Lake Chelan honors fallen heroes in 27th annual Memorial Day Parade

CHELAN – The Lake Chelan community came together on Thursday evening, May 23, to pay tribute to the men and women who made the ultimate sacrifice while serving in the U.S. military.

The Lake Chelan Chamber of Commerce hosted its 27th annual Memorial Day Parade, which featured a diverse array of participants, including marching bands, royalty, non-profit organizations, and local emergency services.

The event commenced with a poignant performance by trumpet

players from the Chelan High School Mountain Goat marching band, who played taps to honor the fallen.

The Lake Chelan Patriotic Singers, led by Steve Davis, also entertained the crowd with their musical renditions before the parade began.

Parade attendees were treated to a colorful display of patriotism, with participants dressed in red, white, and blue.

Dr. Jay Waszkewitz drove his jeep adorned with American flags, while the Chelan Rustlers Saddle Club showcased young riders and their horses, all decked out in the colors of the flag.

Local royalty, including Miss Lake Chelan Chloe Desgroseillier and Princess Eva Marron, as well as representatives from Manson Apple Blossom, Cinco de Mayo, and the Chelan County Fair, waved to the crowd as they made their way through the parade route.

Children in attendance were delighted by the generous amount of candy thrown by parade participants, including young baseball players riding in a boat.

In addition to the Chelan High School Mountain Goat marching

Motorcyclist killed, passenger airlifted after head-on collision near Chelan

CHELAN – A motorcyclist is dead, and his passenger was severely injured after a head-on collision Thursday afternoon on SR 97A south of Chelan.

According to Washington State Police, motorcyclist Wilhelm Penders, 59, and his passenger Christine L. Dunn, 60, both of Winthrop, were northbound on SR 97A just before 5 p.m. when Penders attempted to pass another vehicle using the southbound lane. The motorcycle struck an oncoming 2003 Nissan 350Z head-on.

The impact threw both riders off the motorcycle. Penders was later declared dead at Confluence Health Hospital. Dunn was airlifted to Harborview Medical Center.

The driver of the Nissan, Marcos Huerta, 32, of Chelan, was transported to Confluence Health with unknown injuries.

Both cyclists were wearing helmets.

Craig Pittson honored with a Quilt of Valor

MANSON – The Chelan Valley Republican Women (CVRW) met on May 9 at Radiance Winery. Their agenda included awarding Craig Pittson with a Quilt of Valor from the Quilts of Valor Foundation, Chelan division.

Quilts of Valor Foundation began in 2003 because of a dream Catherine Roberts had regarding her son Nat,

who was deployed in Iraq. According to Catherine, "The dream was as vivid as real life. I saw a young man sitting on the side of his bed in the middle of the night, hunched over. The permeating feeling was one of utter despair. I could see his war demons clustered around, dragging him down into an emotional gutter. Then, as if viewing a movie, I saw him in the next scene wrapped in a quilt. His whole demeanor or changed from one of despair to one of hope and well-being. The quilt

had made this dramatic change. The message of my dream was quilts heal."

A Quilt of Valor is a quality, handmade quilt machine or hand quilted that is awarded to a service member or veteran who has been touched by war. The Quilt says unequivocally, "Thank you for your service and sacrifice in serving our nation."

Presenting the award to Craig were Gail Shaw and Sue Freden with the Quilts of Valor Chelan group.

Craig Pittson grew up in Kirkland,

graduated from Lake Washington High School, and joined the Army on November 19, 1965. He attended boot camp at Fort Ord, California, and was sent to Fort Dicks in New Jersey for advanced infantry training.

After completing training, he was sent to Kirch-Göns, Germany, and joined the 3rd Armored Division. His billet was a brigade draftsman with the Service Headquarters Company. Craig had a Top Secret Crypto Clearance and worked in the "War Room." He was responsible for training maps and preparing to protect West Germany from East Germany and Russia.

In June 1969, Craig returned to the States, stationed at Fort Lewis, and assigned to the 3rd Cavalry, where he trained ROTC personnel.

Craig left the Army in September 1969 and became the first Vietnam-era veteran to attend Bellevue Community College on the GI Bill. Unfortunately, this turned out to be a very bad experience as he was harassed for being a "baby killer" by both students and faculty, his worst experience of being a soldier. Because of this, Craig dropped out of college and worked various jobs before being hired by the Boeing Company in 1972, working in the parts department.

