

Chamber approves donor match challenge to fund Food Bank

BREWSTER – The Brewster Chamber of Commerce approved a donor match challenge at its regular monthly meeting on Wednesday, Nov. 14, to help raise funds for the Brewster Food Bank.

During a discussion concerning the dollar amount to set, Chamber board member Manny Hurtado suggested that the Chamber open the opportunity for businesses to match the Chamber’s donation.

“Let’s make it easy because it’s a hard time, winter,” said Hurtado, “and \$50 would be a good amount.”

Members voted to contribute \$50 from the Chamber coffers and challenged local

businesses – and private parties - to pony up a like amount. In the next few minutes business members around the table, including The Armory, Monse General Store, Coldwell Banker Realty, and property developer Pedro Delacerda had chipped in \$50 each to get the fund pool off to a fast start.

The Food Bank at 301 S. Fourth Street, will be distributing turkeys donated by the Brewster Kiwanis starting at 9 a.m., Tuesday, Nov. 20, so families can have something for the Thanksgiving table on Thursday, Nov. 22.

Project judged cost prohibitive Okanogan PUD abandons plan to reenergize Enloe Dam

OKANOGAN – The county PUD Board of Commissioners has decided to pursue options other than reenergize Enloe Dam, four miles west-northwest of Oroville on the Similkameen River, after a \$70.4 million estimate to electrify the structure

came in at more than twice the initial figure.

The Board arrived at the decision at its regular monthly meeting last Monday, Nov. 9, after being informed earlier in the month by the Spokane firm Max J. Kuney of the project cost to electrify the dam under the

Owner requests action

Council pursues 4.7-acre property for city well site

BREWSTER – During the public comment period at the city councils regular monthly last Wednesday, Nov. 14, members heard testimony from Brewster businessman Said Velazquez, owner of a 4.7-acre piece of property at 1108 Sunset that the city wants to acquire for one if its water well sites.

Velazquez attended the meeting to inquire as to the progress the city is making with respect to pursuing the acquisition after a year of discussions and water testing.

Following his appearance at the council, Velazquez told the Quad City Herald that city representatives advised him in November 2017 that the city wanted to locate a well on his property that also has four seasonal rental cabins on the site. Velazquez said his initial thought was that he could divide out the portion of his acreage the city wanted and retain ownership of the rest.

Before negotiations could proceed further, Velazquez was told that a test hole needed to be drilled and water samples withdrawn and tested to determine the water quality. At a subsequent meeting a few months later following a second test hole and more

water samples Velazquez was advised that the city wanted to acquire all 4.7 acres of the site.

Velazquez said he does not want to sell the entire parcel because he hopes to not only upgrade the seasonal cabins

to allow year-round rentals, but also use part of the land as home sites for himself and family members. He declined an earlier offer from another interested party who wanted to purchase his property.

“There just aren’t any five-acre parcels available in Brewster to build on,” Velazquez said.

Velazquez and his mother own the second-hand store on the site of the former Lindsey’s Drive-Inn and Velazquez operates an auto detail shop behind the building.

“I am paying for three city business licenses,” Velazquez said.

City officials have not yet determined what valuation they will assign to the 4.7 acres, but council told Velazquez that by the next regular meeting in December the city should be ready to disclose that and other details.

In other business Brewster Chamber of Commerce President Anna Marie Dalbey asked the council about a portion of the Hotel-Motel Tax that is earmarked for the Chamber. The Chamber has already been approved for \$2,000 pending documentation that the organization spent that much on out-of-town advertising.

Council members held pub-

BREWSTER – It’s true! The circus is coming to Brewster, or rather, returning to Brewster next June. That was one of many topics addressed by the Brewster Chamber of Commerce at its regular monthly meeting last Wednesday, Nov. 14. The time and location of the performances is still being determined but dates hover around the first week of June at this writing.

The Culpepper & Merriweather Circus visits some 200 communities in 17 states during its 32-week annual circuit, according to the company’s website, www.emccircus.com. The Brewster stop will feature two half-hour shows at 5:30 p.m. and 7:30 p.m.

Chamber president Anna Marie Dalbey she was contacted by circus officials who were scheduled to send a representative to Brewster this week to finalize the date and location for when and where

the group will set up and other details. A principle concern is to schedule the circus, so it will not conflict with the early June graduation ceremonies.

“They will send an advance clown a week before the event who will visit the to the schools,” Dalbey said.

