Sixth graders get to design with earthquakes in mind

LEAVENWORTH - A tabletop earthquake simulator has been testing students' balsa wood structures for years at Icicle River Middle School (IRMS). Earthquake resiliency is a favorite unit because it's hands-on, utilizes Minecraft, the 3D crafting and building videogame, and ends with a potential spectacle of destruction.

Over a couple weeks, students, in groups of four, develop a project that includes two architectural products—a balsa wood structure to test on the earthquake simulator, and a building in Minecraft using earthquake resistant featuresas well as a project budget and marketing materials. Each student leads one aspect in their role as architect, structural engineer, marketing director or chief financial

For the past several years, the unit has been taught by sixth grade science teacher, Shannon Fallon, and sixth grade math teacher, Jessica Hoiland, who currently has a longterm substitute, Carson Rieke.

There was nervous excitement in the IRMS library as one class of sixth graders filtered in to stand near their projects. Some felt the stress of lastminute construction—gluing, pinning or adjusting—the day before, or for a few, mere minutes before. One by one, each group brought their structure up to the earthquake simulator, where Rieke and Fallon helped attach the bottom board to the simulator. The structure had to follow building specifications, including a height of five stories, intentional gaps to insert a metal plate on each floor to see how added weight affects a structure's resiliency, and budget limitations to limit how many raw materials could be "purchased."

When Rieke turned on the simulator, the foundation underneath the test unit shifted back and forth, and Rieke could slowly or quickly ramp up the speed of the vibrations.

LEAVENWORTH - The future of downtown's P2 parking lot remains studies over the years...and every up in the air after City Council's last meeting of 2023, when members decided to table a proposed lease of a major housing and parking development until 2024. For Torstein Lindheim, a former longtime resident, it may be his last opportunity to get the town on board with his alternative idea: the Flower

To give some background, the P2 parking lot is also known as "Blewett Lot" or "the Pit," and sits near the Festhalle, between Front Street and Highway 2. P2, P1, and the portion of land that houses Leavenworth's Finest Espresso (referred to just as "Espresso" in development plans) are included in the 2.08 acre lot the City acquired for just over \$2.15 million in 2013, according to county documents.

For the last three years, Lindheim has been trying to convince the City to transform the lots into a parking garage covered in flowers, which he calls the Flower Tower.

"There have been so many parking time they come up, [they find] we need more parking, and that's it. Then a couple of years goes by, and then they start another study and they end up [saying] we need more parking, but nothing's happening," said Lindheim.

Lindheim's mockup doesn't have an exact amount of parking spaces planned out, but he says it could include up to 500 spots.

"One advantage to parking over that hole is that it's in proximity to the Festhalle, which is the Convention Center for this town," said Elmar Larsen, a Leavenworth resident and friend of Lindheim.

For Linheim, the parking garage would also double as a tourist attraction, being covered in flowers in the spring and summer months.



Cole's Corner restaurant donates nearly 200 children's coats

LEAVENWORTH - The Squirrel Tree had over 170 coats to give away

during its kid's coat drive on Dec. 20. The owner of the Squirrel Tree Resort, Vito Fedor, said his wife Olena was looking at coats in Costco when she got the idea for a coat

"My wife was like "hey, why don't you donate these coats?" First it was gonna be a donation, and then we were like, "no, let's do it at the Squirrel Tree," said Fedor.

They bought 170 brand new coats, sizes 2T - 6. About 17 additional coats had also been donated by locals earlier in the day.

"Some people have been coming in for the coat drive and some people have been donating [money] to the little red cup which will be donated to Plain Pantry," said Fedor.

The coat drive was held from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. By the afternoon, Fedor had already given away around 60

"Oh, people love it. They come in, you know, there's people with four kids. They're like, "let's pick up jackets!" They are loving it," said Fedor.

Seattle residents and regular visitors, Maâde Seddiki and his 9 year-old-son Talan Seddiki, were excited to stumble upon the coat

"We come here all the time. We have friends that live here that have a cabin and this is our first time coming in wintertime. Usually it's summertime when we come here, and we were really surprised with how much snow there was," said Maâde Seddiki.

They came in looking for winter accessories such as gloves, but were pleasantly surprised to find Fedor See **HOUSING** Page **B2** giving away children's coats inside.

"I'm really happy, it's really cool," said Talan Seddiki.

Fedor expected more donations to come in by the end of the day, and more coat pickups once school got out. Any coats leftover he planned to donate to Plain Pantry.

Plain Pantry is open Wednesdays from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. and Thursdays from 1 p.m. to 7 p.m. Its Pantry Porch stocks seasonal clothing, household items, and more for those in need. Plain Pantry is located at 12471 Chapel Drive in the mobile home (next door to Plain Community Church), according to their website.

Leavenworth entities among recipients of County Lodging Tax Grants

WENATCHEE — Chelan County Commissioners greenlit the allocation of nearly \$320,000 in lodging tax dollars toward various tourism-related entities, benefitting a gamut of local organizations.

These funds, generated by local lodging establishments, are distributed with precision. Half of the yearly revenue is designated for six local chambers, Ohme Gardens, the Cascade Loop, and TREAD. Additionally, a part is reserved for the county's Visit Chelan County initiative.

The balance is annually earmarked for grants aiding tourism-related bodies, like festivals and museums. The Lodging Tax Advisory Committee (LTAC) thoroughly reviews applications, recommending disbursement to the Board of County Commissioners.

