## Veterans Day ceremonies include first woman Apache helo pilot

BREWSTER – Author and motivational speaker, Shannon Huffman Polson, the first woman to fly an Apache attack helicopter in the U.S. Army, will be featured at Veterans Day ceremonies at Brewster High School at 1 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 8.

The Brewster High School Band with the combined Middle School and High School choirs, will present a musical commemoration of WWI, that will mark the 100th anniversary of its armistice on Nov. 11.

The American Legion Honor Guard from Columbia Post 97 will present the colors and a small reception for veterans will follow the estimated 45-minute ceremony.

**Pateros High School**  
Pateros High School will hold Veterans Day ceremonies starting at 8:30 a.m. Friday, Nov. 9. The High School band will play patriotic songs, and two classes will have small presentations, said Pateros principal Mike Hull, and the school ASB officers will light candles during the playing of "Taps."

"We are hoping Chuck Borg will stand and address the audience," Hull said.

The Brewster Post 97 Honor Guard will be on hand to present the colors.

The American Legion Honor Guard from Columbia Post 97 in Brewster will participate in Veterans Day observances at three of four schools in the Quad City coverage area later this week on Thursday and Friday, Nov. 8-9.

The Post 97 Honor Guard will be at Pateros High School for Veterans Day ceremonies starting at 8:30 a.m., Friday, Nov. 9.

**Bridgeport High School**  
Later on the afternoon of Nov. 9, the Post 97 Honor Guard will be at Bridgeport High School for a Veterans Day observance at 1 p.m. The High School and Middle School bands and choir will perform.

**Mansfield High School**  
Mansfield High School will hold its Veterans Day observance at 1:30 p.m., Friday, Nov. 9. A guest speaker and special quiet presentation to two veterans will be included in the ceremony.

## Marine called Mansfield home

# 'He was lost, then found, and he died a hero' -Jackie Tupling-

MANSFIELD – Dying rays from the setting sun wash over the west entrance to Mansfield High School and, through the windows there, illuminate the framed portrait of a handsome U.S. Marine, in full dress uniform that incorporates the red, white, and blue colors of the nation's flag.

Students traveling to and from the gym pass this picture of Lance Corporal Caleb John Powers posed next to his retired and framed white football jersey, emblazoned with No. 44 in large red numerals.

The sense a visitor has upon first seeing this display is a moving combination of pride mixed with sorrow because the unmistakable message is that this is a memorial. The confident gaze looking out from beneath the white dress hat confirms that the honoree is very young.

Caleb Powers graduated Mansfield High as one of a class of 11 in 2001. But you might say that, in a major way, Powers was in a class all by himself.

Following graduation, Powers joined the U.S. Marines, completed boot camp at Paris Island, S.C., was stationed at Camp Pendleton, Calif., deployed to Okinawa, Japan, and finally to Iraq with Fox Company, 2nd Battalion, 4th Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Division. With only two weeks remaining in his second tour in western Iraq, Powers was killed by a sniper's bullet while pulling guard duty in Ramadi, Al Anbar Province on August 17, 2004. He was 21 years old.

Just the facts, as a newspaper axiom says, but those who knew him want you to know that LCpl Caleb Powers is very much more than a battlefield statistic. His is a story of a youngster who overcame a

tumultuous early life from a broken home and ward of the state to fulfill his dream of becoming a Marine. Along the

way Powers paid back those who helped him by working with disadvantaged youth and children from broken homes.

One of those groups was Childhelp, (www.childhelp.org) who took Caleb in as a youngster and helped provide love and support during his pre-teen years.

Childhelp had its origins in 1959 when two young actresses, Sara O'Meara, and Yvonne Feddersen were on a goodwill tour to entertain troops in the Korean War. The two rescued some homeless orphans on the heels of a typhoon and as a result of that experience founded International Orphans to help what were termed at the time "throwaway children."

In 1978 the two women founded Children's Village USA which later became Childhelp, a nationwide nonprofit that has helped more than 10 million neglected,

## Douglas PUD breaks ground on Conklin Landing RV sites

BRIDGEPORT – Heavy equipment from Hurst Construction in Wenatchee has broken ground and begun landscaping on what will become 17 new RV spaces and other amenities at Conklin Landing west of town.

