Pateros has three council positions available, Position 3 four-year term (George Brady), Position 4 four-year term (Michael Harding), and Position 5 four-year term (Megan Sherrard).

change or save as part of the long-term plan.

2. Explore alternative approaches to address issues. At this stage the planning team explores alternative approaches to issues raised in stage one as a route to understand the range of possibilities.

3. Prepare preliminary recommendations to address issues. The best ideas from the alternative approaches from stage two are incorporated in a preliminary plan. These include use and development of land, property boundary adjustments and issues raised during the planning process. This stage also includes the State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA) checklist that describes environmental effects of the plan recommendations.

4. Propose final recommendations for Commission adoption. Final adjustments are made and the recommendations referred to the sevenmember Parks and Recreation Commission for approval. At this stage public testimony and written comment is also welcome at the Commission meeting.

Bridgeport State Park

Bridgeport State Park at 235A Half Sun Way is a 748acre camping park behind Chief Joseph Dam including 7,500 feet of shoreline along

the west side of Rufus Woods Lake. The site includes a ninehole golf course that was the headquarters for the Lake Wood Golf Club that closed its doors in 2018 due to declining membership.

The park includes 18 acres of lawn, camp sites and two boat ramps with 240-feet of dock giving fishermen access to year-round angling for triploids, walleye, rainbow trout and silvers. Other amenities included sheltered gazebos, barbecue stands, picnic tables, Wi-Fi and four miles of hiking trails among the haystack lava bounders that reflect the area's turbulent geologic history.

Alta Lake State Park

Alta Lake State Park located 4.3 miles west of Pateros on 1B Otto Road is a 174-acre camping park that includes two-mile-long by half-mile wide Alta Lake. The area was burned over by the 2014 Carlton Complex wildfire and is in a state of recovery, replanting and restoration.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Alzheimer's disease is national public health crisis

There are more than 110,000living with Alzheimer's disease in our state and more than 348,000 family members and friends are acting as unpaid caregivers.

Fellow Washingtonians who joined the more than 1,200 attendees at the Alzheimer's Impact Movement Advocacy Forum in Washington, DC, said Congress was listening to their explanation of the burden that Alzheimer's places on our state and nation.

This advocacy is important to me because I lost my father to the disease in 2016 and I know the heavy burden that families carry. My daughter and I now bring awareness to this disease and offer support whenever we can.

Legislators were asked to continue to increase funding for Alzheimer's disease research at the National Institutes of Health, as well as fund implementation of the Building Our Largest Dementia (BOLD) Infrastructure for Alzheimer's Act which

Congress passed into law

last year. Shockingly only 1% of Medicare beneficiaries with

dementia have received a personal care plan available to them since 2017. Advocates asked members of Congress to cosponsor the Improving HOPE for Alzheimer's Act, new legislation that will give doctors information about how they can develop a care plan for each of their patients.

Alzheimer's is not only the sixth leading cause of death in the country, it ranks as America's most expensive disease, with total costs nationwide surpassing \$290 billion in 2019, two-thirds of which is paid by Medicare and Medicaid. It is only through adequately funding research and enacting reforms like the Improving HOPE Act that we can meet the national goal to prevent and effectively treat Alzheimer's by 2025.

Please join me in urging Congressman Newhouse to continue to invest in policies that address Alzheimer's disease as the national public health crisis it is.



Chelan's Barber Shop to close May 25, owner to retire

CHELAN - Shannon Maitland will retire after working at her barber shop in Chelan for nearly 14 years.

It was 1972 when Maitland got her license as a barber and soon after she began working in Chelan. The Pateros native then headed up north to Brewster, working there for six years. Maitland didn't stop there, she kept on commuting to work up farther up the Methow River to Twisp for 10 years, before finding a job in her hometown. In Pateros, Maitland worked for a little over 10 years.

"There's not enough headcount there, so I came back down to Chelan," she said.

Her second time back in Chelan, she worked for Del Hanson for two years before opening up her own shop on Sanders St. in 2009. "I grew up driving in the winter. Once you have a good car you are good to go," she said about her commute to work.

The best part of her job has been meeting new people every day. "You never know what the day is going to be like, because everything is all walk-ins ... you don't know if you are going to have six haircuts or 12 haircuts. It's just up in the air, I like that," Maitland described as a typical day on the job.

Typically her customers go in to get a haircut every six weeks. However, she mentioned

there are others who wait six months. "It gets busier every year and I am getting to the age where I can't stand up all day," she mentioned.

After serving in Chelan for 14 years, Maitland will retire on May 25 when Chelan's Barber Shop closes its doors. She will be packing her belongings and moving to Ellensburg, "My daughter and her family live there. I will be watching the grandsons' baseball game and their basketball games,"

she said.

Maitland's retirement is leaving her customers with mixed feelings. "They are happy for me and my next chapter in my life, but they are sad they are losing a barber that has cut their hair for 14 years," she

The lifelong barber also feels "melancholy" about her departure. "I have been thinking about for a few years ... I am looking forward it now," Maintland added.

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State officials urge action on youth mental health trends

OLYMPIA -- Recently released Healthy Youth Survey data show a high and increasing number of Washington youth reported feeling so sad or hopeless they stopped a usual activity or seriously considered suicide in the past year. The number of students who reported feeling anxious, nervous or on edge or not being able to stop worrying is also on the rise.

