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Chelan County declares State of Emergency as Pioneer Fire rages on

CHELAN – The Pioneer Fire, which has been burning in the rugged wilderness along the north shore of Lake Chelan since June 8, had consumed 3,811 acres as of Monday, June 17.

In response to the growing threat, Chelan County declared a state of emergency on Friday.

The emergency declaration, initially signed by Commissioner Kevin Overbay, chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, allows the county to utilize local resources without adhering to the standard government bidding process for goods and services. It is also a necessary step for securing most state and federal recovery assistance funding.

The fire, located approximately 31 miles northwest of Chelan, is burning in the Lake Chelan-Sawtooth Wilderness Area and on private land.

While the cause remains under investigation, authorities suspect that human factors may have played a

role in its ignition.

Incident Commander Brian Gales of Northwest Incident Management Team 13 stated that the fire is expected to persist on the landscape for an extended duration due to the vast amount of ground fuels and the difficulties in accessing the area. As of Monday, firefighters were working to maintain constructed handlines, hose lays, and sprinklers to protect structures along the lakeshore.

Chelan County Emergency Management has issued a Level 3 (Go Now) evacuation order for the area around Rex Creek, extending to Hunts Bluff and the Moore Point area. Level 2 (Be Prepared) and Level 1 (Be Aware) evacuation orders are also in place for nearby areas.

The U.S. Forest Service has closed several trails and campgrounds affected by the fire on the north shore as it continues to burn up lake toward the community of Stehekin. The Lakeshore Trail from Prince Creek to the trailhead at Stehekin and portions of the Chelan Sawtooth

Wilderness, including Prince Creek, Cascade Creek, and Moore Point boat-in campgrounds, remain closed.

As of Monday, eight aircraft were supporting the 353 personnel on the ground, conducting supply drops, logistical assessments, cargo deliveries, and reconnaissance missions.

Weather conditions remain a concern, with breezy and cooler temperatures experienced over the weekend. A low-pressure system that moved in on Saturday brought colder temperatures, with lows in the 30s and 40s and a possibility of snow above 4,500 feet elevation. Despite a 60 percent chance of precipitation on Saturday, the amount of rainfall on the fire did not exceed one-tenth of an inch.

Authorities continue to urge recreational boaters to maintain a safe distance from aircraft utilizing Lake Chelan for water collection and ask the public to adhere strictly to forest closure orders for their own safety and the safety of the firefighters battling the blaze.

Chelan City Council discusses seed funding for new Boys & Girls Club

CHELAN – Seed funding and future operating expenses for a new Boys & Girls Club destined for the Lake Chelan Community Center (LCCC) was discussed and generally supported at the regular bi-monthly meeting of the city council on June 11. City Administrator Wade Farris explained a proposed reallocation to the new club of \$233,905 in unobligated American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds that must be assigned by the end of 2025.

Finance Director Jackie Tupling cited the Lake Chelan Food Bank's use of a similar award of ARPA funds.

"They are diligently using those funds to go forward with their project of expanding the food bank," said Tupling.

Some concern was expressed over other city projects that would also benefit from those ARPA dollars.

"When we were first discussing the use of ARPA funds a couple of years ago...using these funds in a way that would build a foundation for organizations that needed that first step to take off and do grander things within the community," said McCardle. "Funding that first step to go and do great things."

Council member Bob Goedde weighed in on the side of the new club.

"Of all the projects I have looked at... this \$200,000 to get a Boys & Girls Club – that is a totally underserved group of

people – that's my target," said Goedde. "We gave \$200,000 to the food bank to look at putting a third floor on it, and this is far better served to the group I'm looking at."

LCCC board member Adam Rynd addressed concerns regarding whether the city would have to cover the club's annual \$96,000 rental cost.

"I wrote the lease for the Boys & Girls Club," said Rynd. "We have already secured private donations for the first five years of lease commitment, so the city is not obligated to any of that."

Rynd said the \$233,000 is an incubation investment to get tentative improvements completed so they can establish the facility for its use.

