Mauk Fishing Stuff makes its mark at White House Made in America celebration

BREWSTER – Mike and Ernie Mauk, of Mauk Fishing Stuff, enjoyed an experience of a lifetime while representing Washington state manufacturers at the second annual Made in America gathering at the White House last Monday, July 23. In a series of events that could plausibly be labelled “The Little Company That Could,” founder Mike Mauk, and his mother, Anna Marie, began designing his tackle protector/organizer covers and sleeves in 2005.

Mauk said he was looking for a way to keep his own lures and tackle organized and protected and came up with the idea for vinyl covers edged with Velcro to wrap around loose lures and flashers and secure them to fishing rods. He got helpful tips from other fishermen and guides regarding specific materials and sizes they could use and by the time President Trump's assistant called last July 1, Mauk had some 80 styles and sizes of sleeves to handle most tackle.

With the slogan, “We Have Your Tackle Covered,” Mauk Fishing Stuff had found a niche market. Still, with a mostly one-man, home-based operation since his mother passed away in 2015, Mauk wasn't expecting to receive an invitation to be Washington state's only representative to the Made in America Product Showcase.

Ernie, three years Mike's senior, helps out his brother at product shows as does sister Melinda Farmer in Ephrata.

President Trump initiated the Made in American Product Showcase and Made in America Week in 2017. The first Washington state manu-

facturer invited to participate last year was Liberty Bottleworks, a water bottle maker from Union Gap.

The trip back to the nation's capital went off without a hitch, said Mauk. The two brothers flew to the East coast Sunday evening, July 22, landed at Ronald Reagan Washington National Airport, grabbed a cab to the three-star Hyatt Centric Hotel in Arlington, VA, and were ready for the show the following morning.

Following the mandatory security searches, the pair was issued badges and assigned an escort that provided a guided tour of the White House. The Showcase ran from 10 a.m. through 4 p.m.

Resurrected Brewster King Salmon Derby launches Thursday, August 3

BREWSTER – The 13th annual Brewster Salmon Derby that was cancelled on the heels of the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife chinook salmon season closure earlier in July, got a last-minute resurrection when a reevaluation of counts prompted WDFW to reopen the season effective August 1.

Derby organizers Randy Coles and Lori Kratzer scrambled to revive sponsors and get affairs in order in time for the 6 p.m. skippers meeting on Thursday evening, August 2. The Derby begins Friday morning, August 3, and ends Sunday, August 5.

In addition to the prospect of landing that are expected to average around 15-20 pounds, entrants will compete for cash and prizes including the grand prize King of the Pool, \$2,000 jackpot. The adult derby winner will pocket \$1,500; \$550 will go to the Youth winner between ages 9 and 14, and the 8 and under top prize is \$100. The Kid's Sockeye winner will get \$250.

Cash prizes will also be awarded to the top 10 finishers in the Adult Division, the top 10 in the Youth Division, and the top five in the Child's Division. Raffles and prizes will be part of the festivities all weekend.

IRIS to host NCW Community Success Summit in Pateros August 15

PATEROS – The ninth annual North Central Washington Community Success Summit that will be hosted at Pateros by the Initiative for Rural Innovation and Stewardship (IRIS) is still more than three months away on Nov. 15. However, the deadline for the success stories that the gathering wants to showcase is fast approaching on August 15.

The IRIS summit under the banner “Pateros Strong,” will convene from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. in the Pateros school gym.

A media release from IRIS said that summit planners want to highlight some of the

stories that brought Pateros and other parts of the region together following the 2014 Carlton Complex wildfire.

“IRIS is gathering success stories that contribute to the kind of community we want to live in,” the release noted, “one that maintains diverse, healthy ecosystems, fosters a high quality of life for all, and bridges the cultural and political divides.”

IRIS staffers did record some stories at a history potluck gathering at the Pateros Museum last May.

Stories are wanted from Okanogan, Douglas, Chelan, and Grant counties and contributors can visit www.irisnew.org to download a Success Story Exchange

form for submission by mid-August.

“We are thrilled to work with Pateros to host the Summit this year,” said IRIS Board President Brooklyn Holton, “and to learn more about how they have strengthened their whole community that stretches south to Wells Dan and west to Carlton.”

