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Suspect shoots mother, turns weapon on himself

Compiled from a report from Okanogan County Sheriff Frank Rogers

BREWSTER – Brewster police and Okanogan County Sheriff's deputies responded to a shooting and apparent suicide on North Star Road at about 10 a.m. last Sunday, March 18.

Law enforcement units were dispatched to the scene after receiving a report of a 19-year-old male with a gun. While en route to the address officers received a second call advising that a female had been shot.

"When officers arrived at the scene they learned that the female victim had left the residence and the suspect was still in the residence," wrote Okanogan County Sheriff Frank Rogers in a media release.

As officers entered the residence the found the suspect had sustained a self-inflicted gunshot wound to the head.

Once was residence was cleared and secured, deputies investigating the scene determined that the suspect, Mike Aguirre-Bobadilla, 19, of Brewster, had been at his residence with his mother, Ernestina Aguirre-Bobadilla, 41, and a 10-year-old sister, Rogers wrote.

BREWSTER - The Brewster Chamber of Commerce held their Awards Luncheon on March 15 at Los Camparos Restaurant in Brewster, with awards presented for Citizen of the Year, Large Business of the Year, and Small Business of the Year. Chamber members along with family members attended the event.

Brewster Chamber president Anna Marie Dalbey presented the awards assisted by Martin Hurtado vice-president of the chamber.

Small Business of the Year Small Business of the Year went to Sweet T's, owned and operated by Shan Miller. Miller, who has spent her life in the community, graduated from Bridgeport High School, raised her children and helps her husband around their cattle ranch.

Large Business of the year went to Gebbers Farms, and was accepted by Bob Grandy, Public Relations Manager for Gebbers Farms. In speaking about Gebbers, Dalbey said, "100% family owned and managed since Dan Gamble planted their first orchard in 1910, incorporating Gamble Lumber, a sawmill and an apple packing shed. Chamber requests Council approval for mid-June Cherries Jubilee

BREWSTER – Officers and members of the Brewster Chamber of Commerce paid a call on city council members at their regular monthly meeting last Wednesday, March 14, to request the city's blessing for the first annual Cherries Jubilee celebration later this summer.

Chamber president Anna Marie Dalbey spoke on behalf of the Chamber.

"Pateros has Apple Pie Jamboree; we want Cherries Jubilee for Brewster," began Dalbey. She added that while volunteers had lined up many preliminary commitments for the event including a car show, 3K run, entertainment and contests the Chamber "but we're not going to act formally until we get the blessing of our city."

Dalbey said that among the elements of the festival, planners wanted to include vendors, theme t-shirts, logo contest, a Mayor's Award for the car show and parade with a show 'n shine so car entrants can strut their vehicles. Specifically, the city was also requesting the city's concurrence to block off the area of Main street between Fifth and Seventh for car show parking

Dalbey specified June 16, the day before Father's Day, as the event date to avoid conflict with other area observances

Council member John Housden, staying on the cherries theme, suggested a cherryseed-spitting contest as another contest consideration.

In other business, The Armory co-owner Martin Hurtado asked the council for permission to use a portion of their building for community fundraiser events and cited a Brewster athlete who is trying to raise money to compete in national competition.

Hurtado and his brother, Manny, are working to complete a restaurant in part of the building have walled off another portion and added

bathrooms to conform with code requirements. Some work remains including installation of a sprinkler system.

After conferring with the county building inspector Martin was advised to take his request before the council to see what could be worked out to use the space for community events during the interim.

Council members had reservations about non-conforming use and upon advice of counsel advised Hurtado to gather more information regarding use specifications and return to discuss the issue when more detail was available.

Brewster city clerk/treasurer Misty Ruiz reported that the reservoir renovation project will be completed by May 10. That should result in a reimbursement from the state in the amount of \$335,219. The city also recently received \$100,000 in reimbursement funds for work on the airport runway lighting.

Public works director Lee Webster addressed competitive bids to replace one of four heat pumps at the Brewster Rec Center. Cascade Mechanical was the lower bidder and was awarded the contract by unanimous vote.

was acting strangely and then went and got a gun from inside the residence," wrote Rogers. "Mike Aguirre-Bobadilla then shot his mother, striking her in the mouth area. Ernestina Aguirre-Bobadilla was able to get her 10-year-old daughter and run from the residence to a neighbor's house to get help."

Mike Aguirre-Bobadilla remained in the residence.

When deputies entered they found the suspect with a selfinflicted gunshot wound. He was transported to Three Rivers Hospital where he died from his wounds.

