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DNA identifies burglar Graffiti artist paints self for easier ID, arrest

(Compiled from a report by Brewster Police Chief Nattalie Cariker)

BREWSTER – It's not easy to catch a graffiti artist in the act of malicious mischief, so it's always helpful when the offender is liberal enough with his supply of spray paint to apply some to his person while in the process of creating a public masterpiece.

That's the scenario that helped Brewster Police Officer Michael Robbins identify and arrest a suspect on April 2 who fled the scene when a citizen spotted and reported the graffiti-in-progress on a city park bathroom.

A tall male juvenile, a Brewster resident, was observed applying black spray paint to the bathroom wall and when yelled at by an alert citizen, fled in a vehicle with a second male.

"The reporting party recognized the vehicle and advised police the name of the tall male who was associated with the vehicle," the police department report said. "A short time later Officer Robbins contacted the juvenile on foot."

The juvenile's clothing matched the description given to Robbins, but the real give-away was the black spray paint on the suspect's hands that bore a striking resemblance to the black paint on the bathroom wall.

"The juvenile was arrested for malicious mischief in the third degree and booked into Okanogan County Juvenile Detention," the police department report said.

The Brewster Police Department received another complaint of graffiti on a building near the park with the tag "XIV FLS" for Norte 14 gang sprayed in black paint.

"The complaint was forwarded to the Okanogan County Prosecutor's Office for review of charges against the same juvenile," said the police department report. "The police department greatly appreciates the partnership with the community to make an arrest on gang graffiti."

Burglar arrested

DNA left by a burglary suspect left at Apple Valley Wireless at West Main Street last September 13, led to the arrest of a 20-year-old Brewster man.

Brewster Police Lieutenant Kelly Hook investigated the complaint, obtained DNA evidence at the scene and forwarded his findings to the Washington State Crime Laboratory for processing. The Crime Lab results returned on March 25 showed that the DNA matched that of Omar Nila-Aparicio who was arrested and booked into Okanogan County Jail for burglary, malicious mischief, and theft.

City planner urges Bridgeport to develop SR 173 corridor

BRIDGEPORT – City contract planner Kurt Danison addressed the Bridgeport City Council about the need to develop a revitalization plan during the group's regular monthly meeting on Wednesday, April 17. Danison reviewed the elements of the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program administered by the Department of Commerce and how those funds could help the city improve its commercial base.

The objective, as Danison explained it, is to "build a resilient community with a vibrant economy, employment opportunities, strong businesses, and stable housing markets in which families and

Highway 173 corridor that runs through the center of downtown Bridgeport be the target area.

Danison recommended that city officials adopt a strategy that:

- Assesses the existing physical structures and infrastructure of the focus area.
- · Develops goals and policies with respect to economic redevelopment, rehabilitation or development of housing (including multi-family rental housing), and the improvement or expansion of infrastructure.
- Prioritizes objectives and develops a timetable for implementing the goals.

In his assessment of the city's current condition, Danison explained that Bridgeport has changed dramatically since the completion of Chief Joseph Dam in 1979.

stop in Brewster on June 6. The initial site under consideration along Sunset Drive next to the school soccer field turned out to be more of a job to clear and landscape and will involve more expense than earlier thought.

City Public Works Director Lee Webster said he walked the site with a heavy equipment contractor who advised him that the old orchard stumps and other debris will require a caterpillar and dump truck to clear before a grader can be brought in. The extra work and expense rules the site out of consideration for circus use.

Chamber officers have other sites under consideration as alternative locations.

Though the most recent news for returning chinook salmon numbers is dismal and the upper Columbia season closed, the Salmon Derby plans to proceed as usual in hopes that either numbers will improve or a limited season will be allowed at derby time during the first week of August.

City clerk Misty Ruiz said none of the out-of-town derby regulars have cancelled their reservations so most appear committed to be on site at derby time.

Danison said the city's primary economic base is connected to tree fruit production, processing and storage, accounting for 56 percent of the workforce and the Bridgeport School District with 11 percent of the work-

Danison proposed the drafting of a Community Re-

- vitalization Plan that would: • Focus on the State Route (SR) 173 corridor.

- · Follow a community involvement process to identify community needs and desires for the corridor.
- · Develop specific goals and policies to guide revitalization.
- · List objectives and priorities for implementation of the plan.



Okanogan PUD to link Pateros-Twisp line to Twisp substation

OKANOGAN - PUD crews installed a temporary shoo-fly connection between the Loup Loup transmission line and the Winthrop substation during a brief power outage earlier this month to serve the Okanogan County Electric Co-op, a PUD media release said.

The PUD continues to work on the new Pateros-to-Twisp transmission line and anticipates completion of that power source to the Twisp and Winthrop substations early in August so the Okanogan Coop can also be served by that route. Once all the connections are completed the power loop will provide dual sources

of power from the Loup Loup line and the Pateros-Twisp line. The redundant system will mean that users will have alternate power sources available during periods of maintenance or an outage.