"We think it's a great anchor tenant for the community center and a lynchpin for raising additional funds to finish the gym and continue with programming for the community center as well," aid Rynd.

"In fact, as part of their lease they will actually be the property managers for the community center so they can help run it most efficiently and effectively."

Rynd said the typical Boys & Girls Club pays no rent and used the Brewster club as an example.

"The Brewster Boys & Girls Club facility is owned by the City of Brewster," said Rynd. "They get a \$1 per year rent. That's it."

Land Trust secures 221.6-acre conservation easement above Wapato Lake

High-quality shrub-steppe and wildlife habitat protected

WENATCHEE – The Chelan-Douglas Land Trust (CDLT) announced Friday the acquisition of a 221.6-acre conservation easement near Manson.

The easement, which protects vital shrub-steppe habitat and wildlife corridors, was secured through a collaborative effort between CDLT, Chelan County Public Utility District, and landowners Denis and Irmi Atam.

The newly conserved land, situated

above Wapato Lake, had previously been subdivided into 10 parcels slated for residential development.

However, the Atams' purchase of the property and subsequent partnership with CDLT and Chelan PUD has ensured that the land will remain predominantly undeveloped in perpetuity.

Mickey Fleming, CDLT's Land Program Manager, praised the Atams' dedication to conservation, stating, "CDLT has been working with the

Atams for several years to permanently conserve these beautiful 220 acres above Wapato Lake. The shrub-steppe habitat is home to a diverse group of wildlife whose territory is being constricted by development throughout the area.

The Atams took the risk of buying the property that surely would otherwise have been developed. They then worked with CDLT and the Chelan PUD to complete a conservation easement that will protect the land forever. We at CDLT are very grateful to Denis and Irmi for their commitment to

Colville Man dies weeks after Lake Chelan crash

MANSON – The Colville man rescued from his submerged vehicle in Lake Chelan has died.

Erik G. Korbely, 37, died on June 10 at Harborview Medical Center in Seattle, according to the Washington State Patrol.

Korbely sustained critical injuries on May 13 when he lost control of his vehicle on SR 150, struck a guardrail on the eastbound side, and plunged into the lake. The vehicle ended up fully submerged, resting on its top. Rescue crews worked to free Korbely, who was then airlifted to Harborview Medical Center.

A GoFundMe page was started to help Korbely's family with medical expenses.

Unprepared hikers rescued from snowy Maple Pass

WENATCHEE – On Monday, June 10, the Chelan County Sheriff's Office successfully rescued two stranded hikers in the Maple Pass area near Rainy Pass on Highway 20.

The rescue operation was initiated after Rivercom Dispatch received a distress text message from the hikers at approximately 6:11 p.m.

According to Sheriff Mike Morrison, the two hikers were unable to move due to snow and were unprepared for the conditions they encountered. With daylight fading, the decision was made to deploy the Chelan County Helicopter and coordinate with Okano-

gan County Mountain Rescue.

The helicopter crew located the stranded hikers from the air and inserted two mountain rescue team members onto the snow field above the hikers' location.

The rescue team quickly reached the subjects and guided them to the waiting helicopter.

The hikers, though cold and frightened, were uninjured. They were flown to the parking lot and met by Rick Balam of Okanogan County Search and Rescue. Due to the deteriorating light conditions, the two mountain

Advocacy group proposal would expand day use dock space

CHELAN – The Chelan Waterfront Dock Advocacy Group, comprised of Art Campbell, Greg Petersen, and Ron Foster, lobbied for more day-use dock space and boater access to downtown during the citizen comment period at the June 11 bi-monthly meeting of the city council.

The group proposes a 40-60-foot extension to the existing PUD dock at Riverwalk Park. At present, there is space for only four boats, and those spaces are usually all occupied during the summer months.

Adding a floating dock and access ramp west of the bandstand would also improve access to the limited tie-ups.

Chelan resident and boat owner Foster read part of an information handout distributed at the June 4 council workshop.

"The demand for the facility is already there," said Foster. "Currently, recreational users on the lake have few public places they can go. If you do not own property on the lake, then your boat must stay out on the water. Those

who own or rent boats or bring their own boats and launch them on the lake cannot reliably access Chelan city center via boat."