Pateros Mayor Carlene Anders said that while a growing dependence on technology can cause people to lose touch with each other, “We can sit together at the summit and hear those stories of success that can improve our communities and are important from an economic, environmental, and even spiritual perspective.”

An advisory committee and the Pateros school district is working with IRIS to plan some elements of the summit from logo design to food, entertainment, and sponsors.

Planners anticipate that some 180 people from Pateros and the surrounding region will participate in the summit that will also serve as a fundraiser to allow IRIS to continue operations through 2020 and beyond.

Watercross racing returns to Deep Bay Park

OROVILLE—Some of North America’s fastest racers will hit the water Friday, Saturday and Sunday, August 3, 4 and 5 as high-speed watercraft racing returns to Deep Bay Park for the annual Lake Osoyoos Cup.

The action kicks off Friday with registration and tuning and testing. Course setup is expected to be completed shortly after lunch, with registration from 1-4 p.m. Tuning and testing on the course will be open from 4-7 p.m.

Registration reopens at 8 a.m. Saturday, with practice set for 9 a.m. Racing is scheduled for 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday and Sunday. Awards follow Sunday racing.

During racing activities, the boat launch in Deep Bay Park will be closed to the public, Harnack said, noting boaters will still be able to access other launches on the lake.

“We’re looking forward to a good turnout,” Northwest Jet Sports Association promoter Roger Harnack said. “We’ll have racers from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and British Columbia.”

There are classes for everyone from beginner to professional, standups and runabouts, and men and women, Harnack said. Children ages 10 and older are also expected to compete.

“Locals can get in on the action, too,” Harnack said, noting the Northwest Jet Sports Association is open to

anyone who has a Jet Ski or just enjoys the water. “Anyone wanting to race can come learn from the best the region has to offer.”

There are even vintage classes.

“So, dust off the ski in your garage and come on out,” Harnack said, noting would-be racers can learn more about the sport online at www.ijbsa.com.

Lauretta Morey of Morey 3D Printing in Oroville has designed special weekend awards for racers and will be set up at the races to show other printing opportunities.

But there will be more going on in Oroville this coming weekend than just racing.

Adjacent to the Deep Bay Park race site, the Oroville

Chamber of Commerce will be hosting a beer garden, food court, and more vendors.

And nearby, the annual Tumbleweed Film Festival will be taking place.

“On Friday and Saturday, take in a film at Esther Briques winery,” chamber spokeswoman Karen Frisbie said.

One international film airs each night at 7 p.m. at the winery, 42 Swanson Mill Road.

Additionally, the weekly Farmers Market will be hosting Trail Days, she said.

“Our goal is to get people out and enjoying all Oroville has to offer,” Frisbie said, noting the parks have been filled with families enjoying our lake and grounds. “Come on out and support the city, community and our local businesses.”

Walters names new North Central Regional Libraries Director

WENATCHEE – The North Central Regional Library Board made it official on Friday, July 13, when they appointed NCRL acting director Barbara Walters as the next Executive Director of the library district. being Candalaria Mendoza of San Antonio, Texas, and Laurel Prysiazny of Fresno, CA.

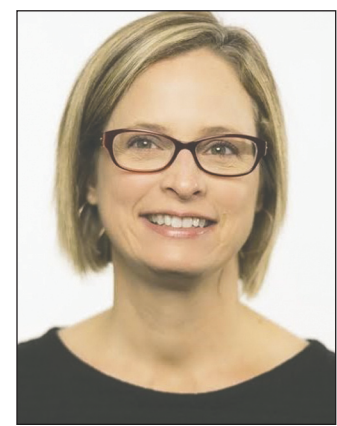

Rossi wants to be Reichert's replacement as our Congressman

NCW Media Managing Editor Gary Bégin reached out to Republican candidate for the 8th Congressional District Dino Rossi and posed a few questions to him. What follows are his answers:

Wenatchee Business Journal: Why do you want to be the 8th District Congressman?

