



Mortimer speaks suicide awareness

In Pateros, Brewster on April 8

NCW - The Christ Center in Chelan and Cashmere have been working alongside business owners in Wenatchee and a group of 12 in Chelan, Manson, and Pateros to bring Bob Mortimer into schools to speak on suicide awareness from April 8-15.

Chelan Campus Pastor Nick Longmire stated that suicide rates in Chelan County are high, and not only statewide, but also nationally, and it is a concern to many community members. Last year, a group of business owners reached out to the Cashmere Senior Pastor wanting to do something in order to help educate students in North Central Washington on this sensitive topic.

The group decided that they would subsidize Mortimer as a guest speaker to the schools. Mortimer will be sharing his

story at 13 different school assemblies on the time he was coming home from a party during his high school days and suffered a fatal accident, losing his two legs and one arm. "He struggled with suicide and depression, and eventually he came through that and found hope," said Longmire.

Mortimer will also be present at the three youth rallies

Capture projects underway

Fundraiser focuses on local cat, dog shelters

BRIDGEPORT - Past issues of The Quad have mentioned the problem of nuisance cat populations in both the cities of Bridgeport and Brewster. While most animal control measures have focused on loose or unlicensed dogs, feral and roaming cats have moved largely under the radar.

Two volunteer organizations in Okanogan County, the Animal Foster Care Cat Shelter at 4 Spring Coulee Road, and the Okanogan Regional Spay and Neuter Project (OK-SNIP), both located in Okanogan, have helped address cat numbers by offering spay and neuter services. Both organizations depend heavily on donations to keep the doors open and offer free or discounted services.

On April 27, Whiskers and Wishes is hosting a dinner, no-host bar and silent auction at the Winthrop Barn to raise funds for both organizations along with Okandogs, a division of OK-SNIP headquartered in Cashmere. Tickets are \$45 with reservations available through Central Reservations

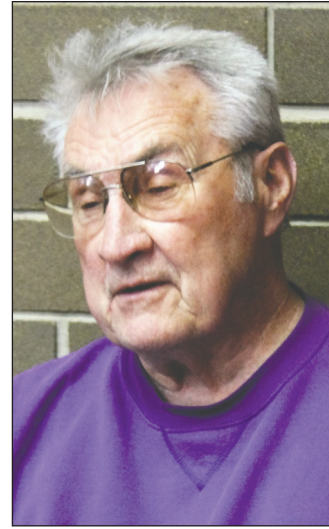

at (509) 996-2148.

Animal Foster Care is currently involved in three rescue operations, one of those on the Bridgeport Bar where volunteers are trapping stray cats for adoption or spay/neuter services. The tamer ones of the lot are socialized and prepared for adoption while the more feral are altered, vaccinated, have other needs addressed and are then returned to the site of capture.

Conklin has raised the issue of a growing feline problem at a residence within the city limits where an excess of cats is causing problems for neighbors. Conklin said she is negotiating with the Wenatchee Valley Humane Society, a no-kill shelter that has worked with the city on its dog populations.

"The problem is they want to neuter the cats and return them here," said Conklin. "We want them gone."

Wenatchee Humane depends upon grant funding to operate a mobile spay/neuter van and lately grant money has been scarce so the Bridgeport cat issue remains one to be addressed down the road.

Bill Zweigle, Bridgeport's part-time Animal Control enforcement officer handles the city's dog control but does not pick up cats. Zweigle patrols the bar as part of his beat but was unaware that a cat capture project is underway there.

Brewster clerk/treasurer Misty Ruiz said that Brewster's feline issues need attention, but city officials must be thoughtful regarding the disposition or spaying/neutering of loose cats that may be family pets.

"It's best if volunteers who are experienced and involved in that service address it," Ruiz said referring to the Bridgeport Bar project.

Cities consider zoning, permits

Nightly rentals gain in popularity, attract scrutiny

OKANOGAN - City officials in Pateros and Brewster, along with Omak, have indicated they may look at zoning related to nightly rentals of homes within their city limits with an eye on requiring permits for owners engaged in the practice.

A three-page report compiled by the Okanogan County Planning Department and submitted to the Board of Okanogan County Commissioners last month addressed the pros and cons of the increasing

incidence of nightly rentals in the county and the economic effects they influence.

The report provided to The Quad by Okanogan County Watch also lists eight reasons supporting regulation of short-term rentals.