Over the next 42 years, Craig held

OLYMPIA – Fishing enthusiasts across Washington state are gearing up for the annual Free Fishing Weekend, set to take place on June 8-9. The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) is inviting anglers of all ages and skill levels to cast their lines and enjoy the state's diverse fishing opportunities without the need for a license.

During this special weekend, anglers can fish for a variety of species, including trout and warm-water fish, in lakes throughout the state. The WDFW website offers a comprehensive guide to help anglers find a lowland lake near them and check which lakes have recently been stocked.

Additionally, anglers participating in the Free Fishing Weekend can take part in the Department's 2024 Trout Fishing Derby and win exciting prizes by redeeming tags from trout caught over the weekend. The derby features tagged fish stocked in lakes across the state, and plenty of prizes are still up for grabs.

For those looking to venture to the coast, the Free Fishing Weekend also offers the opportunity to fish for lingcod, cabezon, and rockfish along the Washington shoreline, with no boat required.

The WDFW has also provided a helpful blog post on jetty fishing for those interested in trying their hand at this unique fishing experience.

Another popular spot during the Free Fishing Weekend is the Columbia River, where anglers can harvest shad. The WDFW offers guidance on where and how to catch these fish effectively. While the Free Fishing Weekend waives the need for a license for many species, anglers should note that any fish requiring a catch record card, such as sturgeon, salmon, steelhead, and halibut, as well as all shellfish, will still require a license.

It is essential for anglers to check the current fishing regulations, emergency rules, and area closures before heading out to ensure a safe and enjoyable experience.

Ronald Lee Berry, 88 of Chelan, Washington passed away at his home on the morning of Monday, May 13, 2024. Ron was diagnosed with Alzheimer's over 3 years ago but the most recent diagnosis of Metastatic Cancer was unexpected and swift.

Ron was born November 27, 1935 to Lester Henry and Beatrice Dorothea (Crow) Berry in Aledo, Illinois. Apart from a short time in Dixon, Illinois, his childhood was spent in Aledo. He always spoke of attending the rural one room school house through grade six. Seventh grade took him to town and the Aledo School District where he became a proud Green Dragon. Little Ronnie Berry, as he was known, was a star running back for the football team. In his senior year they shared the conference title and he was the only Aledo player selected to the Little Six All Star team. He graduated from Aledo High School in 1953. He went on to attend Monmouth College, a private college in Monmouth, Illinois, on a football scholarship. His focus was Science and Chemistry. After briefly attending the University of Illinois, he decided to enlist in the military.

The nearest enlistment office was an Air Force recruiter. He enlisted in November of 1955 and thus his twenty-year career began. Basic training was at Parks Air Force Base, California. He was married to Rita I. Brown while at MacDill AFB in Tampa, Florida. He received his commission in 1958 upon graduation from Officer Candidate School. Daughter Lisa was born while at K.I. Sawyer in Marquette, Michigan. Son Scott was born while at Davis-Monthan AFB in Tucson, Arizona. He was stationed at Ubon Royal Thai Air Force Base in Thailand during the Vietnam conflict. He attended the University of Colorado at Boulder, under the Air Force Institute of Technology Program, where he received his bachelor's degree in electrical engineering. Through a USAF and Royal Air Force exchange program Ron served as an avionics staff officer with the Ministry of Defense in London. His final assignment was out of Nellis AFB in Las Vegas. During that time, he was OIC leading crews all over the Pacific Northwest setting up test sites while working on guidance systems. It was while setting up one of these sites that he discovered Lake Chelan.



After retiring from the Air Force, he moved to Chelan. He obtained a real estate license and worked at Chelan Realty. He took a position at Lake Chelan Community Hospital as the Support Services Manager for several years. He received training and volunteered as an EMT through the hospital. Served one term as a Chelan City Councilman. After he was divorced in 1985, Ron decided on a new adventure. The Chelan Golf Course had just built a new clubhouse. He put in a successful bid for their concession. He ran the Eagle Nest snack bar which included catering for many golf tournaments, weddings, and

special events. He also drove school bus for Chelan school district. On November 7, 1987 he married Toni Higgins and became step-father to her two children, Geoff and Maggie Huffer. He enjoyed following them in school functions and at their sporting events. Finally, he became a contractor with the Post Office. He operated the Chelan Highway Contract Route for the 19 years. Ron and Toni enjoyed many years as snowbirds in Arizona, California, and Nevada.

