### **Warrenton FFA members apply for** Missouri State FFA degree

Congratulations Warrenton FFA Chapter members Isabella Miller, Lindsey Englelage and Hailey Cary for applying to earn the Missouri State FFA degree. The degree is the highest honor that the state association can bestow upon its members.

They earn points towards this degree by having a quality supervised agricultural experience project over the past three years, and attending and serving as a leader in FFA and in their community.

Their applications advanced with honors from the area to state level and are currently being evaluated by the State FFA Association. State FFA degrees will be presented at the Missouri State FFA Convention in Columbia in April of this year.

Miller also earned first place in the Area 5 Goat Production Proficien-

cy Area and Englelage earned first place in the Agricultural Sales Proficiency Area. Proficiencies are evaluated based on the FFA members supervised agricultural experience projects. Members must document the financial expenditures, income, skills they learned, growth of their SAE and FFA leadership activities in their record books from freshman year to today.






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
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## Wright City FFA has first Area Star Farmer in 41 years

Reagan Vehige is a senior in the Wright City FFA at Wright City High School. Reagan is the daughter of Chuck and Eileen Vehige of Wright City, Missouri and her FFA Advisors are Kelsey and Dustin Kemry Elledge. Reagan is extremely involved in FFA and is currently serving as the Wright City FFA Vice President.

The Area Star Farmer is awarded to the FFA member that demonstrates the top agricultural production in their supervised agricultural experience project. The Area V FFA consists of over 18 school districts. The member must demonstrate outstanding achievement, active FFA participation and an exemplary scholastic record. On Thursday,

was informed that she was selected as the Area V Star Farmer.

She is the first Area Star Farmer from Wright City High School since Tim Dunakey in 1983, according to previous agriculture teacher and Advisor David Cook. After talking with Cook about the Wright City FFA Chapter's success, he said "Well this phone call really made this old man smile. Congratulations!"

Reagan earned this prestigious award not only by being extremely involved in FFA but also with her supervised agricultural experience project. Reagan is a sucentrepreneur who owns a show stock business, Vehige Club Lambs, and she raises and shows cattle.

Vehige Club Lambs began six years ago

Feb. 13, Reagan Vehige with buying 5 bred ewes. Since Vehige Club Lambs began, Reagan has continued to grow her herd in quality and quantity. Reagan's overall goals for her company are to produce high quality show lambs for both herself and to sell to customers. Some responsibilities with this business include feeding and caring for her sheep, maintaining barn cleanliness, staying up to date with vaccinations, helping the ewes and lambs during lambing season, advertising and customer service. The quality of her herd is evidenced by Reagan winning Grand and Reserve Champion at the Warren County Fair the past several years. She not only shows her lambs at the county fair but also at the district, state and national levels.

Within these higher lev-

el shows, Reagan's high quality genetics have proven to earn top spots even nationally.

Along with Club Lambs, Vehige Reagan has shown cattle for eleven years. Owning cattle comes with a lot of responsibility such as feeding and watering, staying up to date with deworming and vaccinations, keeping the stalls clean, breaking and washing calves and more. In the last two years, Reagan has grown tremendously in her knowledge and quality of show cattle. She has done extremely well with her show cattle at both the Warren County Fair and Missouri State

Moving forward with the Area Star Farmer award, Reagan is now competing for Missouri Star Farmer. They select the Missouri Star Farm-
