Property revaluation
notices being mailed

OKANOGAN – Property revaluation notices from the Okanogan County Assessor's Office will be going into the mail on May 31 to property owners within the Brewster and Pateros School Districts as well as to those portions of the Bridgeport, Grand Coulee and Chelan School Districts located in Okanogan County.

A media release from the Assessor's Office said that per state law, assessment levels shall reflect the market value of property based upon sales of similar type of property in the owner's area.

"Changes in value varied based upon location," the release said. "These new values will affect taxes paid in 2018."

Anyone who has questions regarding his assessment is encouraged to call the Assessor's Office at 422-7190. Appeals must be received by the Okanogan County Board of Equalization by Monday, July 1, 2017.

Brewster Wells Fargo hosts
Teach Children to Save Day

BREWSTER – The local branch of Wells Fargo Bank, in conjunction with the American Bankers Association (ABA), and Junior Achievement of Washington (JA), hosted Teach Children to Save Day (TCSD) for second grade students at Brewster Elementary School last Thursday, April 27.

The volunteer program, sponsored by the ABA, was one among more than 200 Wells Fargo branches conducted in 102 classrooms in 20 different Washington schools that day.

Brewster Wells Fargo branch manager, Nestor Lemus and lead teller, Julie Godinez, visited the class of Brewster Elementary second grade teacher, Katie MacLean who was introducing her young students to money management fundamentals.

I piloted a program called Money Savvy Kids," said MacLean. "Each student got a piggy bank and learned about saving, spending and donating."

A part of MacLean's instruction involved her class visiting a local bank, and that visit was reciprocated when bank volunteers Lemus and Godinez brought Teach Children to Save Day to the second graders.

Between 9:30 a.m. and noon the two Wells Fargo representatives delivered a five-session course with topics ranging from "People in the Community Work Together" to "How Money Moves in the Community" and the "Role of Government and Taxes."

Lemus, who started his business career at age 16 with a landscaping business in Wenatchee, has been with Wells Fargo since 2008, after a friend who worked for the company introduced him to the business. He worked his way up from teller to his present position as Brewster branch manager.

Godinez started her career with Wells Fargo in 2008 as a teller, moved to customer sales and service rep, personal banker and back to lead teller.

"I want to be a service manager in the future," Godinez said.

"This is the first time we have visited the Brewster school," Lemus said, but plans a return visit May 12, when he will deliver a presentation to Brewster High School seniors and juniors on savings, credit management and related topics.

Tree City Pateros hosts annual
Arbor Day observance

PATEROS – The observance and tradition of Arbor Day, first inaugurated in 1872 with the planting of more than one million trees in Nebraska, was well-celebrated in Pateros, one of 90 Tree Cities in the state, last Friday afternoon, April 28.

Activities got underway with the free distribution of four tree varieties to survivors of the 2014 Carlton Complex and 2015 Okanogan Complex wildfires. Native varieties of Ponderosa Pine, Rocky Mountain Douglas Fir and Chokecherry and non-native Little Leaf Linden were donated by the Washington Community Tree Recovery Campaign supported by the Arbor Day Foundation, FedEx, the Okanogan County Long Term Recovery Group and Okanogan Conservation District and handed out with help from AmeriCorps volunteers.

County commissioners Andy Hover and Jim DeTro – Chris Branch had a prior commitment – spoke briefly about progress on highway repair following the recent rain storm. DeTro also mentioned the weather-delayed opening of the North Cascades Highway, normally opened by the first day of fishing season.

"It's still snowing on those guys every day," DeTro said.

Ben Thompson, with the DNR Urban and Community Forestry Program, spoke not only on the benefits trees provide a community but also the importance of planting "the right tree in the right place" to maximize all the benefits trees offer. Thompson cautioned against locating trees under power lines or next to a house foundation to avoid creating more problems than the trees are intended to solve.

Guest speaker, Okanogan High School junior, Myla Gray of the Valley Venturers 4H Club, delivered a presentation, complete with visual aids, on the importance of bee pollination.

Gray shared some interesting facts about bee life: The typical bee will visit about 5,000 flowers in the course of one day. One bee produces about one-twelfth of a teaspoon of honey in its entire life. It requires the nectar from two million flowers to produce one pound of honey.

Pateros volunteer fireman and local apple and cherry or

chardist Bruce Henne asked Gray what agriculturalists could do to promote bee health. Gray suggested the use of bee-friendly insect and weed sprays to the continuing reduce the continuing decline in bee numbers.

City administrator, Jord Wilson, encouraged recipients to “get your trees in the ground this evening or tomorrow morning and water them well if you want them to survive.”

Pateros High School students Austin Yancey and Isaac Wall explained their senior project that involves the installation of native plant varieties at the new Memorial to the Methow Park that will be completed later this spring. Wall and Yancey set in the first of those plants that were donated by Rob Crandall, owner of Methow Natives Nursery in Winthrop.

