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Three Rivers Hospital revisits building design and cost options

BREWSTER - The Three Rivers Hospital Board of Commissioners continue its campaign to determine best approach to gain public support for replacing its aging facility.

Last March the board authorized a new scope of work proposed by Theorem Architecture. A 2022 study determined that renovating the existing structure is not workable due to cost and the limitations of the existing building. Manufacturers no longer make parts for some equipment.

The present electrical system cannot keep pace with the latest healthcare technology.

CEO Scott Graham delivered his capital improvements report to the board at the May 29 regular meeting.

"We continue to work with Dave Franklund of Theorem Architecture," said Graham. "We reviewed his thoughts about this building site as the primary focus for us in terms of building a new facility."

Franklund is working with the TRH team on a new rough draft design that differs from that proposed to voters last year. Graham said the new building phases include:

Phase 1 The Energy Plant. Phase II The Medical Tower

Phase III The renovated part of the old building

Board Chair Leslie McNamara noted that in the original drawing the energy plant was in the old building.

"Is it cheaper to have it a separate building? asked McNamara.

Graham explained it as a bridge of sorts between tearing down the old and building the new.

"The thinking is it gives you access to the newer hookups, the new sewer, the newer water, and it preps you to be able to bring that into the other." said Graham. "Because you be without services otherwise."

Ultimately it would get us a new inpatient, a new OR, a new emergency room, and that would be huge for the hospital," Graham said.

At the same time, Franklund is encouraging the board to continue to look offsite, Graham added. That could allow construction of a less expensive single-story structure, but cost estimates and a completed design are still under development. "We're still in the exploration stage.," Graham said.

Meanwhile, the board continues to welcome community feedback.

"Residents can contact their elected commissioners or our administration with their questions and input," said Business Development Coordinator Jennifer Best. A

Revitalization Committee nears consensus on downtown Bridgeport street design

BRIDGEPORT - The future design of the city's downtown Main Street takes on more definition with every meeting of the Bridgeport Revitalization Committee.

At the monthly meeting last Thursday, June 6, Superintendent of Public Works Stuart Dezellem shared design options from the city engineers along with examples from surrounding cities.

"Gray & Osborne did this design," explained Dezellem of one concept. "They show angle parking on one side, parallel on the other."

Dezellem displayed modifications he made on overhead photos of Bridgeport's Main Street which is also state route 173.

One version showed 16-foot sidewalks, twice the width of the current city sidewalks but Dezellem advised that 16 feet is both cost prohibitive and wider than the downtown needs.

Another concept showed 12-foot sidewalks, four-feet wider than currently but closer to the happy medium for every interest. The design also features crosswalks and bump-outs on the street corners.

"You still have room for a ninefoot parking lane, a 12-foot travel lane with a couple of feet left over," Dezellem said. "That would also leave room for plowing snow.'

Committee Chair Leslie Robb participated in a recent survey of downtown businesses and reminded the committee that wider sidewalks topped the wish list for business owners.

Angle parking on designated blocks of Main Street was another feature discussed. Dezellem said angle parking would slow traffic speed.

"The road perception is that its narrowed," said Dezellem. "It doesn't narrow because it's still 12 feet, but

the perception is that it narrows because the vehicles are there,"

Dezellem reminded the committee that because the main street is a state highway the Department of Transportation preferences for parking configurations need to be taken into consideration.

"The DOT likes continuity," Dezellem said.

As the committee nears consensus on the final combination of sidewalk width, new street lighting, crosswalks, buffers, and additional amenities, its sense of excitement grows over the change in appearance the upgrades will bring to the downtown core.

"They will be taking about 7,000 sq. ft of upstairs dedicated space at the Community Center," said Cruz. "Once we finish off the gym there will be BBGC activities there as well." Cruz views the BBGC addition as a good fit.

"We have invited the BBGC to be apart of the community center because we really felt that at the heart of what the community center is trying to do is to wrap our arms around the youth and also those who can't necessarily pay for services or who are underserved," said Cruz. "If we can help them, that helps everybody."

Executive Director Bill Tsoukalas explained that there are 1,000 organizations like Snohomish County in the Boys & Girls Club world that represent about 4,000 individual locations.

BBGC of Snohomish County currently have 26 locations

spread across a multi-county area not just Snohomish County, said Tsoukalas. Eight are on reservations. There are other organizations in Spokane, Colville, Tri-Cities, and Moses Lake. There remains a vacuum in Eastern Washington from Yakima north to Wenatchee, Chelan, and on to the border.

Tsoukalas explained that it is much easier and a less expensive pathway to start within an existing club rather than start your own 501(c)(3).

"We have a presence in Eastern Washington at Brewster and three clubs on the Colville Confederated Tribes Reservation," Tsoukalas.

Brewster BBGC started in 2016 and serves more than 400 youth in the greater Brewster area. Clubs are also located in Nespelem, Inchelium, and Wellpinit.

Chelan County Sheriff's Office receives \$49,100 grant for officer wellness

WENATCHEE The Chelan County Sheriff's Office Behavioral Health Unit (BHU) has been awarded a \$49,100 grant from the Washington State Criminal Justice Training (WACJTC) Commission for the fiscal year July 2024 through June 2025, Sheriff Mike Morrison announced Monday.

The grant will fund peer support and critical incident stress management training, neurofeedback machines, PTSD workshops for law enforcement and their spouses, and continuing education materials. This marks the second consecutive year the WACJTC has awarded the Officer Wellness grant to Chelan County.

BHU Program Manager and Licensed Mental Health Counselor Ana Gonzalez has been credited with securing over \$1.9 million in grants over the past two years, with \$268,578 allocated to officer wellness and \$1.7 million supporting the BHU's initiatives.

The BHU, a co-responder program that partners mental health professionals and case managers with law enforcement, aims to divert individuals with behavioral health challenges from the criminal justice and emergency medical systems by providing crisis response and connecting appropriate community resources.



Scroggie said she would love to return to Washington but remains flexible.


"I've been here my whole life," said Scroggie, "but I'm up for wherever my career takes me."