The Chamber has agreed to the \$290 deposit and is asked to select the location, obtain the necessary permit and provide two ticket-takers for the performances. The Chamber will receive 50 percent of advance ticket sales and gets its deposit back once a specified ticket sales threshold is reached.

In other business member discussed the city Christmas tree lighting on Saturday, Nov. 24, and designated the big pine tree in the Legion Park as this season’s Christmas tree. The lighting ceremony will coordinate with Shop Downtown at local businesses.

Members voted to join the

lic hearings on the annual EMS Levy and the Property Tax Levy, and following no comment, approved both measures.

City clerk-treasurer explained a new mandate by the

state regarding city business licenses.

“Every city that wanted to continue to have business licenses was mandated to adopt a model business license ordinance,” Ruiz said.

City attorney Chuck Zimmerman drafted the required business license model and made corrections to the city’s

ordinance. Council approved the measure under Ordinance 909.

In his report, Public Works Director Lee Webster said the sewer line inspections via all the manhole sites is nearing completion and the complete GIF mapping and data should be available soon.

design-build contract.

In arriving at its decision, the Board also noted that the \$70.4 million estimate does not factor in taxes and District costs that would increase the total figure to \$87.4 million.

The PUD began investigating Enloe reenergization in 2005 and proceeded through various steps of the reevaluation, including licensing

and litigation, over the past 13 years.

A PUD media release noted that Enloe’s estimated megawatt hour (mwh) is \$150. Comparative costs show that Nine Canyon Wind projects are \$69 per mwh, Bonneville Power Administration, \$33 per mwh, and Wells Dam, \$12 per mwh.

“At the direction of the Board, District staff will now investigate the future of Enloe Dam, keeping safety and cost considerations at the forefront,” wrote PUD

Community Relations Coordinator Sheila Corson. “The Board granted staff 120 days to explore the legal, political, environmental, and financial issues related to the site.”

Enloe Dam was first built as a wooden crib dam in 1906 and rebuilt as a concrete structure in the 1920s at a cost of \$125,000. It operated until cheaper power became available in 1959 and rendered continued operations of the dam economically unfeasible.

Carlton Complex consumed home

Former Brewster student battles ovarian cancer

CASHMERE – Accounts have been established on GoFundMe and at Cashmere Valley Bank for an 18-year-old former Brewster school student who recently underwent surgery for cancer.

Samantha Himmelhaver, whose family relocated to Cashmere after losing their Indian Dan Canyon home in the 2014 Carlton Complex wildfire, was diagnosed earlier this month with ovarian cancer and a few days later was undergoing surgery at University of Washington Hospital in Seattle.

“The surgeon removed a 12-centimeter tumor, about the size of a Nerf football,” said Samantha’s mother, Judy Himmelhaver.

Himmelhaver spoke with the Quad City Herald last Monday, Nov. 19, after her daughter was released to return home where she will begin six months of chemotherapy as part of her recovery process.

Samantha attended Brewster schools from Kindergarten through eighth grade before the fire struck that summer.

Ironically, Samantha was out of the country traveling when the family home was lost.

“That’s the family joke,” said Judy. “She leaves the house and we move.”

But when Samantha returned home, “she only had what was left in her suitcase,” Judy said.

Samantha was a 12-year-old seventh grader at Brewster when she was selected by school staff to participate in the People to People International Foundation program created by President Dwight Eisenhower

in 1956.

“That summer, she went to Scotland, Wales, North Ireland, and England,” said Judy, “and while on that trip she met a girl from Cashmere.”

The following summer, Samantha, then 13, toured Italy, Greece and France as part of the 10-month program. On that second trip, she met a second Cashmere girl.

When the family relocated to Cashmere following the loss of their home, Samantha ended up going to school with the girls she met while traveling.

Samantha is enrolled in the Running Start program and “wants to do something involved with travel,” Judy said. For now, she’s taking cosmetology and welding classes.

Even though their insurance company denied coverage for

their fire loss, the family has been able to rebuild a 1,300 square foot, two-story house on a 79 x 79-foot half-lot with help from a VA loan and builder John Port of Real Homes in Wenatchee.

As of this writing the online GoFundMe account has raised almost \$3,700 toward a goal of \$10,000 as the Himmelhaver family faces some steep expenses ahead. An account has also been established at Cashmere Valley Bank c/o Samantha Himmelhaver.

The family has a medical policy with a \$5,000 deductible and the \$5K must be paid again in 2019, “then it covers 80 percent,” Judy said.

In preparation for her upcoming chemo, Samantha had her hair cut off last Tuesday.

