Pateros School Board abandons Carlson property consideration

PATEROS - By a unanimous vote, members of the Pateros School District Board of Directors abandoned considerations to pursue a bond for the purchase of the Carlson property during its regular meeting last Monday, Nov. 26.

A proposed bond of \$6 million was under consideration to purchase the property that had to be approved by the next board meeting on Dec. 10 to get the measure on the spring ballot by the Dec. 15 deadline.

Public opposition to the measure was quick and vocal. Former Pateros mayor and current city councilman George Brady said he took an objective look at the survey and found multiple concerns, including access issues, that remain to be addressed.

Pateros resident and former teacher, Frank Herbert questioned water and sewer systems since the property lies outside city limits and hookups and lack of cost estimates for operations and maintenance.

In an earlier media comment, Pateros Superintendent Greg Goodnight said the board was initially impressed with the site and authorized Goodnight to investigate the project further. One goal in acquiring the property was to provide alternate practice space for varsity and JV teams that presently must share the school's only gym.

City Council approves Pateros Transportation Improvement District

PATEROS - City Council members voted to adopt an ordinance establishing the Pateros Transportation Benefit District (TBD) at its regular monthly meeting last Monday, Nov. 19.

The TBD allows the city to impose an annual \$20 vehicle fee to generate revenue for street, sidewalk, and trail maintenance and improvement.

In other business the city executed a professional services agreement with Barry Hansen for building inspector and code enforcement services.

Council members approved an operational agreement with the North Central Washington Narcotics Task Force and agreed to pay a 2019 participation fee of \$2,300.

The city's 2019 Operational Budget was approved in the amount of \$6,061,773.00.

Council members approved

a one percent increase in the Emergency Medical Services (EMS) tax over the 2018 amount. The EMS tax was passed by Pateros voters in 2008. The allowable amount for 2019 is \$26,393.

City Administrator and arborist Jord Wilson and the Tree Board comprised of Angela Van Eysinga, Brenda Brady, and Megan Sherrard presented the annual Tree Report as part of the Tree City USA program. The report noted that a large sycamore at Tennis Court Park had to be removed along with two other trees that interfered with a right-of-way.

Council members approved the 2019 Fee Schedule that will include a 3.1 percent increase in water and sewer rates in

Pateros brings new water system online this week

PATEROS - With Pump Station No. 3 at Pearl Street and Watson Draw coming online this week, the City of Pateros has notified residents to expect some water disruptions as the city transitions from the old to the new system starting this week through the first week of December.

To mark the milestone of the completion of the ambitious Water Improvement Project, Mayor Carlene Anders is planning a long-awaited Ceremonial Flush on Dec. 7.

The new water system comes on the heels of the city receiving the 2018 Drinking Water Award from the Infrastructure Assistance Coordinating Council (IACC) during its conference on Oct. 24. Anders, along with council members George Brady and Holly Bange, accepted the award.

City engineers Varela and Associates nominated Pateros for the honor in recognition of the city's efforts to rebuild its water infrastructure, including the new reservoir, following the destruction caused by the 2014

The completed design plan for the city Well 4 Pump Station that will occupy the parking lot across from Lakeshore Park was unveiled at the regular council meeting on Nov. 19. The dual-purpose structure will feature a stage and other amenities to incorporate a multi-use concept into the building.

Carlton Complex wildfire. In a related water category, Pateros Wastewater Treatment Plant Manager Mike Lambert earned the 2017 Outstanding Performance Award from the Washington Department of

Ecology for the third year in recognition of his near-perfect reporting record for the year. Work began to demolish and replace the Peninsula Park during the week of Nov. 19. The new structure will resemble

the Ives Landing restroom, according to City Administrator Jord Wilson. The Memorial Park restroom remodel is continuing with completion of that project expected in December.

Auditors certify Okanogan, Douglas county election results

OKANOGAN – As of 11 a.m. Tuesday, Nov. 27, results for the Nov. 6 General Election were certified by the auditors for both Okanogan and Douglas counties.

In both Okanogan and Douglas counties there was little movement among the initiatives or candidates from results reported at mid-month.

Republican incumbent Jim Detro won re-election as Okanogan County Commissioner District 3.

Detro told the Quad that the big issues he plans to focus on during his next four year include granting perpetuity for the Smoke-jumper base in Winthrop, fully funded state payment in lieu of taxes (PILT), and permanent federal funding for PILT and SRS (State Rural Schools).

Detro also seeks a solution for apex predators in the county and wants funds derived from cannabis growing operations to be applied to criminal justice needs.

