# Chelan council revisits Community Benefit Grant Program policy

Ward Media Staff Reporter

CHELAN - A discussion that the city council began at its September 10 meeting to create a more structured Community Benefit Grant Program led to final approval of the application policy at the Oct. 8 meeting. The motion also set the maximum funding amount for 2025 grant awards at \$111,250.

**Human Resources Communications** Director Chad Coltman reported to the council that the HR staff recommended benchmarking the awards maximum based on revenue projections from the city's Short-Term Rental (STR) renewals and new licenses issued this year.

and 35 new licenses at \$500 are anticipated during the November-December renewal period.

"This creates a bit of restraint in

the program... that forces us to pick and choose the organizations that we want to support and the amount we want to fund to them," said Coltman. "To help in that, we have created a scoring and evaluation criteria... so we can take an objective approach to ranking and rating applicants based on the application, presentation, alignment to the city's goals, and the potential impact of the gift the organization would receive."

An agenda overview statement said

An estimated 375 renewals at \$250 each that by using STR funds to support non-profits in our community, the city can leverage an aspect of tourism to directly benefit some of the most in need in our community and allow STR property owners the opportunity to partner with the city in supporting vital services through our non-profit agencies.

In past years, agencies such as Chelan Valley Hope, Thrive Chelan Valley, Chelan Valley Food Bank, and Meals on Wheels have been among the non-profit beneficiaries of the Community Benefit Grand Program.

CHELAN - The Lake Chelan Men's Golf Association has concluded its annual President's Cup Match Play Tournament for 2024, with John Hancock named as champion.

# Lake Chelan Research Institute to present findings on shoreline algae growth

CHELAN - The Lake Chelan Research Institute will present new findings on periphyton growth along Lake Chelan's shoreline on October 24 at the Ruby Theatre in Chelan.

Dr. Nate Hough-Snee, a researcher with the Institute, will lead the presentation titled "What's That Stringy Green Stuff Growing on My Dock? An update on attached green algae (periphyton) along the shoreline of Lake Chelan." The event is scheduled from 7:00 to 8:30 pm.

The talk is part of the "Ruby U" speaker series, initiated in 2024, to inform, educate, and challenge the community's understanding of the Chelan Valley and its future.

The study, funded by the Chelan County PUD Public Power Benefit Program, examines factors affecting Lake Chelan, including nutrient loads

# Council revisits proposal for a two-way Woodin Avenue Bridge

CHELAN - The future directions - literally - of the Woodin Avenue Bridge was the main topic of a public hearing over amendments to the city's six-year State Transportation Improvement Plan (STIP) at the October 8 bi-monthly city council meeting.

Public Works Director Jake Youngren said his staff recommended the amendments following a public outreach effort to learn what residents want included as transportation improvements in their city.

The Council adopts a STIP every year as a statutory requirement. Regardless of whether there is money in the budget to complete the projects the STIP provides a prioritized framework necessary to qualify for external grant and funding opportunities.

The city's 2025-2030 STIP was adopted on June 11, 2024. An open house held on Sept. 12 solicited public comment on the plan. Those results, combined with a community survey, were presented later in the month. The city is proposing to amend its

STIP to reflect public outreach that included 591 residents of the Chelan Valley who completed the survey.

"Many respondents advocated for restoring Woodin Avenue Bridge to two-way traffic," Youngren said.

Other suggestions include:

· Better walking and biking paths, specifically along the south shore and between Chelan and Manson, for pedestrian safety.

- · Dedicated parking areas.
- Improving intersections. · Enhancing public transportation
- Reducing traffic bottlenecks.
- · Increasing safety by providing
- better infrastructure for both residents and tourists. Youngren said responses from

residents from outside the city limits ranked a list of priorities as follows:

- 1. Easing traffic congestion
- 2. Enhancing pedestrian safety and walkability
- 3. Emergency evacuation routes 4. Safer access to schools

# Wildlife artist's work featured at Lake Chelan museum

CHELAN - The Lake Chelan Museum of Wildlife, Natural History & Art is showcasing a new mixed-media art exhibition featuring the work of award-winning western and wildlife artist Dean Rainey.

The exhibit, which opened on October 9, is part of the museum's 2024 art gallery program.

Rainey, a Wenatchee-area painter and sculptor, presents a collection of works that capture the diverse landscapes and wildlife of Washington state and the Pacific Northwest. His pieces, primarily oil and acrylic paintings on Masonite panels, reflect his lifelong connection to the natural world.

"Born on a cattle ranch, I was inspired early by the blank rolls of butcher paper and wide range of artist supplies my mother purchased when I was a youngster," Rainey said in a statement. "While I'm was mostly self-taught in the beginning, I learned to paint and draw on the big paper sheets. Luckily, I was encouraged

to express my visual world through a child's imagination.

