\$150 scholarships were given out to Cashmere High School students who wish to continue pursuing the arts in their future during the Excellence in the Arts celebration at the High School May 3.

"We're able to give out scholarships for people who would like to continue pursuing improving their craft," Drama Advisor Susan Gubsch said. "Whether that will be in instrumental, whether that will be in drama camps, or in vocal."

Because there were only four students who applied for the scholarships everyone who applied got one.

Mackenzie Daniels and Reilly Schoening received scholarships for their choice of drama camp or voice lessons.

Both Kyle Lindsey and Elizabeth Worley were given scholarships for instrumental lessons.

The awards for last school's production of Cinderella through 5th

Avenue were also announced that evening.

"The thing that's really, really strange about the 5th Avenue (is that) I don't get to really announce our awards for the show from the year before until tonight," Gubsch said.

For the Cinderella play, Cashmere High School won the Educational Impact Award, which they have consistently won for the last seven years.

"This year we won it for our Story Book Week at the Vale Library where the characters from Cinderella went down and read fairytales to the kids before school," Gubsch said.

The production's cast, crew and orchestra also wrote fairytales for Vale's 2nd graders, which are on display in the High School lobby.

Cashmere High School was also nominated for the state's Outstanding Lobby Display trophy according to Gubsch.

Cashmere had been up against 1A, 2A 3A and 4A schools for that trophy and was lucky enough to be

the winner.

"Surprise, surprise, we won it," Gubsch said. "We were the best lobby display in all of the state of Washington."

On Monday, June 12 there will be a Thoroughly Modern Millie production being put on at Benaroya Hall in Seattle, which Cashmere students are invited to attend.

"We take the kids after school and we head on over," Gubsch said.

The show will start at 7 p.m. and then the students will get back to Cashmere around 1 a.m.

"It's very exciting," Gubsch said. "Then we get up and teach and take final exams the next day."

Tickets for the performance cost \$20 for students and \$30 for adults.

"If you are going with me on the 12th, then you need to be prepared in advance for your final exams," Gubsch said.

For the opening number of the production on June 12, Gubsch will be having two students going onstage to represent the production that Cashmere put on.

Tim Clarke, who played Ching Ho, and Reilly Schoening, who played Ms. Dorothy, will be Cashmere's representatives.

Gubsch also revealed the productions that will be put on during the next school year that were at the request of next year's seniors.

"You're gonna find that I made some changes from what you asked for," Gubsch said to the students. "We needed to do something different that matched you (more) than what you asked for."

Gubsch brought all of the drama department's upcoming seniors onstage to assist her in revealing the upcoming plays.

The upcoming fall play is going to be "The Awesome 80's Prom", which is an interactive, blast-from-the-past play featuring various characters from 80's films who are all competing for the title of Prom King and Queen. It will be up to the audience to decide who will be crowned.

"This show is going to be kind of cool because part of it is scripted and part of it is improvisational theater," Gubsch said. "So we're going to branch out into improvisational theater."

There will soon be improvisational workshops available for students that will be hosted by Julian Schrenzel, a working actor who owns a Seattle-based company called Improv Alive.

The dates for those workshops are still to be determined.

Gubsch connected with Schrenzel while working alongside him at the Leavenworth Summer Theater.

"He has worked with Amazon and Microsoft with improvisation as well as with staff and students at the University of Washington," Gubsch said of Schrenzel.

Next year's musical production is going to be "Hello, Dolly!"

"It's a musical that I didn't think we'd get the rights to because Bette Midler has just (been) opening a revival in New York these past two weeks," Gubsch said. "So I'm excited about that. It's going to be a great challenge for our orchestra."

Scouts witness 'robots at work'

Wide-eyed Cub Scout boys gathered in amazement as they witnessed robots at work in Cashmere's Beckman Machine May 2.

"This adventure required them to learn about tasks that robots could do and how humans could be replaced by them in the work place," Candi Bray, Cub Scout Pack 1 Leader, said.