Aside from the above, “the rest is what walks through the door as problems to be solved for the county on a daily basis,” Detro said.

New Okanogan County Prosecutor Arian Noma (R) maintained a commanding lead over Branden Platter (D).

“I plan on immediately assisting my newly inherited staff in transitioning to our new mission,” Noma told the Quad. “I want them to know that they truly have my support and I understand the stress and tension the election may have caused.”

As things settle down Noma said the goal is to “begin to implement the plans of prosecutorial reform that I campaigned upon.”

“Ultimately, it will be our goal to be SMART on crime in order to prevent crime, protect public safety, and improve our community,” Noma said.

Anthony Hawley is the new Okanogan County Sheriff and Carli Hall is County Auditor.

Initiative 1631 concerning fees on pollution sources was defeated in both counties and statewide.

I-1634 dealing with taxation on certain items for human consumption won approval in both counties as well as statewide.

Initiative 940 on additional law enforcement training and new standards for use of deadly force passed easily statewide but lost by a narrow margin in Okanogan County and by a wider margin in Douglas.

Senate Bill 6269 regarding expanded oil spill response, was repealed locally and statewide.

While Dino Rossi won the Douglas County vote for U.S. Representative for the 8th Congressional District, he lost the multi-county vote to Kim Schrier.

Ann Diamond led Keith Goehner in the Okanogan County vote for State Representative Position 1 in the 12th Legislative District, but Goehner won the multi-county vote.

Marc Straub defeated Norman Tupling for Douglas County Commissioner 3, and Kevin Morris won Douglas County Sheriff over Leon Leyde by 30 percentage points.

Tatley Outpost offers veterans a place to farm, in agriculture, healing

PATEROS – A new website launched on Veterans Day this month signals the latest chapter in an innovative farming, training, healing and community service project located three miles north of Pateros on Watson Road.

Tatley Outpost (www.tatley-outpost.com) debuted online as a veteran operated ranch creating global impact through a community approach but has actually been evolving since the Carlton Complex wildfire swept through the property in July 2014.

Owner David Overcash of Woodinville, a technology entrepreneur and community activist, had a vision of rebuilding what was left of Tatley Farms literally from the ashes as an avenue to help military veterans find opportunities to live, heal, share, and learn new skills in an agriculture setting.

The Quad first reported on what was then called Project Phoenix in September 2017, when fruit crops and infrastructure was taking shape on a portion of the Tatley Farms acreage.

Since then two families have taken up residence at Tatley Outpost, each being their own dreams and skills to expand the enterprise into even more fields of expertise and community service.

Army veteran Tim Andrews, with wife, Amy, runs the day-to-day operations on the property as he develops a hydroponics/aquaculture specialty. A large shipping container on site will be used for mushroom production, and many areas of the property are designated as future sites for everything from hops to vegetables and livestock products for sale to area businesses and beyond. A new greenhouse will allow year-round vegetable production to meet the demand for locally grown produce.

Fellow Army veteran Brandon Kuehn, with wife, Nikki, and 11-year-old son, Gabe, relocated from their home town of Cottage Grove, Oregon.

Last Monday, the Kuehns were allowing three Yorkshire pigs they had just acquired to clean up was left of a tomato and pepper garden. Nearby, a new flock of chickens was sorting out the pecking order and beginning to lay eggs that will be purchased by Sweet River Bakery in Pateros.

“I love it out here; I love the people out here,” said Brandon who added that Gabe “absolutely loves” the Pateros school.

Kuehn brings certifications in CPR and EMT skills and, along with farm work to supplement the income, will be working with veterans on peer-to-peer support training beginning next year.

In the meantime, Overcash is working with Okanogan County and other groups to construct veteran housing on the property.

Overcash was named to the Puget Sound Business Journal's annual 40 under 40 list in 2010 and currently serves as a board member of The Forty, an alumni network of Greater Seattle area visionary business people. He was inspired to devote a portion of Tatley Farms to veterans' causes following service with a Medical Teams International mission to Guatemala.

Ed's Mudville Breakfast Bar & Grill draws 'em in on Main Street

BREWSTER – A new yellow sign recently installed above the entry of the former Ixtapa and El Parasio restaurants at 500 W. Main downtown completes the evolution of the former Mexican-Chinese eatery into its new role as a breakfast, burger, and steak place.

Owners Said and Ruth Velasco are busy these days as Ruth serves as hostess/cashier and Said mans the grill. Both graduated Brewster High School and married in 2011. Said and his mother, Judith Quevedo, also own the Second-Hand Store in the former Lindsey's Drive-Inn building and Velasco operates a vehicle detail shop behind the premises during the warm months.

