Cashmere Cub Scout Brown wins District Derby

Cashmere's Cub Scout Pack 1's very own Jack Brown took home the 1st place trophy for the annual Apple Valley District Derby Race that was held on Saturday, March 22 at Wenatchee's Pybus Market.

"It's always a fun time with lots of cheering and excitement," Candi Jo Bray, Cub Scout Pack 1 Den 2 Leader, said.

Pack 1 held their annual Pinewood Derby race recently, which is an annual racing event for the Cub Scouts.

They got to build their own cars with the help of their parents. These cars were made from pinewood with metal axles and plastic wheels.

The concept of these cars was originally created by Cubmaster Don Murphy of Pack 280C, which is now currently Pack 713.

Murphy's own son was too young to be a participant in the Soap Box Derby so Murphy developed another idea for racing.

Although the newly developed wooden cars were much smaller than the Soap Box Derby cars, the Pinewood Derby cars had the same concept as the larger race cars and were also much easier to assemble.

The first Pinewood Derby was held in 1953.

"Since then many boys and their families have been able to enjoy the process of designing and building their own cars and then being able to watch them perform on the racetrack," Bray said.

This year the Derby was sponsored by Northwest Snow and Ice Equipment, who purchased the awards and cars for all of the boys.

According to Bray, all of the Cub Scouts participating did a great job constructing their race cars.

"Some cars didn't race to the boys' expectations, which can be difficult for some," Bray said. "It's a great learning experience, however, as they learn to show good sportsmanship even in the face of disappointment."

Pack 1 awarded trophies for a few different themes and for the Top 4 placings in the race.

Tristan Wheelless earned 1st place while Jack Brown came in at 2nd place.

Kasey Bray placed 3rd and Conner Bray placed 4th in the Derby.

The award for Most Scout Like went to Dawson Breckenridge.

Col Murdoch received the award for Fastest Looking.

The award for Most Patriotic was given to Kyson Traynor and Most Original went to Dominick Emerson.

Student arrested at middle school for 'threats to kill'

Sheriff Brian Burnett reports a Cashmere Middle School student was arrested for pointing what appeared to be a black pistol at another student in the hallway of the Middle School.

On April 26, 2017 shortly before 3:00pm the Chelan County Sheriff's Office School Resource Deputy responded to Cashmere Middle School for a weapons violation. The investigation determined two students were bothering each other during a class session. One student asked the other student to move to the other side of the classroom. They continued to engage in bothering and annoying each other until the end of the school day. As the two students passed each other in the hallway one "shoulder bumped" the other. The student who delivered the shoulder bump continued to walk and was approximately 10 feet away when he heard the other student call out his name. The victim student alleged when he turned around the suspect student was pointing what he believed to be a black pistol at him. The victim student said he was fearful and ran away as he yelled, "He has a gun". The suspect student

fled down the hallway, went outside, and got onto a bus.

As the incident occurred a nearby teacher heard the yelling and statement about a gun. The teacher ran to the location and was provided the name of the suspect student and that he ran outside. As the teacher pursued he learned the suspect student got onto a bus. The teacher immediately boarded the bus, located the student, and removed the student from the bus. The suspect student immediately told the teacher he did not have a real pistol, but was in possession of an airsoft gun capable of shooting plastic pellets. It was later confirmed the displayed object, which was black in color with an orange tip, was indeed an airsoft gun with plastic pellets.

The suspect student was booked into Chelan County Juvenile Detention Center for harassment – threats to kill and possessing a dangerous weapon on school facilities.

The Chelan County Sheriff's Office is working in cooperation with the Cashmere School District to investigate this incident and we want to stress the Cashmere School District is taking this incident very seriously.

"All of Pack 1 did well in the standings," Candi Jo Bray said. "Well done Pack 1 and all scouts from around the area."

According to Bray, some of the competing boys are already planning their cars for next year.

All of the boys' cars will be displayed for the public in September at the Chelan County Fair in the Youth Building in the Scout Section.

Help Build the Future of Public Transit

Last summer and fall, nearly 1100 residents of Chelan and Douglas Counties shared their ideas and suggestions on how our regional transit service could be improved. These ideas ranged from longer hours during the week, increased Saturday service, adding service on Sundays, and a variety of other enhancements.

Now it is time again for our citizens to weigh in on how they may prioritize these improvements, and whether they are willing to pay a bit

more for those of a larger scale. Within Link's existing financial resources, we have the ability to add a very minor amount of service, perhaps an hour or two to most routes operating Monday - Friday, or a bit more if those improvements were focused just on Saturday service. Anything as comprehensive as service much later into the evening, more frequent service on most routes, significantly more Saturday service, and an effective amount of Sunday service is far beyond our current capacity to fund, and would require additional sales tax. Increasing sales tax for transit requires a vote of the people.

To determine what service enhancements our residents really want when there are price tags attached to each of these, we have developed an online survey tool that gives the respondent feedback on how each of their choices may impact sales tax. Often times, people are unaware of how their choices may impact the costs they would incur, so the Link Board of Directors and staff want to make it very clear that there is a cost to make many of the improvements they want to see.

The input of this survey will help direct the development of Link's long-range strategic plan. If there is adequate support for additional transit service in our region, then it will be up to our Board of Directors to determine the

next steps toward making that a reality.

We encourage all of our residents, even if they are not users of transit, to take a few minutes and complete this survey. Your input is very important and we want to hear from you.

United Way expresses McCleary opinion

Creating better support for all students while meeting the McCleary court mandate continues to be a significant challenge for our legislature. As we navigate these choppy budgetary waters, it's important to expand access to our state's proven high-quality pre-K program for low-income students, the Early Childhood Education and Assistance Program (ECEAP).

We know ECEAP students make major gains in early math and literacy. In the 2015-2016 school year, the number of students who scored at or above age level in early math and literacy rose by 88 percent and 310 percent, respectively. Additionally, ECEAP

students maintain those gains through their elementary years.

Research spotlighted by the business-leader group ReadyNation shows us that early exposure to a high-quality preschool can improve educational outcomes, like better graduation rates, and bolster employability by laying the foundation for skills our students will need in the workplace.

Today, 14 percent of people aged 16-24 are neither in school nor employed. An unprepared workforce is costing the nation \$3.7 billion annually in remedial education services and lost wages.

Yet, in Chelan and Douglas counties, only 35 percent and 29 percent of eligible three- and four-year-olds have access to high-quality pre-K, while kindergarten readiness rates are 55 percent in Chelan County and 44 percent in Douglas. This lack of access leaves nearly 860 youngsters un-served.

Now is the time to expand access to ECEAP so that more of our three- and four-year children can have access. Increased access to ECEAP will help our youngest learners and will add value to the investments we make in K12 by increasing kindergarten readiness and performance down the line.

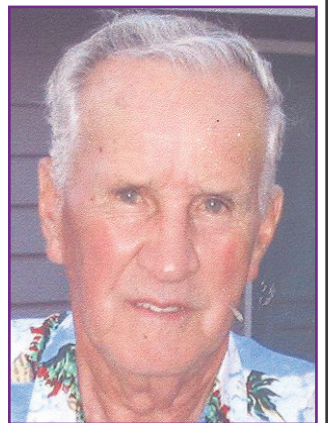

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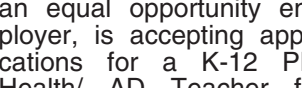
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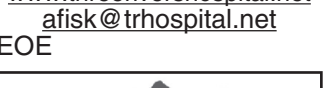