Dino Rossi: I'm running for Congress because D.C. is broken and doesn't seem to remember how to work together to solve problems. I have a proven record of building coalitions and bridges with people from all walks of life. In the state legislature, I balanced budgets and prevented tax increases, all while protecting seniors and people with developmental disabilities or mental illnesses. I passed bipartisan laws cracking down on drunk drivers and laws sending child molesters to prison for life after their second strike.

Where others bring theo-

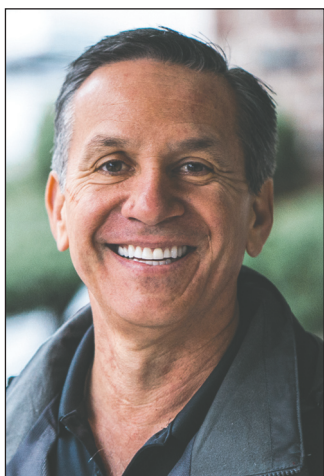
ries, I bring results and proof built by my work across party lines bringing people together. I am proud to be the only candidate in the race with a proven track record of accomplishing bipartisan solutions and solving problems, and I think Congress could use more of that. After all, don't you think we have enough people in D.C. yelling at each other?

WBJ: Tell the readers why your legislative experience in Washington will help you as a legislator in D.C.?

Rossi: I am the only candidate in this race with experience working as a legislator to bring people together and pass meaningful bills into law. As a State Senator, I passed bills that made our communities safer from drunk drivers, hit-and-run drivers, and child predators. I intend to bring that same focus on our communities to Congress.

WBJ: What is your general stance on immigration?

Rossi: Our immigration system is broken. We must pass legislation to accomplish the following goals:

1. Secure our borders. We need to know who is coming into and exiting our country, and be able to screen out threats.
2. Streamline the process for legal immigration. At the root of most of our current immigration problems is the fact that it's too easy to come here illegally and too inefficient and frustrating for those who want to arrive legally.
3. Provide certainty for those here under DACA. Deporting hundreds of thousands of

people to a country that they may have never known and left when they were young is not logical.

4. Clarify that the U.S. should absolutely not be separating parents from their children. We should not return to the "catch and release" policy that was previously in effect.

WBJ: Tell the readers why they should vote for you?

Rossi: I am the only candidate in this race who has actually worked with both sides to solve problems for our citizens. When I served in the Washington State Senate, I brought people of all walks of life together to solve problems. I have a wide range of interests and expertise. In the Washington State Senate, I brought people together to close an enormous budget deficit without raising taxes, while still protecting the vulnerable. I also passed legislation to put child molesters in prison for life after their second strike and the first law to require ignition locks in the cars of chronic DUI offenders. I sponsored the bill to fully fund our State Park system and have the strong

support of the Washington State Farm Bureau as well as local farm leaders.

I'm running for Congress because Washington, D.C. is broken, and I believe I have the skills to contribute solutions. None of my opponents have this experience, and everything they say they'll do is unproven theory. Everything I've done is a proven record of solving problems in a cooperative way, while sticking to my principles.

WBJ: Are tariffs against other nations okay with you?

Rossi: I believe that free trade allows us to bring the success of a free market approach to areas that might otherwise be inflicted by poverty and despair. Free trade is important to Washington State and to the 8th Congressional District. I am strongly opposed to excessive tariffs and will work within my party and with those in good faith on the other side of the aisle to ensure that trade relationships with our allies are strengthened.

The last thing I want to see

is Washington farmers and businesses get caught in the middle of a trade war. Tariff battles hurt all of us -- lost profits for employers, lost jobs for workers, and higher prices for consumers. I will work to remove trade barriers and push to keep healthy and fair trading relationships with our allies.

WBJ: What are your hobbies, passions, family, education, etc.

Rossi: I grew up in Snohomish County in a large family. As the son of a public schoolteacher and beautician, I want every family to live the American Dream like my family was able to. My grandparents worked their way across the country until they settled in Black Diamond, Washington where my grandfather worked as a coal miner. I worked my way through college with jobs in construction and as a janitor, scrubbing floors to be able to pay for college. Later, I became successful in commercial real estate, where I learned to work constructively with others to fix problems and help everyone succeed.
