

Interlocal agreement approved
**Narcotics Task
Force updates
Pateros City Council**

PATEROS – Following a revision of some wording in the annual agreement, Pateros City Council members, at their regular monthly meeting March 18, approved the 2019 Interlocal Agreement with Okanogan County for law enforcement services for the year ahead. A member of the North Central Washington Narcotics Task Force (NCWNTF) along with Okanogan County Sheriff Tony Hawley and Undersheriff Aaron Culp attended the council's regular monthly meeting last Monday, March 18, to update members on work the group is doing.

The NCWNTF member, who requested anonymity, told council members that federal grant funding that helps support the drug task forces is being held up at the federal level owing to a lawsuit dealing with immigration and sanctuary city issues in several states.

and the state government basically are bickering," the NTR source later told The Quad. "There were some questions specifically put on the federal application for the grant issued to all task forces that had to do with immigration."

Some of the questions concerned allowing immigration enforcement in their jurisdictions.

"We in Okanogan County at least are in compliance with all those questions," the NRF source said and added "other agencies on the west side of the state took offense to and did not want to answer."

Congress approved \$254 million for the 2017 fiscal year but those funds have yet to be disbursed and the shortfall is hitting small community drug task forces the hardest. Each task force receives the same amount so counties with large law enforcement budgets like King, Pierce, Snohomish, and Spokane barely notice the

**Pateros School District
address Field of
Dreams, Capital Levy**

PATEROS – Pateros School District personnel James Broome (certified), Shane Kelly, and Darlina Fernandez (classified) were selected by their peers as the 2018-19 Excellence Award Winners and will participate in the North Central Educational Services District Excellence Banquet at 5:30 p.m. at Bridgeport High School on April 24. That was one of many items on the regular meeting agenda of the Pateros School Board of Directors regular meeting on Feb. 25.

Commission to express their view on the proposal.

The District is proposing a Capital Levy in April to raise funds for at least three school campus projects aimed at improving student health and safety. The levy will amount to one dollar (\$1) per thousand of real estate valuation for two years and yield \$411,190 with the first collection in spring 2020 and last in the fall of 2021.

School Board Chairperson Grace Larsen wrote in a public service announcement (PSA) that the funds raised from the levy will be used to construct a covered play area on the elementary playground so students will have a sheltered outdoor area to use in inclement weather. Another project will expand a second-floor room over the auxiliary gym to create an indoor recess space. A third project will provide for an Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)-compliant access ramp to the music building. Any remaining funds will be used in support of campus health and safety. "The Board decided to run the \$1/\$1,000 levy amount because it keeps the school tax rate essentially flat (with the exception of taxes for 2019)," wrote Larsen. "It helps the District compensate for the negative impact of a new state law (2018) which placed a cap on how much school districts could raise in maintenance and operations levies."

**Fire Strong workshops launch
ambitious public education campaign**

CHELAN – Last week the Okanogan County Long Term Recovery Group in partnership with the American Red Cross, launched an ambitious and comprehensive series of six day-long free Fire Strong Workshops aimed at educating and preparing citizens for the increasing incidence of wildfire.

Beginning at Pateros High School on Tuesday, March 19, and Campbell's Resort in Chelan on Tuesday, March 20, representatives from more than a dozen agencies and organizations that deal with natural disasters convened for a day-long schedule that included moderated slide presentations, displays, information and volunteers. Among the participants were:

- Okanogan County Long Term Recovery Group (www.okanogancountyrecovery.com) – OCLTRG brings a detailed display of facts and photos of its efforts over the years since the wildfires help fire victims recover and rebuild. The display recognizes the more than 126 teams and 2,000 volunteers over the past four years, along with dozens of photos of home sites in various stages of construction. OCLTRG projects also include:

1. Map Your Neighborhood – As the name implies a neighborhood preparedness program that focuses on one street and 15-20 homes at a time and tap the most immediate source of help in times of disaster. Online MYN support materials available at www.mil.wa.gov/myn.
2. Share Your Story – Stories from those affected by the



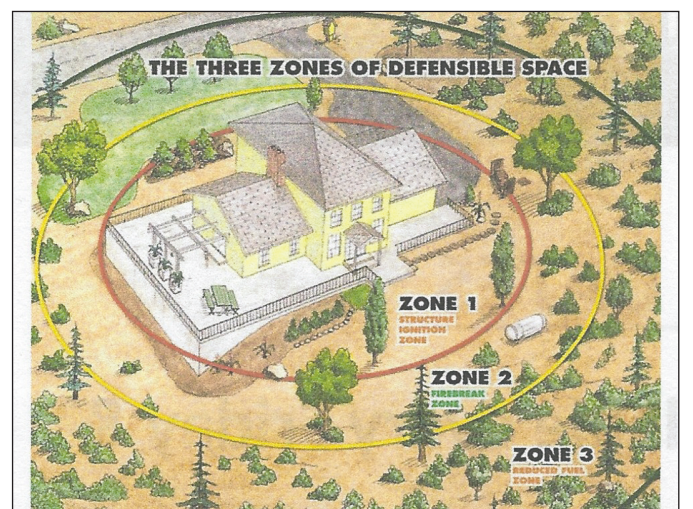

2014-15 wildfires. The stories are for a series of books that will be available to the public. The story coordinator is Jessica Rounds at jessicaocdem@gmail.com or phone 509-846-5101.

