After more than twenty years, Chelan County Sheriff's Office has a cruiser in Stehekin

STEHEKIN - "You can't get there by car." That's the answer you'll get if you ask anyone who's ever been there how to get to Stehekin, the tiny community at the northwest end of Lake Chelan with fewer than 100 year-round residents.

The fact of the matter is, it's hard to even get a car there at all. A quick Google search returns a result that practically insists on it, because there are no roads into Stehekin. There is no ferry that carries passengers and cars, like you might find in Western Washington.

The only way to get a vehicle to the tiny town is to put it on a barge and ship it there, and that'll cost you a few hundred dollars, so be sure you can't iust make do with one of the ATVs you can rent there to travel the one road that spans the lower Stehekin Valley.

But the Chelan County Sheriff's Office has done it: They've permanently stationed a repurposed school resource officer's SUV near the North Cascades Lodge in the picturesque community. The vehicle was in the

process of being rotated out of service, so they got it for a much lower price than buying a new unit.

There is no deputy permanently on duty there, of course. Because Stehekin is part of the Lake Chelan National

Recreation Area, most law enforcement needs are met by the National Park Service. But the Sheriff's Office does respond to some incidents in Stehekin that the NPS is not equipped to handle, and they need a means of

transportation. People live up to 20 miles away from the spot where you'd step off the ferry.

Deputies needing to use the cruiser

Lake Chelan Health CEO speaks on potential federal and state cuts

CHELAN - Lake Chelan Health CEO, Aaron Edwards, expressed concerns to approximately 100 attendees at Ruby Theater, March 15. He offered details on potential cuts, both federally and at the state level, that could negatively impact Lake Chelan Health. A newly formed group, Chelan Valley Indivisible, spearheaded by Jeff Fehr, is attempting to inform Chelan Valley residents about the dangers of Project 2025 and other Trump initiatives. They are also suggesting "Political to-do lists" for residents to speak out against Medicaid cuts, lessened public health protection, tariffs, voter suppression, immigration policies, and other Trump administration policies. Edwards said Lake Chelan Health employs roughly 430 people, with 210 who work full time. It has its own **Emergency Medical Services, Express** Care, Primary Care, Emergency Care and Specialty Care. "We gross 66 million with a margin of two million, which largely comes from tax revenue. Edwards said a new EMS building and a specialty care clinic are planned, but electrical panels come from Mexico and timber from Canada, so he is concerned about tariffs. Edwards listed some of the potential cuts that could impact Lake Chelan Health: Medicaid funding, physician medical education, reimbursement payment of bad debts, and telehealth services, removal of non-profit status, 340B cuts (drug discounts most rural hospitals receive), work requirements for Medicaid recipients. In addition to federal challenges the state is considering new payroll taxes, increases



our area. We believe we are going to grow older and skew toward retirees. which makes it tough to sustain OB which lost roughly \$780K last year."

They also have 22 active hospital grants worth about a million dollars. If it is perceived that Chelan is in violation of executive orders of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI), many of those grants could be at risk.

Another serious aspect is the conflict around immigration. "We want everyone to be able to get care." There is concern that community members will forgo necessary medical treatment because of the fear of being picked up by ICE while at the doctor's office or hospital.

District 12 Legislators address budget, education, and housing concerns in virtual town hall

OLYMPIA - State District 12 Legislators Senator Keith Goehner, Representative Mike Steele, and Representative Brian Burnett addressed key challenges facing Washington state in a virtual community town hall on March 20. The community meeting

during the meeting as lawmakers prepare to negotiate the 2025-27 biennium budget, facing an operating budget shortfall of an estimated \$15 billion over the next four years. The Republican representatives expressed the need to curtail new spending rather than increasing taxes and fees.

"We're not living within our means... We're spending more than we have. And again, this is not a revenues issue. This is a spending issue," said Rep. Steele.

in B&O taxes, capping insurance payments for governmental workers insurance plans (PEBB/SEBB), and a potential loss of rural labor and delivery funding. "Rural health is already challenging and it feels like it's getting tougher and tougher, there are 1,000 ways to die," Edwards said.

He also explained that all hospitals pay into a state fund which gets matching federal funds which gives back payments through Inner Governmental Transfers. This seems to be a potential target for DOGE (Department of Government Efficiency, enacted by Elon Musk)." It is \$1.1 million in the hospital's budget if that goes away, and we are not counting on it this year." said Edwards.

