, stealing my melons, then the lead report of a shotgun. The girls screamed and Uncle Tade yelled: "run for it". The girls started running and of course, could not keep from the wet ditches. Boom, another shotgun blast, and Uncle Tade yelled "I'm hit you girls run for it. The girls turned to help Uncle Tade and he told them to "save themselves".

By the time my dad and Uncle Tade got down to the car they were still laughing until they saw the girls. The

girls were mud splattered with torn stockings and hair a mess. They were not laughing and made it clear that nothing was or would be funny that night.

That was how my mother was first introduced to my father, surprisingly enough they would soon be married. That's another story, but those were the times before smartphones and television. People found ways to enjoy what they had and each other.

spot. There is a giant avalanche chute. When the trail and cliffs melt out, there is still deep snow over this hillside. There is a relatively safe runout at the bottom where the slope angle lessens.

It's a quick way to get down if you go up to climb Dragontail or the Enchantments, he said.

"As long as the conditions are something you can control on, it's no different that skiing down a steep slope. Can I glissade this safely? Can I stay in control?," Paton said. "That's a function of the snow quality, hard or soft, how steep the hill is. What is the runout? Are there hazards in the way, like a rock or tree? It's all very

subjective. Some guys are going to glissade things which are pretty hairy. Others might not glissade without a completely safe runout at the bottom."

At Asgaard, the killer stream is right in the middle of the pass.

"You are on such steep snow, unless you stop and think 'is there a stream under here,' you don't know there is. You can't see an indication of it. You can't hear it," Paton said. "I don't like to be too critical, but these guys going up, could have looked down their descent line, and would have seen that waterfall. They might have said, whatever we do, we're not going to start glissading until we get below that. That's all about experience."

After the accident last year, Paton said Forest Service put

up a notice at the trailhead warning people to avoid the stream hazard. For Paton, an experienced mountaineer, you can't mark every hazard. There are all types of hazards, cliffs, rocks, rockfall, avalanches, crevasses.

"This is a pretty unique spot. My own personal opinion is it would be good to have a sign at the end of the trail as you go around Colehuck Lake and are looking at your ascent route. Stay left at Asgaard Pass. FATALITIES have occurred over the 12hazardous stream. That might still happen," Paton said.

The key question is, how can future tragedies be prevented at Asgaard Pass? Paton said when people are going someplace new, they'll check out guidebooks or websites, like the Washington Trails Association.

There's a lot of information out there, that sometimes, might mention this hazard.

"This hazard is a temporary one. That's why it happened almost a year ago to the day. When it is completely covered with snow, it's not a hazard because it is so deep, you are safe. But as it starts to melt out, it gets thinner and thinner, so you could walk on it and fall through or you could be glissading and, if you did lose control, it could eat you," Paton said. "The mountains are extremely variable in

terms of what is safe, when and where. It's get difficult to document those individual hazards.

"It's a very strange spot. It's not very visible from above. You're over it before you know what happened, if you haven't looked at your route down. Visibility is everything."

After the donations were given, Lodwick had to get approval for all three types of trees to be planted at the hatchery.

Once at the hatchery, the Boy Scouts went down to the boat dock where they planted over 60 saplings in a span of about two hours, with the help of a few of their parents.

"I'm super excited that we got the vast majority of the trees planted," Lodwick said. "It was a really great project and I had fun with this group."

All of the 50 Ponderosa Pines were planted along with all 15 of the Vine Maples and two of the 15 Wood's Roses.

The remaining trees that weren't planted by the Scouts were later planted by high school students within the Cascade Discovery Program Lodwick said.

The staff at the hatchery will be watering the saplings once a week to help them along.

"The boys worked really hard and so did their parents," Wheeless said.

One of the boys that stood out to Wheeless during the project was Connor Bray, son of Cub Scout Pack 1 Den Leader Candi Bray.

According to Wheeless, Bray had exceptional knowledge about conservation and how important the environment was.

Bray seemed extremely enthusiastic as he spoke during the question and answer time with Lodwick after the trees had been planted.

"This project made him light up," Wheeless said. "It was

phenomenal to listen to him. It was a beautiful moment."

Questions that Lodwick asked the boys included why plants are so important and how they contribute to both the ecosystem and to humans.

For Wheeless, one of the best things about the project was how all of the boys just knew that what they were doing was going to make a difference.

Another very important lesson that the boys took away from this experience is being supportive of the community and having respect for both nature and the environment.

"All the boys had a great time," Candi Bray said. "They worked hard digging holes for the trees, they used team work at ensuring that each tree was planted per specifications, then they flagged the trees."

Wheeless stated that the very first major project the boys did was the cleanup and repainting of the Vale Elementary Garden.

"But this is something environmental," Wheeless said. "This would be our biggest thing that we've done to this day."

The Scouts were invited by the staff at the hatchery to come back after the summer for another conservation project that involved cleaning up the boat dock once it was closed up for the season between August and September.