The Scouts learned how to make a robot hand and how to build a real, working robot. They were also required to visit a work place that used robots to complete their robot experience.

Beckman Machine of Cashmere aided the boys in bringing them to their workplace where robots were used.

"Beckman Machine uses large Computer Numerical Control, or CNC, machines to make all sorts of things," Bray said.

Jordan Beckman, the son of owner Brad Beckman, walked the Scouts through the shop and explained to the kids what all their robots did.

Beckman demonstrated how to enter program information into the CNC machines.

The boys then watched as the robots performed the tasks that they were designated for through the programmed information.

"All eyes watched as the machine, or 'robot' moved with precision back and forth, up and down, taking material away from its target," Bray said. "They got wide-eyed as they learned that the robot could actually make a fidget spinner."

The Scouts also learned that CNC machines are used to make other workplace robots as well.

"Fortunately, though, humans are still needed in the process to tell the machines what to do," Bray said.

While at Beckman Machine Beckman works to make sure the robots are performing correctly by double checking every part that goes off the line.

"He checks every measurement to ensure the part will be exactly what the customer ordered," Bray said. "Even though the CNC robot will always follow its program, its own parts are not exempt from wear and tare and need a human to keep it operating properly and to replace its worn out appendages."

According to Bray, the boys were all very enthralled by what they'd learned and had a wonderful time at Beckman Machine.

Bray expressed her gratitude and appreciation towards Brad and Jordan Beckman for the experience the boys had.

"The Scouts had a great time learning about the robots," Bray said. "The machine shop had a lot of things to catch the eyes of this group of boys. They were fascinated by everything."

Local association represents educators and students not out-of-state interests

I am a homegrown educator having taught for 33 years in Cashmere schools. During that entire time, I have been a proud member of the Cashmere Education Association. Because of my experience as an educator and an Association member, I felt I needed to respond to the opinion piece "21st Century Unionism Starting in Central WA" by Jami Lund of the Freedom Foundation.

For me, Lund's piece would have been better placed in the paid advertisement section instead of the opinion pages. Lund is an elected school board member in Centralia, Wash. But he is also a legislative analyst at the Freedom Foundation, an Olympia-based think tank funded by out-of-state corporate foundations that promote privatizing public schools and organizing school boards against union rights.

I stayed in Cashmere and became an educator because I wanted to find a way to give back to the community that

gave so much to me after moving here as a sixth-grader. As educators, we see and know what our students need every day to succeed. Thanks to the Association, we can speak with one voice to the school board and the administration at the local level, ensuring our concerns are heard and addressed.

For example, our negotiating team, which is supported by the Washington Education Association, worked side by side with the administration in developing a teacher-principal evaluation criteria reflecting our belief that evaluations should be about growth for educators. This is important because our paramount duty, like the state constitution, is to ensure the best possible education for kids.

Our perspective as educators who are working and living in the same community is far different than the perspective of Lund, the Freedom Foundation and its CEO backers. Even

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Family worship

Eighty percent of Evangelical youth are leaving the faith by the time they reach college. Let that sink in for a moment. Eight out of ten kids quit Jesus, and these are the ones that attend our youth groups, bible camps and rallies. What are we doing wrong?

Now for starters, I am not against youth groups, camps, or ministries designed to target young people, but I believe there has been a wrong focus, and we are seeing the result of it.

The family—an institution designed by God himself, to represent tangible gospel truths and to be a primary means of the discipleship of young people. Not only that, but any societal change begins with the home. Churches and nations rise or fall depending on the condition of the family, and as Richard Baxter wrote “so goes the family, so goes the church, so goes the nation.” Ask yourself, why are we seeing the increasing level of moral decay and the brokenness of youth in our society? The answer: the fundamental and systematic breakdown of the family unit.