Based on statewide rates, a typical 10th grade classroom of 29 students would include about:

- 10 students who said they felt nervous, anxious or on edge or couldn't stop or control worrying in the last two weeks
- 12 students who have felt sad or hopeless for two weeks or longer in the past
- · Three students who attempted suicide in the past

These numbers may seem high, in part because we don't talk openly about mental health and may not realize how many students are feeling distress.

Survey results also show deep disparities, with certain groups of students feeling distress at significantly higher rates. Female students and students who identify as lesbian, gay or bisexual reported higher rates of feeling sad, hopeless or anxious, and were more likely to have experienced bullying in the past month.

Differences in rates for racial and ethnic groups vary from question to question, but non-Hispanic students who are Native American/ Alaska Native, Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander or multiracial experience higher rates of feeling sad or hopeless than students who are non-Hispanic and white.

While the trends are concerning, adults and peers can help students in distress. Caring adults, along with knowledgeable schools and communities, can help young people feel connected to a support network and learn skills to cope with the challenges they face. Talking to an empathetic listener and using coping skills can help de-escalate a crisis. Suicide is preventable and mental health conditions can be treated.

Here's how to help:

Have open conversations about mental health. Only about half of students said they have adults to turn to for support when they feel sad or hopeless. About 13 percent of 10th graders who reported feeling sad or hopeless for at least two weeks in a row said they didn't have anyone to talk to. It can be difficult to start a conversation, but there are many resources available to guide you.

Know what to look for and ask questions. Keep an eye out for common signs of distress and the warning signs of youth suicide. If you're concerned someone is thinking about suicide, it's important to ask them directly, even if it feels uncomfortable.

Encourage youth to reach out for support. Everyone needs help sometimes. If you know a young person who is struggling, encourage them to talk to a trusted adult or access free, confidential support 24/7 by calling the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline at 800-273-8255 or texting HEAL to 741741 for the Crisis Text Line.

Prioritize safety. If you believe someone is in immediate danger of suicide and has access to a firearm or other potentially deadly means, call 911. If they're struggling but not in immediate danger, help them make a safety plan and connect to services.

Everyone can play a role in supporting youth mental health. To learn more about the Healthy Youth Survey and access data reports and resources, visit www. AskHYS.net.

The Healthy Youth Survey is administered every other year by the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, Department of Health, Health Care Authority and Liquor and Cannabis Board. In 2018, more than 230,000 students throughout Washington state took the survey.





Should you take calcium supplements

Q: My doctor told me I may not need all of my calcium supplement. Don't I need to take calcium pills for my bones?

Last fall, my 75 year old next door neighbor fell down 3 steps, shattering her left ankle into tiny pieces which were painstakingly put back together during a 5-hour surgery. She has osteoporosis, or "thin bones" due to years of taking daily prednisone for an inflammatory condition called lupus. Because she takes a medicine to help build her bones back up, she needs to take a calcium supplement every day, but the rest of us may not need to do that.

We all need to get enough calcium every day to keep our bones strong, but it has other important jobs as well: your muscles, nerves and blood vessels depend on calcium to work properly. Every time your heart beats and you take a breath, the muscles of your heart and chest work to keep you alive and well. However, if you don't have enough calcium available, your body will take some out of your bones, like an ATM (automated teller machine) for calcium instead of \$20 bills.

If you run low on calcium occasionally, this only happens once in a while and it's no big deal, but if your body pulls calcium out of your bones regularly, those withdrawals eventually weaken your bones, increasing your risk of a hip fracture, or worse.

How much calcium do you need?

The Institute of Medicine recommends 1000mg daily of calcium for men and women up to age 50, and 1200mg for adults older than 50 years of age. Most postmenopausal women get 600-900mg of calcium daily through their food, falling short of that

goal unless they make up the difference with a calcium supplement.

Calcium supplements were recommended for as a way to ensure women and men at risk for osteoporosis get their full recommended daily dose of calcium, but recent studies have shown that you can actually get TOO MUCH calcium, which increases your risk of having a heart attack or stroke. Most people get 300mg of calcium daily from non-dairy sources. You can also get 300mg per serving of dairy products like milk, yogurt and cheese. Green vegetables, oranges and figs also contain calcium.

2.If you take a medicine to treat bone loss such as alendronate (Fosamax®), risendronate Actonel®, or Boniva®, make sure you get enough calcium.

These medicines work by

encouraging calcium back into your bones, but if you don't have enough extra calcium available, they can't help you.

3.Avoid taking more than 500mg of a calcium supplement at one time.

Your body absorbs calcium better and keeping your blood levels of calcium from "spiking" will help avoid increasing your risk of heart attack and stroke.

4.Get 400 IU of Vitamin D every day.

Vitamin D is necessary to help your body absorb calcium, and can help prevent falls in the elderly. You can get vitamin D from the sun, but salmon (800 IU per 3 ounces), canned tuna (150 IU per 3 ounces), fortified milk (about 120 IU per 4 ounces), and fortified orange juice (80 IU per 4 ounces) are also good sources.

5.Eat dried plums or prunes to build bone.

In one study, women who ate 100 grams of dried plums daily for a year had measurably stronger bones. Despite the extra calories, none of the women in the year-long study gained weight, possibly because of the very high fiber content of the plums. 100 grams of dried plums is about 9 of those plump plums sold in big bags at places like Costco®. Watch out, though; plums (also known as prunes) have a natural laxative effect, so go slowly at first to avoid embarrassing side effects.