Foster pointed out the irony of the current lack of access to the downtown of a tourist mecca.

"We now have a beautiful city with a great downtown right next to the lake and we got four dock points (on the PUD dock) with access to downtown," Foster said.

"The day use moorage project would be such a win for the city," said Campbell. "Lake access is a big priority for the city and this project helps meet that goal. It's a simple project that would have an immediate public benefit with a high return on investment for the city."

The Dock Advocacy Group cited the following to support cost-effective two dock extensions:

- The expensive hardscape infrastructure is already in place at both locations. Only floating dock sections and a ramp need to be added.
- There is significant unmet demand for water access to the Chelan city center. Simply building the access infrastr-

structure will quickly generate more economic and recreational activity for the city center.

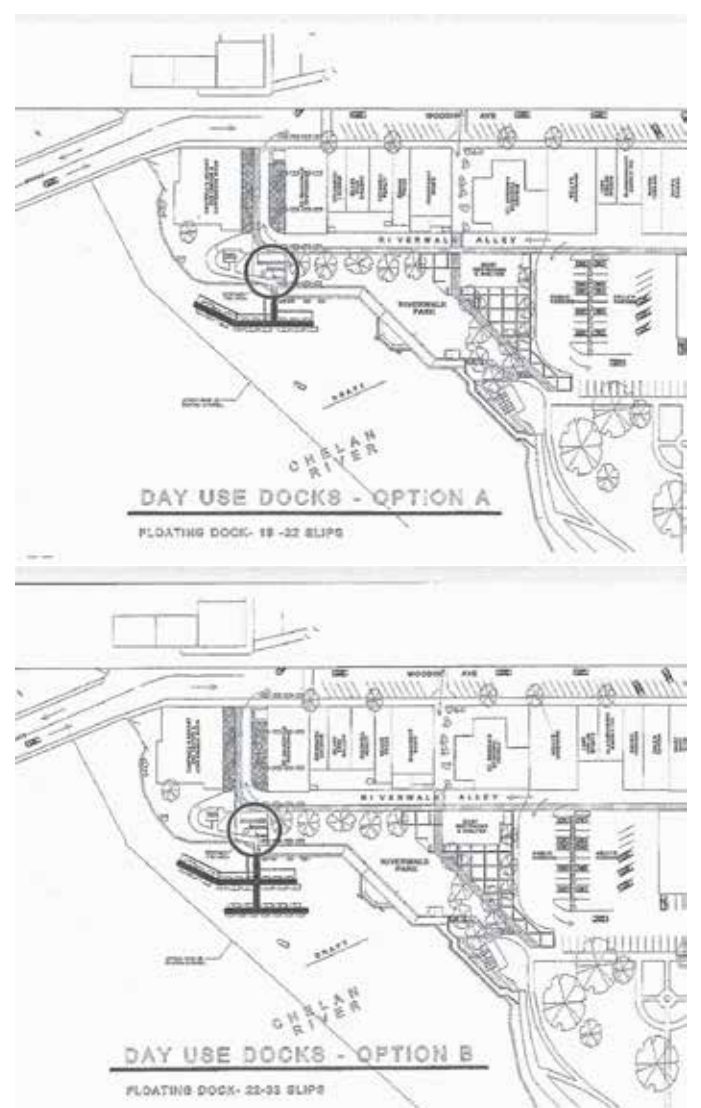
3. City residents and visitors will immediately benefit from the enhanced waterfront access without requiring new programs to generate interest and awareness, or the need to dedicate and modify new land for the project.

4. We believe resources beyond the city can be accessed to develop and implement this project. In addition to PUD involvement, there should be funding available from the RCO (Recreation and Conservation Office) which prioritizes state trailer license revenue for projects such as short-term boat moorage.

Our Advocacy Group has already met with Jim Kantz, Executive Director of the Port District, who has offered to help with the design work, submitting funding proposals, and permitting.

Campbell concluded his comments by offering tours of the proposed project to any council members interested in further inspecting the site.