How do we curb the tide of this mass exodus of the Christian world view? Why is it that, according to the studies conducted by the likes of the Barna Group and the Nehemiah Institute, show that young people who attend church on a weekly basis, less than 10 percent of them are theologically “born again?” In other words, they are wrong

on most every single point of orthodoxy that would consider them a Christian. They may sing the song “Jesus loves me this I know, for the Bible tells me so,” but they disbelieve in the Biblical Jesus and dismiss the inerrancy and sufficiency of God’s word. To stand against the prevailing trend, a family reformation must occur.

That reformation of the family begins with the practice of family worship. Family worship is a phrase practically unheard of anymore, and unfortunately many of us have no idea what it means. Family worship is quite simply a consistent, sustained practice of gathering the family together to pray, sing and interact with the Bible. It is an activity rooted in history and Scripture.

Joshua, who succeeded Moses after he had died, addressed the people of Israel and said, “As for me and my house we will serve the Lord.” (Josh. 24:15) What in effect Joshua was saying, by “serve” is that his family would worship the Lord in every sphere of life, with every means possible. This wasn’t a once or twice a week event, where they would go to the church down the street but rather woven into the very fabric of family life.

In family worship, the family together sees the authenticity of what it means to be a Christian. It is an unfortunate reality, that at times, the church environment can be somewhat artificial and perfunctory, leaving somewhat of a separation between what

is said and done in church and what happens in the home. Yet when a family sets out to pray, sing and to read the Scriptures, interacting with God’s truth, it cements in the mind of every member of the family that indeed the message of “Christ is Lord,” is not only confined in the church, but is proclaimed and believed in the home as well.

Family worship is not just a religious obligation, even though it is commanded in Scripture (Deut. 6:7, Eph. 6:4) rather it is a wonderful experience to see the presence of Christ move in the hearts of your family. Some of the sweetest and most precious memories are when our family gathers for family worship, and witnessing the tears run down the cheeks of my children because Christ has been so faithful in their lives.

As families we spend so much time at sporting events, music recitals and teaching our kids this and that, but where is Christ in your family’s life? When is the last time you even shared a meal together, let alone talk with your family face to face?

As father and leader of my home, I commend family worship to you. I will be honest, it was awkward in the beginning, I made a lot of mistakes, and there have been many times where I have been so weary, but to see my family worship the Lord has been worth every struggle.

If 80% of our kids are abandoning the Christian world view, then we cannot afford to not have our homes serve the Lord.

This Wisconsin connection might seem too out of the ordinary for Cashmere. However, the Center for Media and Democracy and the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel last week published separate

investigative reports detailing how millions of dollars flow from the Bradley Foundation to the Freedom Foundation.

“Bradley Funds Washington’s Freedom Foundation to Dismantle Unions,” was a headline in the Center for Media Democracy story.

Unlike Lund and the Wisconsin Bradley Foundation, I have a vested interest in the outcomes of my students. I see my students’ parents and neighbors at local events and when I’m out shopping at local businesses. I hope that in some small way I have contributed to

improving my students’ lives.

I am sure the Bradley Foundation and its millions from Wisconsin will not be visiting Cashmere anytime soon. Better yet, they should stay out and quit secretly trying to tell us in Cashmere what is best for educating our kids.

Not Your Grandma's Rhubarb

Last week, I wrote about two spring favorites, asparagus and morel mushrooms. Another spring veggie is starting to appear in gardens, rhubarb. For me, rhubarb is an acquired taste, and the more I eat it the more I like it. Last spring, I was in a restaurant in Tri-Cities that had a special menu devoted to all things rhubarb. I had the spring salad with rhubarb dressing and it was wonderful. Such a clean fresh taste on delicate spring greens. I did pass on the rhubarb martini but indulged in a warm rhubarb crisp over homemade vanilla bean ice cream. Rhubarb never tasted so good, so I thought I would share this recipe with a twist on rhubarb. I hope you enjoy this recipe. Enjoy!