The Brewster Ag class brought a selection of plants from its annual spring plant sale. Ag advisor Todd Dezellem and students Melissa Corrales and Erick Pamatz set up a display of plant selections including Million Bells, Osetomum, Lobella and other varieties.

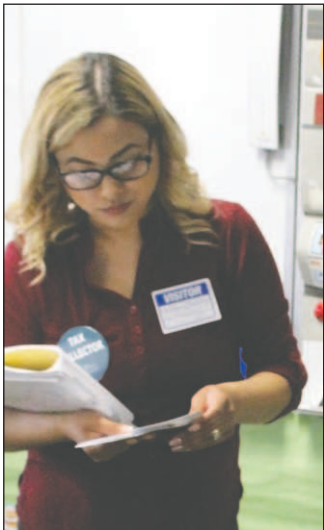

Legion Riders poker run raises Honor Flight funds

BREWSTER – Military veteran motorcyclists from Omak, Leahy and Chelan converged on American Legion Columbia Post 97 last Saturday morning, April 29, to participate in an Honor Flight fundraising poker run with the Legion Riders.

Post 97 First Vice Commander, Glenn Farrington was in charge of the event and by the time the 10 a.m. departure time rolled around, some 20 riders had gathered to pony up \$20 for each player punch card.

“Ten dollars goes to Honor Flight Spokane,” said Farrington. “The other \$10 goes into the poker hand.”

The Inland Northwest Honor Flight’s mission is to “transport Inland Northwest war veterans to Washington, D.C. to visit those memorials dedicated to honor their service and sacrifices,” according to its website, www.inhonorflight.org.

Since November 2009, 1,341 veterans have taken INW Honor Flights to the nation’s capital.

The Legion Riders will hold their next ride on July 22 in conjunction with the Post salmon barbecue.

“We’ll be doing a charity teddy bear run,” said Farrington. “Entry for the ride will be a stuffed animal.”

The stuffed toys will be distributed to agencies such as

the Brewster police and fire departments where they can be gifts to comfort youngsters in emergency situations like house fires and other stressful events.

Saturday’s run took the riders to stops at Chelan, Mansfield, Bridgeport and back to the starting point in Brewster.

“It’s an 80-mile round trip,” Farrington said. “I told everybody I want them back here by 3 p.m.; that’s five hours so that should give them plenty of time.”

Farrington filled the role of sweeper, and left behind the other riders to help any stragglers or riders who en-

countered problems along the route.

Farrington said the Legion Riders originally got their start as a group to escort local returning soldiers home from deployment.

“We would get together with their parents and surprise them and escort them home and tell them thank you,” Farrington said.

Farrington has a grandson who is currently deployed in Afghanistan.

“He’s a dog handler and he’s got a bomb dog,” Farrington said.

Child Find is a process designed to locate and evaluate children from birth through age 21, who may have a suspected developmental delay or disability. Child find offers free developmental screening including a brief assessment of a child’s communication, fine/gross motor, cognitive, social/emotional,

and self-help skills. Early identification of disabilities assists parents, students and schools in the design of appropriate educational services.

BRIDGEPORT – The Bridgeport School District is committed to identifying and providing for the unique educational needs of all its students. In that effort, the district is currently soliciting nominations from parents, school staff, and community, of students who are believed to have a high capacity to learn quickly, deeply, and/or broadly so the district can better provide an individualized educational service to each of its students.

Students nominated through this process will be considered for enrollment in the district’s Highly Capable Program based upon screening and assessment with the permission of their parent/guardian.

Bridgeport School Superintendent, Scott Sattler said the school has had a HiCap Program for years now.

“It’s our effort to reach out to the upper end kids,” Sattler said and added that candidates are selected through a variety of ways.

“Our Math is Cool competition is just one example of our Highly Capable programs,” Sattler said.

The definition of highly capable students applies to those students who perform or show potential for performing at significantly advanced academic levels when compared with others of their age, experiences, or environments. Per Washington Administrative Code (WAC) 392-170-035/036 that potential includes:

- The capacity to learn with unusual depth of understanding, to retain what has been learned, and to transfer learning to new situations;
- Capacity and willingness to deal with increasing levels of abstraction and complexity earlier than their chronological peers;
- The creative ability to make unusual connections among ideas and concepts;
- The ability to learn quickly in their area(s) of intellectual strength; and
- The capacity for intense concentration and/or focus.

BRIDGEPORT – The Mustangs varsity baseball team could not find the key to unlock a win in either game of a doubleheader against the visiting Manson Trojans last Thursday, April 27. In fact, the hapless Mustangs could not even wring a single run out of either game and fell to Manson, 25-0 in both games.

BRIDGEPORT – In a contrast of opponents, the Bridgeport Fillies scored wins over visiting Manson, 16-5 and 16-1, last Thursday, April 27, but lost two days later to Tonasket, 20-9 and 28-3 on Saturday, April 29.

The 14-0 Lady Trojans were looking for their first win of the season on the Fillies field but were unable to handle the pitches of senior Shaylee Polvos or the Bridgeport infield defense.