Ron was a lifelong golfer playing all over the U.S., England, Scotland, and Spain. He loved watching Gonzaga basketball. Ron and Toni attended the WCC tournament in Las Vegas for many years. They were Seattle Seahawks season ticket holders during the Kingdome years and enjoyed watching the Mariners in person and on TV. Whether on Ron's Honda Goldwing or in a car, Ron and Toni enjoyed many road trips over the years from Canada to Mexico and many parts of the U.S. They made a special trip to Thailand touring the whole country by train, plane and elephant. They thoroughly enjoyed being season ticket holders at the 5th Avenue Theatre in Seattle. The Phantom of the Opera was Ron's favorite. Summer hikes with the girls were also a favorite. Ron also enjoyed hosting large dinner parties for family and friends. He was an excellent cook and many recipes were his own. Ron and Toni also loved their pets having many dogs, cats, and other assorted critters over the years.

Nature's Window Museum debuts art exhibit showcasing Eastern Washington landscapes

CHELAN – The Nature's Window Museum in Chelan will unveil a new exhibit on May 31 featuring the dramatic landscape paintings of award-winning artist Don Nutt.

The exhibit runs through June 30 and marks the first rotating show in the museum's 2024 art gallery program.

Nutt, based in Coulee City, is known for his intense and vivid oil and watercolor depictions of the diverse natural beauty in eastern Washington. His work captures the grandeur of the Grand Coulee as well as the forests, streams and wildlife of the Cascade Mountains.

"I am inspired by the majestic grandeur of the Grand Coulee in which I live, as well as the forests and streams of the Cascade Mountains and the wildlife that occupy this magnificent wilderness," said Nutt.

"I feel extremely fortunate to reside in an area with such an amazing visual assortment within a few hours' drive."

Founded in 2019 by Shannon and Cris Kollmeyer, the Nature's Window Museum is an education center for wildlife conservation. Its 9,000-square-foot facility houses over 140 taxidermed animal and bird species in lifelike dioramas.

The museum's permanent collection also includes wildlife sculptures, paintings, and

mixed-media artworks.

"We are pleased to unveil a vivid selection of Don Nutt's paintings in the Nature's Window art gallery with other sculptures and pieces that are part of the museum's permanent collection," said Cris Kollmeyer.

"Everyone is invited to the complimentary opening reception May 31 from 4 – 7 p.m."

The Nature's Window Museum is located at 21285 Highway 97A in Chelan and is open Wednesday through Sunday until October.

WENATCHEE – For Wenatchee Public Library employees Chelsea Evans and Molly Schuringa, outreach with youth at the Chelan County Juvenile Detention Center is one of their favorite parts of their job.

Their least favorite part is that they only get to go once a month.

At each visit, they bring books and activities like crafts, games, or STEM projects to do with the children.

Recently, they made native flower arrangements with the children, which was a popular activity. Comments from the incarcerated kids included:

"I miss seeing flowers."

"Can I bring these into my cell?"

"This is my favorite thing about nature."

"I love nature so much, when I get out I am going to touch and smell everything..."

"I miss nature."

"I love flowers so much."

Michelle Campbell has been teaching children at the Chelan JDC for 13 years and appreciates the library's outreach program and what it brings to her students.

"It's just been such an amazing connection with the students because Molly and Chelsea really bring commu-

nity into the juvenile detention center because the kids don't have that except for, you know, within their units and with the staffing," she said. "It makes them feel connected to the community."

The Chelan JDC serves youth ages up to 18 from Chelan and Grant counties. The school program is run through the Wenatchee School District.

Visits begin with books. Evans and Schuringa bring books that have been requested and books they think the kids will like.

"We really focus on bringing in diverse books for them to be able to relate to or find something of themselves in," Schuringa said.

Kids share about the books they have read in the last month and make recommendations to their classmates.

"It's pretty awesome to hear kids talking books with each other and sharing what they like and what they don't like," Campbell said.

Books are very important to the kids because that is the only thing they are allowed to do in their rooms.

After books, they move into their activity.

STEM activities have included coding robots, Legos, and 3D printing. Sometimes, a speaker will visit to talk to the kids. Once, a local author conducted

a writing workshop.

"They have made dominos out of resin, air-dry clay ornaments, and large snowflakes that Evans and Schuringa brought back to the library for winter decorations.

