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Cashmere seeks civic-minded residents for planning commission role

CASHMERE - During the Cashmere City Council's Jan. 8 meeting, Mayor Jim Fletcher announced that the city is seeking local residents who would like to serve on the Cashmere Planning Commission.

He clarified that to be eligible, an individual must live within the city or the UGA boundary. The Cashmere Planning Commission is an advisory committee that provides recommendations to the City Council to help determine the growth and development of the city. Individuals interested in guiding and planning the future of Cashmere should contact the Mayor at City Hall.

In response to petitions from Al Kennedy and Blaine and Jaqueline Smith for the city to vacate a portion of Spring St., Fletcher explained that the Kennedy's property surrounds three sides of the street, which dead ends into their property. With little discussion the Council unanimously approved a Public Hearing to obtain comments regarding the requests. The majority of the evening's meeting was an update by Fletcher of city activities and plans. He explained that he wanted to start discussions related to potential utility rate increases and to provide new council member, Jeff Johnson, some background into the current state of city business.

The topics discussed included the following.

• Fletcher told Council that a possible increase in water utility rates may be needed, but there should not be a need

for an increase in wastewater rates. He explained that he is waiting on final year-end budget numbers to determine what will be required. According to Fletcher, the primary reason for a potential increase is to allow the city to build the Capital Funds budget for future capital projects. Rhetorically, he asked, how long should the city delay projects in order to build funds to do the projects? He added that the discussions would occur across several meetings, to allow for public input and increase awareness.

- New playground equipment for Riverside Park will be arriving sometime in April. The plan is for it to be installed near the current swing set that is on the west end of the park.
- The pool is continuing to leak from a seam, so the city is planning to have a pool company evaluate the problem and provide recommendations for a solution.

One-of-a-kind thrill

Luge like nowhere else on Bear Mountain

LOUP LOUP SUMMIT – Winter outdoor sports lovers searching for that one-of-a-kind thrill ride will find just what they are seeking in their own backyard on Bear Mountain at the Loup Loup Ski Bowl.

Bear Mountain Luge Sledding opened for the season last Saturday, Jan. 13, with its brand of excitement not found anywhere else. Luge – a French word meaning "sledge" – employs small single or double occupancy sleds that riders sit on, control with their hands, and use their feet for breaking.

"The Loup is one of the first and only resorts in the Western US to offer luge sledding," A Loup media release said.

Combine that with a ride in the back of an open-air snowcat to ascend 1,200 feet to reach the starting point of the five-kilometer course and you have a pair of experiences unique to

Steve Nelson and wife, Julie, came up with the novel and inspired idea for the luge program, now in its eighth year.

"It's kind of a total experience," said Nelson. "An initial education, a little clinic to tell everybody how to do it, then everybody loads in snowcats – how many people have ridden snowcats? .01 percent of the population – and then the guided trip down by our luge guides."

With twists, turns, and plenty of speed, the course is a thrilling adventure for all ages.

"Speed is whatever the sledder wants because you control it yourself," said Julie who manages the program. "It's really for those who are more adventurous to go faster."

For those adventurous types, whose daring exceeds their skill there is a border fence just like the kind used on ski racecourses to catch errant riders.

Highest level of protections for three Washington rivers goes into effect

OLYMPIA – Protections for the Napeequa River in Chelan County are set to go into effect Jan. 18, after being designated as an Outstanding Resource Water (ORW). The Napeequa River flows from the Glacier Peak Wilderness into the White River, which ultimately feeds into Lake Wenatchee.

Segments of the Napeequa, Green and Cascade rivers were the first rivers ever designated as Tier III (A) Outstanding Resource Waters in Washington State, granting the highest level of protection assigned to a water body under the state's antidegradation rule. Soap Lake was designated at a Tier III (B) ORW.

The Clean Water Act of 1972 allows for states to provide extra protections to high quality and unique waters through ORW classification. To meet the criteria, bodies of water must meet high quality water standards, have ecological importance, and/or provide unique attributes or recreational value. Under the antidegradation rule, water bodies with Tier III (A) ORW classification are protected from any and all future degradation, while Tier III (B) classification allows minor degradation under certain circumstances.

In 2021, the Department of Ecology took nominations from the public, tribes, and interests groups. The three rivers and Soap Lake were nominated for having met all or some of the criteria.

The Napeequa River received nominations from Pew Charitable Trusts, American Rivers, Cascade Forest Conservancy, Wild Salmon Center, American Whitewater, Washington Wild, and Trout Unlimited, according to Ecology. Due to its remote location, the river was chosen for its high water quality, ecological significance, and recreational value, meeting all the criteria.