"The new trend in tourism seems to be Nightly Rentals as defined in Okanogan County Code 17A.270," the report begins. "Homeowners have discovered that marketing their second homes and extra bedrooms as nightly rentals, can potentially earn them as much money in one week as in one month as a long-term

rental and they can still use their property for personal use."

A downside of the short-term rental is the removal of a home from long-term rental or new ownership, the report said resulting in the potential for increased costs to consumers with fewer houses available.

"Rent for a 3-bedroom home in 2018 in Okanogan County averaged around \$1,048 per month with the average household income being \$42,598 according to bestplaces.net," said the report. "Nightly rental prices in Okanogan County

range from \$48 to \$982 a night with most rentals requiring a 2-night minimum stay."

Currently Twisp and Winthrop are the only two cities in the county that regulate nightly rentals. The report said that compiling reliable data on Okanogan County nightly rentals is difficult, citing no transparency requirements of websites like AirBnB that arrange booking and payment details. On the other hand, "websites like AirBnBHell.com are full of statements from consumers

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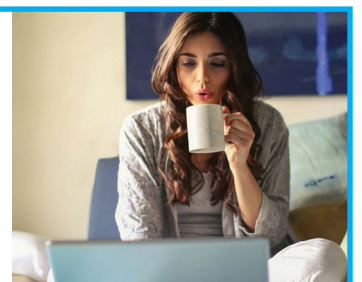
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Act fast to purchase American Legion Clam and Oyster Feed tickets

Dyer Hill snow runoff closes portion of SR 173 between Bridgeport and Brewster

BRIDGEPORT - Snow runoff from the north slope of Dyer Hill between Bridgeport and Brewster proved to be too much for drainage routes to handle last Thursday, March 28 and closed a portion of the highway between Cedar Avenue and Gun Club Road. A detour around a short stretch of 173 between mileposts 6.2 and 6.4, routes traffic onto Gun Club Road and Cedar Avenue, so drivers can get around the problem area. Washington State Department of Transportation highway personnel worked to clear mud and water from the roadway and monitor a culvert that serves as the main drainage channel along the south side of SR 173 where the runoff is accumulating.

stating that there is no one to contact for complaints or to rectify situations. Even simple questions go unanswered," the report said.

Department of Revenue figures show that more than \$50,000 in hotel/motel taxes were collected from nightly rentals in 2017.

"This tax goes into the LTAC (Lodging Tax Advisory Committee) fund that is used to bring more tourism to the county by advertising and making improvements to infrastructure," the report said.

The report said that the website, HostCompliance.com lists eight reasons to regulate

short-term rentals:

1. Increased tourist traffic from short-term renters has the potential to slowly transform peaceful residential communities into "communities of transients" where people are less interested in investing in one another's lives, be it in the form of informal friend group or church, school and other community-based organizations.

2. Short-term renters may not always know (or follow) local rules, resulting in public safety risks, noise issues, trash and parking problems for nearby residents.

3. So-called "party houses" i.e. homes that are continuously rented to larger groups of people with the intent to party can severely impact neighbors

and drive down nearby home values.

4. Conversion of residential units into Short-term rentals can result in less availability of affordable housing options and higher rents for long-term renters in the community.

5. Local service jobs can be jeopardized as unfair competition from unregulated and untaxed short-term rentals reduces demand for local bed & breakfasts, hotels, and motels.

6. Towns often lose out on tax revenue (most often referred to as Transient Occupancy Tax/Hotel Tax/ Bed Tax or Transaction Privilege Tax) as most short-term landlords fail to remit those taxes even if it is required by law.

7. Lack of proper regulation

or limited enforcement of existing ordinances may cause tension or hostility between short-term landlords and their neighbors.

8. The existence of "pseudo hotels" in residential neighborhoods (often in violation of local zoning ordinances etc.) may lead to disillusionment with local government officials who may be perceived as ineffective in protecting the interests of local tax-paying citizens.

The report said nightly rental owners who follow the rules, obtain permits, and pay taxes are frustrated by those who do not. It concluded by noting that county agencies responsible for compliance are working to gain full compliance through outreach and education with property owners.

Okanogan PUD proceeds with dewatering of Enloe Dam

Approves inspection and safety contracts

OKANOGAN - Okanogan County PUD staff members have been meeting with various federal and state agencies concerning the dewatering and inspection of Enloe Dam as part of the structure's decommissioning process, wrote Community Relations Coordinator Sheila Corson. At its regular meeting March 25, the PUD board approved contracts for safety and inspection work toward that end.