Apple Rhubarb Crumble

3 cups chopped fresh or frozen rhubarb

2 medium tart apples, peeled and chopped (I use granny Smith)

1 egg

3/4 cup sugar

1/4 cup maple syrup

1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg

1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1 cup all purpose flour

1/2 cup brown sugar

Pinch of salt

1/2 cup cold butter

In a bowl combine the rhubarb, apples, egg, sugar, syrup, nutmeg and cinnamon. Pour into a well buttered two-quart baking dish. In another bowl, combine the flour, brown sugar, and salt. Cut in butter until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs; sprinkle over fruit mixture. Bake at 350 degrees for 45-55 minutes or until bubbly. Make 4-6 servings.

WENATCHEE -- Joyous cheers erupted from the crowd as the Cashmere Bulldogs defeated the Okanogan Bulldogs in the 1A State Regional Championship baseball game at Recreation Park here Saturday, May 20.

Cashmere will be moving on to the Final Four at Yakima County Stadium on Friday, May 26.

The Bulldogs defeated the Colville Indians 10-0 in the Caribou Trail League Cross-over playoff on Tuesday, May 16 in Cashmere.

The May 16 game saw Junior Tyler Chipman toss his second complete no-hitter game of the season.

Chipman allowed only one base run from Colville and he struck out 11 players while issuing no walks.

With a 1.01 ERA, Chipman improved his season record to 7-1 and struck out 83 batters in 48.2 innings this season.

Cashmere's offense was led by Kross Knoll (2-4, 4RBI), who got two of Cashmere's eight hits and drove in four runs.

Chipman (1-3, 3RBI, 2B) drove in three runs and Daniel Wright (2-3, RBI, 2R) got two hits and scored two runs.

Cashmere stole ten bases (Kyler Keogh 3, Jacob Ball 2, Hudson White 2, Tyler Chipman 1, Kross Knoll 1, Daniel Wright 1).

Leadoff hitter Jacob Ball (1-1, 3BB, 3B, 3R) reached base in all four of his runs to base and Senior Jay Lightfoot (3R, 3BB) scored three runs and also got to base three times.

Both Nick Morrison (1-3, RBI) and Hudson White (1-3, R) added base hits for Cashmere's offense.

Once Cashmere defeated Colville, they went to the 1A State Regional Tournament here for the ninth straight season.

At the State Tournament Regionals Cashmere played against the Zillah Leopards and then the Okanogan Bulldogs for a shot to play in the Final Four at the Yakima County Stadium.

In the game against Zillah, Junior Tyler Chipman (Win, 6IP, 0ER, R, 8K, 2H, 2BB) earned the win on the mound, allowing only two hits and striking out 8 Leopards.

Senior Tanner Van Lith (SV, R, ER, IP, H, 2BB) came into the game in the 7th inning and solidified Cashmere's win.

The Bulldogs out-hit the Leopards 9-3 offensively.

Chipman, Kross Knoll and Garrett Tarver all had RBI while Lightfoot, Chipman, Jarec Kunsman and Daniel Wright scored runs.

Ultimately Cashmere defeated the Leopards 4-2 and moved on to play against the Okanogan Bulldogs in the Regional Championship game.

While playing against Okanogan, Tanner Van Lith (3IP, ER, 3K, R, 2H, 3BB), pitched for the first three innings and only allowed one run from Okanogan.

Junior Garrett Tarver (Win, R, 4IP, ER, 3K, BB) came back and tossed four innings of relief for Van Lith.

Van Lith (4-4, RBI, 2B, R, SB) led Cashmere offensively with four hits.

Cashmere out-hit Okanogan 15-4 overall and beat them for the fifth time this season.

Tyler Chipman (3-4, SB, 2R) added three hits for Cashmere while Jacob Ball (2-4, RBI, R, 3B), Jarec Kunsman (2-4, 2RBI) and Hudson White (2-4, SB)

each had two hits in.

Winning 6-2 against Okanogan, Cashmere has improved its record to 22-2 and have won 13 straight games.

Cashmere will be facing off against Vancouver's King Way Christian (21-2) in the 1A State Semifinals at the Yakima County Stadium Friday, May 26.

