State archives grant will help Chelan scan and store city records

CHELAN – As they tend to do over the years, the paper records were piling up in the city’s storage space, but an internal scanning project combined with a recent state grant is helping the clerk’s office get a handle on the matter.

City Clerk Peri Gallucci reported to the June 11 bi-monthly meeting of the city council that the city was among three applicants to receive a maximum \$50,000 records grant to help cover scanning costs of the backlog. Gallucci said that of 122 applications for the grants, only 25 were funded. Of those, only three exceeded \$40,000, and Chelan received one of them. The grant was awarded by the State of Washington Office of the Secretary

of State Archives and Records Management Division.

“The downside of it is our actual scanning needs are \$102,000,” said Gallucci. “We are looking at doing some scanning in-house, but the grant will cover a big chunk of it, about 35 boxes.”

Mayor Erin McCardle asked Gallucci to update the council about the quantity of records her office has already addressed.

“When we first started, the whole entire (room) was full of boxes and drawings and stuff all mixed up,” said Gallucci. “We are completely finished with community development. Besides the scanning, we are done with finance, we are done with parks, and we will hit public works in September.”

Gallucci said her office has scanned thousands of documents internally and disposed of at least 300 boxes of

those no longer needed.

A downstairs central repository will house those records that must be retained until their retention period is met.

“All of the city’s records will be coming here until their disposition,” Gallucci said.

Chelan installs Narcan kiosk to combat opioid overdoses

CHELAN – Chelan now has a kiosk with the potentially life-saving medication Narcan.

Narcan is a life-saving medication that can rapidly restore breathing to a person experiencing an opioid overdose. The kiosk is located outside the Lake Chelan Health Clinic at 219 E. Johnson Avenue.

Ray Eickmeyer, Director of Lake Chelan Health EMS, said the kiosk’s location is low-barrier because, with its proximity to downtown, it is easy to access and available 24 hours a day.

The kiosk also offers two types of COVID tests. Eickmeyer hopes to add additional items such as emergency blankets, condoms, feminine hygiene products like pads and tampons, electrolyte drink mixes, yeast infection

treatments, and flu tests.

Eickmeyer said that he has seen similar kiosks in other areas. He noted that people took only what they needed and did not abuse it.

“It’s an additional low-barrier safety net,” he said. “I think what it does is it helps people engage in their health, or they would just go without, right, and so having stuff available

Special meeting addresses Chelan homeowner fire insurance issues

CHELAN – A special meeting of the Chelan and Manson Fire District Commissioners, department chiefs, city council, and Washington Fire Commissioners Association lobbyists came together for a ZOOM conference last Thursday, June 20, to discuss remedies for the growing problem of insurance coverage for Chelan County homeowners.

“What we are seeing in our area and in other areas are insurance

companies not renewing policies either by zip code or by outdated blanket fire risk maps,” said Chelan Fire Commissioner Russ Jones, who opened the conversation. “What we’d like to see is legislation that would require insurance companies...to look at individual parcels and assess their actual fire risk and recognize things people have done to harden their properties against fire risk.”

In an earlier discussion with State Senator Brad Hawkins, Jones was advised to arrange a stakeholder meeting of all affected parties

to ensure everyone has a clear understanding of the issues before trying to come up with answers.

“We really need to hear about other districts in the state and come with a coalition,” said Manson Fire Commissioner Fred Weiss. “We can’t necessarily have legislation that is germane to Chelan County. We know there are other districts that are having problems, I just don’t know who they are.”

Public hearing highlights Chelan six-year transportation program

CHELAN—Residents who did not attend the proposed six-year transportation program (STIP) public hearing at the June 11 city council meeting missed a staff report by Public Works Director Jake Youngren outlining the STIP’s purpose and need.

“This plan is a requirement of the city to adopt on an annual basis to submit to the state,” said Youngren. “It’s one of the mechanisms that allows to qualify for state and federal funding.”

Youngren described the following near-term projects:

Apple Blossom Pedestrian Trail

“There is a current contribution commitment from the developer of Apple Blossom to the city for \$725,000 to commit to a trail that would connect Apple Blossom from where the existing sidewalk ends near the Sargeant Field football field,” said Youngren. “We estimate that total project costs around \$1.2 million, and we are working to leverage our commitment from the developer to be able to execute through different grants.”

