Back in 1925, a Virginia high school decided to create a club for teenage farming boys to teach them more about the industry they worked in. They called this organization the Future Farmers of America, designed to educate those "future generations" of agriculturalists. They worked to teach these boys about industries such as meat processing, agronomy, and dairy. Three short years later, the club soon became a national organization, with chapters being chartered all over the nation. Little did these founders know, this organization would grow into something bigger than they ever could have imagined.

Throughout the years, FFA has evolved from a strict all-boys, agriculture based club to an all-inclusive and diverse organization. While FFA still focuses on teaching students about the agricultural industry, it also focuses on providing students with real life skills to prepare them for their futures in any industry. For example, kids learn how to effectively present themselves for a job interview, learn crucial communication skills, and how to overcome public speaking fears. To showcase this shift in focus, in 1998, FFA's name was changed from the Future Farmers of America to the National FFA Organization. Now, this organization serves over 850,000 members across all 50 states along with the U.S. Virgin Islands and Puerto Rico.

The experiences that FFA can provide to a high



school student are second to none.

Personally, through my experiences in FFA, such as the Missouri Agribusiness Academy, National FFA Convention, and being an FFA Officer, I have evolved into someone I never thought I would be.