"And then this is the second year in a row we'll be doing a mental health-centered activity," Schuringa said. "So last year, we created a word cloud and had the kids talk about their like, What's one word that you would describe yourself? A positive thing about yourself?"

"They're (Chelsea and Molly) pretty amazing," Campbell said. "And I think they get a lot out of it, too. I mean, I really think they like coming in. When people show up for these kids, and they're consistent, and they care, and they talk, and they're interested, that means a lot to the kids."

"My favorite part is that these kids, these students, are seeing how creative they are and how kind they are and how much potential they still have in them," Schuringa said. "They're all really beautiful souls. So I just really enjoy each and every one of them."

"That's basically what I love, talking to them and getting to know them," Evans said. "They're such amazing kids. When I think of them, I just, I think, you know, smart and

friendly and funny and engaging and generous. And they're so engaged in every activity that we've brought, and they surprise me every time, so just spending time with the kids and getting to know them (is her favorite part)."

Evans and Schuringa both have particular things that they hope the kids get out of their time with them.

"They let us know that they appreciate us; they thank us many times every time we go," Evans said. "And I think that having positive interactions with adults is just probably meaningful in itself in addition to their amazing teacher and ParaPro and the staff there, too."

"And we, I mean, well, we obviously think they're awesome," Evans said. "And we're excited to be there, and so I hope that they can tell that we care about them and we're rooting for them."

"We're invested in their well-being and their futures and then also making sure they know they have a safe and welcoming place to come, if they get out, at the library and inviting them here," Evans said. "And even if they're not going to get out, the library is coming to them. Important enough to us that we want to make sure that they have library services."

"I think that they have a lot of uncertainty in their future, and giving them the knowledge that the library is a safe space that they can come to, ask questions without any biases and that we're really eager to see them succeed in whatever next steps they take," Schuringa said.

With any job there are peaks and pits or highs and lows. Evans and Schuringa shared their peaks and pits of doing outreach at the Chelan JDC.

For Schuringa, her peak was watching a student feel success and pride with 3D printing and the software used to create the objects.

"And the pit was seeing this specific student's, seeing their trial date be pushed back and pushed back and pushed back until they became an adult and then were tried as an adult," she said.

"I have a story that happened recently, a teen, which is like a full circle story because the teen came into the library, and I could tell they wanted to talk in particular to me, and then once we started talking, I realized it was someone that Molly and I had seen at the juvenile detention center a year ago, and they remembered both of us they remembered everything about the visit," Evans said.

The student remembered

making zines and even what their classmates drew in their zines. She said they remembered a particular book and how much they appreciated it.

"It was a really nice conversation," Evans said.

"They got a library card, and then I let them know that the zine project was really popular here, and library patrons took so many of them, and I still use them as examples, and they were like, 'Do you still have it?' And I say yes," she said. "And so I went and got the one that they had created and brought it to them, and they were so excited. They were still so proud of what they had created and showed everyone they were with. And it was a very happy moment."

"For me, it's just every time I go, I can see in their faces, sometimes it's important enough to just see them and Chelsea's story after she told me that story, I was like, yeah, it's just important to just go and show up and see, like, just be there. Sometimes that's enough," Schuringa said. "And just sharing in whatever moment that we have with them. Then they get to come back in and know that this, that the library, is a space for them."

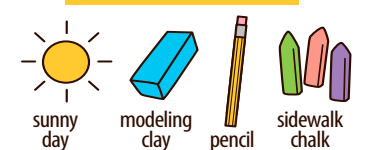

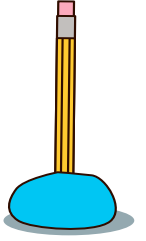

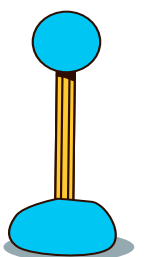
STEP 1

Make a ball of clay and place it on the cement outside. Stick the pencil in the clay so it stands upright.



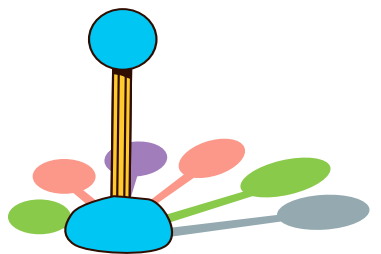
STEP 2