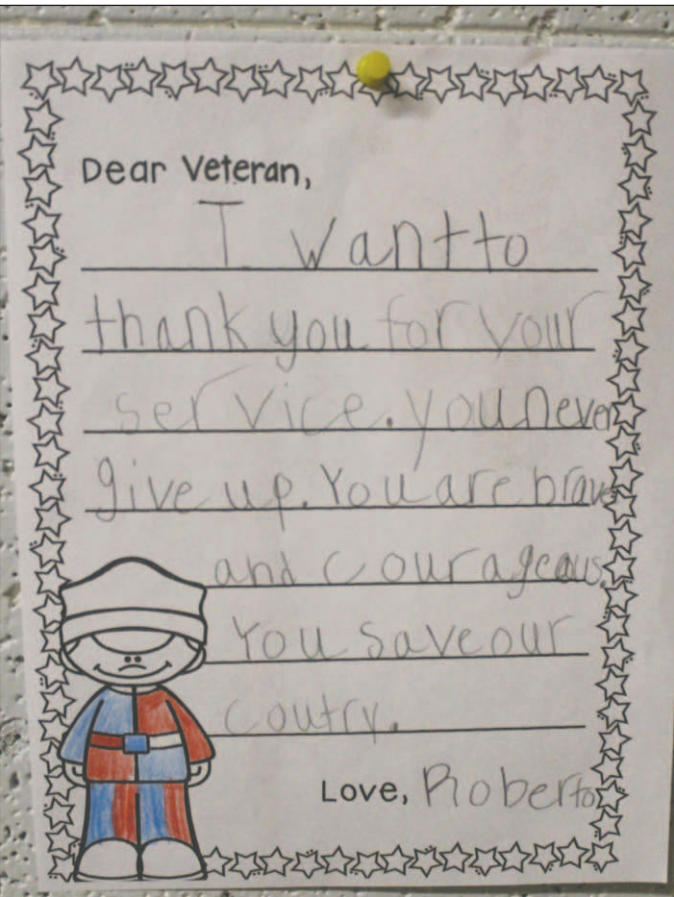

State Parks final free day Friday, Nov. 23

OLYMPIA – Recreation and outdoor enthusiasts have one more opportunity to visit Washington’s state parks for free in 2018. On these free days, day-use visitors will not need a Discover Pass for vehicle access.

Last day for 2018 is Friday, Nov. 23.

Last year, the agency set aside the day after Thanksgiving as a fall free day — to encourage people to get outside to visit a state park in autumn.

State Parks free days are in keeping with 2011 legislation that created the Discover Pass, which costs \$30 annually or \$10

for a one-day visit. The pass is required for vehicle access to state recreation lands managed by Washington State Parks, the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) and the Department of Natural Resources (DNR). The Discover Pass legislation directed State Parks to designate up to 12 free days when the pass would not be required to visit state parks. The free days apply only at state parks; the Discover Pass is still required on WDFW and DNR lands.

Free days apply only to day-use access by vehicle, not overnight stays or rented facilities.