U.S. acknowledges historic and ongoing negative impacts of Columbia River dams on tribes

WASHINGTON, D.C. – In a report released on June 18, the U.S. Department of the Interior acknowledged Columbia River dams have had historic and ongoing negative impacts on tribal communities.

"The Yakama Nation has always spoke for the water, fish, and cultural resources that cannot speak-up for themselves. I am hopeful that through this report, federal entities will listen to Yakama People," said Gerald Lewis, Yakama Tribal Council Chairman, in a press release.

The analysis highlighted ways in which the hydroelectric system on the Columbia and lower Snake Rivers blocked critical migration for anadromous fish and flooded thousands of acres of land,

sacred sites, and ancestral burial grounds. In doing so, the report acknowledged the system's adverse cultural, physical, spiritual, and economic impacts on Indigenous populations.

"The Department understands that honoring the government's trust responsibility and the sovereignty of Tribal Nations includes advancing equity and self-governance, correcting environmental injustices, and supporting Tribal Nations to ensure the spiritual, cultural, physical, and economic well-being of their members," the report stated.

According to the report, the current annual return of naturally produced salmon and steelhead is less than 10 percent of historical runs, stating "around two million salmon and steelhead return to the Columbia Basin annually, with

hatchery-origin fish making up two-thirds of that total."

"It's been a long time coming. I've been working on the Columbia River most of my career. We've fought for salmon restoration and increased funding. We've sort of known what we need to do for salmon rebuilding, salmon recovery, and we always get about 25 percent of what we ask for as far as habitat restoration or actions at the dams, even our hatchery funding," said Tom Iverson, Yakama Nation Fisheries Regional Coordinator.

The report concluded with a series of recommendations, such as prioritizing treaty and trust responsibilities in resource management and protection, considering impacts on cultural resources in future actions, recognizing the cumulative impact of historic and current conditions, and giving weight

to the disproportionate environmental burden on tribes, particularly in the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA).

The report also called for recognizing that status quo conditions of the river and its contained species reflect a degraded baseline, particularly in the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA).

"When the Endangered Species Act was adopted in the 90's for Columbia River salmon, it actually lowered the bar for the federal government...the standard for the Endangered Species Act is to avoid jeopardy. Which means, you can't do harm that will cause a species to go extinct, but it means you can do some harm, as long as it's not going to drive the fish to extinction," said Iverson.

The analysis looked into 11 Columbia River Basin dams,

and the circumstances of eight of the basin's Tribal Nations immediately affected. It fulfills a commitment by the Interior Department to look into how hydroelectric operations on the Columbia River have affected Tribes as part of an agreement to pause a lawsuit in the U.S. District Court of Oregon.

This agreement, called the Resilient Columbia Basin Agreement, was signed on December 14, 2023, by the U.S. government, the states of Washington and Oregon, several Native American tribes, and the National Wildlife Federation. The agreement will work towards restoring wild salmon and other native species while expanding and strengthening a clean energy grid in the basin.

CHELAN - The Lake Chelan Health & Wellness Foundation has awarded scholarships to 18 high school graduates from Chelan and Manson for the 2024-2025 academic year. The foundation also provided financial support to 13 college students in their 2nd, 3rd, and 4th years of study.

Fifteen students from Chelan High School each received a \$1,000 scholarship, while three students from Manson High School were also awarded scholarships. The recipients will pursue degrees in various health-related fields, including biology, nursing, dental hygiene, kinesiology, and psychology.

Additionally, the foundation awarded scholarships ranging from \$2,000 to \$3,000 to college students from the Chelan and Manson areas who are continuing their education. These students are enrolled in universities such as Washington State University, Gonzaga University, Eastern Washington University, University of Washington, and Lewis & Clark College. They are pursuing degrees in nursing, kinesiology, speech and hearing, pre-med, biology, dental hygiene, and veterinary medicine.

CHELAN - The gym floor at Chelan High School was covered with girls ranging in age from elementary through high school last Friday, June 21. They were among the more than 100 from around the state who signed up for the Chelan All-Girl Wrestling Camp

"We just added a middle school girls wrestling program this year," said Chelan Athletic Director Evan Reister. "We're going to hire a coach in the next couple of weeks. It's becoming a huge thing."

Manson wrestling coach and camp organizer Sam Lovelace said that while girls wrestling has come a long way, it's just getting started.

"Never did I think I would be at a girls-only camp, let alone running one," said Lovelace, "Every year, they

have to restructure the state tournament because so many girls are joining."

