# Fire damages six units at Vista Park Homes apartment complex

BREWSTER-A multi-alarm fire damaged at least six apartments in the 13-building, 25unit Vista Park Homes housing complex at 509 S. Fourth Street in Brewster on Wednesday evening, July 12.

Before the blaze was contained, units from Bridgeport, Pateros, Malott, Okanogan, Methow and Omak joined Brewster fire teams to keep the flames from spreading to more units in the Vista Park complex.

More than dozen occupants were displaced by the smoke and flames and many found refuge in a Red Cross shelter set up at Brewster High School.

A media release from the Brewster Police Lieutenant, Kelly Hook said that the fire broke out at 6:53 p.m. Brewster Police Department officer Michael Robbins and Douglas County Sheriff's Deputy, Rory Williams "arrived and found the fire spreading through the shrubs lining the fence line on the southwest corner of the complex," Hook

As the fire spread, Robbins and Williams began knocking on doors advising residents

Arson suspected

"Witnesses said the fire was started by someone burning a small pile of garbage near the little league concession stand which was also damaged in the fire," Hook wrote.

The Washington State Patrol, Douglas County Sheriff's Office, Brewster Police Department and Brewster Public Works blocked off streets to control traffic while the fire was being contained. The flames

were confined to just two buildings of the complex involving six residential units but others sustained smoke damage.

Several firefighters suffered from smoke inhalation or exhaustion caused by the heavy smoke and intense heat, but no injuries to any Vista Park occupants were reported.

"Authorities are currently following leads in their continuing investigation," Hook

# Canyon Creek Fire remains active, evacuation alerts remain

PATEROS - A wildfire, now called the Canyon Creek Fire, that began just after noon on Saturday, July 15, along State Route 153 about a mile north of Carlton burned some 300 acres and prompted evacuation alerts for residents in the surrounding

According to the Okanogan County Emergency Management's Facebook website, Level 3 (Evacuate Now) evacuation orders were issued for residents living from Carlton north to Benson Creek and east up Texas Creek. A Level 2 evacuation

alert (Be Prepared to Evacuate) was issued to those living from Benson Creek to Lower Beaver Creek.

By 9 p.m. Saturday evening the fire had grown to an estimated 1,000 acres and state mobilization of fire resources had been ordered, the OCEM website said.

The alarm sounded at the Douglas Okanogan Fire District 15 fire hall at 12:41 p.m., Saturday, July 15, right in the middle of the city's biggest three-day celebration of the year - the Apple Pie Jamboree. A water tender was dispatched from Pateros to assist crews from the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) who were first on the scene from Twisp.

A source on scene with the DNR crew said they were just sitting down to lunch in Twisp when the dispatch call came

A helicopter with a water bucket was on the scene early and an AT-802F Fire Boss amphibious scooper air tanker was seen skimming Lake Pateros to assist with water air drops. A power pole was toppled

by the flames before the fire jumped to the west side of the highway. The fire later crossed the Methow River and continued to burn for more than two SEE FIRE ON PAGE 3



miles north and east.

The Okanogan County Public Utility District cut power temporarily from Twisp to Libby Creek owing to burning power poles and downed lines.

A burned area on the immediate east side of State Route 153 was taped off for later investigation as the potential ignition site.

As of this writing, Sunday morning, July 16, the Canyon Creek fire is still active, according to OCEM updates. Level 3 and Level 2 evacuations remain in place

and State Route 153 remains closed at the intersection of the Twisp-Carlton Road just south of Carlton and at Lower Beaver Creek Road.

Red Cross evacuation shelters have been established at the Twisp Community Center and Brewster High School

The Canyon Creek Fire comes almost three years to the day after the Carlton Complex Fire, that started from lightning strikes on July 14, 2014, burned more than 250,000 acres before it was contained.

# A grace discovered

"Grace does not require tolerance to create a path for healing. Grace looks past the intolerable to find the humanity, and establish the divine."

An old VHS Video on the thrift store shelf caught my attention. It was Highlander, a show my wife and I loved when it was a television series. As usual, this blast from my past had fizzled with time. Although filled with entertaining action, the premise of a violently gained immortality had lost its previous sense of wonder. I would rather have the one thing that was almost completely lacking in this movie... grace.

"For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith..." Ephesians 2:8

I heard a story about a group of scholars who were debating the challenging question of what made the Christian faith unique. A virgin birth? God becoming man? No. Every suggestion served up could be shot down by one of the learned men as being found in the world's multitude of religions. Told, upon entering the room, the topic of discussion, C.S. Lewis answered simply," Grace!"