Velasco recently assumed ownership of Ixtapa from his two partners, one the cook and the other the owner of the former El Parasio. Exposure to and experience with a variety of menus from his years working for Seattle-area restaurants gave Velasco a clear idea of what kind of fare he wanted to offer in his new eatery. How the new place came by its current name is another story.

Brewster businessman and land speed racing Hall of Fame inductee Ed Tradeup was an early and frequent supporter of Velasco's American menu selection, but he had his own ideas about a name that would be more representative of the cuisine.

Tradeup's son-in-law is the manager of Ed's Mudville Grill in Clayton, Calif, so Tradeup suggested that name for the new venture. Velasco added a couple of additional words, and Ed's Mudville Breakfast Bar & Grill was born.

Velasco's first brush with the restaurant business was in 2001 when his family opened Los Cantaritos in Pateros. A year later Velasco's father sold to an Omak buyer and Velasco headed to Seattle to broaden his restaurant experience and develop his own menu and management style. During his years on the west side, he worked for Elliott Bay Brewing at its Lake City location and Patty's Eggnest in Lynnwood among others.

Ed's Mudville is open six days a week, Tuesday through Sunday. During the winter hours run from 9 a.m. until 8 or 9 p.m. depending on the day. The dining patrons

Acclaimed author to address Pateros school students

PATEROS – The North Central Regional Library will host best selling author Ruth Sepetys as part of its NCRL Reads series for a three-day tour of selected schools next month.

Sepetys, a writer of historical fiction and author of the award-winning book, *Between Shades of Gray*, will speak to students at Pateros High School on Dec. 5, and Liberty Bell High School, Dec. 6. She will also visit schools in Eastmont, Cashmere, Moses Lake, and Warden.

In addition to her visit to Okanogan County, Sepetys will headline a public speaking event at Wenatchee High School at 6 p.m., Dec. 5, where she will also sign copies of her book.

NCRL Reads is a program that encourages participants to read the same book, discuss it in school classrooms and reading groups, and meet the author.

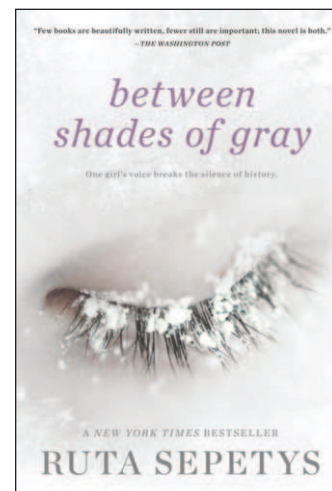
Between Shades of Gray, Sepetys' debut novel tells story of a Lithuanian family caught up in Stalin's ethnic cleansing in the Baltic states when Soviet officers invade their home, force them into a crowded train and enslave them at Siberian work camps. The story is told through the eyes of 15-year-old Lina, who finds solace in her art and documents the events by drawing.

Sepetys' book was a New York Times Bestseller List, nominated for the Carnegie Medal and translated into more than 27 languages. The author is the daughter of a Lithuanian refugee. She was recently awarded the Cross of the Knight of the Order by the President of Lithuania in 2013 for her contributions to education and memory pres-

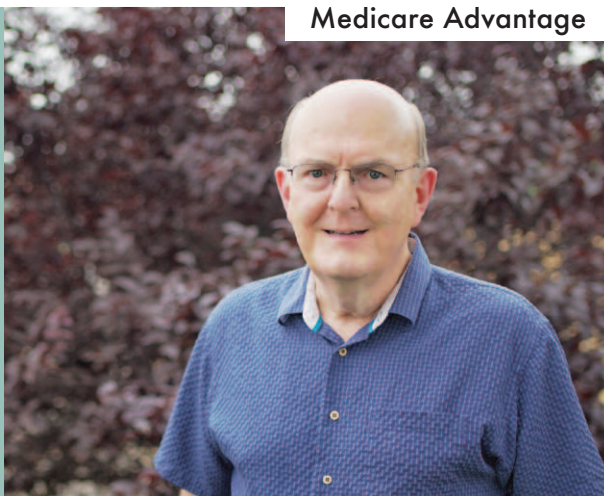

He defeated Democrat Valerie Sarratt of Twisp in the November general election by a resounding nearly 2-1 margin garnering 64.84% to Sarratt's 35.19%.

Newly elected Douglas County Commissioner Marc Straub also had words of appreciation for his win over fellow Republican opponent Norm Tupling by a decisive margin.