Opportunities beyond high school are part of the incentive now.

"I tell kids that if you go to the state tournament, I can get you a scholarship to go to college," said Lovelace. "There are so many programs opening up and not enough kids. When I wrestled, there were 15 programs altogether at Nationals, now there are close to 200."

Lovelace, from Puyallup, wrestled at White River High School and for a year at Yakima Valley College before moving on to Missouri Valley College, where she was named an All-American. She coached at Klahowya High School in Silverdale and, upon receiving her teaching certificate, took a

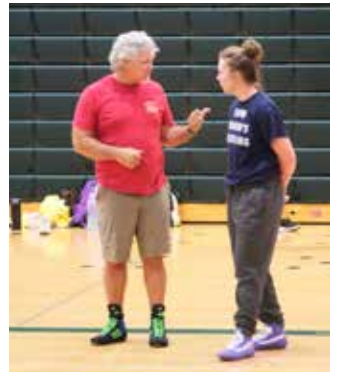

position in Manson.

experiences related by homeowners, there appears to be little rhyme or reason as to why one party's coverage is canceled while another's is renewed. The suggestion that companies are using insufficient or outdated maps and data has merit.

"The insurance companies are actually using a lot of third-party providers for their fire risk maps," said Chelan Fire Commissioner Mark Donnell. "Some of them are based on past history; some of them projected history based on severity of previous fires, especially in California and elsewhere."

"The insurance companies aren't all consistent in what they are using," said Donnell. "Homeowners aren't getting any help or direction from them, and we are trying to do our best as fire districts or agencies to help them do the right thing."

Donnell said that somewhere, there is a disconnect.

"We need to get these folks together to figure out how we can make this:

1. So that people aren't getting dropped.
2. That they are doing the right thing to mitigate their risk.
3. Help the insurance companies lessen their losses," Donnell said.

"What I would like from you in Chelan is a brief

description of what the issue is in your words," said Roger Ferris, Executive Director of the Washington Fire Commissioners Association (WFCA). "We can dress it up and forward it out in 2,000 emails and find out if it's happening somewhere else, as well as coordinate with the state fire chiefs and their email network."

WFCA lobbyist Ryan Spiller agreed with the earlier suggestion that a meeting of insurance, legislative, fire prevention, and homeowner stakeholders is the next step toward getting all parties informed and on the same page going forward.

Chelan Fire Commissioner Karyl Oules said legislators told her they want to be involved in a stakeholder meeting and suggested lobbyist involvement as well.

"We've got an animal here with a lot of heads that needs to be invited and involved," said Oules. "What we got started is very, very good, but it's going to take everybody working together."

Chelan councilmember Jon Higgins encouraged the group to keep Chelan citizens informed of its progress.

"Senior citizens are especially concerned," said Higgins. "Insurance issues could be the tipping factor for many of us."

Chelan PUD engages community on outage plans to prevent wildfires

LEAVENWORTH – Chelan County PUD held three open house events in Entiat, Wenatchee, and Leavenworth to educate the public on its Fire Safety Outage Management, which is also referred to as a public safety power shutoff (PSPS).

"This is a great opportunity for us to listen to folks about particular concerns...So it's a way for us to learn," said Chelan PUD Commissioner Steve McKenna.

A PSPS is a proactive measure in which the PUD implements power outages during high winds and dry conditions, in order to prevent wildfires ignited by utility infrastructure. The last resort

measure is reserved for when the right conditions would create unstoppable fires that escape initial attack, such as the 2018 Camp Fire in Paradise, California.

According to Chelan PUD Senior Communications Strategist Rachel Hansen, the PUD monitors a dashboard of data points such as wind speed, dryness of fuels, estimated flame length and speed of travel in the event of a fire, over a 10-day forecast. PUD monitors rural areas with the highest risk of wildfire for a potential PSPS, which spans about 14,000 PUD customers.

"We're going on our fourth year of having fire safety outages. We started it in the Lake Wenatchee area in 2021. We know that every year we do get 40 mile an hour winds

on different days. But so far, it's never been dry enough. The fire potential just hasn't been so high that we'd actually have to use it. So we've never actually had a fire safety outage, we're just prepared to do so," said Hansen.

If the right conditions are forecasted, PUD would warn affected areas of a targeted outage 48 hours in advance. Power would be shut off until the end of the weather event, affected infrastructure would be inspected and repaired if necessary, then power would be restored.