Wenatchee Valley College launches Community Engagement Project

WENATCHEE – Wenatchee Valley College announced the launch of a regional survey to gather input from residents and help shape the college's future and better serve the communities of North Central Washington.

The initiative marks a shift from the college's previous internally focused planning approaches.

The last strategic plan was completed in 2018, before the pandemic. The college seeks

to center itself and be more impactful in the communities it serves.

"Our goal is to create a strategic plan that truly reflects the needs and aspirations of the communities we serve," said Wenatchee Valley College President Dr. Faimous Harrison.

"This project underscores our commitment to collaboration, partnership, and collective action."

The community engagement work includes an online bilingual survey, stakeholder interviews, listening sessions

in Wenatchee and Omak, and a separate survey for leaders in the region's private, nonprofit, and public sectors.

Consultants Summer Hess of Sage Step Consulting and Steve Maher have been retained to conduct the engagement work, analyze the input received, and write a report on the key findings to inform the college's strategic planning efforts.

The project is slated for completion on September 17, 2024, at the college's President's Day Event, with key findings to be made available to the community in fall 2024.

Wenatchee Valley College expressed gratitude to all participants and stakeholders involved in the collaborative endeavor.

conservation and their faith in CDLT."

The preserved transitional pine zone habitat will provide sanctuary for a wide array of wildlife species, including mule deer, black bear, cougar, moose, elk, western gray squirrel, numerous bird species, and native pollinators.

The property's adjacency to public lands further enhances its value as a wildfire corridor.

Chelan PUD Commissioner Carnan Bergren underscored the utility's commitment to environmental responsibility, noting that the easement acquisition was funded as part of Chelan PUD's federal license to operate Lake Chelan Dam.

"Chelan PUD is committed to stewardship and dutiful compliance with our Lake Chelan project," said Bergren.

"After many years of trying to secure a site – we are excited to be celebrating this successful partnership. Many thanks to the Atam family for their willingness to enter this conservation easement. This project highlights what can happen when public entities (state and local), nonprofit agencies, and individuals work together with a shared vision and

in the public's best interest."

For the Atams, the conservation easement represents an opportunity to safeguard the natural beauty and ecological integrity of the region for generations to come.

"We feel blessed living in such a beautiful environment and community," Denis and Irmi Atam shared. "After almost five years of collaboration with CDLT and Chelan PUD, we were finally able to obtain and implement a permanent conservation easement for a 221-acre parcel in the hills of Manson to preserve and protect the wildlife, fauna, and flora. We hope we can inspire others to follow our path – our mantra is: 'Not everything which can be developed should be developed.'"

Since its founding in 1985, CDLT has been at the forefront of land conservation efforts in North Central Washington, protecting forty miles of recreational trails and twenty-six thousand acres of diverse landscapes, including forests, shrub-steppe, wheat fields, and riparian areas across Chelan and Douglas counties.

The Atam conservation easement marks another milestone in CDLT's ongoing mission to preserve the region's natural heritage and promote responsible stewardship of its resources.

Culpepper & Merriweather Circus hosts Big Top raising tour

BREWSTER – Two cannibals were dining on a clown for dinner. One turns to the other and asks: “Does this taste funny to you?”

Leo Acton, a clown for the Culpepper & Merriweather Great Combined Circus when he is not serving as Big Top greeter and tour guide, definitely would taste funny. He delivered a constant stream of facts sprinkled with humor for guests watching the tent-raising process last Sunday morning, June 9, before the afternoon’s two performances.

As Acton began his introduction, the large Big Top tent was spread flat on the ground behind him.

“We are now watching the most important part of the tent-raising process, the coffee break,” he deadpanned.

“The first poles they are putting into place are called side poles because they are on the...” asked Leo, cupping an ear toward his listeners, “Side” came an answer from one observer. “Correct!” Acton said.

“It’s important our technical terms are so easy because we have people in this business from all over the world,” said Acton. “We have four spoken languages on this show, and lots of different cultural and educational backgrounds from GEDs to Ivy League degrees.”