Jeri Timm, Director of Regu-

latory and Environmental Affairs reported that PUD staff has met with representatives of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) and state agencies including Ecology, Natural Resources, Bureau of Land Management (BLM), Colville Confederated Tribes, and Fish and Wildlife, among others.

Once FERC terminates the license for Enloe Dam after July 9 of this year, Ecology will assume jurisdiction for dam safety as part of its priorities of dewatering and inspection. Provided that engineering and permitting can be completed in time, Timm said inspection could occur by this fall, with fall 2020 as the next option.

BLM representatives are dis-

cussing the process of right-of-way issues between that agency, the PUD and the district, a process that could take months to years to resolve, Timm said. In the interim the PUD board has decided to defer actions regarding the dam's future until the district has a full understanding of the requisite regulatory parameters involved.

The board approved a change order with Max J. Kuney Contractors of Spokane in an amount not to exceed \$200,000 for safety inspection planning at Enloe Dam. The board also approved a budget amendment not to exceed \$238,900 authorizing a 2019 contract for Owners Advisory Services McMillen Jacobs Associates to oversee dam safety work.

that will take place in different community locations. "We are trying to get the students from the schools to jump in and be a part of that," said Longmire. The rallies are open to all youth and are welcome to attend. Food will be provided and they will be able to hear more from Mortimer and his message of hope. Those who attend the rally are going to receive a resource card with contact information, along with the suicide hotline number.

Longmire explained that in Chelan a 30-day Kindness Challenge is being developed. The idea is to have a social media bundle for the schools to post describing a challenge for the day. The challenges might start off easy and get harder as

the days go by. "A lot of those cases of suicide develop out of cases of being bullied, so this is a way to also approach it from that point," clarified Longmire.

The big picture of the week is to spread awareness, recognize signs and for people to get accurate help. Longmire and the rest of the group don't want this to be a one-time event. "We would like to develop some support groups for it and possibly do more with that," said Longmire.

The Gathering

On March 27, a pre-rally was held at the Ruby Theatre in Chelan to give student leaders the training needed to help spread the word on suicide. Approximately 60 students participated in the event and received a mini training on Suicide Prevention. The event also served as a way for them to get

informed on the rallies.

Championship of Champions at Walla Walla, Sept. 20-22. HNIRC is also involved with the Omak Stampede during the second weekend of August and several HNIRC riders will compete in the World-Famous Suicide Race.

A CCT team, Northwest Express, won the Championship of Champions event hosted by the Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation last year in Walla Walla.

"Those who attended this Championship Indian Relay race witnessed 40 teams from throughout the United States and Canada participate in this very memorable event," said Colville Tribal Chairman Rodney Cawston. "We saw many quality horses and talented riders giving their all. There were heart-pounding stretch battles, painful losses and horses and jockeys taking terrifying spills. There is an exciting element of risk with each race."

Northwest Express was started by brothers Loren and Francis Marchand. Current members of the team include rider Mathew Pakootas, horse holders Loren and Edward Marchand, and mugger (horse catcher) Arnold Abrahamson. Loren Marchand will compete in the Suicide Race this year aboard a horse named Augustus, co-owned by Mike Jones of Malott.

Other CCT teams include Little Grizzly Mountain, Arrow Lakes Express, Little Abrahamson Express, Omak Express, Grizzly Mountain, Cayuse Express, and Abrahamson Relay.

There have always been great teams in the Northwest," said HNIRC President Calvin Ghost Bear. "For many years those teams traveled out of their area to compete in the championship event."

Abrahamson Relay traveled to Montana in 2017 to win the Championship of Champions there.

In 2018 CCT member Mane Pakootas was selected for the Kirby White Hawk Determination Award.



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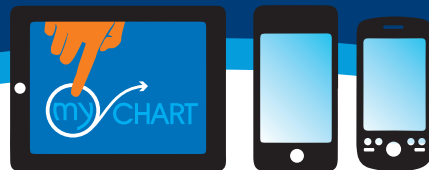