"It's not a blanket shutdown, but it's really monitoring where the problem areas are, cutting those settings, diverting electricity as much as we can, and then monitoring," said McKenna.

To stay up to date with potential outages, Chelan PUD recommends updating contact information and signing up for Everbridge notifications through Chelan County Emergency Management. Those in need of electricity for medical equipment can sign up for the Electrical Medical Needs Registry at chelanpud.org/medform.

When notified of an outage, Chelan PUD customers should charge their phones, and stock up with at least three days-supply of water, especially if using a well, non-perishable food, gas for their car, and medications. Important things to consider include knowing how to manually open a garage door, safely operating a generator (unsafe use could put PUD workers at risk), keeping refrigerators and freezers closed as much as possible, and unplugging sensitive electronic equipment.

for people to use to help them do, I think, the right thing to do. And it doesn't hurt, and it may help somebody. That's what we're here to do is help people, right?"

The Chelan Douglas Health District, Department of Health and Lake Chelan Health EMS coordinated to make the kiosk available. Eickmeyer said this is the only kiosk of its kind in Chelan, Douglas Okanagon counties that he is aware of.

He said that Wenatchee has

a kiosk to help people connect with recovery navigators.

Eickmeyer hopes that offering Narcan in the kiosk will be a first step in helping people who struggle with addiction.

"There's two reasons (for the Narcan)," he said. "One we want, we don't want people to die from overdoses, right? Number two, it gives us an ability to gain trust and give an access point."

"People who are struggling with addiction, and most people who struggle with addiction, don't like struggling with addiction," he said. "They don't live

intersection study and one to address some pedestrian safety concerns.

"Currently, we have a crosswalk that is heavily used by students of Chelan Middle and High School and in close proximity to a corner that does not provide a great line of sight," said Youngren. "The solution is to provide safety measures to align the trail with the intersection and provide advance warning on the bridge through a push-activated rapid flashing beacon so vehicles

will be aware of crossing pedestrians."

Youngren noted that a grant application to fund the work was unsuccessful, but the city will continue to pursue grant money.

Sanders Street Pedestrian Project

This one is fully funded and includes intersection improvements at Okanogan and Wapato avenues.

"Right now, we have extremely long exposure to pedestrians crossing that street," said Youngren. "This will provide a shortened exposure by incorporating

ADA ramp buildouts and rapid flash notice beacons."

Youngren added that Saunders is under design, with construction expected in 2025.

Lakeside Trail

A project to connect Water Street to Woodin Avenue via a trail.

"That project is under design and fully funded by mostly grants," Youngren said.

Downtown Revitalization Project

"That is one that is currently funded for design without a super-clearpath on construction funding," said Youngren, "We

have some ideas that we will float to council on maybe how to execute that project."

Youngren explained that most of the projects he outlined are underway in some form.

"We are heavily dependent on grants," said Youngren. "If you look at the funding breakdown that we anticipate to be able to execute these, most of it does not come from the city. It's coming from external funding sources."

No council action was taken on the STIP.

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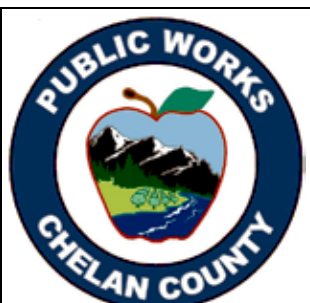

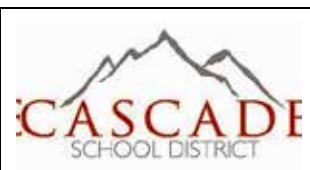

Don't Sweat It A Guide to Antiperspirants

Q: What's the difference between an underarm antiperspirant and a deodorant?

In 1984, the Gillette Company launched one of the most successful advertising campaigns of all time, making its Dry Idea® antiperspirant a household name.

Using famous celebrities, including a fashion designer, actress, comedian, and NFL football head coach, each advertisement featured an individual who shared three pieces of “advice” with their audience, starting with the word “Never...”

The first two “neverisms” related to the celebrity’s profession. The third piece of advice was always the same. It was a short tagline created to market Dry Idea® antiperspirant: “Never Let Them See You Sweat.”

Well, sweat happens. The average adult makes between 0.5 and 1.5 liters of sweat every day. Created inside special glands called sweat glands, sweat is delivered to the skin through tiny tubes called sweat ducts.