"LTAC budgeted \$280,000 for this round of 2024 grant applications,' said Commissioner Tiffany Gering, who chairs the nine-member advisory committee. "The committee recommended allocating nearly \$40,000 more because of the quality of applications that came in. These dollars are an investment in our communities and the organizations that play a vital role in our tourismdependent economy.'

In 2024, a total of 23 local groups and nonprofits will benefit from the \$319,681 granted. This financial boost will support diverse endeavors, from marketing and outreach efforts to enhancing new and established festivals, museum exhibits, and event arrangements.

LEAVENWORTH - Leavenworth Spanish is offering a discount on its Spanish Basics for Medical Professionals course. Those who sign up before Jan. 15 will receive \$50 off an \$250 course, and an additional \$50 off with the code MEDICO.

The course is designed to accommodate both beginners and those with a background in Spanish, with an overview of the basics intertwined with medical vocabulary. It's online and self-paced, and is eligible for six Continuing Education (CE) credits or six clock hours through the North Central Educational Service District (NCESD). It's intended to be a first step to building rapport with patients, but should not replace the duties of a professional medical interpreter.

There are 14 lessons in the course, all of which include a lecture and a quiz. Ten of the lessons have additional videos of native Spanish speakers acting out real medical scenarios such as a women's health exam, an emergency room visit, or a basic check-up. Before each video, students get a list of vocabulary and an audio file of a native speaker reading the words. Then, the video is accompanied by Spanish subtitles, a Spanish script, and an English script.

"For a beginner, they're

they are going to get hardly anything out of it, but maybe a couple of words. But that's really how you improve your ability to understand. [You're] hearing gibberish, and then being able to understand one word out of 30, and then two words out of 30, then three words out of 30," said Morgan Fraser, owner of Leavenworth Spanish.

The course not only covers medical vocabulary, but also dedicates a lesson to cultural differences to consider. In lesson one, two Mexican instructors speak on social nuances, U.S. medical experiences, and differences between the U.S. and Mexico's medical systems.

By familiarizing with these differences and learning even just a few words, Fraser believes it can go a long way for making Spanish-speaking patients feel more at ease and not so alone.

A 2020 report by the Latino Center for Health at the University of Washington identified an estimated 16,967 Spanish-speaking individuals residing in Chelan County,

making up 23.9 percent of the population. It identified only three physicians in the county that were both bilingual and Latino, showing underrepresentation in the medical field.

"They're our neighbors, and our friends, and our classmates...They deserve to feel like they belong, and this is one small way that I can help, [by helping] people who want them to feel like they belong," said Fraser.



To Florea, the P2 parking lot would be better utilized for housing, because it could provide an affordable living option for the downtown workforce. The location would make for a walkable commute, and is close to public transportation.

"We don't have a funding stream at this point but we do have land, and it's in the heart of town," said Florea.

For over a year, the City has been in discussions with the Housing Authority of Chelan County and the City Wenatchee (CCWHA) and the Office of Rural and Farmworker Housing about turning the plot into a mixeduse development.

ZBA Architecture was

building that included parking, affordable housing, and commercial retail space. At the Nov. 14 City Council meeting, Keving King of CCWHA and Stephanie Davis of ZBA presented a design that would include 55 affordable one and two bedroom housing units, 88 parking spaces, and six retail spaces. Every City Council member showed support for the development.

In the agreement, the Housing Authority would lease the property from the City for one dollar annually for the purpose of determining feasibility and if possible, constructing affordable housing. The lease would allow the housing authority to seek out grants and funding for the project, and give them an option to purchase the property down the road.

However, the city attorney and bond council reviewed the plan after the Nov. 14 meeting, and found that the existing debt on the property prohibits use of bond proceeds for a private business. The commercial aspect was removed to both comply with the bond restrictions and allow for more parking spaces, in order to maintain at least the same amount of spaces that currently exist.

The City Council was hesitant to sign the lease without the commercial component, agreeing to dedicate a separate session to further discuss the next options, and also allowing for new members to be involved in the decision in 2024.

The students' creations, on the whole, survived quite well in these simulations, with the vibrations maxing out at 30 per second. A few lost a poorly glued bracing, and one seemed to be slowly coming unglued from its base, but, on the whole, the structures survived with only minor damage. Several of them tolerated the high-speed

vibrations even after adding metal plates.

As a build up to the group project, students learned from Fallon about plate tectonics, the causes of earthquakes, and how the earthquake consequences can vary depending on the energy released, the distance the earthquake's epicenter, and the type of soil or rock at a location. STEM concepts that were integral to the project included geometry

and scale drawings, and the properties of shapes in architectural design.

The real-life application of science units like this one holds the students' attention. For instance, while the simulator could not simulate a real earthquake's 3D terrestrial tremors—in all directions and including roll, pitch and yaw-students could better appreciate the next level of resiliency design such as

seismic isolators and tuned mass dampers. One student, Everitt Duffield, even added those elements to his Minecraft structure, incorporating them underground. Another student, Aidan Tucker, displayed his prowess in Minecraft by fully incorporating his group's brand, Locos Camperos, into his earthquake-proof taqueria.

"This unit is also about working together," explained Fallon. Students gain practice in

communication skills and being accountable to team deadlines and goals. Fallon said she was pleased with how enthusiastic the marketing directors were in terms of designing the brand and tracking down information from their teammates. She helps ensure there's team cohesion because each person needs to learn about the other roles and contribute to the different aspects of the work. There are opportunities for