At their board meeting April 8, the PUD commissioners authorized Michels Corp., a nationwide contractor with five Washington offices including Tumwater to perform the reroute for the 115 kilovolt (kV) Twisp-Winthrop project.

"The work will rebuild a half-mile of single circuit transmission line between the Twisp and Winthrop substations to increase reliability for both Okanogan PUD and the Okanogan County Electric Coop," the media release said.

The 27-mile Pateros-to-Twisp line was completed and energized last October.

The Okanogan PUD serves some 20,000 customers spread over more than 5,000 square miles in the largest county in

"In addition, two electric co-ops and one municipal system also provide service in the county," according to the PUD website, www.okanoganpud.org. "Our electric system consists of approximately 1,365 miles of overhead and 382 miles of underground distribution lines."

The PUD also owns a 115-kV transmission system comprised of approximately 104 miles of line and 16 major substations.



Flax is an oily grain grown for its fiber, seeds

Q: My sister takes flaxseed oil because she can't stand getting "fishy burps" from the fish oil, and insists that flaxseed is just as good for you as fish oil. Is this true?

Flax is an oily grain grown for its fiber and seeds. While the fiber is used for clothing, the seeds are sold as whole seeds, partially defatted seeds, ground seeds, flaxseed meal and flaxseed oil. Flaxseed is used as a natural way to decrease your total cholesterol and "bad" LDL cholesterol levels and can relieve menopausal symptoms like night sweats and hot flashes.

Both flaxseed and fish oil have high concentrations of a type of fatty acid called Omega-3. Eating foods rich in Omega-3 fatty acids helps counteract the effect of "bad" fatty acids called Omega-6, which create inflammation in your body.

Omega-6 fatty acids contribute to arthritis and heart disease, and there are lots of them in a typical American diet. Omega-6 fatty acids are found in popular foods like popcorn, pasta, potato chips, corn chips, bread, French fries and hot dogs as well as many salad dressings, canola oil and soybean oil.

The "good" Omega-3 fatty acids EPA and DHA help counteract the inflammatory effects of a diet high in Omega-6 fatty acids. Flaxseed also contains large amount of an Omega-3 fatty acid called ALA, but ALA is inactive until it is changed into EPA or DHA, and most people can't convert it into an active form.

Although flaxseed oil CAN decrease menopausal symptoms in SOME women, this supports the fact that most people can't convert enough of the inactive Omega-3 fatty acid ALA in flaxseed into biologically active EPA or DHA to get much benefit.

Flaxseed is a very good source of fiber, especially soluble fiber. Adding fiber to your diet with flaxseed has been shown to decrease LDL and total cholesterol. Flaxseed's fiber helps you stay regular because it works as a bulk laxative, similar to psyllium or Metamucil®. In fact, most of the documented benefits of eating flaxseed can be explained by the effect of more fiber in your diet. Flaxseed oil has not been shown to lower either LDL or total cholesterol.

The outer coating of flaxseed is a gummy layer that's very high in fiber, especially soluble fiber. Getting adequate fiber in your diet helps decrease your "bad" cholesterol (LDL) level and your total cholesterol level.

The beneficial effects of flaxseed over flaxseed oil or lignin extract on your LDL and total cholesterol can be explained by the increased fiber from its seed coat, whether from eating the whole seeds or grinding them up



like flaxseed meal.

You can add whole flaxseed to your diet by adding it to cereal, granola, or smoothies. Ground flaxseed or flaxseed meal is less gritty and can be blended into smoothies or baked into breads, muffins or cookies. Whole and ground flaxseed each contain lots of fiber and act as a bulk laxative very similar to psyllium or Metamucil®. When starting them, add flaxseed to your slowly to avoid suffering intestinal distress such as gas, bloating, cramps or diarrhea and get plenty of fluids to avoid intestinal blockage.

Most sources suggest up to 40 grams flaxseed daily (4 tablespoons of whole flaxseed or 7 tablespoons of flaxseed meal) to lower LDL and total cholesterol. Avoid taking more than 45 grams per day (4.5mg tablespoons of whole flaxseed or 8 tablespoons of flaxseed meal) to decrease your risk of intestinal problems.

Here are 5 Key Facts About Flaxseed and Omega-3 Fatty

1.The Omega-3 fatty acid ALA found in flaxseed is not active in your body.

ALA from flaxseed needs to be converted into active Omega-3 fatty acids like EPA and DHA by

your body before it can benefit you. Some people can make this happen, but most cannot.

2.Fatty fish, fish oil and krill oil have high concentrations of the active Omega-3 fatty acids EPA and DHA.

The foods containing the most Omega-3 fatty acids EPA and DHA are fatty fish like salmon, herring, mackerel and sardines.