The exhibition also features bronze sculptures by Lorenzo Ghiglieri, a world-renowned artist known for his evocative animal figures.

Shannon Kollmeyer, cofounder of Nature's Window, expressed enthusiasm for


WENATCHEE - Legislative candidates from Districts 7, 12, and 13 shared their thoughts on the future of STEM education and career-connected learning for youth through a forum on Oct. 7.

The forum was hosted by the Apple STEM Network in partnership with the North Central Educational Service District (NCESD) and NCW Tech Alliance.

"I was really excited with how many of the candidates came forward and participated, and they all seem to have done their homework and really [tried] to educate themselves about education through connected learning... It was really enlightening to get a sense of their thoughts around what we do here," said Holly Bringman, NCESD STEM Network Coordinator.

Position two candidates were those roles in the next year.

Both Engell and Ing-Moody were in favor of early exposure to different pathways. Engell encouraged career fairs that provide access to pre-apprenticeship programs, while Ing-Moody stressed the importance of legislative support in collaboration, addressing concerns shared by community colleges and school districts of having to compete for enrollment due

For early learning, Rep. Dent stressed the need to increase support for childcare centers who are overburdened by regulations, and said he was working on a bill to make childcare centers more viable and promote early learning.

"Early learning is a pathway out of dependence. Okay, we don't need welfare reform. We need to teach people so they can take care of themselves... I truly believe that, and to give them a pathway out of attendance to me the way to go," said Rep. Dent.

When addressing access to secondary education, Rep. Ybarra and Rep. Dent emphasized the importance of having conversations with experts from community colleges and school districts to learn what they need on a legislative level.

Lastly, the panel for District 12 candidates was moderated by Dr. Tracey Edou, Superintendent of Cascade School District. Participating panelists included candidates for position one Brian Burnett and Heather

Koellen, position two candidates Daniel Scott and Representative Mike Steele, and Representative Keith Goehner

Edou asked Burnett and Koellen how they would ensure digital equity with a number of online requirements such as the High School and Beyond platform. Burnett said he would work across the aisle to ensure broadband access is expanded.

"I don't necessarily have the answers, but I know that we need to come together and work as a team to make that happen," said Burnett.

Koellen said there was a need to increase accessible and consistent broadband, as well as expand education on how to use technology.

"We also need to ensure strong partnerships between local industries, community colleges and high schools to create a seamless transition from school to work in fields like healthcare, renewable energy, manufacturing and tech," said

Koellen. Edou asked Scott and Rep. Steele how they would ensure

"We do not have a dedicated funding mechanism for these projects," Youngren reminded the council.

"If the TBD (Transportation Benefit District) ballot measure does pass, there will be an addi-

tional effort to rank and prioritize the projects the city would like to execute.

The TBD measure for a .03 percent sales tax to fund city transportation projects is included on the Nov. 5 general election ballot.

The Woodin Avenue Bridge amendments won the Miss Popularity vote among councilmembers for most comments.

Councilmember Bob Goedde supports the two-way revision and cited his recollections of vehicle and pedestrian flows to support it.

'This isn't a city problem, this county and state," said Goedde. "Everybody that comes in from the North Shore has to fight the traffic problem... sixty seconds it takes to escape downtown Chelan is worth the effort.'

Councilmember Tim Hollingsworth wants more clarity between what he sees as conflicting proposals for a two-way bridge and reversing bridge direction together with pedestrian alternatives. He favors a cost-benefit analysis of how changes to Woodin would affect other city intersections.

"Before we commit to a specific proposal on our STIP I want us to fully understand the costs," said Hollingsworth.

"We have limited resources and a lot of traffic needs to address.'

Councilmember Shari Deitrich inquired about the potential for additional grant funding that could help pay for a Woodin project.

Councilmember Mark Ericks asked about the city's required match for a grant of that size. Youngren said the city match

range can be from five percent for state grants to 15-25 percent for federal. "One hurdle we have encoun-

tered looking at large projects is even being able to fund the match," Youngren said. At the conclusion of the

hearing, it was decided to pursue a deeper analysis of a two-way bridge proposal for a possible advisory vote of the public down the road.


# **NCW Libraries to host artist Lupillo** Beltran for symbolic art presentations

schools in rural and underresourced areas would have access to necessary technology and qualified teachers in place to meet a proposal to have computer science as a graduation requirement.

While the efforts would be challenging, Scott said he would bring unique insight to the legislature with an engineering background.

"We do need to make sure that we educate the teachers on how to educate the children, on how to use these devices, and we need to make sure that there are systems in place to do that. This proposed requirement, this computer science requirement for all students, I think it's pretty valuable," said Scott.

Rep. Steele emphasized the importance of ensuring that the class fits appropriately into the school day and students' curriculum, with proper state to ensure the proposed mandate doesn't become another burden on students and educators.