Humans have 2 types of

sweat glands: eccrine glands, which are active from birth, and apocrine glands, which don't become active until puberty. The sweat from eccrine glands is odorless and nearly 100% water. In contrast, apocrine glands secrete a thicker, oily substance with a musky scent.

Sweat glands concentrate in certain areas, including your forehead and temples, armpits, the palms of your hands, and the soles of your feet. Although you have far more eccrine sweat glands than scent-producing apocrine glands, both can be triggered by excessive body temperature or the stress of anxiety, fear, or pain.

Although the sweat from your eccrine glands is odorless when secreted, it creates an odor when bacteria on your skin digest it. Eccrine sweat also makes the smellier sweat from your apocrine glands much more noticeable.

There are four ways to combat the body odor and wetness created by sweating. The first is by using good hygiene, like showering or bathing regularly. This removes both types of sweat deposited on your skin before it can be digested by bacteria

and also reduces the number of bacteria on your skin available to digest it.

You can also block perspiration from appearing on your skin by applying an antiperspirant product to the areas with the most sweat glands, like your underarms.

Two other ways to prevent the development of body odor from sweat include inhibiting bacterial digestion of the sweat already on your skin by applying an antimicrobial substance and by using a fragrance to offset body odor.

All topical antiperspirants contain compounds called astringents. When applied to the skin, astringents cause the proteins in your skin cells to clump together.

The astringent's clumping action blocks the sweat ducts on your skin where you apply it, making that skin feel dry. All antiperspirants also work as deodorants because they have an antimicrobial action that interferes with bacteria on your skin.

Most antiperspirants contain aluminum salts, either alone or in combination with zinc. The most desirable antiperspirants keep skin dry without caking or

flaking off, damaging fabrics, or causing skin irritation.

The most common antiperspirant ingredients in use are aluminum zirconium, aluminum chloride, and aluminum sulfate, also called alum.

Because of the increased concentration of aluminum in the brains of people with Alzheimer's dementia, there is concern that daily use of antiperspirants containing aluminum could increase your risk of developing Alzheimer's.

Underarm deodorants that don't contain antiperspirant ingredients are antimicrobial compounds that interfere with the digestion of sweat by bacteria on your skin. Vitamin E and benzalkonium chloride are the most common antimicrobials in underarm deodorants.

Benzalkonium chloride is a mild astringent and antimicrobial widely used in products for use on skin and mucous membranes. It is also a preservative commonly used in contact lens solutions and non-prescription eye drops.

Here are 4 Tips for Selecting an Underarm Antiperspirant or Deodorant:

1. Choose between an antiperspirant/deodorant or deodorant-only product.

I prefer deodorant-only products because while antiperspirants may keep my armpits dry, the moisture is diverted to other places. I've experienced my entire back becoming totally soaked in sweat.

2. To minimize exposure to aluminum, look for natural or aluminum-free products.

Aluminum-free options include most deodorants and “natural” antiperspirants that do not contain alum or aluminum salts.

3. Choose based on your preferred scent instead of by gender.

The strength and chemical composition of underarm antiperspirant/deodorant products marketed for men and women are identical. The only difference between them is the fragrance.

4. “Stronger” antiperspirant products are available without a prescription.

You can use a “clinical strength” antiperspirant product containing a higher strength of aluminum zirconium, with 20% aluminum zirconium instead of 15%. Another option is the non-prescription antiperspirant



Drysol®, which includes 20% aluminum chloride hexahydrate.

Home fire sprinklers cut death risk by 82%, USFA reports

OLYMPIA -- Home fire sprinklers significantly reduce the risk of death in residential fires, according to recent data from the United States Fire Administration (USFA).

The USFA reports that a combination of fire sprinklers and smoke alarms can decrease the risk of fire-related fatalities by 82%. This statistic underscores the critical role of home sprinkler systems in enhancing life safety during fire incidents.

The National Fire Protection Association notes that property and content losses in fires are reduced by 55% when sprinklers are present. Additionally, the USFA estimates the installation cost in new homes at approximately \$1.35 per

square foot, with potential insurance rate reductions of 5 to 15 percent for meeting code requirements.

Residential sprinkler systems can be installed in both new and existing structures. These systems are designed to activate independently based

on elevated temperatures, not smoke, ensuring targeted response to affected areas and minimizing the risk of accidental activation.

Notably, sprinkler systems use 91% less water to extinguish a fire compared to traditional fire department

responses, offering a more efficient and less damaging solution to fire suppression.