The project was conceived when Bridgeport was awarded a \$264,000 grant from the Washington State Recreation and Conservation Office (RCO) to cover the city's portion of the PUD's development costs for 10 RV sites. Mayor Janet Conklin and the city council saw an opportunity to add additional RV spaces at an affordable cost by piggybacking the additional work on the PUD contract while the equip-

ment was on site. In August 2017 the Council approved an additional \$225,000 to add seven additional RV sites to the 10 already approved.

The state Legislature's delay in passing the 2017 capital budget until January 2018 increased the original costs of the PUD contract so several amenities earmarked for the original design were eliminated, including a laundry room, picnic area, a dumpster screening wall among them.

Last August the Council approved an additional \$50,000 to cover the city's portion of the increased costs. The PUD awarded the development contract to Hurst Construction after the Wenatchee company was

abused and at-risk children. Powers was taken in by Childhelp when his biological mother, who had fled to Virginia with Caleb and his sister, Rosanna, following a divorce, signed him over as a ward of the state when he was seven.

Caleb's aunt, Jackie Tupling of Mansfield, and her sister had petitioned for custody of Caleb and Rosanna but lost track of the children when their mother moved away.

"We didn't know where they

2004, with hundreds in attendance including fellow Marines and a certain member of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. A Raise the Flag Memorial Fund paid for a flag pole that stands on the school football field in Powers' honor.

Powers' remains were interred at Arlington National Cemetery during a ceremony held on October 14, 2004. His memorial marker is in Section 60, Site 8003.

The Tuplings have established a scholarship in Caleb's name for a Mansfield graduate who wants to pursue an agriculture-related career.

"Grades are not a factor and those with learning disabilities are given preference," Jackie said.

Contributions may be made c/o the Caleb John Powers Memorial Scholarship Fund at any North Cascades Bank branch.

Every year on Halloween, the Tuplings drive Caleb's pickup to his memorial marker at Mansfield Cemetery. Caleb was born on Oct. 31, 1982.

were or what had happened," Jackie said.

Even during those dark days, Caleb did not abandon his dreams of becoming a U.S. Marine, and during his time with Childhelp, he joined the Young Marines, "a national non-profit youth education and service program for boys and girls age eight through the completion of high school," according to its website, www.youngmarines.com. Rosanna also joined the Young Marines.

While in the Young Marines, Caleb caught the attention of a future mentor, Navy Admiral William A. Owens, Vice Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff from 1994-96. Friends say Caleb flourished under Williams' guidance and they credit the Admiral with "drawing out the young boy, taking him on a special submarine tour and to the White House, among other high-profile excursions."

Caleb's real turning point came when he was 12 years old and he moved to Mansfield and the care of Jackie, husband, Mike Tupling, and daughters Mikia, Mikki, and Mishell.

"The State of Virginia was searching for living relatives because they were transitioning him out of the system," Jackie said.

In the rural beauty, honest work, and simple pleasures of life with his new family in Mansfield, Caleb thrived and one day dreamed of returning to the community and owning his own farm.

In 1999 Caleb and Mike began restoring a 1964 Ford F100 pickup, a project that was interrupted by military obligations and was finally completed by the Tupling family in 2014, 10 years after Caleb's death.

The shiny red classic, with the U.S. Marine emblem sewn into the backrest and Caleb's dog tags hanging from the mirror, has since been rolled out for special occasions like Mansfield Days, the Sun Lakes Car Show, the Chelan Memorial Day Parade, and one other solemn annual observance.

In between visits home during active duty, Powers found time to support Childhelp functions like the Childhelp Armed Forces Tribute in Beverly Hills, Calif., where he mixed with founders Fedderson and O'Meara, celebrities, and political luminaries in the cause of disadvantaged youth.

Jay Cooper, a friend and charity worker, described Powers as "our poster Marine, just an amazing young man, a fine, inspirational young man who loved life."

A 16-plus minute YouTube video posted at https://www.facebook.com/LCpl-Caleb-Powers-Young-Marines-141359516078/ includes

scenes of the Childhelp event and many more as it follows Caleb's years as a child through the last footage taken of him in August 2004. Be advised that the retrospective of this young man's brief life is a powerful tribute.

In an ironic twist of fate, Caleb's sister, Rosanna, who also served as a Marine Lance Corporal, lost her fiancé, 24-year-old Marine Sergeant Rick Lord, killed in action the day after Caleb.