“We have some third generation, some sixth generation,” said Leo. “Even our newest performer – a member of the Loyal Bareback Riders – just born in April is an 11th generation circus performer.”

Born in Berkeley, California, Acton is not from a circus family but got into the business three decades ago.

“I’ve been a circus clown since 1998. I went to Ringling Bros. clown college in 1996 and toured with the big show for 10 years,” said Acton. “I have been with C&M for the last 16.”

One of the show’s newest employees, Luella Smith, just joined the crew for the summer. She is a University of Idaho sociology major who said the exposure will benefit her study choice.

“Both of my parents were

clowns with Ringling Bros. & Barnum & Bailey,” said Smith. “I picked my major too late to get an internship and my mom brought this idea up to me. It’s kind of awesome.”

As Acton continued, the tent began to rise as the crew went about the process with practiced speed and efficiency. Earlier in the morning they drove 118 four-foot-long anchor stakes into the ground using 60-pound sledgehammers.

“The larger poles are called torsion poles,” said Acton. “They are 22 feet tall. The center pole is 30 feet.”

He turned attention to the tent.

“The tent is not one big thing, it’s three huge sections laced together,” said Acton. “It is 110 feet long, 80 feet wide, 30 feet high, and can fit 600

people in just our seats alone. We got this Big Top in 2018 for \$40,000,” said Leo adding that they can endure from three to eight years before needing replacement.

The show is based in Hugo, Oklahoma and started in 1985. It alternates years between West Coast and Midwest tours. Its 32-week season begins in mid-March and extends through October. The West Coast tour visits 200 cities and towns in 17 states while the Midwest schedule runs through 11 states.

Among those who arrived to watch the tent raising process Sunday morning were members of the Wenatchee Youth Circus Blue Crew.

One of the performers, Samantha Willoughby, a sixth grader from Lake Chelan,

showed up with father, Chris. “I’m an aerialist, acrobat, and stilt walker,” the younger Willoughby said.

The youth circus performs mainly in Washington and had a performance scheduled in Entiat the next weekend.

The tour progressed to some of the animal stars of the show including Wendell the lion who was raised as a household pet by an Oklahoma family before the circus acquired him.

Acton noted that all three cats on the Brewster tour are rescue animals.

“Our tigers were born in a roadside zoo in Northeastern Texas that was not taking care of their animals and got shut down for it,” said Acton.

He described how the C&M circus owner rescued the tigers when they were a year and a

half old and rehabilitated them for later introduction into the show. This year marks their 17th year on the tour.

They just turned 20 last July,” said Acton. “They see their main veterinarian at the beginning and end of every season and see another vet on tour at least once a month.”

The cats perform in a specially built 34-foot diameter, 50-foot-tall steel cable cage.

Before Acton completed his narrative the Big Top was up as final touches were addressed. Following the final performance of the day it takes the team about 90 minutes to pack up and load the 40-foot flatbed trailer for departure to its next destination.

Chelan will join Brewster among the 27 clubs that operate under the 501(c)(3) nonprofit umbrella of the Boys & Girls Clubs of Snohomish County.

“In our case, we have secured private donations from local and Puget Sound area donors to offset the rent expense the community center needs in order to service its own building expenses,” said Rynd. “We have a number of sponsors, including an individual donor who is going to contribute up to \$50,000

per year to offset to the quarter-million-dollar expense for the first year of tenancy.”

With the city’s AAU director nearing retirement, Farris said the city is also exploring the transfer of the AAU program to the Boys & Girls Club to manage, a savings of about \$50,000 for the city.

Rynd said he will arrange for a Boys & Girls Club representative to attend the June 25 council meeting and explain in more detail the new club’s sustainable operating strategy.

rescue personnel had to hike out of the area.

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My Experience with Shingles

Last week, I noticed some soreness in my left shoulder and saw a welt on the top of it, the size of a dime, next to my bra strap. It didn't look like an insect bite, but my shoulder felt "achy."

Shingles are caused by the same virus that causes chickenpox and herpes zoster. Having shingles is not like having a "new" infection; it's actually a delayed reactivation of chickenpox.