3. Insurance Survey – Responses from insured, underinsured, and uninsured residents to comprise a true picture of the factors and gaps in process of disaster recovery. Online at www.surveymonkey.com/r/OCLTRG.

4. Reflective Address Marker – OCLTRG received a grant to fund 200 reflective address markers issued on a first come, first serve basis. Applications are available at the Fire Strong workshops.

difference, but smaller units feel the pinch, in some cases terminally.

“We have already lost at least one and maybe two task forces in the state that have already collapsed,” the NTF source said, citing the lack of grant funding.

Fortunately, the Okanogan County Sheriff’s Office planned ahead and prepared for such a contingency.

“We have a reserve,” said the NTF source. “We’ve been financially smart in the meantime and we have a reserve that will take us out for a couple of years now.”

The NCWNTF commanded by Undersheriff Culp is a multi-jurisdictional group of which the Okanogan County Sheriff’s Office is the parent agency. It is funded through an annual Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant and contributions from communities like Pateros that currently ponies up \$2,500 a year.

There are currently about 20 Brynes Grant Task Forces in the State of Washington.

While the delay in federal funding has a minor effect on large city task forces, “we only get \$35,000 from all the agencies in Okanogan and Ferry counties,” the NTF source said.

Adding to the expense, the NCWNTF goes wherever the drug trail leads, even if it involves communities that do not participate in funding the unit. That can be statewide as when the NCWCTF served

two search warrants last year in the city of Kent in south King County.

“We do a lot of work in Bridgeport even though they don’t contribute to our task force,” said the NTF source. “We have to because a good portion of our drugs are coming out of Bridgeport.”

The NCWNTF staff “includes one National Guard employee, three Task force detectives and other Okanogan County Law Enforcement personnel as local agency budgets allow,” according to a statement on the

website okanogansheriff.org/ncwntf. “The task force has a full-time detective from the U.S. Border Patrol, a full-time detective from the Ferry County Sheriff’s Office and a full-time sergeant from the Okanogan County Sheriff’s Office.”

Lack of manpower is the other critical ingredient of the local task force staffing.

“Even when we are getting the grant, we’ve been having an issue with manpower,” said the NTF source, “Just getting these other agencies, Brewster, Omak, Oroville to contribute

full time officers to the task force is a big burden.”

Over the past few years cocaine has been the primary focus of the NCWNTF with methamphetamine a close second.

The NCWNTF is governed by a board comprised of “the Sheriffs of Okanogan and Ferry Counties and all the Police Chiefs in both counties,” notes the website. “This board meets every other month for financial planning and to discuss the direction of the task force.”

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Council reaches agreement on Atomic Way street vacation

BRIDGEPORT – Unless spring floodwaters breach Chief Joseph Dam or a giant asteroid hits the Earth in the next few weeks, it appears that actions to complete the vacation of Atomic Way will be finalized at the next regular meeting of the City Council in April.

Council members cleared the final hurdles that will allow Bridgeport resident, Scott Wright, the applicant for vacation, to receive the upper portion of Atomic Way plus a little more property that was specified in Wright's original proposal.

Council member Anthony Perkins who, with Council member Phil Lee, served on the committee researching

Atomic Way said everything should finally come together next month.

"It's a win-win for Wright and the city," Perkins said.

In other business a 100-year-old-plus map of the city revealed that the city boundaries along the west end of town actually extended farther than previously thought and involves about four property owners near

the town's sewer plant. The city attorney recommended that the council take no action on the new findings as the process required would not gain the city enough to justify the cost and expense.

Council members decided to refer the issue to the property owners for their consideration.

Time nears to fire up Wells Dam April Fool's Turbine

1925-2019

On March 21, 2019 our mom was relieved from her suffering after 365 days of pain. As was her nature, she fought a hard fight.

She was known by many names - Mom, Grandma, Great-Grandma, and GG, but the name that she held dearest was "Mrs. Vaughn Godbey." Her family takes great comfort in knowing that now she is reunited with the great love of her life, her husband, Vaughn - their first born daughter, Marcia - their grandson, Carter - their son-in-law, Ken - plus other loved ones who passed before her.

