Memorial Day Events to pay attention to

BREWSTER – The American Legion Columbia Post 97 has a full schedule planned up to and after Memorial Day, Monday, May 29, according to Area Three Commander Denny Pittman.

Beginning at 9-9:30 a.m. Saturday, May 27, Post members and volunteers will place a cross with a small flag on the grave of every veteran at cemeteries from Packwood to Pateros.

American Legion members will be out again at 6 a.m. Monday morning for a rapid-fire roster of Memorial Day activities.

Legionnaires and volunteers will put up the large flags at each of the cemeteries Monday and add a wreath to each flag pole. They will post an honor guard and firing squad at each location where three volleys will be fired and taps played.

In between ceremonies in cemeteries at Pateros (9 a.m.), Packwood (10 a.m.)

Monse (11 a.m.), Brewster (11:30 a.m.) the Legionnaires will also hold a service for Navy and Coast Guard veterans on the Bridge Street Bridge that spans the Columbia River at Brewster at 9:30 a.m., and will drop a wreath into the river to honor those veterans.

Monday’s activities will conclude with a final service at the American Legion Hall in Brewster at noon.

On Tuesday following Memorial Day, volunteers will again be out picking up the

crosses with flags on the veterans’ graves. Volunteers are welcome on all three days.

Columbia Post 97 is comprised of some 180 members. The total is around 325 if you include the Ladies Auxiliary and the Sons of the American Legion. They also have about 30 Legion riders who participate on their motorcycles in parades and funeral processions around the area.



Senior Center offers Farmers Market Public Vouchers

BREWSTER—TheBrewster-Pateros-Bridgeport Senior Center at 100 S. Bridge Street will distribute 40 Farmers Market Public Vouchers to qualifying senior citizens on a first-come, first-served basis from 10:30 a.m. to noon on Monday, June 5.

A public service announcement (PSA) from Aging and Adult Care of Central Washington (AACCW) specifies qualifying guidelines for eligible seniors.

Recipients must be at least 60 years of age (55 for Native American or Alaska Native with Washington State Tribal Card) and be Washington residents.

A valid Washington state driver's license or photo I.D. is required and recipients' monthly income cannot exceed \$1,859 for a single person or \$2,504 for a two-person household

"Each qualifying senior will have the opportunity to apply for one book of vouchers worth \$40," the PSA said. "The vouchers can be redeemed for fresh fruit, vegetables, and honey and can only be redeemed at participating Farmers Markets and Farm Stores (road side stands) in Washington State."

The vouchers are valid from June 1 through Oct. 31, 2017.

Proxy forms are available for those unable to attend voucher distribution due to a medical appointment or lack of transportation, the PSA advised. For more information,

The Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program (SFMNP) provides fresh fruit and vegetables to qualifying seniors to improve their health and nutrition and supports local farming through increased use of farmers markets and roadside stands.

A dozen seniors graduated from the Stay Active and Independent for Life (S.A.I.L.) exercise class taught by Shawn Isenhart of Eagle Rock Physical Therapy in Brewster and have been awarded Eagle Rock shirts to prove it.

"Shawn helped us in the beginning to make sure we were

using the right form when doing our exercises," said Senior Center spokeswoman Kathy Lowry. "The number of participants has steadily increased."

The Center has been open for two Saturdays in May and will continue into June on a trial basis to see if Saturdays may be beneficial to members and customers. June Saturday hours are 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on June 2, 16, and 30. Regular store hours are 8-11:45 a.m. Monday-Thursday.

You could always find him wearing one of his witty t-shirts about being a dad, a grandpa, a fisherman, or old (but great) and retired.

While serving in the U.S. Coast Guard in Alameda, Calif., during 1955-1959, Gene received a bravery award for saving a young girl from drowning in Lake Merritt. He started his career as a truck driver with Ringsby Truck Lines in Oakland, Calif., where he was recognized as a “goodwill ambassador” for his enthusiasm and outstanding service. He kept on truckin’ with PIE in California, then Magi and Mumma Trucking after moving back up



to Washington in 1978. He was a career-long member of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, and a proud member of the Masons, Freemasons, and Shriners. He got a kick out of driving his red mini car in Shriner parades and loved helping children be admitted into Shriners Hospital in Spokane.

Gene loved his kids, his grandkids, his friends’ kids, all kids. He was a big kid himself, with an even bigger personality, tucked into a compact body. You could count on him to be opinionated, fun, playful, and loveable. The Liar’s Club at CJ’s just isn’t the same without him.

Gene is survived by his son, Kenneth Bergenholtz; daughter, Lisa Segal (Mitch); stepdaughter, Deborah Styers (Brian Bjodstrup); grandchildren, Cameron, MacKinnon and Ian Bergenholtz, Victoria and Adam Bjodstrup; and brother, Paul Bergenholtz. Gene was preceded in death by his parents, James and Opal (Wright) Bergenholtz, and his brother, James Bergenholtz.

SPOKANE – With a team of only four players above the grade of freshman, the Brewster Bears defied the odds and opponents on older, more experienced teams to advance to the final round of eight in the state baseball championships at Spokane last Saturday, May 20.

On the strength of a 14-2 regular season record, CW2B League Championship, and 2-1 second place District 5/6

performance, the Bears faced Northwest Christian – Colbert in the first round of loser-out play at John Thacker Field at Ferris High School and ended the Crusaders’ quest with an 8-2 victory.

Northwest took a two-run lead in the top half of the first inning but the Bears knotted the contest in the bottom of the first and “pretty much controlled it from there,” coach Todd Phillips said.

Brewster added another run over the next two innings before “a nice little rally in the

fourth,” said Phillips, when the Bears added four more runs. “I think that gave us a cushion.”

Northwest came into the playoffs with a 9-0 second-place ranking in the 2B Bi-County District, behind leader Colfax, but did not advance beyond the first round. The Crusaders converted six hits into two runs while Brewster squeezed eight runs from 10 hits.

“Jeff (Sonneman) pitched really well,” said Phillips of the sophomore’s performance

on the mound.

Colfax triumphs

“Colfax just beat us from the get-go,” said Phillips of the Bulldogs 14-4 win in round two Saturday afternoon.

In a scenario resembling the previous week’s back-to-back district games first against Kittitas and then Tri Cities Prep, Brewster played what Phillips called its best game of the season in the 9-2 win over the Coyotes.

In the second game, Tri Cit-

ies took advantage of errors and converted bases-loaded walks into scoring runs in the 12-0 win over the Bears.

Against Colfax, “we made a lot of errors again and found ourselves in a 4-1 box in the first inning,” said Phillips of the six-inning game. “It kind of snowballed from there.”

Colfax scored 14 runs on 16 hits while Brewster was a perfect 4-4 in hits and runs.

Freshman Kade Kelpman pitched the first three innings and Joe Taylor took over for the last three.

“We didn’t ever quit, just couldn’t get the job done,” said Phillips. “Colfax is a good ball club.”

Last weekend’s loss was the third consecutive time the Bears have made it into the state quarterfinals and the fourth year in a row that the team has qualified for state competition.

The Bears “have to get over that hump the next two years and then it will become something that we are used to doing,” Phillips said of his young team’s prospects.