Edwards added that, as a retirement community, there are fewer births. Last year, the hospital was reimbursed \$177,000 for losses in that department, but it isn't enough. "We don't see many new young families moving into

Lastly, the Affordable Care Act (also known as ObamaCare) could potentially be in the crosshairs which could substantially harm rural healthcare. Senator Maria Cantwell and Kim Schrier (D-WA, 8th District) are working hard to save it.

Port weighs redevelopment while citizens push for park expansion on vacant lot

MANSON - The future of a prime piece of property in Manson is undecided as the Chelan-Douglas Regional Port Authority considers purchasing the vacant commercial lot next to Manson Bay Park.

The port, which holds the first right of refusal, envisions a bus turnaround and small business incubator on the site at 91 Wapato Way, Port Executive Director Jim Kuntz said.

Meanwhile, a group of private citizens has assembled a backup cash

offer with hopes of expanding the park instead. The port is set to make its decision at its next meeting on Tuesday, March 25, at 9 a.m.

"We have received input from a host of Manson citizens," Kuntz said. "Some like the concept of a redevelopment into small business incubator buildings. Others want the property to be used as a park."

Larry Hibbard is part of the group of citizens who want to see the property added to the Manson Bay Park.

'When some of us in the community realized that's the piece of property that had been talked about for probably 50 years as getting as an extension of the Manson Bay Park,' Larry Hibbard said. "Quickly, we put together a backup offer to the port if they decide not to do it and we found enough local donations to make a cash backup offer on the property. And that is where we sit."

If the port does not follow through with the purchase Hibbard said the group of locals is ready to jump in and purchase the property.

"We feel that we're not against them having the incubator building, but we think there are other options, without taking one of the nicest spots in town to do it," Hibbard said.

"It's just a group of individual, private citizens," Hibbard said. "We're all involved in various things in the town, and we have a common interest of improving the park and gaining more public access to the lake, and we feel that it would be an economic benefit in a lot of different ways to the community."

In the past, the owner of the service station kept an area of the property as a green space with trees and grass, Hibbard said.

"There were community picnics, Fourth of July celebrations, and other things there," he said. "And we have a park there now, but there's not a room there for a gathering place for people.

"If you want to have a family picnic, you want to have a group there, it's not set up for that," he said. "We have a great swimming area. We have a great boating area. But if people want to come up and bring a lunch or just sit and enjoy the lake, we don't have an area for that, it's pretty marginal."

The current property owner is Dorette Prinsloo.



Helion opens dialogue with community on fusion power project

WENATCHEE - Approximately 350 people filled the Mission View Elementary gym to learn about the possible construction of the world's first fusion power plant in Malaga during an information meeting on March 11.

Helion, an Everett-based energy company, is considering a 10-acre site on Chelan PUD property near Rock Island Dam to build the first fusion machine to produce electricity, if successful.

The purpose of the power plant would be to fulfill a 50-megawatt power purchase agreement with Microsoft.

"Our goal is not just to provide electricity, but to provide electricity in a way that's clean and safe, that's really low cost," said CEO and founder David Kirtley.

The community meeting hosted a panel of leaders from Helion, Chelan County PUD and Chelan Douglas Regional Port Authority to answer questions about the potential project.

With fusion, the company promises clean and cost-efficient energy without the downsides of existing nuclear power (fission), which runs the risk of an uncontrolled chain reaction and associated nuclear proliferation, and has long-lived ra-

dioactive waste. However, the developing fusion machine, named Polaris, would be the first of its kind to produce electricity at a commercial level. So far, the company has produced six prototypes. Its sixth generation, Trenta, became "the first privately-funded fusion device to reach commercially-relevant fusion conditions."

Helion hosted the informational meeting alongside Chelan County PUD and Chelan Douglas Regional Port Authority to answer questions and field concerns from the public about the groundbreaking power project.

During the Q&A portion of the meeting, residents raised concerns of the reliability of executing the project, as well as impact on the public utility,

property taxes, and the environment.

'There's got to be a cost. There's got to be a form of pollution that we don't understand... How do we harness that unknown?" said audience member Gary Koehler, who referenced the Hanford Nuclear site contamination and the Columbia River dams' impact on salmon populations.

The company said its power plant footprint would be smaller than the size of a high school campus, its water usage would be comparable to a small hospital (100 to 300 gallons of water per minute), and its air emissions and radiation would be within Department of Health standards.

The plant would also have a nitrogen fire suppression system. Additionally, Helion explained its radioactive byproduct tritium had a half-life of only 12.5 years.