"I'm very proud of all the boys and the work that they've done," Wheeless said. "I look forward to our next conservation project."

What to do with the kids?

"What do we do with the kids?" Is a question that every church will have to answer at least once. Typically churches will opt for age segregation. This is usually how it goes, a family walks into the church foyer and mysteriously their children are swept away into what is called "children's church," and the parents walk into the sanctuary childless, and experience a child-free worship environment. Okay, maybe it is not as shadowy as I make it out to be, but the normal experience is not too far off, kids and parents are usually separated from each other when it comes to church.

Family integration, or families worshipping and sitting together underneath the preached word is the norm, Biblically. The Bible answers what to do with the kids when it comes to the worship service, and it says that they should sit with their parents. Don't misunderstand me, I am not saying that if a church has an age segregated service that somehow they are a bad church and should be avoided. I realize that there are going to be a great many people that will disagree with me in

this article, but I want to reemphasize there are scores of churches that are solidly gospel centered and do a great work for the Lord. I along with others, just choose to follow a more biblical example.

Church life is a familial experience. Every generation, parents and children should receive the blessing of worshipping together corporately. As I said before, this is the Biblical example. We see in Deuteronomy 31:12 that God commanded Moses when the word of the Covenant was to be read, to "assemble the people, men, women, and little ones, and the sojourner..." why? "that they may hear and learn to fear the Lord your God." When Joshua renews the covenant and reads the Law to the people of Israel, everyone including children were present (Jos. 8:35).

However this is not just an Old Testament precedent, rather we see it in the New Testament within the letters written by the Apostle Paul. For example we see in both Ephesians 6 and Colossians 3 that immediately after the children are addressed, the father is as well. This means that when a letter was received by the early church, both children and parents both heard an exhortation together.

So if the Bible provides examples both from the Old Testament, as well as the New, then what is the purpose of segregating ages? I may be going out on a limb here, but the reason why we separate

parents from children is because we expect far too little from our children. Or this reason, we just simply don't want our kids to be present.

Kids are messy, they are loud, and they sometimes leak, and frankly we simply do not want to be around that "grown up church." I mean I have heard pastors say that children are a distraction so they must be removed, even one pastor going so far as to say that a baby crying spooks the Holy Ghost from making his presence known. Can it be said that we really dislike children that much, as to separate ourselves from them? Let me remind everyone that God says children are a blessing, not just when we think they are, but all the time, and to have a church sanctuary full of kids is a real treasure that I think many are missing out on. Let me share an experience with

you. At our church we have family integrated services, and we have one small child who sings really loudly. She doesn't know the words, but you can tell she is singing with all her heart to the Lord. Her sincerity of worship at 4, inspires 64 year olds to sing louder and match her level of zeal.

As I said, we expect far too little from our children. We feel that they won't get the deep theological truths, let alone sit long enough to hear the application of the sermon. Yet, you would be surprised what your children pick up on. You will also be surprised what a blessing it is to sit and worship together as a family. Give it some time and discipline, you won't be disappointed.

Van Lith has played pitcher, catcher, shortstop, 3rd baseman and 1st baseman, which showed his versatility as a player.

"Tanner chose Big Bend because he really liked the coach and he felt that the staff and program will help make him a better player and a better person," Carlson said.

Van Lith wishes to be a Lineman and work for the PUD once he is finished with his schooling. He hopes to pursue a degree in Electrical Sciences.

Bethany Wagner has signed on to participate in Women's Soccer at Wenatchee Valley Community College because of her desire to pursue a degree in the WVC Nursing Program.

"Bethany was a four year member of our girl's soccer program and was also a three year starter," Carlson said.

Wagner was second team All-League Selection as mid-fielder during her junior year and was second team All-League her senior season as a forward.

Wagner also received the Coach's award this year for her performance on the field.

"She's also very excited to get the opportunity to continue her soccer career while continuing her education," Carlson said.

In the fall, Wagner will start taking her prerequisites and work towards completing a four year degree in the Nursing Program.

Earlier this year, three other Cashmere athletes signed their letters of intent in a similar ceremony.

Abbie Johnson signed on for the Women's Basketball team at the Lewis-Clark State College.

Paiton Wagner signed for the Women's Tennis team at the University of Oregon.

The Women's Track team at Grand Valley State University was selected by Elli Kimes.

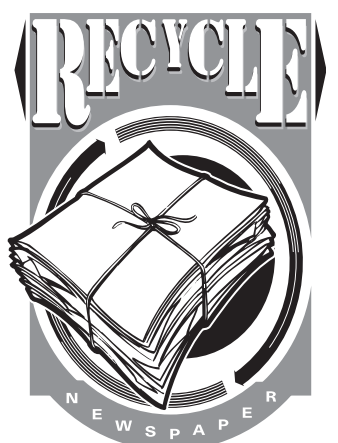
