# **Chelan Parks Vision 2030 plan** takes root at council meeting

CHELAN - Parks, Recreation, and Community Services Director Paul Horne delivered the second and third pillars of the Chelan Parks Vision 2030 Plan to the city council at its April 23 bi-monthly meeting. The three pillars are 1. Exemplary Parks (Places), 2. Engaged Community (People), and 3. Operational Sustainability (Organization).

Horne discussed the first pillar at the previous council meeting and included Places:

- Destination playgrounds
- Promenades and boardwalks
- Outdoor amphitheaters
- Marina

• Lakeside Park Land and Water Conservation Grant

- RV park and golf course
- Trails and greenways

#### **Engaged Community**

"This focuses on community engagement as an end in itself," said Horne, "not as a means to an end."

Horne said his department is launching its new recreation software to help keep citizens engaged in recreation informed, allow online registration and payment, sign up for newsletters, and more. The new software will also free up staff from some of those functions.

planning "Design meetings, meetings... we've always had good turnout for these," said Horne. "People care about their parks.'

The Parks Department has been working with SCJ Alliance to produce a Parks and Recreation Open Space (PROS) Plan. The PROS Plan provides a strategic roadmap for the parks system for the next six-year Capital Improvements Projects (CIP) cycle. These plans are typically updated every six years, and much has happened in Chelan in the eight years since the adoption of the 2016 plan.

In June 2023 the city council approved the SCJ Alliance Professional Services Agreement for the Parks and Recreation System Master Plan Project. The following month council reviewed the Parks and Recreation Open Space (PROS) Plan survey questions. An administrative report was issued on Feb. 27 this year and later approved it on April 9.

Horne previewed the 43-page Chelan Parks Vision 2030

"Out of our last strategic retreat we heard that recreation is vital to the community," said Horne. "It's a core part of the Parks and Recreation mission...and we want to step that up."

Horne noted that park signage is currently on the minimal side and needs more work.

"We have 13 capital projects on the books for 2024 representing \$2.7 million," said Horne. "We've done a great job of getting grants in.'

Parks has also been good at introducing new trees to the system.

We planted four different species of trees to add variety and diversity

to the (Don Morse) park," Horne said. Those were installed in fall 2022 and include:

• Forest Pansey Redbud - A flowering deciduous with brilliant scarlet-purple spring blooms, maturing to maroon.

• Kentucky coffeetree - A pestfree, pollution-tolerant deciduous that bears leathery, reddish-brown seed pods.

• Dawn Redwood - A deciduous, not evergreen, with striking goldenorange fall foliage. Thought to be extinct for millions of years, it was later rediscovered in China.

· Pin Oak - A deciduous native of Illinois with russet to red fall color.

• American Hornbeam - A small, deciduous tree with leaves that are

# **Chelan supports Link Transit** low emissions grant application

CHELAN – The city council approved a letter of support at its April 23 bi-monthly meeting for a Link Transit application to the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) for its 5339(c) Low- or No Emission Grant Program. The grant is a competitive opportunity introduced in 2015 to support the U.S. transition to low- and zero-emission public transit fleets.

The city's letter of support says in part: "The City of Chelan recognizes the

under the Grants for Buses and Bus Facilities Program.

The funding opportunity advances FTA's priorities of strengthening U.S. bus manufacturing, containing vehicle costs, and accelerating the delivery of new vehicles. This funding opportunity also introduces streamlined application requirements for tribes requesting less than \$1 million, making it easier for tribes with relatively small requests to apply.

Eligible projects include:

• Purchasing or leasing low- or noemission buses.

additional 0.5 percent may be for training at the National Transit Institute (NTI). Applicants proposing any project related to zero-emission vehicles must also spend 5 percent of their award on workforce development and training as outlined in their Zero-Emission Transition Plan unless the applicant certifies that their financial need is less.

The city letter of support goes on to state that Link will use the grant funds to "purchase five new battery electric vehicles that will replace gasoline powered vehicles on a one-on-one ratio, increasing the percentage of Link Transit's electric fixed-route fleet to 73 percent."