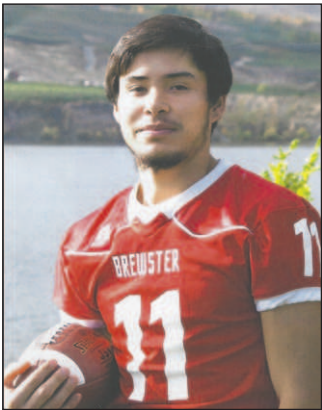

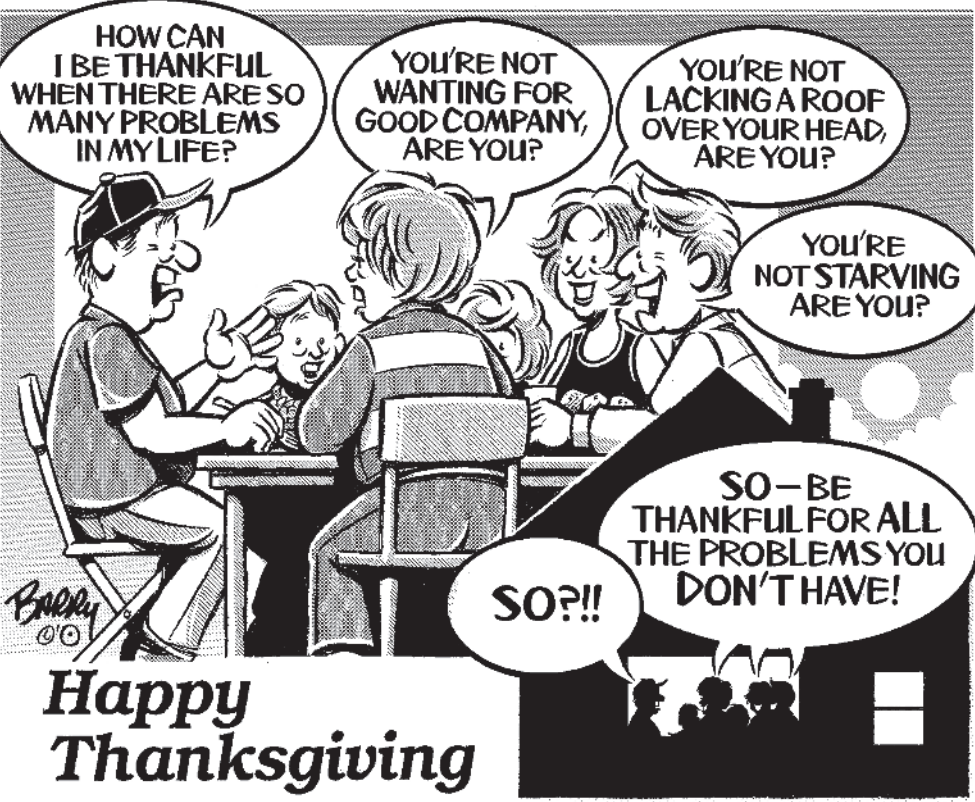
Second, I am thankful that I still have an active mind. Many friends and relatives who are of

Commercial wood decks, personal firewood available from emergency wildfires actions

CENTRAL WASHINGTON- In the large gravel parking area of the Eightmile Sno-Park north of Winthrop, logs are stacked in several piles called decks. Local District Ranger, Chris Furr, has a good idea just how much wood those decks include. After all, crews from the Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forest have spent the past several weeks measuring decks left over from emergency wild-fires suppression efforts from Naches to the Methow Valley.

“Decks and smaller wood piles are a common by-product of emergency actions of large fires,” said Furr. “In the Methow valley there will be approximately 1,900 CCF of wood offered for commercial bids with saw lengths ranging

from 16ft to more than 40ft.”

While there will be several commercial decks offered across the Forest, smaller, road-side piles may also be available for personal firewood use in the coming weeks in the Entiat and Methow Valley areas. Woodcutters are encouraged to check with the local ranger station as they purchase a permit for information on personal-use firewood locations.

“We value being good neighbors and supporting our communities,” added Furr. “This is a win-win for moving material cut during an emergency off the Forest and helping folks heat their homes or support a business.”

Forest receives \$730,000 for post-wildfire emergency efforts; 133 miles of road and trail work planned

CENTRAL WASHINGTON In the Potato Creek drainage northwest of Entiat, fall colors are popping in brilliant golds and reds on a cool November day. For most folks, this means a great fall drive or hunting season. For Forest Hydrologist Molly Hanson, this is a reminder of the time sensitive, emer-

gency road, trail, and invasive plant work that happens after uncharacteristically intense wildfires. In the central Cascades, that work is most effective if completed before the snow flies.

“We’ve identified 72 miles of trails and more than 61 miles of roads for emergency work based on the Burned Area Emergency Response Assessments,” said Hanson.

“From the Methow Valley to Naches, we’re investing in areas that have the highest risk of post-fire erosion, flooding, or debris flow.”

Key Emergency Response Efforts:

McLeod Fire: 13 miles of road/trail drainage, signage and invasive plants

Crescent Mountain Fire: 46 miles of road/trail drainage, signage and invasive plants,

campground barriers

Cougar Creek Fire: 69 miles of road/trail drainage, signage and invasive plants

Miriam Fire: 5 miles of road/trail drainage, signage and invasive plants

“We’re working in partnership with other agencies to address this year’s post-fire effects,” added Hanson. “In the long-term, increased

erosion and flooding are all the more reason to rethink how we can lower fire intensity and better live in a fire-adapted landscape into the future.”

It is important that area landowners work directly with NRCS and local conservation districts to determine appropriate actions needed to protect their property.

Even after work is completed to minimize the post-fire risks, burned areas may still pose a risk to adjacent areas from potential erosion and flooding. Residents living near burned areas should be aware of current weather conditions and forecasts. BAER information and maps are available at: centralwashingtonfirerecovery.info