This year will be the sixth time Cashmere has made it to the Final Four in the last nine seasons.

They are now only two wins away from winning the State Championship for the fourth time in the last eight seasons.

The winner of that game will play at 4 p.m. in the 1A State Championship game on Saturday, May 27 while the loser will play in the 3rd-4th place game 10 a.m. Saturday.

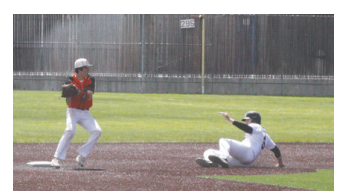

Honey, there's a tick on the floor



When my husband Charlie saw a spider on the dining room floor last week, he tried to smash it with his shoe but it kept crawling away. Dropping to his knees for take a better look, he called out, "Honey, there's a tick on the dining room floor. It must have come in on one of the dogs!"

"A tick, already?" I wailed. "It's only May!" The ticks are coming, with this summer starting out as possibly one of the worst ever for exposure to ticks. Those pesky little critters carry diseases in their saliva, ready to infect their innocent victims. In the Pacific Northwest, we have three species of ticks that can transmit disease to humans. You can get Rocky Mountain spotted fever from a bite from either the Brown Dog tick or the Rocky Mountain Wood tick, and the Western Blacklegged tick carries Lyme disease.

But those aren't the only diseases ticks can transmit. According to Rebecca Eisen, a research biologist at the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (the CDC), "Tick-borne diseases are on the rise." The CDC is seeing more cases of tick transmitted diseases like Powassan disease, a serious, potentially fatal nerve infection caused by a virus carried by tick saliva.

Living in the foothills of the Cascade Mountains for the past 27 years, I have tried nearly every method (sane or insane) of tick removal. I can honestly say, "Don't use Vaseline" because it makes that tick so darn slippery your tweezers can't get a grip." And, forget the advice to dab the tick with nail polish. It only makes it impossible to grip the little bugger with your tweezers and Heaven help you if you haven't got polish remover close by to remove the residue. Aack!

Several years ago, my friend Denise and I read on the internet about using liquid dish detergent to remove a tick. "Well, it sounds like it might be useful someday, like knowing 48 ways to reuse fabric softener dryer sheets...maybe not."

Then one summer day Denise found a tick on my 6-year-old Scottie, Jamie. Jamie was a gentle soul nicknamed "Spook" because he was black, hated loud noises and lurked under kitchen chairs. Denise first tried brushing off the dreaded tick, but no luck there. When she got out the tweezers Jamie wouldn't stay still long enough for her to grab it, so, desperate, she tried the Dawn® dish soap trick.

When she put a small dab of liquid Dawn® on Jamie's neck right where the tick sat, to her amazement it immediately began a frantic backstroke and within moments was out, completely out. Wiping it off with a tissue, she told me that it was amazing. We both now keep a small bottle of liquid Dawn® next to our tweezers for tick removal.

Here are six Tips to Reduce Your Risk of Tick-Borne Illness:

- 1. Avoid places where ticks congregate, like brushy, woody areas or tall grass. Walk in the center of trails to avoid contact with branches or leaves where ticks get brushed off by deer, waiting patiently for their next warm-blooded meal: you.
2. Check for ticks frequently. Every spring our three Scottie dogs get a "summer cut" to keep their hair short, especially around their faces, making checking for ticks much faster and easier. We do "tick checks" on each dog after every long walk and a complete nose to tail check every night, looking for "freckles" and feeling for bumps.
3. It's smart to treat your clothing and your dog(s) with tick repellent, but make sure to keep doing daily tick checks.
4. Wearing light colored clothing helps you see ticks more easily. Wearing long sleeved shirts and tucking your pants into your boots limits a tick's access to your skin (and blood).
5. When you get home from an outing where you are exposed to ticks (tall grass, or woody, brushy areas) shower within two hours for your best chance of rinsing them off or finding them before they dig in.
6. To remove a tick,