Brewster Bears allow a single run in last five baseball games

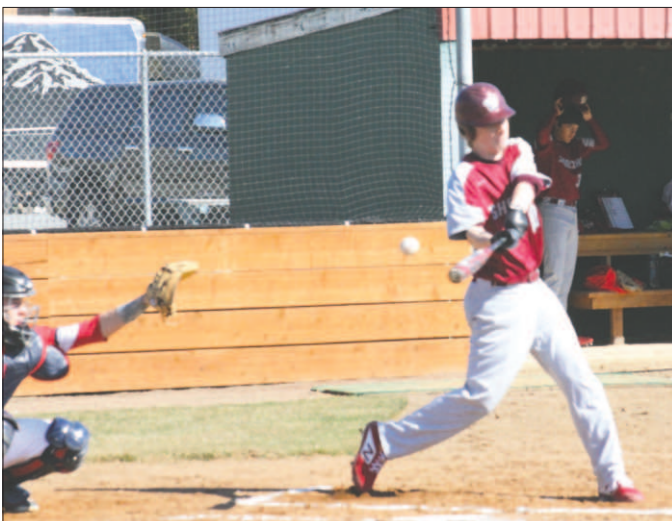

BREWSTER – The Bears varsity baseball team is still looking for an opponent that can play them toe-to-toe but haven't found one in its last three outings that included a pair of doubleheaders.

Since hosting Okanogan on March 23, the Bears have given up a single run while scoring several double-digit innings in lopsided wins against both Bridgeport and Waterville-Mansfield.

The Bears hosted the Shockers in a doubleheader last Saturday, March 30, and put up numbers that approached school history proportions, including a school record 32 runs batted in (RBI), coach Todd Phillips said.

Six Bears combined for 13 extra base hits for doubles or better. Joe Taylor slapped two triples and a double, Connor Ashworth, Kade Kelpman, Logan McGuire; Isaac Baker

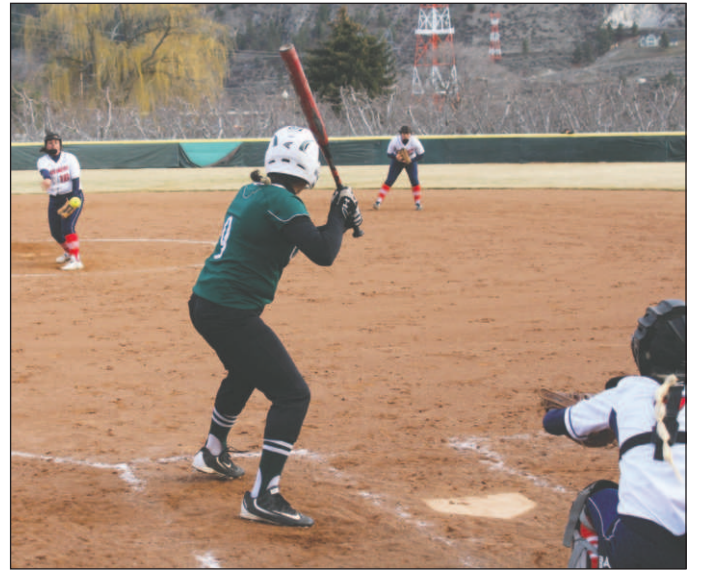
Lady Bears softball undefeated in early season league play

BREWSTER – The Lady Bears varsity softball team has been winning when it counts, against Central Washington 2B opponents, in their early season games and losing a pair of non-league battles with 1A Caribou Trail League teams.

Brewster downed Soap Lake 20-0, and 18-3 in a home doubleheader Saturday, March 23, and shut out Bridgeport, 18-0, and 16-0, in its second DH on Tuesday, March 26. The Lady Bears' only losses were to Okanogan, 14-3, on Thursday, March 21, and Chelan, 17-6, last Thursday, March 28. Brewster is tied with Lake Roosevelt for top billing in the CW2B so far.

New head coach Jessie Barnes has seven veterans back from last year plus seven new faces to fill some of the spots left by five graduating seniors last June. The roster breakdown includes one senior – Bizzy Stam; four juniors – Michaun and Mikenna Kelpman, Cynthia Sanchez, and Sammi Emigh; three sophomores – Vicky Sanchez, Anah Wulf, and Kaitlin Garcia; two freshmen – Victoria Reagles and Jenny Valdovinos; and four eighth graders – Tori Hull, Marisa Medina, Abi Boesel, and Makenna Kelly.

"It has been tough not having all my players eligible due to injury and starting late so I'm excited to have everyone able to play and see what's going to fit best," said Barnes. "Liberty Bell (coming up Tuesday, April 9, at home) is always a tough game for us so I expect either them or Lake Roosevelt to be our toughest matchup in league play."

Brewster is currently tied with Lake Roosevelt for top billing in the CW2B at this writing.