Driver takes a shortcut to end all shortcuts

PALISADES - On Tuesday, March 13, a commuter let's call him 37 Ephrata Man (37EM) – decided he'd try a new off-the-grid, so to speak, alternate from Leavenworth to his home in Ephrata. The standard route via U.S. 2 and State Route 28 is just over 72 miles and takes about 2.5 hours. So far so good.

But there are shortcuts. One is Douglas Creek Road via Palisades that bypasses Quincy as a (theoretically) faster, more direct way home,

right? That might be the case if the Douglas Creek Road was in drivable condition, which it was not, according to a report from the Douglas County Sheriff Harvey Gjesdal.

DC deputies responded to a call at about 8 a.m. Wednesday, March 14, to investigate a reported injury accident near Palisades. Deputies found 37EM at a residence at the base of Douglas Creek grade. "He told investigators that on (the day previous) he was on his way to his home in Ephrata from Leavenworth," wrote Gjesdal. "He thought Douglas Creek would allow him to bypass Quincy.'

Douglas Creek is washed out and impassable and has been so for years, Gjesdal's report said.

37EM "got off the road and began slipping down a side hill," wrote Gjesdal. "His vehicle stopped inches from dropping off a cliff into a ravine.'

37EM safely exited his vehicle but since he was out of communication range in the canyon, he found a cave to shelter in through the night. 37EM reported to deputies that during the night, "coyotes were tugging on his feet and took one of his shoes."

At sunrise, 37EM walked to a residence at the bottom of the canyon where he was able to call for help. He was transported to Confluence Hospital for treatment of exposure, wrote Gjesdal. "His current condition is unknown."

Gjesdal reminds drivers that North Central Washington "has many remote areas with dubious access and spotty cell service."

"Please know where you are going," advised Gjesdal. "Carry a basic survival kit in your vehicle in case you are forced to spend the night."

And throw in an extra pair of shoes for the coyotes.

New playground wins city council approval

BREWSTER - A new playground, that will be located in the field north of the Brewster Boys and Girls Club, received funding and construction approval from the city council at its regular monthly meeting last Wednesday, March 14. The estimated \$38,800 installation has been a pet project of council member Avis Erickson who has promoted the new playground and solicited donors to replace old equipment on the site. Public Works Director Lee Webster said the new footprint for the playground area will measure 100 feet by 50 feet and will include a concrete border filled with wood chips. Most or all of the chips are left over from tree pruning and chipping from last fall when Kile Tree Service from Wenatchee limbed a more than a dozen trees along with two London Planes that were later carved into park sculptures.

As to when the work actually begins on the new playground is another matter. Webster said public works personnel are already committed to completing several projects including the RV park electrical upgrades that take precedence over new work. Honoring Washingtonians during Women's History Month

More than 36 years ago, three women in Central Washington pioneered their vision of serving their community through improving access to higher education opportunities for students who society may not have considered college-bound. Martha Yallup and Violet Lumely Rau of the Yakama Nation, and Sister Kathleen Ross of Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus, came together to found what would become Heritage University in the Yakima Valley. Their



determined efforts continue to bear fruit in Central Washington communities and in the lives of graduates.

Decades ago, Fort Wright College, the predecessor of Heritage University, planned

to shutter its regional Yakima Valley location due to financial challenges and low enrollment. These three women understood that without a college with a mission to reach them, many students in the community would lose the chance to pursue a four-year degree. Yallup and Lumely Rau had worked together at the Yakama Nation's Head Start Program. They joined efforts with Sister Kathleen Ross and worked to overcome many obstacles to found

and operate what was then called Heritage College in 1982. Despite the odds they faced, they have proven to be advocates for present and future Heritage students by striving to keep the doors of the college open.

Over the years, and under strong leadership, Heritage has grown to become "the University of the Valley." Heritage now offers more than 50 undergraduate and graduate majors. Many in the Heritage student body come from families below the poverty line, and most students are the first in their families to pursue higher education. Heritage has proven to be fertile ground for these students and has so far graduated an astounding 9,000 students. That total represents an amazing contribution not only to our community, but to the longterm future of these young people and their professional and personal enrichment.

Sister Kathleen Ross served as the first college president and has received the prestigious MacArthur Fellowship "genius grant."

Violet Lumley Rau sadly passed away in 1994, but her legacy of strong advocacy on behalf of Heritage lives on.

March is Women's History Month, and the pioneering example of Martha Yallup, Violet Lumely Rau, and Sister Kathleen Ross stands out. Central Washington can be proud of these incredible women and acknowledge their contributions that have overcome barriers and enriched so many lives.