Mom was born on September 18, 1925 in Gove, Kansas. In 1937, her parents decided to leave the "dust bowl" of Kansas. They left in an old Chevy pick-up, with \$40.00, a stove in the back, and five children. After many stops along the way to work for money in order to continue their journey, they finally settled in Chelan Falls, Washington. She graduated from Chelan High School in 1943. As her children and grandchildren went through their high school years, she would tell each one, "I never had to read The Grapes of

Wrath - I lived it!"

As a young woman she was selected as Chelan County War Bond Queen. Her picture was displayed in store windows, and shortly after V-E Day a young man came to Chelan - Vaughn Godbey from Nebraska. He saw her pictures in various windows, then saw her walking across the street one day. He told the man that he was working with, "I'm going to marry that girl!" Mom, however, was not interested. He pursued, she alluded. She always told us girls, "I just knew he was too much for me to manage: so handsome and self-confident." However, Daddy persisted and won his girl. Five months later they were married on New Year's Eve. As they said, "we always had a party for our anniversary!"

They were two hard working young people who survived the "dust bowl," poverty, the depression, and WWII.

Daddy was the man with the vision, but Mom was the help-mate who helped turn his vision into reality. She always disputed her importance, because she wanted Daddy to have 100% of the credit. Those of us who loved them know that it took two - the perfect match

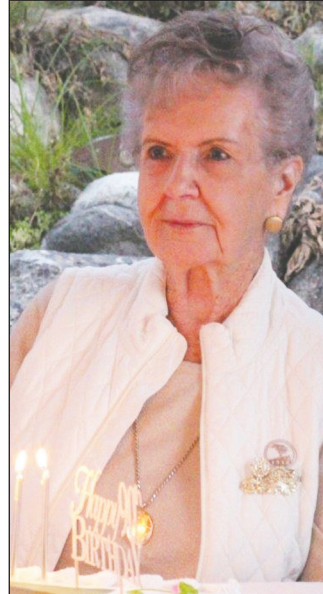


- to make their hard work turn that vision into reality.

In 1950, while living in a John Countryman's cabin in Brewster, Washington, with a three year old, a newborn (who slept in a drawer), a brother and father-in-law, they used Daddy's money from the GI Bill to start Godbey Red-E-Mix Concrete, Inc. Many years of hard work and sacrifice followed to make their business successful. Years later they purchased Chelan Concrete, Inc.

Because "Mr. Wonderful" wanted a family, their lives were blessed with three daughters - Marcia, Portia and Jinx.

They, also, suffered great heartache when in 1984 an automobile accident took the lives of their daughter, Marcia, grandson, Carter, and son-in-law, Ken. 18 months later Mom



lost the love of her life in a workplace accident.

She missed him every day.

At her most difficult time, her "Irish Spirit" came through and she gave her trust to her remaining sons-in-law, David Freels and Stephen Pauli, to carry on the family businesses. She would say, "well done, boys" as the businesses grew and are now entering into the hands of the third generation, fulfilling a dream that Mom and Dad envisioned.

Us girls always called Daddy "our rock," but after his death, we soon discovered that Mom was "the foundation" that provided the stability and support. She always denied that,

because she always gave Daddy all the praise and credit. However, she truly was "the foundation" that he needed in order for the vision to become reality.

Many parts of this eulogy refer to Mom and Dad, because her story in many ways was their story. It was the way she always wanted it, and the way she always told it.

Mom lived a long life filled with dignity, hard work, self-sacrifice for family and those she loved, and always striving to be an independent person.

She left us all with a great legacy. She believed that love shows itself in discipline, example and sacrifice. We will miss her dearly and will forever be grateful for the lives she made possible for each and every one of us.

Every evening when Mom would come to the end of another day shared with Daddy, the last thing she would do is say, "good night, sweet prince." Her family who so loved her, would like to paraphrase William Shakespeare and say,

Good night, Sweet Prince "and his Princess"

May flights of angels sing thee to thy rest!

Mom was preceded in death by her husband, Vaughn, daughter, Marcia, grandson Carter, and son-in-law, Kenneth. Also by her parents and

all of her siblings.

BREWSTER – The team that nearly won it all last year has everyone back minus one senior for the 2019 season.

“We are looking to improve on our performance from last season and have established some pretty lofty goals,” said sixth-year head coach Todd Phillips. “They are going to be very difficult to achieve but they are definitely achievable.”

Conner Ashworth from Okanogan and Cascade's Mason Kelly are new faces on the team this year.

“Conner brings another arm to the stable and was an All-State selectee last season,” said Phillips. “Mason Kelly brings a real solid glove to beef up our defense and he has a really high baseball IQ. Both athletes were All-Caribou Trail League last year.”

Phillips has four eighth graders on the team this season but owing to the team's depth this year the younger players have their work cut out for them to get as much playing time as young players in years past.