The letter adds that "The Washington State legislature set a standard for all transit agencies to use 100 percent electric or biofuel to power their fleets. "This investment would put Link Transit on a pathway to achieve that measure and continue to connect people and communities, foster commerce, operate seamlessly across boundaries, and provide travel options to achieve an environmentally conscious system."

## Manson School District opts to maintain 5-day school week

MANSON - The Manson School Board has decided against pursuing an Economy Efficiency Waiver for the 2024-2025 academic year, which would have allowed the district to switch to a four-day school week.

The decision comes despite recent legislation expanding the number of districts eligible to consider such a change.

Board members felt unprepared to discuss the potential shift in the school calendar and have chosen not to include it in their meeting agendas at this time.

However, the board may revisit the topic in the fall of 2024.

Superintendent Tabatha Mires

stated, "The board remains focused on strategic planning and budgeting. We appreciate the input from all stakeholders, which was carefully considered in the decision-making process."

The Manson School District will continue to operate on a five-day school week for the foreseeable future.

## Royal Proclamation for | Earl and Judi Stanford - 104th Manson **Apple Blossom Festival Grand Marshals**

#### **By MANSON APPLE BLOSSOM FESTIVAL COMMITTEE**

In 1902, Obed Stanford, Earl's grandfather, who was only 19 years old, came to Manson from Iowa and established a homestead which was located in the upper Joe Creek area. This was the beginning of the Stanford family in Manson, and it has continued since that time – some 122 years ago.

Earl Stanford was born to John and Nellie Stanford, Obed's son and wife, in a picker's cabin on Washington Street in Manson in 1934, 90 years ago. He was one of six children.

Earl grew up in Manson and graduated from Manson High School in 1952. He was the first in his family to go to college.

He attended WSU and graduated with a BA degree in Physical Education, coaching, and a teaching certificate.

Judi Pool Stanford was born in Sequim in 1941. She attended school in Sequim and then moved with her family to the north end of Seattle, graduating from Shoreline High School in 1959.

She spent two years of college at UPS in Tacoma and graduated from the University of Washington with a BS degree in Physical Education, science, coaching, and a teaching certificate.

Earl and Judi were married in 1969 and taught in the Northshore, Bellevue, and Shoreline school districts. In 1975 they decided to quit

their teaching jobs and move back to Earl's childhood town of Manson

During this time, Earl and Judi became very active in the Manson community. For several years, they helped build the Manson Apple Blossom floats.

Earl would often drive the floats through the parade and also drive them all the way to Wenatchee for the Washington Apple Blossom parade.

Judi also helped build the floats and chaperoned the royalty.

Earl also helped organize and line up the parade participants before the parade began.

This was before the age of cell phones, so he was often seen riding up and down the parade route on his fourwheeler, trying to keep the radio station informed about

Horne added the Hornbeam in response to a Mirror inquiry about the varieties that were planted. All the newcomers seem to like their Chelan home.

"They all look healthy and seem to be doing well," Horne said.

foresters have Urban advised Horne that, with some additional steps, Don Morse would have enough diversity to reach the threshold of being considered an arboretum.

Expanding on the arboretum threshold, Horne said that one of the criteria for reaching arboretum status is having a minimum of 25 unique tree species.

"While seeking official arboretum status for the RV Park or Don Morse Park is not a priority at this time, we will continue to add variety to our tree mix for patron's enjoyment, and for the ecological benefits of avoiding a monoculture,"

Horne said.

They were planted in the fall 2022 Arbor Day celebration.

"We'll have our celebration this year again in the fall," added Horne. "While Arbor Day is officially in the spring, planting trees in the fall seems to be the best practice."

#### **Operational Sustainability**

"We have 13 capital projects on the books for 2024 representing \$2.7 million," said Horne. "We've done a great job of getting grants in."

Preparing for the unexpected

"We've had growing revenue for the last four years with the exception of 2020 when we were forced to close the RV for Covid," said Horne. "We lost about \$500,000 that year."

Frances Louise (Cathey) Draggoo, loving wife, mother, grandmother and great-grandmother was born on December 27, 1923 in Priest River, Idaho. In the next 100 years she lived a full and happy life.