"Its cold, pristine waters provide critical habitat for species, such as endangered Spring chinook and threatened bull trout. Both the White River and Lake Wenatchee rely on critical inputs from the Napeequa as a major tributary to provide high-quality water and habitat for downstream salmon and trout," said Pacific Northwest Stewardship Director Tom O'Keefe in an American Whitewater press release. The Napeequa River Valley has highrecreational value for hikers exploring the remote wilderness, and kayakers and rafters benefitting from its water contributions to the Wenatchee River downstream.

Mountaineers.org calls the Napeequa River Valley "one of the most awesome, revered and wildest valleys in the state."

On Dec. 18, 2023 the rivers were officially designated through the adopted changes to the Water Quality Standards for Surface Waters of the State of Washington. The changes go into effect 31 days after its adoption date.

Are you getting too much magnesium?

84-year-old Martha was halfway down her driveway to get her mail when she tripped and fell onto the asphalt. Luckily, her neighbor across the street witnessed her fall, rushed to help, and called 911 when she couldn't get up.

Her head, heart, lungs, and kidneys checked out fine, but the magnesium in Martha's blood was too high, which can cause muscle weakness. When asked if she was taking any magnesium supplements, Martha said no. "I only take a thyroid pill for my thyroid and a pain pill at night for my arthritis."

I asked her, "Do you take any laxatives?"

Why, yes, nearly every night. My pain pill helps my arthritis, but it binds me up, so I take a laxative for that."

"Which one?"

"It's in a blue bottle. Phillips®, I think."

"Do you take anything for stomach acid, burning, or indigestion?'

"Sometimes. I like the mint flavored Mylanta® chews."

about "How other supplements? Do you take anything for sleep?"

"Sure. There's a powder called CALM that helps me sleep. I mix some in my chamomile tea at bedtime."

1. Watch out for multiple sources.

In addition to taking a magnesium supplement, your body can absorb magnesium from other sources. Some antacids, liquid laxatives, supplements for sleep, and Epsom Salts all contain magnesium.

2. Know the signs of getting too much magnesium.

If you notice diarrhea, cramping, weakness, or low

blood pressure, you may get too much magnesium, like Martha.

4. Change up your laxatives.

5. Don't mix magnesium with antibiotics.

OLYMPIA - The allure of flickering candlelight, often associated with tranquility and spiritual reverence, comes with a stark warning from the Washington State Fire Marshal's Office (SFMO). While candles add ambiance and are integral to religious services, they pose significant fire risks. Emphasizing the hazards, the SFMO has released crucial safety guidelines to prevent fire incidents.

In the U.S., candles are a leading cause of residential fires, with an average of 20 candlerelated fires reported daily. Washington State's alarming statistics show over 2,000 fire incidents in 2022, attributable to open flames, resulting in property damages exceeding \$21 million. These figures highlight the critical need for candle safety awareness.

SFMO's safety The recommendations include:

- Extinguishing candles when leaving a room or before sleeping.
- · Ensuring candles are in sturdy holders and not passed between people if handheld.
- · Avoiding placement of lit candles near windows with blinds or curtains.
- Keeping a minimum one-foot distance from flammable items.
- Prohibiting candle usage in homes with medical oxygen.
- Supervising children near burning candles and storing matches/lighters safely.
- Monitoring candles continuously in religious settings, preferably within glass containers and on water-filled basins or metal trays.

- completely prevent holder/container damage.
- Considering the safer alternative of battervpowered flameless candles.

For further information on candle safety, the public is encouraged to visit the State Fire Marshal's Office website at www.wsp.wa.gov/statefire-marshals-office or contact them at (360) 596-3929. As the SFMO stresses, vigilance and adherence to these guidelines are key to preventing candlerelated hazards in homes and places of worship.

found the perfect experience that any age can enjoy safely. Nelson said the two types of people he hears from the most are the repeat customers and those who have been trying for years to get a reservation.

"This is primarily a European type of sport," said Nelson, "We're very unique and nobody else has really caught on."

The 2-1/2-hour experience costs \$50 per person and includes sled, helmet, luge sledding instruction, open air snowcat ride up Bear Mountain, and guided sledding down five-plus kilometers of groomed luge sledding.

Director of Operations, Steve Croci, added that the city has patched the seam in the past, but a professional solution is needed. In response to a question from council member Chris Carlson Fletcher replied that the pool's gutters are also still part of the leakage problem, but if the seam can be repaired, it may take some of the pressure off of the gutters.