It is that very essential element of the Christian faith that makes the whole thing beyond the grasp of many. Grace is outside of the nature of man and is in fact, so uniquely God's creation that even the angels are fascinated to see it in action between God and man (1 Peter 1:12). It challenges the theory of evolving man and survival of the fittest and self-preservation. Receiving what you have not and cannot earn makes no sense except in divine purpose. That God can and does give what only He can give, makes His salvation a treasure for certain.

God is counting on the fact that having received such a gift, we will want to tell others and treat others as we have been treated. This is not a requirement. It is a test of our own faith. Grace should not sit. idle in the heart. According to Jesus, if you have received it, it should flow from you, and in like quantity. The parable of Matthew 18 tells of a servant who, after receiving unbelievable grace, did not pass along grace to his co-worker. Under the law, grace was revoked from the ungracious. In the teaching of the Apostles Paul and John we find it clearly said that the evidence we are

saved by grace is that we extend grace. The Apostle Paul declared himself chief among sinners and so great was the grace of God to Him that he reached out to his persecutors to share the same Good News of God's Grace.

In Phillip Yancey's book, "What's So Amazing About Grace", he says trying to explain grace is like dissecting a frog. You may open up its innards, but it dies in the process. Yancey further explains, "God's grace is not a grandfatherly display of 'niceness', for it cost the exorbitant price of Calvary." An opinion exists among certain theologians that the most profound thing ever written on the Christian faith is a little kid's verse that goes, "Jesus loves me this I know". Brennan Manning believes the only thing God will ask when you stand before Him is, "Did you believe that I loved you?" The acceptance of that speculative statement stems from the realization that God took your sin and mine. There is no explanation for grace except the Love of God. Just as with grace that love exists outside human understanding.

In studying the Scriptures about salvation, I have grown to understand why people want to think they have earned it; because the prospect of owing such a great debt as saving grace is frightening. We will spend an eternity with the Master of our salvation and never understand the engineering that went into the justification and rebirth of fallen man.

Spending too much time with grace under the clinical microscope could actually make it less lovely. Except that, by the grace of God, His plan of salvation is such that it cannot be altered by the foolishness of man.

Many have examined God's grace only to conclude that something is required of us to accomplish its effect of forgiveness in us. Romans 6:23 and Ephesians 2:8 both declare salvation a gift; which a gift, by definition, cannot be earned. After all my research, I doubt I had any part in my own salvation at all except to be the recipient of it. Add to the gift of Grace the fact that our faith too must be credited to Jesus, who authors and perfects it, and brings it to being by His word; and salvation by grace through faith is simply a miraculous work of God, gifted to those of

# Numbers schmumbers

Laura Ingraham asked a Republican an interesting question last week. She pointed out that Republicans always try to appeal to voters with numbers and logic while Democrats always try to make their appeal based on emotion.

Democrats, for example, drag out the story of some individual with a horrible disease or other problem they cannot get help for without a government program. They never quantify how prevalent their selected anecdote is in the general population or how much their program will cost.

They tug at your heartstrings but never mention the impact on your wallet.

Ingraham's question was when are Republicans going to learn to change their messaging to appeal to the hearts of voters. Of course the problem with that is how do we get Americans to recognize we cannot spend our way to prosperity.

Mention budgets and numbers and most people's eyes begin to glaze over. But the reality is we cannot ignore our common problem. There just is not enough money to fix all of the world's problems tomorrow. Just like our personal budget, we must prioritize and manage our national budget.

Regardless of political party our government has been notoriously bad at managing the budget. The reality is that spending is out of control. It has been out of control for decades and our national debt continues to grow with no plan in place to reduce it.

Currently, our national debt is about \$20 trillion. If you

find it difficult to grasp that number that is approximately \$160,000 for every household in America.

Congress is currently debating about when and if they should raise the "debt ceiling." The debt ceiling is an artificial limit on how much the government can borrow to support its profligate spending. If the government cannot borrow any more money then it has to start defaulting on paying its bills.

What bills will it stop paying first? Will it quit paying on the notes they issued to individuals? Will it stop making payments to social security recipients? Will it stop paying medical providers for their Medicare and Medicaid patients? Will they shut down all of the National Parks and Monuments? Will they lay off Federal employees?

The reality is there would be chaos. The reality is there would be people dying from the distress caused by the economic collapse.

Let's look at this another way. Suppose we all agreed to assume our share of the national debt - \$160,000 and to pay it off over the next 30 years at zero interest. The monthly payments for every household in America would be \$666.67 per month for 30 years. Add a very modest

rate of interest – say 4 percent to that note and the payments are \$969.57 per month.

That would not solve the problem though because the government is still spending more than it is receiving in revenue. In fact, Social Security will be paying out more in benefits than it receives in taxes as the baby boom generation starts collecting their retirement payments.




