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Wright City continues pursuit of district title

The Wright City baseball team is ready to make an-

other run at a district title.

The Wildcats return a strong nucleus from last season's team that won a pair of games in the district tournament before falling to St. Charles West on a walkoff home run in the district championship game. Wright City's seven returning seniors have been to the district championship game their only two seasons of high school baseball.

'They've been there twice. Just haven't done that yet," Wright City baseball coach Ryan Raterman said. "After being there twice, hopefully the jitters are gone and we can. I'd like to think we can get back there again and give ourselves a chance again.

Wright City is led by all-state players Hayden Waters and Duan McRoberts. A senior, Waters returns as the Wildcats' top pitcher. He also started in the outfield when he was not on the mound and hit in the middle of Wright City's lineup. A sophomore, McRoberts hit in the leadoff spot for the Wildcats for the majority of last season. He started in the outfield for Wright City.

The Wildcats return a bevy of regular starters from last year's squad. Additionally, Jake Orf is expected to take over a starting role for the Wildcats after seeing increased playing time late last season as a freshman. Orf hit the game-tying double with two outs in the seventh inning in last year's district championship game.

With the loss of a couple big bats from last year's team, Raterman anticipates the Wildcats will use their speed even more this season. They are faster as a team

"It's no secret that we play a unique style," Raterman said. "And people are going to know that but I don't think that's going to matter because of our team speed. It's even more of an emphasis now so we're going to be even better at it than prior years I would say."

Like many spring sports teams, the Wildcats had to deal with difficult weather conditions early in the season. As of last Thursday, the Wildcats only had four outdoor practices due to weather conditions. This included one practice the Wildcats were only able to play catch outdoors. They did not get much field time as a result prior to last week's Jamboree and season opening games. Raterman did say he thought the Wildcats were ahead in their X's and O's, specifically with how they want to run their offense and their bunt coverag-

Raterman thinks the Wildcats have a good chance to have a successful season and finish the season over the .500 mark. Their expectation is to get back to the district championship game and give themselves a chance to win the district title.

"Pitching and defense has been a focus of ours," Raterman said. "Our guys probably wish that they hit more but I think that getting over the hump, it's in every sport. Defense wins championships. And so does pitching. We've got to pitch it and play defense."

The Wright City track and field teams return a host of key contributors and a strong number of newcomers as they look to build on last season's success.

The Wright City track and field teams return multiple conference champions and state medalist Elizabeth Riggs from last year's squad. Wright City's roster size increased to 54 this year. They had around 42 athletes on the roster last season.

We're a little bit bigger, which is good," Wright City track and field coach Fred Ross said. "The majority of the kids have been working really hard. "We expect her to be our leading girl," Ross said. "We don't have any senior girls. So we expect her to ping up as leaders for the Lady Wildcats this season."

Wallace touts Wright City's depth, leadership

The Wright City girls soccer program is seeing a boom in numbers in Jacob Wallace's first year at the helm of the program.

The Lady Wildcats have 37 players in the soccer program, the most in the program's short history. Wallace said while they return experienced players, about half of the players on the roster have not played true competitive organized soccer before. He stressed they have a couple players that have played competitive soccer for a long time.

'It makes it a challenge to kind of differentiate in practice because we have a mixture that you are building up the skill level of those ones who are just learning how to play but also challenging the ones that have played competitively for a long time," Wallace said.
Wallace said the strong numbers will help the Lady

Wildcats be able to utilize substitutes when needed.

Wright City returns three senior starters from last year's 10-win team. Cassandra Reash returns after starting last season as Wright City's goalie. Alex Sutter and Abigail Unterreiner also return for the Lady Wildcats. Sophomores Paige Kirn and Paige Rees also return after starting at midfield as freshmen.

We have a couple sophomores who have really just taken on some leadership roles and run with them," Wallace said. "And they've been incredible leaders. It's really exciting to see both leadership from the senior level with the upperclassmen but also that leadership for the younger kids."

Wallace anticipates the Lady Wildcats will implement a balanced attack. He wants Wright City to press when it is smart to do so but also be intelligent about possessing the ball. They want to get the best looks they can on the offensive end without opening up opportunities for opponents on the defensive end.

One of Wallace's main goals for Wright City this sea-

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Warriors return contributors, eye GAC North title

With a strong nucleus returning, the Warrenton Warriors are setting their sights on a conference title.

Warrenton returns a strong number of contributors from last year's squad that finished the season with 14 wins. They went 6-2 in GAC North play and were one game short of a conference title.

"In the nine years we've been in the GAC North, we've been first or second in conference in six of those years," Warrenton head coach Eric Burle said. "We were an inning away from winning conference last year. Really, that's the expectation is to be able to compete for a conference title."

Warrenton's strength will be in their infield, with four of five starting infielders returning from last year's team. Senior Kannon Hibbs returns for his fourth season and will man the hot corner for the Warriors. The third baseman led Warrenton in hitting last season. Caleb Clark, Austin Haas and Tyler Oliver are also returning starting infielders from last year's team. Ben Peth and Sam Wortham also started games in the outfield last season.


'Offensively, I think we had a really good year last year," Burle said. "We have a number of big bats coming back. A number of guys that have had a number of years of experience on varsity. So hopefully they can continue to maintain and build on what they've done the last couple of years."

The Warriors will have multiple varsity starting spots to fill from last season's team, including spots in the outfield. Junior Joe Goldsmith is still on the roster but is out for the season after suffering a knee injury in the fall. Goldsmith was the Warriors' starting center fielder last season. Burle characterized Goldsmith as the best outfielder in the GAC North last season. He anticipates there will be a learning curve for Warrenton's outfielders.

Peth headlines the list of pitchers returning to the team this season. He threw a team-high 46 innings last season and led the Warriors with five wins and a 2.86 ERA. Olver and Wortham each logged over 20 innings.

'There's a lot of question marks there. There's a lot of guys that we know that can pitch but a lot of guys don't have a lot of varsity experience," Burle said. "There's at least three guys that saw a significant amount of innings last year. There's a lot of youth there so hopefully they can get some experience throughout the year and kind of figure out what their role is.'

Burle stressed the Warriors know what their returning starters can bring to the table. They are counting on the newcomers to fill in the gaps left from players who graduated last year or did not return to the team

"I think we have more options on offense than we've had in the past with more ability, more speed and more shots," Wargowsky said.