After recovering from having chicken pox, your body doesn't completely eradicate the virus that caused it. Herpes zoster sticks around, held in a suspended state inside your nerve

cells. Your immune system is in charge of keeping herpes zoster locked up.

At some point in the future, your immune system may be unable to prevent the virus from multiplying inside your nerve cells. Then the virus starts attacking your nerves, causing itchy blisters and a burning, tingling pain called neuralgia.

Some people with a shingles infection occasionally experience periodic "flares," suffering from painful tingling and burning that can last months or even years.

This is the most feared result of having shingles, called postherpetic neuralgia. Unfortunately, most pain medicines do not relieve nerve pain effectively, making postherpetic neuralgia a painful and lingering reminder of a shingles infection.

Five years ago, when I got the previous shingles vaccine, Zostavax®, my arm burned and itched for a week afterward. I tend to react strongly to vaccines, so I decided to postpone getting the newer vaccine, Shingrix®.

nent residents in the greater Wenatchee area who are eligible to naturalize. Through this partnership, we are bringing the resources to them," said Summer Hayes, Associate Director of Community Libraries for NCW Libraries.

Just how strong is spider silk?

A thread of spider silk is stronger than a thread of steel the same thickness. It is one of the strongest materials on earth.

ORB WEB

This web has spokes like bicycle wheels.

TRIANGLE WEB

The spider attaches two points of its web to twigs. It holds onto the third point and attaches itself to a third twig. When an insect lands on the web, the spider loosens the end it holds and the web pulls the insect inside.

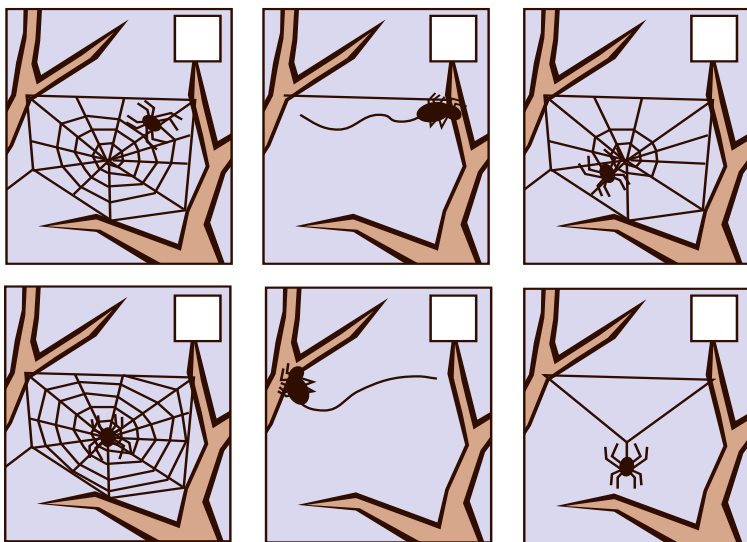
FUNNEL WEB

Spun between blades of grass, the funnel web has a wide opening. The spider hides at the bottom of the funnel, waiting for insects.

How do spiders make silk?

Spiders have little finger-like spinnerets at the rear of their bodies. They squeeze liquid from a silk gland between the spinnerets. When the liquid hits the air, it hardens into a long, thin thread. Spiders can make the thread thick or thin, sticky or dry, smooth or bumpy.

The Making of an Orb Web

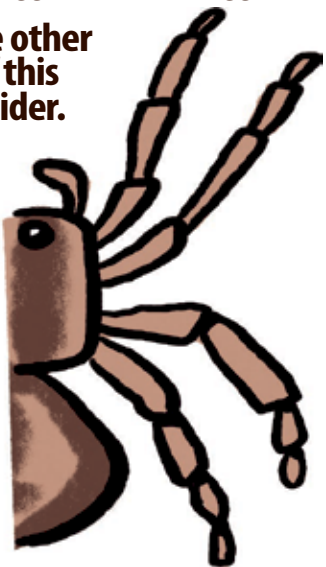
Number the pictures in order from 1 to 6 to show the making of an orb web. It takes a garden spider less than an hour to complete an orb web.
