BREWSTER - The New Start Clinic, a treatment facility that is the first of its kind in this area, opened for business in the Brewster Medical Center building at 520 W. Indian Avenue, last October. New Start "is a medically supervised outpatient addiction recovery program that is committed to helping people fight opiate addiction with little or no withdrawl symptoms," said its Chief of Operations, Nicole Smith said.

income survey for water project BREWSTER – The City of Brewster is looking for funding and grants to help finance the upgrade and improvements to the city's potable water and wastewater systems. As part of that effort the city is reaching out to its customers with a household income survey to help determine the average income level of residents. That information could help with the application process where such qualifications as low income play a role in determining funding eligibility

With funding assistance from the Department of Health, the city has contracted with the Rural Community Assistance Corporation (RCAC) a non-profit, impartial third party to conduct the survey. RCAC will mail an income survey letter and form with return postage-paid envelope to every Brewster household. Residents are urged to provide the requested information and return to RCAC.

City of Pateros proposes Triangle Property Development project

PATEROS – City council members heard a preliminary proposal for development of a long finger of land called the Triangle Property from City Administrator Jord Wilson at their monthly meeting on Dec. 18. The **Triangle Property extends** from S. Dawson Street east between E. Industrial Way

and the railroad tracks.

"I've included some of my thoughts on moving forward with development of the Triangle Property," Jordan told council members.

Elements of the proposed development include landscaping, expansion room for the Recycle Center, a Public Works Yard, County Sand Storage, Bulk Water Fill Station, and future Rail Loading Facility.

The Recycle Center would remain in its present location but include space for future expansion consideration.

A landscape buffer would front the Public Works Yard along E. Industrial Way and include a street equipment barn for snow equipment, material bins for gravel, sand and asphalt, security fencing, electrical facilities for lighting and equipment charging, a frost-free hydrant, optional sand storage and storage for park equipment.

The sand storage would accommodate sand shared by the city and county for winter use.

The bulk water station would be relocated from its present site at Ives Landing Park.

Bridgeport 'plugs-in' with new vehicle charging station

BRIDGEPORT – Electric cars will soon be a more frequent sight in Bridgeport thanks to a new car charging station that is nearing completion in Bouska Square in the city's downtown core.

The new station is a cooperative effort between the City of Bridgeport, the North Central Washington Economic Development District (NCWEDD) and its affiliate, Plug-in North Central Washington. Completion of the station will add Bridgeport to a network of outlets that will allow drivers access to power along State Route 17 and SR 174. Other stations are located in Pateros, Grand Coulee, Wilbur and Davenport.

Pilot during World War II with the 513th Squadron, 376th Bomb Group. Stationed in Benghazi, Libya, the 376th flew missions over the Mediterranean Sea to strategic targets in Southern Europe. His combat tour finished with 33 missions and 305 combat hours. Jack was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross with Cluster, seven Air Medals, 2 Presidential Unit Citations and five Battle Stars. After returning from combat in 1943, Major Jack Goehry was assigned as a B-24 Flight Instructor where he met and married Betti Lou Schram. He returned to Brewster, Wash. where he worked as a car salesman for the family business.

During the floods of 1948, he

flew a 2 seater Cessna into the Methow Valley landing wherever possible to deliver supplies and transport the injured. During the Korean War, Jack was called back into service and was stationed in Bermuda as a hurricane hunter for the U.S. Air Force. Jack married Elinor (Peg) Clinton, the love of his life, in 1957.

In 1965, Jack and Peg moved from Brewster into their newly built home on Lake Chelan where Jack enjoyed riding his snowmobiles on the beach, spending time with family and friends on the porch and growing the best tomatoes known to mankind.