"It decays into helium-3. So this becomes like a wine cellar. As it ages, it ages into our fuel. These valves can be opened up. We can pull that helium-3 out and put it back into our machine," said Michael Hua, Helion Director of Radiation

so that's our interest here," said Chelan County PUD General Manager Kirk Hudson.

In response to concerns about project abandonment, Kirtley said the company had enough private investment to construct the "buildings and all the generator infrastructure for the facility." As part of the licensing process, the company also had to place the cost of decommissioning the site in a trust to ensure state-driven clean up was funded, said Hua.

The company is still in the process of permitting and agreements. If all goes to plan, it aims to deliver its first electrons to the grid by 2028, according to Helion Communications Director Jessie Barton.

OLYMPIA - The Washington State Parks and Recreation Commission is opening up more camping opportunities for visitors by expanding its same-day reservation option to all parks with reservable campgrounds.

Campers can book a sameday reservation until 2 p.m. on their intended day of arrival.

This change is specific to campground reservations and does not apply to roofed accommodations, vacation rentals, yurts and day-use facilities (like picnic shelters).

First come, first served camping is still available for unreserved sites after 2:30 p.m.

State Parks launched its same-day reservation pilot program in September 2023 at Cape Disappointment, Deception Pass and Millersylvania state parks. Due to its success, it was expanded in 2024 to an additional 24 parks. To date, the program has brought in more than 7,000 same-day reservations for sites that might otherwise have been vacant.

This system-wide improvement will provide more opportunities for more campers to experience a night in a state park, and it will improve the experience for day-of planners. Additionally, this change will help the agency fill sites with last-minute cancellations.

State Parks is primarily funded by earned revenue, with 64% of its funds coming from fees, purchases, donations and other revenue and 36% coming from state general funds. Camping and roofed accommodations account for 40% of the agency's earned revenue and 23% of its total funding.

Eastmont District budget update sees staff cuts due to reduced enrollment

EAST WENATCHEE Interim Eastmont School District Superintendent Spencer Taylor is tasked with delivering difficult news to parents and the community.

But a school district's budget is a tightrope even in the most affluent communities, and all across Washington state there's been an education funding crisis for years. Taylor notes that the community has become accustomed to budget shortfalls, but is not attributing this one to Eastmont-specific policies.

Now, due to reduced enrollment primarily at the two extremes of the grade spectrum, there are unfortunately staff reductions in the works. At the kindergarten level, reduced enrollment can come from a number of factors, but is explained primarily by a decreasing birth rate and the cost of housing in this area. At the high school level, many students are availing themselves of the Running Start program and find themselves in seats at Wenatchee Valley College instead of Eastmont.

In fact, the district anticipates a three-point-five percent reduction in enrollment. That

looks like it's going to translate to approximately 10% cuts in administration, which will bear the brunt of the reductions. The district anticipates a five percent reduction in the budget each in both certificated staff (those holding teaching certificates) and classified staff (those not required to be certified, like custodians and bus drivers).

The reason for the use of percentages rather than real numbers for expected cuts is that much of the "right-sizing," as Taylor calls it, will come from restructuring existing roles. Where one person may have been filling a role as a job of its own previously, two or more jobs may be consolidated into one in the future. For

example, Taylor is the Executive Director of Elementary Education for Eastmont, but was named Interim Superintendent last December in anticipation of former ESD Superintendent Becky Berg's retirement at the beginning of this year.

He now holds both roles until a new Superintendent is appointed by the school board.

The district does not believe there will be a large disruption in class sizes, from essentially no change for elementary levels to slight variations based on department at the secondary level.

Many parents have questioned the prioritization of sports and the purchase of a

bus over keeping staff. The district explains that sports funding and transportation spending come from entirely separate funding allocations and can't be redirected to staffing. The district could not, for example, forego repairs to a district vehicle in order to redirect that money to teacher pay. Priorities are on the mind

An additional struggle that Eastmont faces is the fact that the state only funds about 70% of school district positions, and in practice, actually underfunds the true costs, according to Taylor. The schools are forced to make up the shortfall with levies and other revenues to make sure that educators

"We are keeping the student experience at the heart of this,' said Taylor. "This is really hard. Eastmont has a great culture, and we try to do our best to support our staff, so our staff can support students, and any time that you're not able to keep staff, it is really, really hard."

Taylor wants parents and community members to know one thing first and foremost: That all budget decisions are being made with students in mind, and that all contracts are being honored, including the contract with the community that funds their levy.