Straub is currently the Executive Director of "Building NCW," a non-profit construction trade organization headquartered in Wenatchee. BNCW's monthly member newsletter appears each month in the four-page center-spread of the Wenatchee Business Journal.

Straub has previously stressed the importance of affordable housing and explained to prior audiences that the main revenue resource in Douglas County are property and sales taxes, not tourism like Chelan County.

He cautioned that bringing jobs to the county wouldn't be enough if there wasn't a place for the workers to live that they could afford.

He also said it was a must to maintain the county's roads so its farmers and ranchers can get their harvest and livestock to market. Straub assailed the state and federal unfunded mandates that cost rural counties millions.

One of those mandates is the care of indigents, which causes a burden on rural counties in order for those unfortunates to be housed, fed and medically cared for.

Straub said the state only pays five percent of the costs and the county must pick up the tab for the other 95 percent. He takes office in January.

Public invited to comment on 4-year program of WSDOT projects

WSDOT accepting public input on the draft Statewide Transportation Improvement Program from Nov. 21 to Dec. 20

OLYMPIA - Comments are now being accepted on a proposed four-year program of multimodal improvement projects to the state and local transportation system.

The Washington State Department of Transportation is asking for public review and comment on the draft 2019-2022 Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). More than 1,500 statewide transportation improvement projects using \$3.9 billion in federal funds are included in the 2019-22 STIP. Comments will be accepted through Thursday, Dec. 20.

The program's 2019-22 projects, available online, are compiled from local transportation programs, metropolitan and regional transportation improvement programs

(TIPs) and have been identified through state, metropolitan, regional, tribal and local planning processes. These are the highest priority for the available funding to preserve and improve the state's transportation network.

About the STIP

The STIP is a four-year, fiscally constrained, prioritized multimodal transportation program of state, local, tribal, and public transportation (transit) projects. The STIP includes highways, streets, roads, railroads, transit-hubs, park-and-ride lots, bridges, sidewalks, bike lanes, ferry terminals, trails and safety projects funded with federal, state, tribal and local revenue sources. Federally funded projects must be included in the STIP before Federal Highway Administration or Federal Transit Administration can authorize the expenditure of federal funds.

The STIP is developed annually by WSDOT in coordination with statewide metropolitan and rural transportation planning organizations. This collaborative effort ensures projects are consistent with local, regional and state long-

range plans. Several projects may carry over as they move from design, to permitting and, finally, to construction. Some county projects are not included in the draft STIP because state law requires counties to complete their transportation programs by the end of the year; those projects are amended into the final STIP in January.

The current 2018-21 STIP can be viewed online and a similar, searchable database of the 2019-22 STIP will be created in early 2019, following FHWA and FTA approval.

How to comment

The public comment period for the draft STIP is Wednesday, Nov. 21, to 5 p.m. on Thursday, Dec. 20. Written comments can be sent to: Nancy Huntley, WSDOT, P.O. Box 47390, Olympia, WA 98504-7390, email: Huntlen@wsdot.wa.gov, or by fax at 360-705-6822.

The comment period is the final step of the community engagement process that began locally. Comments received will be sent to the local or regional planning organization for their consideration.

IRS reminds employers, business owners of Jan. 31 filing deadline for wage statements, independent contractor forms

WASHINGTON — The Internal Revenue Service today reminded employers and other businesses that Jan. 31 remains the filing deadline for wage statements and independent contractor forms.

The Protecting Americans from Tax Hikes (PATH) Act of 2015 started a requirement for employers to file their copies of Form W-2,

Wage and Tax Statement, and Form W-3, Transmittal of Wage and Tax Statements, with the Social Security Administration by Jan. 31. Certain Forms 1099-MISC, Miscellaneous Income, filed with the IRS to report non-employee compensation to independent contractors are also due at this time. Such payments are reported in box 7 of this form.

The IRS can more efficiently verify income that individuals report on their tax returns because of the Jan. 31 deadline; this helps prevent fraud. File these forms correctly and timely



to avoid penalties. IRS e-file is the quickest, most accurate and convenient way to file these forms.

Pointers to help filers prepare

Employers should verify employees'

information. This includes names, addresses, and Social Security or individual taxpayer identification numbers. They should also ensure their company's account information is current and active with the Social Security Administration before January. If paper Forms W-2 are needed, they should be ordered early.

Automatic extensions of

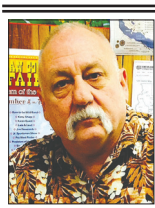
time to file Forms W-2 are not available. The IRS will only grant extensions for very specific reasons. Details can be found on the instructions for Form 8809, Application for Time to File Information Returns.
