

Last-minute Brewster Salmon Derby draws more than 200 anglers

BREWSTER – When Maurice Santillants of Lynnwood dropped his line in the Brewster pool on the Columbia River last Friday morning, August 3, he did not expect that he would haul in a 34-plus-pound hatchery chinook salmon that would dwarf the King of the Pool winner in the annual Brewster King Salmon Derby. However, Santillants did not enter the Derby.

"We come over here about the same time every year," Santillants said of he and his fishing partner's annual

After boating the lunker salmon, Santillants decided to swing by the derby head-quarters to get an accurate scale weight of the catch. As derby co-organizer Randy Coles placed the king on the scales, the reaction of those present as the digital display flashed at 34.32 pounds indicated the surprise at a catch that exceeded the early leader by more than 10 pounds.

Despite a last-minute resurrection of the previously cancelled derby when the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife reopened chinook salmon season on August. 1, entries still numbered 208 fishermen including 17 in the 9-to-14-year Youth Division and 10 in the 8-and-under Child bracket. Nearly 50 sponsors including businesses, guide services, and sports outfitters signed on to support the derby.

Anglers launched a total of 81 boats and weighed in 253 salmon, 230 of those chinook and 23 sockeye during the three-day tournament run. On Friday, August 3, 86 chinook and 19 sockeye crossed the scale; Saturday saw 97 kings and two sockeye; Sunday concluded with 47 chinook and two sockeye.

Cash and prizes, not including raffles, were spread among 15 competition categories, with nine of those being side pots.

As it turned out, the nonderby entry weighed in on Friday eclipsed the eventual 27.43-pound King of the Pool SEE **SALMON** ON PAGE A3

Mauk addresses Brewster Chamber on Made in America trip to D.C.

BREWSTER – Fishing tackle maker, Mike Mauk, owner of Mauk Fishing Stuff, was the guest speaker at the annual meeting of the Brewster Chamber of Commerce last Wednesday, August 1. Mauk, fresh from his trip to Washington, D.C., on July 23, where he participated in the Made in America Product Showcase at the White House, addressed chamber members about his experience.

Mauk, the Chamber secretary, said he thought he was being pranked when a White House liaison first called him on July 1 and invited him to come to the nation's capital. Mauk said that after the caller convinced him the offer was legitimate, he was told he had just 48 hours to accept the invitation to be the representative for American-made manufacturers from Washington state.

Mauk told the Chamber of his disbelief at being chosen but later learned that through his advertising or product use, a selection staff member was familiar with his tackle covers. He added that the selection committee performed its due diligence about him and his

company to determine if both would be a good fit for the showcase.

"And there I was, a one-man operation among Lockheed Martin, NASA, and some companies that had 1,500 employees," said Mauk with some amazement.

"But you represent the start of a company that can grow to 1,500 employees," chamber member Avis Erickson reminded him



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

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

Vic Baker to speak at Erratics Chapter

WENATCHEE - Wenatchee Valley Erratics Chapter of the Ice Age Floods Institute will meet at 7:00 p.m., Tuesday, August 14 at the Wenatchee Valley Museum, 127 South Mission, Wenatchee. Vic Baker, Professor of Planetary and Geosciences, U. of Arizona, and long-time Friend of the Erratics, will discuss "Ice-Age Flood Controversies: Past and Present." Catastrophic flooding has invoked controversy ever since the beginning of geological sciences. Disputes

concerning the mega-flood origins of eastern Washington's Channeled Scabland began a century ago with research by J. Harlen Bretz (1882-1981) and Joseph Thomas Pardee (1871-1960). Debate has continued over the 50 years that Dr. Baker has been studying the area. This talk will provide an update on recent discoveries, with some reflections on both the past and future science of catastrophic floods.

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



Cooney went ahead and presented Steele with the City Champion Award "for his advocacy when it comes to local control of the public rights of way."


As the attendees applauded Steele, he thanked them for being there for him that evening. Steele felt humble and honored in receiving the award.

I for one am willing to pay a little more for American made products where higher wages to American workers can flow through the American



In response to requests from stakeholders, including specific inquiries from Congressman Dan Newhouse, the two bureaus are taking

Newhouse, Cuellar H-2A Amendment included in Homeland Security Appropriations Bill

Bipartisan amendment applies Ag guest worker program to all agriculture

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Rep. Dan Newhouse (R-WA) and Rep. Henry Cuellar (D-TX) released the following statements after the House Com-

mittee on Appropriations approved an amendment they offered to the Fiscal Year 2019 Homeland Security Appropriations Act. The legislation provides for critical programs such as border and immigration enforcement, customs activities, protection against cyberterrorism, aviation security, natural disaster response, border security, and temporary guest-workers. Rep. Newhouse and Rep. Cuellar's bipartisan amendment applies the H-2A program to all of agriculture, and it was adopted

by unanimous voice vote:

'Farmers facing a shortage of agriculture labor have not been well-served by the current H-2A program," said Rep. Newhouse. "Modern agriculture demands modernization of the bureaucratic H-2A program, and as farming methods have become less seasonal or able to produce multiple harvests, the H-2A program must be updated to meet the needs of the agriculture industry. I am grateful to my colleague Rep. Cuellar for working with me on a bipartisan solution to

make H-2A more workable for farmers."

"Today, large segments of American agriculture face a critical lack of workers," said Congressman Cuellar. "This amendment is simple it provides the agriculture industry with the access to workers it needs by making clear that all agriculture may utilize H-2A. The reality is that the H-2A program is not working for the entirety of the American agriculture industry. In fact, it excludes non-seasonal agricultural

sectors, such as dairy farming, and puts them at a disadvantage. This amendment will clear the path for our farmers and ranchers to gain access to much needed workers that will benefit the local economy in my district and across the country. I would like to thank Rep. Newhouse for working with me in a bipartisan manner to address this issue."

Newhouse/Cuellar H-2A Amendment Summary: Rep. Newhouse and Rep. Cuellar's amendment clarifies that for FY2019 all of agriculture may use the H-2A

H-2A would still remain a temporary program. Additionally, the amendment would not change the time limits a worker employed through the H-2A program can stay in the U.S., and it would maintain the requirement that farmers show they are advertising open positions and are trying to hire domestic workers first. The amendment would simply ensure that all of agriculture is able to utilize the program. The agriculture industry's labor situation has been a concern for many years and currently large segments of American agriculture face a critical shortage of workers. This shortfall is exacerbated by the fact that the H-2A program is not working for all of agriculture, such as dairies and agriculture operations with multiple crops and harvests.