"District budgets are incredibly complicated, and we want to make sure that your questions are answered," said Taylor. The proposal would increase in annual property tax growth from the current 1 percent cap to the combined rate of population growth plus inflation.

On the topic of housing, Sen. Goehner, who sits on the related committee, discussed his support for more housing options through his sponsorship of middle housing allowed in Urban Growth Areas (UGA). However, he could not support the proposed rent control cap of 7 percent annually.

"I talked with a number of low income housing people, and they've encouraged me to support that, and I've told them I can't support it, because I really do care about low income housing people. Because if this goes in, it's shown to be across the nation to actually be a deterrent to more housing being built," said Sen. Goehner.

Education also received significant attention during the town hall, with concerns of budget declines and dwindling resources from a local teacher.

The representatives affirmed their commitment to education funding in the budget, as well as exploring additional means of support.

Concerns also arose from a retired teacher regarding the need for a permanent cost-ofliving-adjustment (COLA) for closed retirement plans.

"It's something that I care deeply about. I know it's something that Sen. Goehner cares deeply about, and I know it's something that Rep. Burnett is absolutely behind, and it's something we all believe...That


a promise made should be a promise kept," said Rep. Steele.

Additionally, Rep. Burnett discussed his first legislative bill proposal, House Bill 1969, which would provide financial assistance to local law enforcement aviation support units. The bill passed the House floor and is currently under review in the Senate.

"That's just going to help provide some funding for our four agencies in Washington State, which [are] Snohomish, King, Chelan and Spokane, that [have] rotary programs primarily for search and rescue," said Rep. Burnett.



The concept of defensible space, as outlined by the National Fire Protection Association's (NFPA) Firewise program, divides a property into three distinct zones that work together to slow or stop the spread of wildfire. Each zone has specific landscaping and maintenance recommendations to minimize fire hazards.

Immediate zone (O-5 feet): your first line of defense

The area closest to your home is the most vulnerable to flying embers, which are a leading cause of home ignitions during wildfires. To safeguard this space:

- Keep roofs and gutters free of leaves and debris.
- Choose non-combustible ground covers such as gravel, stone, or concrete rather than flammable

Install metal mesh screens (1/8-inch or smaller) over vents to prevent embers from entering.

Intermediate zone (5-30 feet): reducing fire intensity

This area serves as a buffer between your home and the surrounding landscape. helping to reduce the intensity of flames should a fire reach your property. Best practices include:

- Maintaining a wellirrigated and trimmed lawn with grass no taller than four inches.
- Spacing trees at least 10 feet apart to prevent fire from jumping from one to another.
- Removing "ladder fuels"vegetation that allows fire to climb from the ground to treetops.
- Pruning tree branches 6-10 feet from the ground to prevent flames from reaching the canopy.

Not only that, but quality soil provides stability so plants can root firmly and grow healthy and sturdy to support their bounty. Quality soil also allows for ample drainage. Organic matter like compost, leaf mold or aged manure all help improve soil quality.
- 4. Keep water close. Lugging water can quickly eliminate the pleasure of tending your garden, so be sure you're situated near a hose. You'll know it's time to water when the soil is dry about an inch below the surface.
- 5. Plan for plenty of sun. A bright, sunny spot is a must, since most vegetables, herbs and fruits depend on six or more hours of sun every day. Remember the sun's path changes throughout the year, and as trees and foliage grow, they may produce more

shade with each growing season.

Dethatching your lawn has numerous benefits. But if you're not sure what dethatching is or how to do it, you may be wondering if it's really worth all the effort.

To shed light on dethatching, lawn care equipment manufacturer, Exmark is answering some frequently asked questions.

What is Thatch? Thatch is a compacted layer of grass and plant stems, leaves, roots, and other organic debris that builds up faster than it can decompose. It accumulates right below the surface of your lawn and right on top of the soil, at the base of your grasses' blades. Overly thick thatch blocks water and fertilizer from reaching the grasses' roots, causing them to be trapped and vulnerable to heat, drought and stressfurther stunting your lawn's health and growth. However, thatch isn't always a bad thing—a layer that's less than a quarter-inch thick is normal and isn't cause for alarm. It actually helps reduce soil compaction and water loss through evaporation, and it increases tolerance for cold and heat by protecting the growing blades.