The town of Mansfield held a service for Powers on Oct. 2,

# Bridgeport Elementary displays Time Capsule contents

BRIDGEPORT – Just inside the front door of Bridgeport Elementary School, the contents of a 25-year-old time capsule are on display for all to see. The capsule, buried on the site of the Mega Mansion playground when it was built in 1993, was recovered last September when the playground was being dismantled.

School Superintendent Scott Sattler was on hand as school maintenance staff dug up the section of large white PVC pipe with sealed caps on both ends. As elementary students gathered round, workmen opened the capsule and Sattler carried on a running commentary as he explained the history of the playground and held up class photos, letters, and mementos that were placed in the capsule by students who were enrolled in Bridgeport Elementary at the time the capsule was buried.

Time constraints did not allow everyone on hand for the recovery to see everything that was unearthed, so a display and photo album was assembled so that anyone who is interested can get a look at what was happening 25 years ago.

Shan Miller, manager of Sweet Ts located in the Brewster Pharmacy, spearheaded the fundraising campaign to build the playground and recalled the steps involved.

“We started a non-profit group called Bridgeport Helping Hands,” said Miller. “We worked with Leathers and Associates out of New York, a company that went all over the U.S. helping small communities with projects, particularly playgrounds.”

Leathers laid the groundwork for the Bridgeport project

and helped community volunteers organize into committees and raise funds.

Leathers can be found online at [www.playgroundbyleathers.com](http://www.playgroundbyleathers.com) and notes on its website that the company has completed more than 3,300 projects with the help of more than 3 million volunteers and more than 2 million playground ideas collected from kids.

Youngsters played an active role in designing the Mega Mansion when it was built, including coming up with the name and providing design ideas, Miller said.

“One of our committees was a Dream Committee comprised of kids,” Miller said.

One of the questions Leathers asked the youngsters was:

“If you could have a dream come true, what would you want to have on your playground?”

After a year of planning and fundraising, and four round-the-clock days of construction, Mega Mansion was done.

“Time, much of the materials, and heavy equipment was donated,” Miller said of the estimated \$40,000 it cost to build the playground that was valued at several times that amount.

During the fundraising campaign, T-shirts were made and sold to help raise money. When the project was done, Miller was presented with a special quilt made from some of the left-over shirts.

“I sleep under it every night,” Miller said.

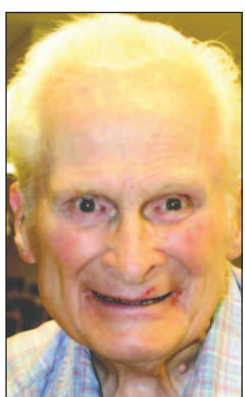

The Lady Crusaders, ranked first in the eight-team 2B Bi-County standings with a 5-1 record, mounted a strong attack to take an early 2-0 lead before closing the door on Brewster, 3-0.



**State Parks announces final free days for 2018**

*Day visits free on Veterans Day and the day after Thanksgiving*

OLYMPIA – Recreation and outdoor enthusiasts have two more opportunities to visit Washington's state parks for free in 2018. On these free days, day-use visitors will not need a Discover Pass for vehicle access.

The two free days are Sunday, Nov. 11 and Friday, Nov. 23.

Since the free days were first designated in 2011, the Washington State Parks and Recreation Commission established Nov. 11, Veterans Day, as one of its free days to honor those who served in the armed forces. Last year, the agency also set aside the day after Thanksgiving as a fall free day — to encourage people to get outside to visit a state park in autumn.

State Parks free days are in keeping with 2011 legislation that created the Discover Pass, which costs \$30 annually or \$10 for a one-day visit. The pass is

required for vehicle access to state recreation lands managed by Washington State Parks, the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) and the Department of Natural Resources (DNR). The Discover Pass legislation directed State Parks to designate up to 12 free days when the pass would not be required to visit state parks. The free days apply only at state parks; the Discover Pass is still required on WDFW and DNR lands.

Free days apply only to day-use access by vehicle, not overnight stays or rented fa-

cilities.

**About Washington State Parks**

The Washington State Parks and Recreation Commission manages more than 100 state parks and properties totaling approximately 120,000 acres. The Commission provides a variety of recreation opportunities for citizens and provides stewardship protection for a diverse array of natural, cultural and historic resources. State Parks' statewide programs include long-distance trails, boating safety and winter recreation.