When Should You Dethatch Your Lawn? For warm-season grasses, it's best to dethatch in the late spring or early summer, and for cool-season grasses it's best to do it in early spring or fall. But before you start dethatching, mow your lawn to half its normal height to avoid tearing up any live grass in the process. Then, take out your rake or dethatcher and remove the thatch.

How Do You Dethatch? The process of dethatching is simple. You can purchase a specialized rake, but in a pinch, a regular rake will do. You can also rent a dethatcher to make the job even easier. Your lawn might look a bit ragged afterwards, so you'll need to go over it again—this time just barely skimming the top of your lawn to remove all the loose debris that you just dug up. But before you start, call up your local utility company and have them mark any buried lines to avoid unwanted surprises.

What are the Benefits of Dethatching Your Lawn? The time and effort that it takes to remove thatch pays huge dividends. Primarily, it exposes your soil to warmth and sunlight, helping carbon dioxide and key nutrients reach your grasses' roots, resulting in deeper growth. It also encourages the effectiveness of fertilizers and reduces water pooling on the surface of your yard by facilitating drainage. And, it helps fight back against invasive weeds that thrive in conditions created by a heavy thatch layer. Best of all, it promotes an overall healthier, greener lawn.





Dig Safely

Before digging, remember that proper tree placement requires factoring in underground utility lines, overhead power lines and proximity to sidewalks, driveways and homes. Dial 811, the national call-beforeyou-dig number, to locate underground utilities and consider contacting an arborist or tree care professional to make sure you've weighed all the important factors.

Break Ground

Dig a hole that's roughly 2-3 times wider than the root ball of your tree and equally as deep as the root ball. Be sure the trunk flare (where the trunk expands at the base of the tree) is partially visible when planted. Remove any wrapping or cover from COURTESY OF UNSPLASH the root ball and trunk. Lift from the root ball, not the trunk, to place in the hole then straighten vertically and firmly backfill soil around the root ball to stabilize.

Add Mulch

Mulching helps maintain moisture and improve soil conditions while controlling weed growth. Place a 2-3-inch layer in a 3-foot radius around the base of the tree without touching the trunk itself.

Keep Soil Moist

Make sure your tree has enough water to grow strong by keeping the soil moist. Typically, this means watering just once per week, barring rain, but may require more frequency during especially hot weather.



BACKFEED: Never plug a generator into an electrical outlet- this could cause backfeed, which sends electricity from the generator, through the home's wiring, out through the electric meter and energizes the power lines. Backfeed can injure or kill a utility worker repairing a power line.

TRANSFER SWITCH: When operating a generator, connecting appliances that are hard-wired to the house's wiring system requires the use of a transfer switch. The switch will mechanically disconnect the household's circuit from the utility's power grid. A transfer switch MUST be used to avoid backfeed into the utility's power grid and is required by electric code.



INSTALLATION: Electric code requires that a licensed electrician install stationary generators that are permanently wired to the household's electrical system. The owner of the generator must acquire an electrical permit, and the unit must be inspected.



Gardening can be a simple way to beautify your yard, relieve stress and save money on your grocery bill, but like any hobby, you can get carried buying necessary away equipment.

frugal and Fun, environmentally friendly, these tricks can help you create a cost-effective garden:

- Use a yardstick and permanent marker to mark inches and feet on the handle of your rake, shovel or hoe. The next time you plant, simply lay the marked handle along the row to create perfectly spaced holes for seeds.
- Line the bottom of a clay pot with a coffee filter to keep soil from leaking out the bottom.
- · Use empty plastic water

bottles or clear milk jugs to fill the bottom of large pots. They reduce the weight of the pot and require less soil to fill.

- To test your seeds to see if they're still viable for this planting season, place a wet paper towel inside a zip-top bag, drop in 3-4 seeds and wait a week to see if anything grows.
- One way to help prevent weeds is lining your garden with a layer of newspaper. Just top two or three sheets of newsprint with a layer of pine needles, grass clippings or dried leaves for an eco-friendly and inexpensive weed barrier. Keep gardening twine handy. Nail a funnel to
- your potting bench with the spout pointing downward,



feed the twine through and your string will never go missing. For a more portable solution, place a ball of twine inside a canning jar, make a hole in the lid and feed the end of the twine through the hole. Now, you can take twine anywhere, tangle-free.

There is no need to buy expensive potting systems for starting seedlings. Place several cardboard toilet paper rolls inside a clean plastic clamshell, like those used for premade salads. Fill each cardboard tube with potting soil and plant. Once your seedlings grow too tall for the clamshell, simply tear off the top lid.
